What's Up D.O.C.? by Joel Jackson

1. FGCSA Website:

2. Government Relations:

Water (1): Hillsborough County attempted to tack on an additional 5% reduction in irrigation demand on courses in the county. Commissioners claimed they were acting in response to continued public outcry over the "apparent" over use of water by area golf courses. Other than unfounded complaints the county could not answer SWFWMD's continued questions of proof of violations. Don Cox of the Cheval CC also got his club involved in asking questions. Since they had no facts to back up their proposed actions, the county has backed off for the time being. They say they want to form a coalition of big water users to discuss water issues. Somebody please tell them that golf courses used less than 5% of the water in Hillsborough County. But we'd love to sit at the table at least in order to educate them and evidently defend ourselves.

Water (2): Polk County Commission Symposium on Growth and Water Resource Management - I made a 20 minute presentation to an audience of 50-60 people. Most of the attendees were county and city officials and staff. I was able to show the group that in Polk County Recreational/Aesthetic use of water is only 3% of the total consumed in the county so be sure to put golf course use in perspective when talking about conservation measures in the future. FTGA President Alan Puckett also attended and we had lunch with two of the commissioners after the program. Alan also sits on the Polk County Water Advisory Board and has brought new understanding to the county on golf course practices.

Nemacur registration - Susan Jennings of

the US EPA office called the other day looking to verify or clarify some information she heard in DC. Some sources were telling her that the only use of Nemacur we cared about was for greens only. I said that was not the case; we still need the ability to treat tees and fairways as needed. I reiterated that greens are the primary concern, but we cannot forsake other key turf areas on the course. Jennings is the Risk manager for fenamifos and has been in that position for only a couple of months. I was concerned that all the information we gave back in January was lost, she said no, just buried in the files!!! As I backtracked to make sure she had our message, she said all I was saying was the word she got, but she just wanted to make sure about the Nemacur and greens only comment. Final decision will probably come down in December.

FGCSA BMP Committee: Will meet again on Friday, October 26th just prior to the FGCSA Fall Board Meeting at Bay Hill in Orlando. The group will discuss how to format the information we are gathering to fit into the IFAS BMP Manual. We hope to have Dr. Unruh attend the meeting.

3. Allied Associations:

The Florida Golf Economic Impact Study is on schedule as the survey questionnaire is being made ready for distribution. The study headed up by UF/IFAS Ag Economic professors John Haydu and Alan Hodges will attempt to define the total impact of the golf industry to Florida's economy. This information is a vital tool when discussing state budget cuts in research, water restrictions, and local ordinances on chemical and fertilizer use to name just a few items close to us. It will also be valuable for new course development and expansion of existing facilities. FGCSA President Geoff Coggan is urging all superintendents to be on the look out for the survey and to promote the completion of the survey by his or her club. The study is being funded by the FTGA with the backing of WCI Communities. The FGCSA, Everglades GCSA and Florida Golf Alliance have made donations to the project and other groups are being encouraged to do so as well. This study benefits everyone in golf.

I was happy to see Pat Jones respond in his column to his tough positions with regard to GCSAA. I thought he explained his views well. Having worked at Disney with its squeaky clean and wholesome image, you are bound to see some flaws being so close to the operation. Not every person and every decision is going to be perfect. However, the overall mission and the majority of the staff are Grade A. So it is with every group. I'm happy to be part of Golfdom's editorial team. WCGCSA Hosts Final GCSAA Seminar for 2001

West Coast GCSA offers the final GCSAA Regional Seminar to be held in Florida in 2001on November 15th at the Renaissance Vinoy in St. Petersburg.

Dr. David Kopec of the University of Arizona returns to Florida to teach the all day seminar titled Irrigation Water Quality. The five components of irrigation water quality (salt content, sodium hazard, residual sodium carbonate, pH and toxic ion content) are discussed in relation to their impacts on turf performance and soil properties. Interpreting a water test report is emphasized. Sound management strategies to cope with poor quality irrigation water while providing acceptable turf and protecting soil are presented. Learn how to develop management strategies to cope with less than optimum quality irrigation water. This seminar is considered an intermediatelevel program; the recommended prerequisite is an introductory soil science course or seminar.

17th Annual SFGCSA Tournament a Resounding Success

For the last 16 years, the S.F.G.C.S.A. has sponsored a golf tournament to benefit the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children/Florida Branch (NCMEC/FL). The tournaments have raised over \$140,000 to support local Florida programs. After the October 5th event, the total donation now exceeds \$155,000 with the tremendous success of the 17th Annual Tournament held at Colony West CC in Tamarac, Florida.

"Twenty years ago, the Center began its work out of tragic circumstances, the abduction and murder of Adam Walsh. Today we are part of a national network of nonprofit centers helping thousands of children and their families every year," stated Nancy A. McBride, NCMEC Director of Prevention Education. "We are proud to be associated with the S.F.G.C.S.A. and grateful to the community for their ongoing support of our mission: to help find missing children, and to prevent child victimization."

The S.F.G.C.S.A. is one of our charter supporters and partners," said Reve Walsh, cofounder and Board member of NCMEC. "The children in Florida have access to child safety information and programs, and their parents have access to an efficient and effective response team if their child is missing. Tallahassee Report by Mike Goldie

Reapportionment is defined by Webster's dictionary as a "new appointment - to divide and share out according to a plan." The key word is a "plan". Every ten years following a new census the United States and the Florida Constitution require the Florida Legislation to reapportion the state and federal legislative districts to reflect the new census information.

What effect would this have on the golf industry in Florida? First we must look at what exists today. Districts like Senate District 29 -- Senator Rossin, a Democrat. This district takes the high population of Palm Beach county, ie. democratic, and a large low-density area of Republicans all across the state to Collier County. We could see the opposite taking place with a Republican controlled Legislature. The Florida east coast has been a Democratic stronghold but with reapportionment we could see a shift of power to a Republican west coast.

What this could mean is within water management districts you could see a change in policy between the South Florida Water Management District and Southwest Florida Water Management District. You could see more "golf friendly" attitudes in Naples vs. Fort Lauderdale.

Again, the key word is the "plan". In 1992 the plan was controlled by the Democrats, in 2002 it will be controlled by the Republicans. It becomes more and more incumbent on us to know our legislative members and their attitudes relative to our industry. We must be ready to educate new members as to the economics and environmental value of golf to our state and to each legislative distrits of our state.
