



#### THE FERNIE-CAMPBELL MATCH.

NOTES ON THE GAME.

Every opportunity has now been given for forming an opinion of the exact merit of the Islay links, and, without qualification, it may be said it is of the first order, and very well worth a visit Nothing strikes one more than its likeness to the old portion of the Prestwick links, only on a larger scale. Three and a-half miles is given as the length, but on a hot day, when one has tramped over the rough ground to the fifteenth hole or so, a tremendous feeling of thirst-because Islay is a particularly thirsty place—and a slight feeling of fatigue, suggest a greater length. And, perhaps, it is in this that the less robust golfer will find fault with the course, and but the only one. The shortening of a hole here and there might be an advantage. With regard to the Island itself, a more pleasant holiday could not be imagined than a week's sojourn at Port-Ellen in good weather. Already known as one of the homes of whisky, the new attraction ought to draw both the Scotchman and the Englishman. The mysteries of the "still" may be explored by

anyone, and "best Scotch" is always at hand. The day of the match dawned beautiful. The weather in Scotland this year has been unusually cold, but this day proved to be an exception. The sun shone all day and made the surroundings look their loveliest. Port-Ellen presented quite a picturesque appearance. The inhabitants were early on the stir in anticipation, and not a little attention was given to the sun-burned professionals, each looking his best, and the handful of spectators, dressed in semi-Highland garb, who had come from afar to witness the game. About ten o'clock the vehicles to convey the players and spectators were ready, but not a few preferred to walk the picturesque road to Laggan Bay. There was a very respectable appearance when the match started. A few trial shots took place, and after the green had been formally opened by Mrs. Ramsay, of Kildalton, play in earnest began. Play up to the ninth hole was tough, with varied success, but Campbell managed to secure a lead of two. He added another at the eleventh hole, then three halves came in. Unaccountably Fernie fell off at this stage, and he lost the next three holes. This turned out to be the crucial point in the match, and he was never able to make up the loss of six holes. The seventeenth, however, fell to him, and the last hole was halved. After an interval for luncheon play was resumed, and going out three holes were halved, and the same number fell to each player. Fernie fought splendidly, but he was not able to shake his opponent; Campbell won the tenth and eleventh holes, and stood dormy seven. A half at the twelfth hole gave him the match by seven up and six to play. He was given three ringing cheers on being subsequently presented with the medal. The same compliment was also paid to Fernie.

Campbell deserves all credit for his well-earned victory. He was in splendid condition, and played a strong game throughout. The comparatively new nature of the putting-greens, however, did not permit of a brilliant game being played; Fernie, on the other hand, was seen decidedly to disadvantage. His record has been a brilliant one, but on this occasion he did not show up to the mark. It must in justice be said that he was unlucky, and that, combined with his small knowledge of the green, may have had something to do with the heaviness of the defeat. Still the fact remains that Campbell played the better game. Fernie nearly always outdrove his opponent, and their game between was equal; but it was on the green that Campbell's superiority was shown, Fernie more than once threw away the holes by missing short putts.

One delightful feature of the match was the cordiality of feeling which existed between the players. They are old friends, and this pleasantness added much to the interest of the game. When one or other secured a temporary advantage, much goodnatured chaff was indulged in. Fernie, even, although playing a losing game, was throughout in the best of spirits and temper, and, as he put it, "died hard."

It will be remembered that in match play these two men have met on three previous occasions. Twice Fernie was the victor, by 7 and 6 to play, and by 2 and 1 to play; against that, however, he sustained a heavy defeat by 12. The present match leaves all parties equal, and it would be interesting to see another match, perhaps over home and home greens.

### AN ANCIENT GOLF CLUB.



Messrs. J. G. Thomson and Co., of The Vaults, Leith, are at present making alterations on their premises, which will now front the new street formed by the Leith Improvement Trust; and in the course of demolishing what must have been the oldest part of the Vaults property, bearing date on the cornerstone, 1682, there was found a coin bearing that date and a curious old Golf iron head, which are reproduced. Our sketch of the iron is one-half the size of the original, which weighs just over 1 lb. It appears to have been admirably finished, and its shape proves conclusively that the so-called "patents" so much in vogue are by no means the invention of the patentees. For instance, this antique iron has the heavy-weighted sole, as in Forrester's patents; and also has its face bevelled like Park's lofters. The main buildings bear date 1785, and these which are retained have been greatly altered internally to meet the more modern requirements of Messrs. Thomson's business.

