On the 6th inst., the stirring contest for the blue ribbon of the golfing world took place at St. Andrews. Ever since I took part in the competition—in another form—at Perth, in 1867, I have had a special interest in the struggle for the Open Championship. At that time it was rare for an amateur to think of competing with the professional talent ; but, seeing that I had never played on Perth Links before, I was delighted when I came in third—Bob Andrews, the professional at Perth being first, and Will's Park, of Musselburgh, second. Now things are quite different. Last autumn the Open Championship was secured by a brilliant English amateur, Mr. John Ball, jun., of the Hoylake Club, Liverpool. New zest has been given to the contest. Not only are amateurs holding their own with professionals, but there are so many first-class players in England, that this is becoming more and more an international competition for the golfing laurels.

St. Andrews-the Doncaster of the game - was crowded with brilliant players from both sides of the Tweed. The stormy and rainy weather was the only drawback, and for some it was only too serious. Mr. Ball, who held at the same time the Amateur and Open Championship, and who was in good "form," was naturally looked on as a likely winner, though eighty-two skilled players were against him. After him, the hopes of the gentlemen players -and of Scotchmen - centred in the present holder of the amateur championship - Mr. J. E. Laidlay, of the Honourable Company of Golfers, Musselburgh. Mr. Horace Hutchinson, an ex-champion, hailing from Westward Ho ! was another favourite of the English players, though Mr. H. H. Hilton, of Hoylake, a close imitator of Mr. Ball, and one who took second honours in the amateur championship, was considered in the meantime a more powerful rival. Among less likely amateur winners, yet brilliant players, were Messrs. A. F. Macfie, R. B. Sharp, E. R. H. Blackwell, S. Mure Fergusson, W. Auchterlonke, H. S. C. Everard, F. G. Tait, A. Stuart, D. Leitch, and C. Hutchings.

The professional talent, too, was particularly strong. For the thirtyfirst time was old Tom Morris to take part in the contest on his native green, which he keeps with exceptional taste and ability. He was champion in 1861, 1862, 1864 and 1867; this proves his exceptionally high place as a golfer in his younger days, though he now plays "for the fun o't," as he expresses it, without any serious thought of success. Willie Fernic, of Troon, who carried off the blue ribbon in 1883, was looked on as a formidable competitor, seeing that he was in capital play, Bob Martin, St. Andrews champion in 1876 and 1885-the last with the "record score ;" Willie Park, jun., champion in 1887 and 1889 ; and Davie Brown, Malvern, champion in 1886, were all very likely men to come in high. Willie Campbell, too, of Bridge o' Weir, who was second for the 1890 championship, was in good order ; and he was most anxious to add the blue ribbon to his many laurels. Ben Sayers, of North Berwick, also, has been playing a remarkably steady scoring game for some time. Nor was Archie Simpson, of Carnoustie, out of the favourite count, though he is more brilliant than certain. He was desirous of standing equal with his brother Jack, the champion of 1884, who was also a competitor. But old Tom was strongly of opinion an opinion which he has held for a considerable time, that Hugh Kirkaldy, if he kept in to his play, would beat the field. He has been playing a very steady scoring game for some time past, and has broken the record of St. Andrews Links. With many, his brother Andrew was a greater favourite. No doubt Andrew is the most powerful driver, and the most determined of all the St. Andrews players. Two years ago, he tied for the championship with Willie Park, jun., and though then beaten he challenged the champion afterwards, and won the match with exceptionally brilliant play.

In all, eighty-three aspirants to the premier position among golfers started for the contest—forty of these being amateurs. The struggle was keen, the amateurs anxious to retain the honour, the professionals equally keen to regain the laurels which had only once been taken from them. The weather was wretched. They had to start at nine prompt, for each had to play thirty-six holes. Accordingly they had to brave it through the drenching rain, and against a high easterly wind. The onlookers were undaunted. A "gallery" followed the principal players, and betting was pretty free.

