Since then, they have been improving course conditions, adding bunkers, constructing greens and renovating the Par 3 course. The course has gotten a new irrigation system and pump station as part of the renovation work.

Pine Hills was constructed in 1966 by Hank Evanish as a 9 hole course with construction being completed

by Greg's uncle in 1972 for the 18 hole course. Greg began to work for his uncle before the partnership that is the current ownership was formed. Greg, Scott, and superintendent Eric Duffy formed a partnership where they set out to provide a safe, fun, affordable golf course for the public to enjoy. With this mindset they have made the improvements listed and have goals of more changes in the future.

In 2006, the pitch and putt course was renovated to offer golf in a different way to the public. This Par 3 short course of 735 yards of challenging target golf is available to us at our meeting.

What a year! The challenges continue.

Drought stress has a firm grasp on much of the Mid-Atlantic Region. Although dry weather is good for the golfer, it makes it very difficult for

the turf manager to establish new sod, germinate new seed, and, most of all, prepare the turf for winter. Recovery of damaged areas is very slow for this time of year, due to lack of rain. As of this update, many turf managers are faced with making difficult decisions about the care of the course due to water shortages!

All of Pennsylvania is either under a drought warning or drought watch. This involves either a mandatory or voluntary reduction in water usage. This can have an effect on golf course fall renovations. <u>Only renovate what you can support with irrigation</u>!

Drought-stressed grass should be cut less, fertilized less (a real problem if turf must recover from the summer), raise mowing heights, and restrict cart traffic from drought-sensitive grasses like fairway bentgrass. When will this year's weather problems be over?

Though many turf managers can buy water, doing so will affect the bottom line. Many



courses had to make adjustments to their budgets as the year began, and it was not uncommon to hear from superintendents that the line item for water was slashed. The last two years were somewhat benign compared to this season. Monies not spent for water last year were viewed as potential savings this season rather than a real estimate of need during a tough year. The decision to purchase water should be based on agronomics rather than economics. It will cost far more over the long term to reestablish playing surfaces from seed or sod compared to the cost of water needed to sustain the current stand of turf this fall.

The critical issue this fall is to prepare the turf for cold temperature stress. Properly hydrating the turf is the first step towards maximizing cold temperature tolerance. During the fall, sugars are produced and act as an anti-freeze within the plant. This is referred to as *hardening*. Without water (irrigation/or precipitation), it is very difficult to fertilize the turf, maintain surface density, maximize root mass, recover from disease or mechanical damage, or even implement basic grass growing techniques such as aeration. And, if faced with a choice, a turf manager would always prefer rainfall to irrigation in order to stimulate the grass. We can't duplicate what Mother Nature can do.

Many courses continue on the road to recovery, but turf mangers are still battling turf diseases. Summer Patch (*Magnaporthepoae*) for example, has been a persistent problem in most of the region. Summer patch has affected *Poa annua* on greens and in bluegrass rough. Although pest control measures can be enacted, it is essential that fertilizers be used to grow grass this fall. Using holistic practices continues to provide the best results.

Re: PCNB – Stop Sale

Dear Valued Customers:

As you may have read from our press releases, last month the United States Environmental Protection Agency issued a stop sale order with respect to our PCNB product line within the United States on the ground that our product contained a trace impurity that is not listed on our confidential statement of formula (CSF). We were shocked and surprised at the order, as it was issued without any advance warning just as our main selling season was starting and related to an impurity about which we had notified the agency nearly 20 years ago.

By way of background, under FIFRA for each registered compound, a registrant is required to list in its CSF all components that either (i) constitute at least 0.1% (1 part per 1,000) of the compound or (ii) are determined by EPA to be of toxicological significance. In 1993, we informed EPA that our PCNB manufacturing process yielded a trace impurity. It was unclear then (as now) whether this impurity had to be listed on a CSF. The agency took that information without further comment. In 1998 and then again in 2005, that agency approved our CSF for PCNB without making mention of any of the trace impurity. Last June, we engaged in discussions with USEPA about our CSF with a focus on impurities and embarked upon what we thought would be a mutual effort to assess purity levels, manufacturing processes and our CSF disclosure.

Without furnishing any technical analysis, notice or opportunity to explain our position, the agency stopped sale of our product in August. Bear in mind that the stop sale order did not include any contention that our product poses any risk to health or the environment. Indeed we are talking about an impurity of less than 10 parts per billion or 0.000001%. We promptly called for meetings with USEPA to hammer out an informal resolution, but quickly determined that the matter had been effectively handed off to government lawyers.

In the interest of protecting our business and saving our season, we filed a motion for emergency relief from the stop sale with the federal court arguing, among other things, that the issuance of the order amounted to the taking of our property without due process. Last Thursday, however, that court denied our motion. In making his ruling, the judge noted that although the agency's actions were troubling and Amvac had been treated unfairly, the agency was legally permitted to take this action.

At this stage, we plan to amend our CSF and work as expeditiously as possible with USEPA to get this stop sale removed. We will also continue down the path of further litigation, as we continue to believe that the order is an abuse of process. However, there is no guarantee that the agency (or a court) will work through this issue in less than four months (which they are permitted under applicable law). As a result, we are not confident that we will be able to ship product to our customers in time for turf application in the late Fall and Winter of 2010. We sincerely apologize in advance if we are unable to supply your needs in time for your application. Nevertheless, we thought it best to give you ample time to protect your business interests as we work on this matter. We will, of course, keep you apprised of material developments as we learn of them.

Thank you for your understanding and support. We look forward to continuing to serve you when this storm passes.