#### INKSTAND GOLF TROPHY.

We desire to call the attention of our readers to an inkstand Golf trophy which has just been designed and executed by Mr. Robert Sawers, jeweller, Maitland Street, Edinburgh. As will be seen from the sketch of the trophy given in the advertisement pages, it will be noticed that in every point of detail the design is redolent of Golf. The figures on the inkstand represent Ben Sayer, the well-known North Berwick professional, and his caddie. Sayers is represented as being in the act of holing out, while the caddie standing in front with the clubs is a keen and interested spectator of the stroke. The figures were modelled from life by Mr. W. G. Stevenson, A.R.S.A., and all golfers who have played with Sayers will readily recognise, not only his putting attitude, but in a general way the close resemblance to his features. The two ink-bottes are facsimile reproductions of the sand-boxes at the angle hole, the fifth out at North Berwick, where Sayers is supposed to be putting. The length of the stand is 23 inches, the breadth 10 inches, the height of Sayers' figure 6 inches, and the height of the caddie with the clubs 7 inches. The trophy is made of electro plate of the first quality, and of course could easily be made in sterling silver, should any golfer or club so desire it. The price is £10.

From an inspection of the trophy, one gathers the impression that Mr. Sawers has certainly done his work well and with admirable taste. He has the advantage over many designers of Golf trophies in being a keen hand at the Royal and Ancient game himself, and thus knows exactly what is needed, not only for general effect, but in filling in the essential and characteristic points of detail. The figures in this trophy show this, for not only are they posed in such a way as to indicate that the designer knew what was needed in order to secure the element of vraisemblance, and to preserve the whole work from that incongruous grouping which the keen and practised eye of the golfer is so prone to detect. The design is the most original we have yet seen for a golfing trophy. Hitherto, Mr. Sawers has made a good many trophies for clubs, and for individual golfers, among the latter being one for Major-General Renton, of the Jersey Club, and quite recently a silver putter for Mrs. H. S. C. Everard. His latest design is a welcome relief from the hitherto stereotyped form of cubs and other articles so familiar as prizes; and it is to be hoped that Golf club executives who wish to give a really useful and artistic article as a good prize in a competition, or if a Golfer wishes to make, say, an appropriate wedding or birthday present to a lady golfer, will look with kindly favour on this new and original claimant to their attention.

#### A NEW MACKINTOSH GOLF CAPE.

All golfers know how distressing it is to be overtaken in the middle of a long round, say at Sandwich, St. Andrews, or North Berwick, by a heavy, drizzling rain, when shelter is out of the question, except behind a wall, a whin bush, or under the partial protection of an escarpment in a deep sand bunker. Clothes become sodden and heavy, club grips become slippery, play becomes careless and uncertain, and everyone is in a hurry to get home to the club-house, though an otherwise excellent score should be sacrificed. When the weather it lowering the prudent players put an old umbrella among ths clubs, and trust to its shelter in case of rain. But this expediene is an unsatisfying one at the best, and does little to hinder the eventual drenching. Several mackintosh manufacturers have turned their attention to supplying the golfer's want; and Messrs. Benjamin and Sons, of Ulster House, have designed a Golf cloak which can be worn while in play without in the least incommoding the arms in playing the stroke. Their efforts, we are glad to notice, have been attended with a gratifying amount

Messrs. Goudie and Co., 25, Princes Street, Edinburgh, wellknown as the makers of fine Golf balls and clubs, have just brought out a golfer's mackintosh cape which fulfils the same end as the Golf cloak of Messrs. Benjamin and Sons. It is not so long in the body as the garment of Messrs. Benjamin, but it is equally serviceable. It can be worn while in play, it leaves the arms free, and does not in the least incommode the player. We have recently had the pleasure of testing one of these capes, and found it to answer in every respect the requirements of a player who goes out in a drizzle, or who may be overtaken far from welcome shelter, by a downpour. The cape is very light. It is fitted with two straps that go over the shoulders, and button in conjunction with a waist-belt round the body, so that when one has to play the ball the cape may be momentarily thrown back and then readjusted in its original position, so as to cover practically the whole body. The material has a soft silky feeling about it, and is handsomely lined with a check stuff. A more serviceable garment as part of the golfer's holiday outfit could not be found, and its appearance ought to banish from the links into the limbo of antiquated and useless relics the battered, dripping, inconvenient, unsightly, incongruous, umbrella.

#### THE SANDWICH MEETING.

POLLOWING close upon the heels of the Amateur Championship at St. Andrews came the great southern gathering of golfers at Sandwich last week, to compete for the St. George's Champion Grand Challenge Cup, open to all amateurs. It is a far cry from the county of Fife to the county of Kent, and, although but few players of note on Scottish greens put in an appearance, the muster of golfers present during the three days of the meeting must have been particularly gratifying to the executive of the St. George's Club.