Mr. Ball, began well, going out in 41. More indifferent was his play in, but at the Road hole he made an awful mess of it. His ball lay on the road, so near a stone that it was almost unplayable; and he took eleven to hole out. This put him entirely out of the running. Mr. Laidlay lost himself at the very first hole, pitching his ball into the burn. This put him out, and his score of 90 to the round threw him out. Of the amateurs, Mr. Mure Fergusson with 86, and Mr. Auchterlonie with 85, were alone left with a chance of success at the end of the first round. Much was expected from Fernie (an old St. Andrews man), when he went out in 39; but he required 45 home against the wind. He repeated the 84 during the second round, making his total 168, three strokes below the record.

But Hugh Kirkaldy, by almost faultless play, had also gone out in 39. He showed himself in grand form. His driving was perfect and his

approaches were deadly. Though he got trapped in one hole, when he had to play back, thus losing a stroke, he came in in 44, making his round 83. Andrew made a mess of the High hole out, yet managed to score the out-holes in 40. Taking 44 to come in, he scored the round in 84. Hugh's success became the more probable when he took 38 to go out the second round, against his brother's 39. By excellent play against the wind he came in in 45, holing the round in 83. His total was therefore 166. Andrew was playing a most powerful game ; but at the turn he was two strokes behind his brother in the match. Could he retrieve these during the remaining nine holes ? Within the next four holes he wiped them off. The following three he halved. At the Road hole, which is a difficult one, he failed to hole out in the number taken by his brother and by himself during the first round. Yet could he not, by an effort, hole in four against his brother's five at the last hole? Fernie had holed it both rounds in four, and several others had made the same score. Would Andrew not succeed? An immense crowd had now assembled. The numbers were whispered numense crowd had how assembled. The humbers were winspered round. All knew that the championship depended on this hole's play. But just at the crucial point Andrew failed. He did not get home in his second, and he was dreadfully short with his third. If he had put himself dead, he would have halved the match. But the putt was too long; he missed it, and lost the championship a second time. Taking six to the hole, he came in in 45. making a total of 84, and tieing with Fernie for second honours.

Hugh thus broke the championship record by five strokes, exceptionally creditable, considering the boisterous weather during a great part of the day. The professionals, too, have regained their lost honours, and have proved themselves unassailable in stormy weather by the best caste of amateurs. No one grudges Hugh Kirkaldy the much envied title of champion golfer of the world; for he is a favourite with all-gentlemen and professionals alike. Tom's favourite outstripped all.

BURGESS GOLFING SOCIETY .- The Burgess Golfing Society, which appears to have renewed its youth, held its autumn meeting on the 15th, at Musselburgh. Despite the fact that the weather conditions in the early part of the day were wretched, there was a good muster of mem-bers. The state of the course, on the other hand, was decidedly against good Golf. The recent stormy weather seems to have completed the work which the race meeting began, and between the one and the other the course has suffered greatly. The putting-greens especially are in a wretched state, and holing out on them is no easy matter. The " blue ribbon" of the meeting was of course the gold medal of the club, won at this competition last October by Mr. A. M. Ross. Mr. Ross, as was to be expected, was an absentee, and naturally all the members of the "first file" present had a desire to fill the vacant place. It was Mr. J. M. Williamson whose oesire was gratified. As usual, a couple of rounds decided the competition, and these Mr. Williamson, notwith-standing his exertions at North Berwick on the two preceding days, succeeded in completing in 89. Mr. Gregor M⁴Gregor found himself quite at sea in his short game during the first nine holes, on account of the condition of the greens, and although he played in something more like his own form in the second round-doing it in 43-his score for the eighteen holes ran up to 91. It was indeed Mr. Swan who ran Mr. Williamson hardest, the latter only winning from him by a stroke. For handicap players the principal attraction of the meeting was the silver medal; but there were also several handsome prizes given by members medal; but there were also several handsome prizes given by members of the club. The following are the best handicap scores, from which it may be seen to whom the prizes fell :-Mr. A. B. Doughty, 97, less 14 =83; Mr. J. H. Forrester, 106, less 18=88; Mr. J. M. It may interest golfers to know that Mr. James Kerr, captain of the Thistle Golf Club, Leven, who won our second "Golfers' Prize," is a very keen player, although only having one hand the left. He can, however, enjoy the game as well as those more fortunate, and can hold his own with many good players. In a match which his club had with the St. Andrews Club, some years ago, he played the round in 92, beating his opponent by 6 holes.

