WHY OUR PRESENT DROUGHT?

Wayne C. Palmer of the U. S. Weather Bureau says that the drought is "spreading and intensifying." The reason for the drought is as the experts say "a meteorological phenomenon that began 4 years ago and as of yet has given no signs of abating; a predominantly dry air mass that has locked itself over the Atlantic". This has made us on the downhill side of the air cycle. Air flowing from northwest to southeast moves lower as it reaches the east coast, becomes warmer and drier and loses its rain making potential.

REASONS WHY SUPERINTENDENTS SHOULD PLAY GOLF

To know your golf course is to improve it. You will be able to find imperfections and adjust them before the members become dissatisfied. I am speaking mostly about pin placements, markers, clean towels, properly kept ball washers, traps that need sanding, weeding, raking and edging, rough that needs attention, bottles, papers and other debris which litter the course, places that need reseeding and the condition of your greens. These are a few of the many things which make for a well groomed golf course.

I play golf at least twice a week. Saturday with my chairman, upon completion of golf, we have an informal meeting to discuss the condition of the course and any improvements which we think should be made. Sundays I usually play golf with different members. By so doing many members discuss with me ideas to improve the course and this helps the Superintendent to have better rapport with the members.

Golf is a game for the old and the young alike. So let's all play a little golf and see our handywork as the membership of a club sees it.