The Bell Hotel, even in its enlarged form, was unable to accommodate the whole of the metropolitan exodus. The lodging-houses were laid under requisition, and for nearly a week the surplus labouring population of the town were converted into the carriers of clubs. Golfers coming from their lodgings to the hotel to breakfast or to dine were continually losing their way among the labyrinthine streets and alleys. Silent, grass-grown streets echoed with the steady. martial clank of hob-nail golfing-shoes, and men arrayed in Harris tweeds and knickerbockers afforded a source of wondering speculation to dames and urchins congregated around open doorways. Crack players, in the persons of Mr. John Ball, Mr. Hilton, Mr. A. F. Macfie, Mr. A. D. Blyth, Messrs. W. E. and F. A. Fairlie, Mr. Mure Fergusson, Mr. Henry Lamb, Mr. Molesworth, Mr. F. G. Tait, and others, were present, and a really first-class exposition of the game was witnessed throughout the contests. Unhappily for all concerned, the weather was very unfavourable on Monday and early on Tuesday; but this drawback did not appear in the least to diminish the enthusiasm of players. A steady procession of couples, some with umbrella, others in waterproof golfing cloaks, could be seen steadily wending their way over the undulating ground and heedless of the wet, and intent only upon the flight of their ball. And when the lowering, leaden clouds lifted and allowed the warm sun to peep forth and suffuse the landscape with its warm rays, what a picturesque sight gladdened the eye of the holiday golfer, say, from the summit of "The Maiden." To the right, Pegwell Bay rolled with reverberating echo on the pebbly margin of the links; ships, with bellying sails, passed to and fro among the Goodwins; the white chalk cliffs opposite shone in the rich morning light with a dazzling splendour; and Ramsgate, partially shrouded in a humid mist, stretched itself lazily downwards to the sea. Behind, Deal nestled with an air of placid, sluggish comfort; while to the left the warm May sun glistened on the old, weather-beaten, picturesque church of Sandwich, on the red tiles of the irregularly-built little town, on the little stream that crawled like a silvery worm around its outskirts, and freshened into a more exhilarating tint the green of the extensive meadow lands and the luxuriant foliage of the Kentish woods.

Scottish golfers recall with pride the historical associations that cluster around St. Andrews as the leading golfing

centre. Sandwich, too, has its historical associations, not less important, and probably more stirring.

"Something of old ancestral pride it keeps, Though fallen from its earlier place and circumstance."

When one gazes out of the Bell Hotel window at that sluggish stream, with one or two little craft moored to the edge, and being perfunctorily loaded or unloaded, it is impossible for the memory not to recall a little of what Sandwich has been in the past. At the coming of the Vikings to England in the ninth century it was on this little town on the Kentish coast that their attacks fell most frequently. The reason for this is not far to seek, because, as its monasteries and ecclesiastical edifices show, the early civilisation of Kent was very high; it was one of the wealthiest and most thriving parts of Britain, and the main road of communication between this country and the continent. The silting up of the Wantsum closed the harbour of Richborough, and thereafter the growing trade with France passed to Dover and Sandwich. At that time, also, Canterbury was, in point of size and wealth, among the greatest of English cities, and was, besides, the seat of a Primacy. Time after time did the Anglo-Saxon kings gather their fleets at Sandwich, either for offence or defence; although when the golfer looks at that little stream in the summer twilight, he has great difficulty in realising that this was the case. Chroniclers tell us that in 1009 Æthelred saw assembled at Sandwich more king's ships than had ever been assembled before, and Harthacnut, when chosen king of England, landed at Sandwich somewhere about 1040, with a fleet of sixty vessels, which had been chosen for the conquest of the kingdom. On the silting up of the Channel between Thanet and Kent, Sandwich rose from a little hamlet on the sandy flats beside ruined Richborough into the main port of the Channel. Its "butsecarls," or sailors, had long been famous as the best mariners of the coast, while its ferry dues, port tolls, herring fishing, and general merchandise produced so much revenue as to excite the fierce cupidity alike of kings and ecclesiastics. That day of comparative splendour has long passed away. The sea has receded from it and left the little town stranded; but if there is anything that can bring back some of its departed glory it is the Golf club which has settled in its midst, and the army of golfers who are continually passing to and fro on health and pleasure bent. In years to come, Sandwich, by the aid of the golfer, may once again become the busy, prosperous haunt of men it once was; and the best thing the corporation of the town could do would be to inscribe in grateful recognition on its burgess-roll the names of the founders of the St. George's Golf Club. Many municipalities have conferred civic freedom for services less durable and less productive of good.

Much discussion arose in the evenings as to the champion tees. Some players argued that those tees were too stiff, that they necessitated continual pressing on the part of the players in order to clear the hazards, that they were not fair,

that the continual strain produced exhaustion, that to carry them was an impossible feat to the bulk of the players, and an agitation was threatened in favour of their abolition. We hope that the committee will adhere to their resolution to maintain the tees as they are. In our judgment the champion tees are one of the best features of a course, which is as ideal as it can well be made. Writing with ample experience of the tees, we should say that they are by no means so insuperably difficult as some players were heard to make out. Certainly, with a fresh wind against one, like that on Tuesday's competition, it was difficult for scratch players in all cases to clear the hazards; but the number in which failure brought bad luck is not worth consideration. The truth is that the champion tees are for scratch players of the best quality; not for handicap players just on the border limit of scratch. It ought to be recognised also that, in order to play the champion course satisfactorily, one must be in the best health and "as hard as nails" through constant practice. Adverse criticism like this is a testimony to the skill, care, and judgment with which Mr. Laidlaw/ W. Purves, and the early founders of the club, designed and laid out the course.