"The Spirit of Golf," idealised in our Christmas number, continues to spread her benign influence in the far-off corners of the world. Since that article was written Golf is now played within sight of the Rocky Mountains, more recently in Melbourne, Australia, and now, in our competition columns, will be found the account of a match at Christchurch, New Zealand. The possibilities to its extension in the New World are practically illimitable, and the time may come when reciprocal visits shall be made by picked Golf teams between the Mother Country and the Colonies. Just as our best cricketers were taught to respect Colonial prowess with the bat and ball, so golfers, even of the calibre of Hugh Kirkaldy, Mr. Laidlay, Mr. Hutchinson, and Mr. John Ball, may have to reckon with some formidable Colonial offshoots as antagonists. Certain it is that the spread of the game among so many players bringing fresh minds to its consideration, leading them to speculate, theorise, and experiment free from traditional prejudices as to the form of clubs and balls, and the government of old laws, will exert an influence fraught with far-reaching consequences, which no one can adequately forecast.

In the driving competition in connection with the recent' North Berwick amateur tournament, Mr. J. Williamson (Burgess Club), gained the special prize, the full length of his drive being 236 yards. Mr. A. Stuart (North Berwick New Club), was second with 228 yards, and Mr. G. Gordon Robertson (Tantallon Club) third, with 226 yards.

Mr. Frank Baden-Powell, the marine painter, and a member of the Wimbledon Golf Club, whose design for the commemorative diploma, about to be awarded by the Royal Naval Exhibition, was unanimously selected by the Council, has had the honour of submitting the finished drawing to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, at Marlborough House, who has granted it his official sanction, and expressed his admiration for it as a most ingenious work of art as well as a most complete emblem of the naval service.

A correspondent writes:—"As to gutta balls floating or not it depends mainly upon the quantity of paint upon them. As a rule, a black gutta ball floats well out of water with two thin coats of paint, and just on the surface with three coats. If the paint be so put on as to fill all the grooves, down it goes."

THE "A1" GOLF BALL.

Golfers have long been familiar with the excellent qualities of this ball, and the widespread reputation which it has so deservedly earned. It came at a time when a good ball was largely in request owing to the spread of the game, and its use among players all over the world is probably as extensive as that of any other ball of equal excellence in the market. The material of which these balls are made is the best red gutta, and they are moulded and seasoned so well as to withstand any amount of rough usage, while for driving and putting nothing better could be desired.

Hitherto the experience of golfers with this ball has been that the paint somehow chips off too readily. This defect would seem to have been overcome, for the balls we recently tried (size 27) showed no such signs of usage after a day's play. In remaking these balls also the club-makers find that the material has an oily surface when completely moulded but not painted. Hence they have found a difficulty in coating the ball with paint which will adhere in defiance of the oily surface, and which will not cause players to complain of an unsightly ball after the first two holes. Some club-makers have tried a chemical preparation, either before the paint is put on or among the paint itself; but the success attained has not always been uniformly successful. The Gutta Percha Company, Whart Road, City Road, London, N.—the makers of the "A1" ball appear to have overcome this defect in the paint which they use, because in the balls we tried not the slightest symptom of the paint giving way was observable. A better ball in appearance, weight, and flying capacity, could not be found.