ST. ANDREWS AS A CHAMPIONSHIP COURSE.

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—I have read with much interest, the strictures upon St. Andrews Links which "One Who Played" has been good enough to pronounce in your columns. Within the last six weeks I have been informed, partly in conversation, partly through the newspapers: (1) That Hoylake is not a champion course; (2) that Prestwick is not a champion course; (3) that Sandwich is not a champion course; and now, (4) that St. Andrews is not a champion course. This appears to me to be in the last degree unfortunate, as it happens that the greens in question are precisely those over which the contest is to take place for the next four years (not, however, in the order named). Destructive criticism requires no particular aptitude; it comes naturally to some people, but perhaps your correspondent, in the light of the facts I have just mentioned, would be kind enough to supplement his remarks by favouring us with a constructive policy, and indicating where in his opinion, not one green, but four, may be found which would be suitable. I have so far been unable to reconcile the general tenour of his letter with his statement that, "on the contrary, Mr. Laidlay's winning on such a green proves that he is a player of super-excellence."

On reading this, I took the meaning to be that the difficulties

of playing the green were considerable, and this impression is borne out by an experience extending over many years. An eminent and successful player from the south has been heard to characterise St. Andrews as "drawing-room Golf," but somehow, when it comes to deeds, as distinct from words, the gentleman in question is never able to get within sight of 90 for a medal round. Facts like this have come under my notice times without number; really good players from other greens find themselves unable to play St. Andrews in a manner even faintly approximating their ideal. What follows? Are they themselves at fault? Not they; the fault lies obviously in the St. Andrews green. But, on the other hand, what first-class player bred at St. Andrews is at fault when he goes thence to other greens? Allan Robertson, young Tom, Andrew and Hugh Kirkaldy, Willie Fernie-what description of shot is to be met with elsewhere, that each and all of these players, to say nothing of a host of others, were and are unable to negotiate? Hitherto I have been under the impression that these and others of their kidney were both "accomplished and versatile," able to play, and constantly playing every sort of shot that could possibly present itself. But perhaps your correspondent will indicate the parts of the game where, upon St. Andrews, or any green, the "moderate player" would, as he inferentially states he would, overcome such players as I have named. From, I suppose a few days' experience, your correspondent dogmatises about lengths of approach, full shots, and other matters, and poses as an authority in much the same way as a newly-fledged undergraduate feels himself so infinitely superior to, and wiser than the rest of the world. If your correspondent were to play St. Andrews green in fair weather and foul, in every wind, in wet weather and dry, winter and summer, and then read his own utterances afresh, I wonder what he would think of them! But with parts of his letter I have every sympathy; unfortunately

the green is "a Paradise for wild drivers"; would that it were otherwise, and restored to its condition of thirty years ago. With sorrow I admit that a ball in the whins, or where whins ought to be, is now often in far better case than one beautifully driven on the direct line. Your correspondent is good enough to advise the St. Andrews authorities what they are to do in order to make St. Andrews a championship course. From one having such an experience of the links as his letter indicates, the advice is of course valuable, and will perhaps be duly noted; but if steps are taken to carry out his suggestions, the authorities in question will speedily find themselves in conflict with the proprietor, with the grazing tenant, and other interests, which your correspondent has not thought necessary to mention.

#### CARRUTHERS' PATENT CLEEK.

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—Having heard considerable discussion recently upon Carruthers' New Patent Cleek, and being unable to give my own opinion, not having seen the Patent, I determined to do so, and for that purpose called upon the Inventor. I am not at any time in favour of new inventions in the shape of clubs, because, with all the supposed improvements, the result of one's play is not in keeping with them. In truth, were all the intended benefits derived from every new patent club, I should not like to predict what the game would ultimately become. In course of conversation with Mr. Carruthers 1 was fingering away with some of his cleek heads, and found them so well balanced that they stood upon a smooth table in playing position without support. The very moment I saw his driving cleek I could see at a glance what its capabilities were, provided that the other end was all right. There are all kinds of clubs, driving cleeks, putting cleeks, lofting irons, heavy irons, and niblicks; and his latest is a neat little cleek also of perfect balance, and so small that two of the heads go easily into the watch-pocket. Mr. Carruthers is also very careful with the handles and has them all made of fine tough white hickory, with the spring where it ought to be. But the great treat is to try one-I mean as a driving cleek. There is, I am certain, a surprise awaiting anyone who has yet to try it; for in the flight of the ball, just at the moment when you are expecting it to begin to fall, it begins to rise as if while in the air receiving some fresh impetus. The ball leaves the cleek with a pleasant feeling to the hands, making little noise, and if the strokes are played easily (which they must be on account of the extra spring) the ball travels off as if played from a driver. With apologies for taking up so much of your valuable space.

#### GOLF AT KIMBERLEY.

This playing with the cleek only recoils heavily upon the one who indulges in it, because though he may make a safe and steady score, he will never do anything brilliant, as he will never learn to use the driver properly, without which he can never become a first-class player; indeed, for the good of the game and members of the club generally, the practice should be put down by a rule to that effect. Dr. Mackenzie topped his best previous score by one stroke, doing the round in 97 actual. His driving was for the most part very fine, but short game is where he must improve if he wishes to play at scratch, which doubtless he will do soon.

# OPENING OF THE ISLAY COURSE. CAMPBELL AND FERNIE FOR £100.

Friday, the 15th inst., was rather a notable day for Islay, in respect that it not only witnessed the formal opening for play of a Golf course on the island, but saw the fulfilment of an interesting professional fixture on the new green. A more delightful day for an open-air gathering of the kind could scarcely be imagined. All day the sun shone brightly, and the moderately fresh north-westerly breeze which blew across the island was only sufficient to temper the heat and to make the exercise of the game more exacting on the Machrie course, as the new links are named, than otherwise unpleasant. Perhaps the opening match between Willie Campbell, of Bridge of Weir, and Willie Fernie, of Troon, gained something in interest from the fact that it was played over the one green to be found in the Hebridesover the Westward Ho! of Scotland, as this green might not inappropriately be termed.

In these days when Golf has become so popular, half a day is not too much to give up in the journey for the sake of reaching a really good

green, where there is no congestion of players, but every facility for enjoying the Royal and Ancient game at its best. Greens more easy of access have now-a-days become so over-run with players that the golfer who wishes to enjoy his favourite pastime at its best must be prepared to go further afield than of yore. The multiplicity of players has led to the opening of greens in every district of Scotland, and of the courses of recent origin that of Islay carries off the palm. Nor is it difficult of access after all. One is apt to think that it is a far cry to Islay, but with the improved steamboat service which has come into operation this month the distance from the mainland can not only be very quickly covered, but the time of travelling is very enjoyably spent. The course of the Islay Golf Club was described in these columns some little time ago, so that it is not necessary to again go over the ground. Situated about three miles and a half from Port-Ellen, the course skirts Laggan Bay, which gains in attractiveness from the fact that it is open to the wide sweep of the Atlantic. The vast stretch of links reminded one in their appearance at times of Troon; again of Prestwick, and, in the case of some of the putting-greens, of Hoylake. As lighted up by the bright sunshine, the adjacent hills inland, as well as the more distant peaks of Jura, were the better seen in the clear atmosphere in which Friday's play took place. One great advantage the Machrie course possesses—the ground is by nature excellently adapted to the purposes of the game. The turf, which is an important factor in every Golf course, is wonderfully firm: the grass is short; there are few patches of bents common to other seaside greens; and the natural conformation of the links is such that eighteen capital holes have been obtained without in the least exhausting the resources of the ground. The course, indeed, only requires play to bring it into a high state of excellence. No doubt it is difficult of play. Punishment follows fault, and traps are abundant, but the green is only the better fitted on that account as a test of Golf and its value.

At the opening ceremony, which took place shortly before noon, Mr. Ramsay, of Kildalton, the proprietor of the ground, was on the spot. He was accompanied by Mrs. Ramsay and Miss Ramsay, and among others present were Captain Graham, of Lagavulin, Major Wise, captain of the club; Mr. P. J. Michie, who has acted as interim treasurer; Councillor M'Cuaig, Port-Ellen; and Mr. Peter Reid, the factor on the Kildalton estate. At the request of the club, Mrs. Ramsay for mally opened the links by driving the first ball. For this purpose she was provided with a club having a silver grip, which she retained as a memento of the occasion after the formal opening. Thereafter no time was lost in starting the match of the day between Campbell and Fernie. These players have met more than once before with varying success, the advantage being, however, on the side of the old Musselburgh professional, and, as there is a healthy rivalry between then, the match was more interesting on that account. Campbell, of course, had a slight pull over his man in that, having laid out the green, and laid it out capitally, too, he was fairly well acquainted with the general run of the ground. At the same time he secured the match, which was one of 36 holes, by distinctly the better play, as he won by seven holes and six to play. Campbell's victory was thus quite a substantial one, and the match was only another proof of the fact that, as a match player, he is a hard nut to crack. The Bridge of Weir professional was driving as well as ever. He played his approaches in very much his old style, and he was strong on the green, where, as on all new courses, one may have more or less luck. Fernie, again, was not seen at his best in the long game, but he did not lose the match by any shortcoming in that paut of the play, nor were his approaches faulty. As a rule it was on the green that he failed, and failed badly, and this weakness, together with the fact that bad luck dogged him throughout, well nigh lost him the match on the first eighteen holes. In