THE NEW GOLF CLUB AT WARKWORTH.—Tom Morris has just finished superintending the laying out of a 12-hole course, for the use of the members of the recently tormed Warkworth Club. The course is within easy access of the village, and will doubtless be well patronised during the season. Morris has also been engaged by the Newcastle City Golf Club, and will begin operations on the Newcastle Town Moor at once. The membership of the club has been considerably added to lately, and the committee are now endeavourng to secure suitable premises for the purposes of a club room.

THE ST. ANDREWS MANAGEMENT.

7 HILE the Open Championship is quite fresh in the minds of golfers, a useful purpose may be served by saying a homely word or two to the authorities at St. Andrews, who were responsible for its management In one or two of the northern dailies chronicling the events of that week, the customary roseate tag of congratulation was added, commemorating the success of the gathering, and felicitating the management on the admirable nature of their arrangements. There is no need, probably, to remind that body that one swallow does not make a summer; neither does a stray, colourless compliment signify that a feeling of profound contentment and satisfaction suffused the minds of all the golfers who either competed or were onlookers at the recent championship meeting. That very much the reverse of this was the case must have been gathered from the outspoken article which we published last week, and which, so to speak, dotted the i's and stroked the t's of a great deal of the current criticism from the mouths of golfers to be met with over a wide area.

The doings of the Royal and Ancient management would be comic were they not so serious in their effects. Apart altogether from the keen interest which amateurs take in the gathering and its success, there is the even more im. portant element of the professionals; and in dealing with this body of players the Royal and Ancient contrived very thoroughly to give the golfing community a new and somewhat grotesque rendering of that maladroit policy popularly known as "how not to do it." When one reads of the management's proceedings there is an inevitable disposition to ask whether we are living in the age of the steam-engine, the telegraph, and the penny press. The manner in which their arrangements were made seems to us to have followed very much on this principle. This dignified and select conclave of golfing legislators assembled round a table in order to fix the date of the meeting. They appear to have agreed among themselves to blot out in a geographical sense the existence of other large Golf clubs. They loftily disdained to look at the copious list of fixtures which we publish weekly for their benefit and that of other managing bodies, in order to find out the most suitable date which shall not clash too prominently with the convenience of Like the Queen when she pricks with a other clubs. bodkin the list of sheriffs eligible for election, the St. Andrews management evidently called upon the club steward to bring the club yearly almanack. The guiding authority of the conclave would appear then to have shut his eyes, and to have valiantly tried his luck by pricking for a date. If, after the cast, the date fixed upon with so much inspiration happens to be October 6th, and the following day is that on which the Hoylake members hold their large autumn gathering, so much the worse for Hoylake and the champion, Mr. John Ball, jun. The date having been selected, steps are next taken to secure that it shall not be too widely known. Though an oft-times

repeated advertisement of between twenty and thirty lines on the front page of a sixpenny paper is considered to be the right and proper thing to herald to the world that the St. Andrews Autumn Meeting (to a large extent, a local event) will be held on such and such a day, that there would be a little light festivity afterwards in the shape of a dinner for the gentlemen, and a ball for the ladies, three obscure lines in the smillest type, huddled away out of sight among the competitions, are thought to be ample publication for an infinitely more important engagement, national in its interest. Did the committee expect poor and struggling professionals to invest their hard-earned sixpences in order to disinter this curt piece of information? Not content, however, with allowing intending competitors to find out as best they could the date of the meeting, the enlightened management take the wholly unprecedented, as well as unnecessary, step of closing the list for entries three days before the competition is actually played-that is to say, that a competition fixed for October 6th cannot be entered for after Saturday evening the 3rd. The result was what might have been expected. Several professionals have poured into our ear bitter lamentations regarding the fool's errand of many hundred miles on which they had been induced to go to St. Andrews at this time of the year in order to take part in a competition which they imagined to be "open" in fact as well as in name. But evidently conscious that the indignation of the ten excluded professionals had some foundation in fact, a ludicrously abortive attempt was made to parade a document signed by the legitimate competitors, the practical effect of which was to give the ten professionals an ill-defined form of locus standi without in any degree ensuring that should the eventual winner turn up among their number he should enjoy the recompense of his success.