To many of those who followed the match, and there was a numerous gathering both of ladies and gentlemen, this was a first insight to the Royal and Ancient game, but they did not seem to follow the play with less interest on that account. Each and all, however, were quite amenable to the well-known rules in force on all Golf courses, and play proceeded very pleasantly. The first hole is one to delight the heart of the genuine golfer. There are bunkers to trap a bad tee stroke, and the approach being over a wide hazard of sand, with a burn flowing right across the line of play, is a most difficult one. Neither Fernie nor Campbell came to grief on the way, however, and the latter was only able to draw the first blood because his neighbour of Troon was twice weak on a rough green. The Strand, the second hole, has its only hazard in the approach, which is over a sandy cart-track, but for pulled balls through the green dangerous country lies in wait. It requires a long carry and an iron stroke to reach the green, and neither of the players required more. Fernie's wrist stroke, however, was much the better of the two, and it was good enough to enable him to square the match. Texa, the third hole, so called from the fact that it is placed close to the site of the old school, is chiefly remarkable for its magnificent approach over a low burn. Into this burn Fernie carried from the tee, and though he made a grand recovery, he lost the hole, as Campbell, using his mashie most deftly, got down in 3 with a better approach than the Troon man. Going to the fourth hole,

Campbell lay on the green in 2, while Fernie had still a wrist stroke to play to put him on equal terms with the other. He played this well enough, and looked as if he were to have a half; but his fourth jumped over the hole, and Campbell getting the like down, stood 2 up. A well-played half followed for the fifth hole, which reminds one somewhat of the end holes at Troon; and the sixth (the "Scotsman's Maiden," as the club has been pleased to term it), where the player has a most sporting drive over a sand-faced hill, was also halved, Fernie having hard lines at the hole side. The succeeding hole, where the course skirts the shore, and the whole vista of the bay is opened up to view, possesses features much in common with the last. It, too, was halved, although Fernie had the best of it through the green. The last hole on the way out (the eighth), which brings the players to th Glenegedale Water, and which possesses scope for interesting play, fell to Fernie, Campbell losing distance in the first instance owing to a ball lie, and afterwards being somewhat faulty in the short game. Wit' ten holes to play on the round, the old Musselburgh player accordingly turned one up. It was at this juncture that his opponent fell of appreciably. At the first hole in—the Punch Bowl, as it is well rather hard lines with his run up to the pin. The next was halved in 5; and the eleventh, where line is of great moment, fell to Campbell, Fernie losing a stroke in one of the rabbit holes, which are at this part of the green too numerous to be pleasant. Even after that misfortune, however, the Troon player had a chance of a half had his short game been better. With Campbell now standing three up, the twelfth hole was halved, Fernie at this green throwing away an undoubted opportunity; and so was the next, the longest hole on the green. In playing towards Machrie Farm, however, where the approach to the green is guarded by nasty traps, Fernie had hard lines from a nice cleek stroke. He failed to get out in the first attempt, and practically gave up the hole, as Campbell was on the green very prettily in 3. Campbell four up. Now off his game considerably, Fernie missed his second to the fourth last hole, and took 4 to reach the green, where Campbell, playing a faultless approach over the intervening bunker, got down in that figure. Campbell five up. A difficult hole is the third last. There is marshy ground in the direct line, and the Machrie Water has to be crossed, sooner or later, Fernie, choosing to cross it from the tee, got an atrocious lie in the rough grass; while Campbell, taking the better line, crossed easily with his grass; while Campbell, taking the better line, crossed easily with his second. Lying as he was, Fernie had a beautiful recovery, but the advantage gained by it he gave away on the green, where he lost his half by weak holing out. The lead of five holes the Troon man reduced by one at the second last green, where Campbell was not seen at his best; but a bad stimie on the home green, after a fine recovery from a trapped ball, prevented Fernie from getting more than a half there. The round thus finished with Campbell five up. The scores for the round were :-

In the afternoon, when the second round was played, it was apparent that if Campbell just managed to get halves he would win in a canter. It was an ill omen then for Fernie that he lost the first hole, where he overcarried the hole, being almost on the shore, and gave up. The Troon man, however, managed to knock off this advance on the second Troon man, however, managed to knock off this advance on the second green, where, with the better approach, he got home in 3 very nicely. A half in 3 followed, but Campbell, playing the short game much better than the other man, pocketed the fourth in 4. A missed brassey stroke to the Lag, which left Campbell in a rabbit furrow, and caused him to lift, gave Fernie a temporary advantage at this point, and the Troon man reduced the lead to 4 on the match at the Maiden, where Campbell's run up was strong. A stimie on the next green, however, cost Fernie the hole, for in trying to loft he played Campbell in; but at the Glenegedale (the eighth) the same player should have had the hole. Campbell was now 5 up; and the issue was further narrowed when the Punch Bowl was halved beautifully in 4. A fine chance Fernie had of a half at the next green, but he failed to take advantage of it, and the end was a foregone Conclusion when the same player got into a rabbit hole in going to Venus, and had to lift. Campbell won the hole easily, and stood dormy 7, and a half at the next green settled matters in his favour by up and 6 to play. At the close of the match Mr. Mackie presented Campbell with the gold medal given by the club to the winner, which was in addition to the money stake of £100 at issue. #### ST. ANDREWS.

According to a letter in a local newspaper, a difference of opinion has arisen between Tom Morris, the veteran conservator of St. Andrews links, and the green committee. It appears that the committee favour the proposal to roll the putting-greens by means of a heavy horse roller, whilst Tom objects to this process of putting made easy, on the ground that the rolling will destroy the putting-greens, and he points to Prest-wick, where the system was tried, in verification of his contention. There can be no doubt that the use of a heavy roller will consolidate the soil, and if the turf should get knocked up during the summer months, it will take some inducement to again get the grass to grow.

The letter in last week's Golf on St. Andrews as a champion course has evoked a good deal of criticism, most of it adverse. It is pointed out that in at least six holes the approaches are sufficiently trying to test the skill of even champion golfers, whilst from the tee it is generally the long and wild driver who is most severely punished. It will be remembered that last week Mr. L. Auchterlonie and Mr. W. Greig tied at 88 for the gold medal presented to local clubs by the Royal and Ancient. This tie was played off on Thursday in the presence of a large number of spectators. Both men made a capital start and halved the burn hole in four. Swiping off to the next, Grey topped his tee, and getting a bad lie, he drove away to the right of the green. Auchterlonie had two fine shots with a nice open road for his third up to the hole. The consequence was, that he took the honour. At the third hole, Grey got a good half in five after topping his tee. Proceeding to the Gingerbeer hole, Grey again foozled his lie, but he atoned for his mistake by an excellent display of putting which got him a half. In the journey to the hole across, Grey got well away from the tee only to find himself bunkered, which penalised him a couple of strokes. playing a fine game got home in five, and stood two ahead. Both were unlucky going to the Gingerbeer hole, and a half in five was called. The high hole was negotiated in the same figure, though from their position on the green four strokes should have sufficed. In the short

hole both were wide from the tee, but Greig being weak with his putter, allowed Auchterlonie to score. He also lost the end hole, Auchterlonie thus turning four ahead. The scores were:—Auchterlonie, 4 5 5 5 5 5 5 3 4=41; Greig, 4 6 5 5 7 5 5 4 5=46. Homeward Greig scored his first success at the high hole and again at the hole across; but after this Auchterlonie had all the favour going, and ended five ahead, and eight strokes better than Greig. The cup course is much more severe, or perhaps more testing is the better term, than the medal course. The length of the carries from the tee gives rise to some difference of opinion, but as this seems to be a matter de gustibus, it may be left undiscussed. The criticism of the medal course is encouraging to those interested in the club. The Cinque Ports medal was won by Mr. S. Mure Fergusson with 85, the same gentleman and the same score taking Monday's club cup; the Genmell cup was won by Mr. Eric Hambro with a net 80, the Caird prize by Mr. Cornelius Thompson with a net 40. Mr. C. Hutchings carried off the sweepstakes on Monday with the good score of 84. There was also a special competition on Monday between the previous winners for the final possession of the Pringle-Protheroe prize, which was carried off by Mr. C. The weather in the province was a bad as it could will be Smith. The weather in the morning was as bad as it could well be. Heavy rain fell until ten o'clock, and for a while there was little promise of improvement. Soon after the first couple started, however, a breeze sprang up, and before eleven o'clock the forenoon was bright and fine. From this time until two o'clock the weather was perfect for golfing. In the latter part of the day the wind freshened considerably, and made the round several strokes more difficult than it was in the mor ing.

The interest of the match hinged mainly on the play of Mr. Ball, Mr. Tait, Mr. Hilton, Mr. Mache, and Mr. A. D. Blyth, Mr. Mure Fergusson, the brothers Fairlie, and Mr. A. Molesworth. Mr. Mache was the first of the cracks to start. He made an unpromising beginning. His second shot for the first hole was bunkered, and he was again in grief at the second. He never recovered this unlucky start, and was at an early period out of the running. Mr. A. D. Blyth began much better. For the first nine holes his game could hardly have been improved upon, and he got out in 39. In the home coming he fell off a little, and he required 87 for the round. Mr. Ball was playing just behind him. He had a very good partner in Mr. W. E. Fairlie, who, though he plays with a stiffish style, frequently holds his own with the best that can be brought against him. Mr. Ball made a most brilliant start. He was 3 below 5's when he reached the Maiden, and the Maiden he took in a perfect 3. Again at Hades he had a magnificent 3—half the journey in 37. So far his game had been absolutely faultless. Mr. Fairlie, on the other hand, had been ruined by the Maiden, to which he took 8. When he turned homewards it looked as though Mr. Ball would beat the amateur record. Unfortunately, he did not quite maintain his form. The first three holes in were very well played, with the single exception of a difficult iron shot which he missed, but the next three holes told against his score. At the thirteenth he pulled his second shot into bad country. At the next he was loose in his short game, and at the fifteenth he was again faulty in putting. Three bad figures-6, 7, and 6-were thus added to his card, but at the sixteenth he recovered himself with a brilliant three, for which he holed out a 12-foot putt. He missed his drive for the seventeenth, but he pu'led together in his subsequent play, and he made a fair bid for a 4, which, however, he did not get. The last hole in a good 4 got him home in 45. His round was thus 82, one of the best performances ever

done by any amateur on the course.