Did one ever hear of such hugger-mugger management in connection with the most important golfing event of the year? This, too, by a Golf club which allows it to be inferred that it contains not only the quintessence of Golf legislative wisdom, but that it can show an example to the world of how practical affairs ought to be managed. The truth is, that St. Andrews is just a little too prone to consider that prestige for past services counts for everything, and that it can be made to cloak a multitude of sins, both of omission and of commission. Although supposed to be the leading club in the country, it rarely takes the initiative in any Golf movement. It tinkers and tinkers the rules in a half-hearted, unworkmanlike way, only after repeated pressure, and in the interest of its own members alone, and without asking the views of the larger golfing democracy standing outside its gates. In this Open Championship business the same stolid, apathetic policy has been pursued, with the result that anger and bitterness have been engendered. In short, the Royal and Ancient is irresponsive to the progressive spirit of the times; it is narrow in its ambitions. and illiberal in its sympathies; it is slow in initiating reforms, and is extremely wedded to old ways; it is exclusive in its retrograde conservatism, and its government

needs a larger infusion of younger and fresher blood, more in touch with the wider world of Golf beyond the limits of Fife-always, of course, assuming that the St. Andrews Club wishes to take rank as the premier club in fact, and not only in theory. But the practical point which we wish to put straight to the management is this : Their bungling has had the effect of seriously crippling the resources of a number of poor, hard-working professionals who have left their homes, in some cases many hundreds of miles away, to play in the competition, only to find, on technical grounds which they cannot appreciate, that the door is shut in their faces. Would it not be a graceful act on the part of a very wealthy club to pay, at least, a portion of the railway fares of such men as George Lowe, who travelled all the way from St. Anne's-on-the-Sea, in Lancashire? If some such step as this were adopted, the present sense of rankling injustice against St. Andrews among the professionals would be, to a large extent, smoothed down.

LARGS GOLF CLUB.—In the competition for the captain's prize the lowest scorers were Mr. H. J. M'Call (captain) and Mr. J. Bishop Culpepper ; but as those two gentlemen were not competitors for the medal, the next lowest scorer was entitled to get it. As the lowest score was 66, and as three players made this score, viz., Mr. J. Murray, Mr. J. M. Thomson, and Mr. A. E. Barbour, they had to play off to decide who should hold the medal. The result of the tie on Saturday was that Mr. Murray was the winner with 92, for the double round, Mr. A. M. Thomson being 96, and Mr. Barbour, 119

LANARK GOLF CLUE.—The members of the Lanark Golf Club held their first competition on Saturday for the silver cleek presented by the golfers in the 3rd and 4th battalions of the Highland Light Infantry, during the summer camp on the Muir. Two rounds of the green were played, 28 holes in all; and when cards were handed in, it was found that Mr. Haddow had got home in 129, which, after his odds were deducted, brought him in at 116, and gained the cleek, which becomes the property of any one winning it three times. Mr. John Smith, jun., was second with 119 net, and the Hon. A. J. Bingham came next, with 121 net. The greens were perfect, and the weather was all that could be desired.

QUESTIONS ON THE RULES.

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—While playing in a foursome last week at Nairn, one of my adversaries played into some broom hazard, and when trying to get at his bail, badly punished, he pulled up some of the dead part of the bush in his way. My partner and I objected to this proceeding, but the player's partner backed him up, saying the bit of bush pulled away was dead (it was not loose), and therefore could not be growing. Was this hole lost?

2. The same player, when putting on the green, accidentally moved his ball slightly, and then played into the hole. Was this not a hole lost?

3. If a player presses down the turf with his hand round the edge of the hole before putting, is not the hole lost? I am, Sir, &c.,

NIBLICK.