Mr. Ball's was, by a good bit, the best score made in the early part of the day. Mr. Hutchings got out well in 41, but he was not so good in the second half of the round, and in the end he broke down altogether. Mr. Tait and Mr. Hilton, playing close behind Mr. Ball, kept for a time two very promising cards. Mr. Tait, however, came badly to grief at the seventh hole. He did not get hold of his first drive, and was bunkered. His ball lay so badly that he picked it out and lost two strokes. He missed his next; was bunkered a second time; and took 10 to the hole. Notwithstanding this heavy progress he was out in 44, against Mr. Hilton's 42. In the first few holes in the home journey Mr. Hilton kept his lead, and had the first four all in good figures, with the exception of the tenth, where he lost a stroke through bad putting. Mr. Tait, on the other hand, played the twelfth bally, and took 7 to it, but at the fourteenth green Mr. Tait turned the tables on his partner, who missed an easy iron pitch and was bunkered. From this point Mr. Tait played his strongest game, and finished on equal terms with Mr. Hilton, both scores being 91. Mr. A. Molesworth also put in a good card for the first round. He was out in 42 and home in 47, making 89 for the round.

When the players started on the second round they found the game entirely different from what it had been in the morning. The wind was blowing very fresh, and it made some of the carries from the tee impossible. The result of the change of weather was seen in all the scores. Mr. Ball went off with all the odds in his favour. He led Mr. Blyth by five strokes, Mr. Molesworth by seven, and Mr. Tait and Mr. Hilton by nine. To give him these odds was rather a hopeless business. Mr. Ball, however, gave his opponents a fair chance. He was not by any means in his forenoon's form. At the second tee he topped his drive. The third he placed indifferently for five, At the fourth he had a bad lie off his drive and never retrieved himself. Neither in putting nor driving did he play with the same accuracy as in the first rounds. His faults in putting were especially noticeable. Again and again he was weak. Indeed, his long putts were only once up to the hole all the way out. The result was that he was six worse for the ninth hole than in the forenoon, and he was beaten by Mr. Fairlie, who improved considerably in his early form, and was out in 40. In the second half of the round Mr. Ball was better in his short game, but there was nothing

particularly notable in his play unless, indeed, a beautifully taken brassy shot to the twelfth hole, which carried on to the green in 2, and gave him a chance of 3, which he almost got. On his way to the fourteenth he used his cleek in rare style against the wind, but at the next he was bunkered twic: after a long shot which deserved better treatment. He finished in 49, which made him 92 to the round. This was not particularly good, but it was beaten only by Mr. Fairlie, who was round in 91. The others all deteriorated from their first round. Mr. Blyth spoilt his card by 11 at the fourteenth hole, and Mr. Molesworth came to grief several times, and put himself hopelessiy out of the hunt with 104. Mr. Tait did well going out, and he had at one time a fair chance of at least coming in close upon Mr. Ball's heels, but he, too, failed to keep down his average in the home journey. The spring meeting of the Troon Golf Club takes place, and also the annual general business meeting of the club to-morrow. At the meeting a statement will be submitted by the committee of management, from which it may be noted that at the commencement of the year the number of honorary, life and ordinary members on the roll was 465; the new members admitted during the year were 65; resignations and deaths, 9; number of members as at 30th April, 1891, 521. The additions to the club-house have been satisfactorily finished; but the committee regret that they are not in a position to state the full cost, as some of the tradesmen's accounts have not yet been sent in. The committee think it right, however, to advise members that the cost of the alterations, including furnishings, will somewhat exceed the sum of £2,000, which the committee were authorised to borrow on debentures from members of the club, and which were allotted by ballot. In terms of the resolution adopted by the club on 31st May, 1890, the committee thought it expedient to raise the entry-money, from 1st January, 1891, to £10 10s. In view of the increased expenditure arising from the larger house accommodation, and the probability of a slower increase in membership, the committee suggest that they be empowered by the meeting to raise the annual subscription to £1 10s. per annum, including the use of a

box. In terms of resolutions adopted by the club, £50 of the debentures issued in 1887, and £100 of the debentures issued recently, fall to be repaid by ballot at this annual meeting.

#### THE ROYAL NORTH DEVON GOLF CLUB.