[(1.) The player described had no right to touch anything in the hazard. His action in tearing up the dead portion of the bush was distinctly illegal, and can in no way be defended by the technical quibble that a portion of a bush which is dead cannot be growing. He lost the hole. (2.) If in this case the player caused the ball to leave its original position, and not merely to oscillate, he played a stroke. Thus, by playing two consecutive strokes in the match he caused his side to lose the hole. (3.) The rule distinctly states that no irregularity of surface shall be pressed down by the hand. A player can only move loose obstacles in the line of putt, and this very lightly with the back of the hand. Here again the penalty should be enforced.—ED.]

To the Editor of GOLF.

 S_{IR_3} —I shall be much obliged if you will answer the following question.

Everyone knows that in Golf nothing may be moved or lifted in a hazard; but what constitutes a hazard? If one gets into whins, say, one hundred yards long, and fifty wide, but happens to remain on a very small patch of grass, his ball being surrounded by loose sticks and stones, are these allowed to be removed? The player may remain on a large patch of grass in the midst of the whins. Where is the line to be drawn about a hazard?

[A bunker has not been defined in the rules as they at present stand with any large amount of categorical clearness, but certainly a stretch of whins has always been considered a hazard, and subject to the same rules as govern other objects coming within that definition.—ED.]

Had he any right to do so, and if not, how long were we entitled to let the ball lie in the hope of its going in? There was a strong wind blowing at the time, and I had allowed for this in my putt, and there was every probability that if the ball had not been knocked away it would have been blown in.

A similar incident occurred not long ago at St. Anne's, but in that case no one touched the ball, and as the party were turning away to the adjoining teeing ground, the wind blew the ball in, and straightway a dispute arose at so whether the hole was halved or not. I believe it was admitted. Of course, I know that if I had played the odd and my ball had stopped as described, if my adversary had then holed out, he would be entitled to knock my ball away : but the case I describe is essentially different, and I would be glad of an expression of opinion from you or any of your correspondents, who have experience in the game.

[If the opponent knocked away the ball when it had ceased to roll, and when there was no doubt among the players that the ball was actually dead, he was within his rights in acting as he did. Our correspondent had no claim to count on the off-chance of his ball being blown by the wind into the hole if the ball had ceased to move by the momentum of the putt. The rule is clear.—ED.]

This was a very good score, and hard to beat. A little later, how-ever, it was stated that Mr. W. Doleman, with four holes to go, was doing even better, and was in a fair way of eclipsing this. He was out in the same number of strokes as Mr. Bone, and was better than him by one stroke at the fourteenth hole. But alas for the veteran. A heavy shower that came down at this point seemed to put him out, and 5555 for the four holes brought his total up to 77, two strokes beyond the, as yet, lowest score. Indeed the above 75 remained unbeaten, though there was a near approach to it twice, two 76's being recorded later-by Mr. A. Neillie, and by Mr. W. Martin—and another 77 by Mr. A. Morison. Mr. Bone accordingly become winner of the scratch medal. He was also the winner of the same medal at the autumn meeting last year with 80 after a tie with Mr. D. G. Miller and Mr. D. G. Rose at 79. Mr. Bone also won the scratch medal at the spring meeting with 77. The score made by Mr. Martin, as above, 76, turned out in its way to be a phenomenal one. It was early known that Mr. A. McDonald had the unusually low handicap score of 67, viz., 81, less 14=67. It was confidently predicted that this score would not be beaten for the Salmon medal. As it was, however, the principal prizes went to very low actual scorers.

It need hardly be stated that with so much business, the honorary secretary, who was in personal attendance the whole day, had quite as much as he could do, even with the assistance of several other members of the club. It is not improbable that his abstention from the competition, holding, as he does, the easy record of the green at 69, may have modified the result. In any case, Mr. Milne must have found his task in dealing with such a mass of figures, and correctly allocating a large number of prizes, no sinecure.

THE NORTH BERWICK TOURNAMENT.

Judging from recent experience the amateur tournament at North Berwick is apparently destined to undergo a rather chequered career. Last year, the efforts of the promoters were undoubtedly rewarded with a very fair share of success, and as they have this season been equally assiduous in their endeavours, it is matter for regret that so few competitors came forward on Wednesday of last week, Very much is it to be desired that by another year such arrangements may be made as to place the meeting on a firm basis, so as to prepare the way for its rapid development into a competition fitting to the renown of North Berwick as a golfing resort. As play proceeded a fair amount of attraction centred around the probable issue ; but it must be admitted that an unfortunate combination of bad weather, with a meagre turnout, tended to make the interest in the various matches of a com-paratively listless and limited character. The play, notwithstanding, ruled excellent and close, a fact of much significance being that most of the matches finished either at "Pointgarry-in," or the Home hole. In the first round of the contest, Colonel M'Kinnon and Mr. John

Forrest each showed an excellent game. Out in an almost faultlessly compiled 39 (the course was much extended on tournament day), against 41 by his opponent, Colonel M'Kinnon led by 2 at the turning. Mr. Forrest, however, is a player seldom easily disposed of, and although he proved unequal to securing the lead, he yet succeeded in making the match level at "Pointgarry" home. After the approaches for the Home hole had been played, the gallant colonel might well have felt anxious as to the result, but just at the critical juncture the local crack was unaccountably lacking, and, missing an easy putt, he allowed his antagonist to enter into the second round. The victor had a credithis antagonist to enter into the second round. The victor had a credit-able 79 for the round (the best score of the day), and the vanquished followed closely with 81. Mr. Garden G. Smith conquered Mr. David Anderson at this stage, the second prize winner of last year's tourna-

ment succumbing at "Pointgarry" after a fine tussle. The two might, in a way, be said to be old rivals. They tied, after a close encounter, last year, and an extra hole had to be played ere Mr. Anderson could then be declared winner. Mr. Smith had his revenge on Wednesday, for although the couple were again equally matched, and stood all even at the turning, the Royal Musselburgh player succeeded in just winning on the homeward journey. Mr. John M'Culloch met in this round the veteran captain of the Tantallon Club, Mr. J. R. Whitecross, of North Berwick. Mr. Whitecross, who has had a splendid record in his palmy days, showed that his right hand had not yet lost its cunning, and Mr. M'Culloch had to play a good game to win by two holes. Mr. Adam Hogg rather easily disposed of Mr. A. Hutchison, the defeated repre-sentative of the Bass Rock Club practically losing the match to his captain in the outward half. Mr. A. Stuart defeated Mr. W. G. Paxton, the latter showing up pluckily in the encounter with his strong antagonist. A good and close game was that between Mr. Lehmann and Mr. Younger, the latter being ousted just at "Pointgarry-in," Mr. G. Gordon Robertson, who showed ecadwice his set in." Mr. G. Gordon Robertson, who showed so admirably in his match on the last occasion against Mr. Harold Hilton (the then champion of the tournament) succumbed to Mr. J. Williamson by 5 and 4 to play. In this round, and throughout the tournament, Mr. Williamson proved himself an opponent by no means to be despised. Mr. S. H. M'Culloch, the young Tantallon representative, had his initial tussle in the competition in his match with Colonel M'Kinnon, the former having had a bye owing to the non-appearance of Mr. Pullar. The Trap hole saw Mr. M'Culloch assume the lead with the aid of a splendid approach. The couple again started level on going to the seventh hole, the younger player having found his way won almost alternately, and here they still stood on even terms. After driving from the Pit hole the St. Andrews player forged steadily ahead, but he missed a simple putt at the Perfection, and the game again turned in favour of his opponent. As the players neared home a hurricane of wind and rain raged. The Royal and Ancient player now fell away, topping some of his drives whilst the Tantallon representative held surely and well on his way. At "Pointgarry" Mr. M'Cul-loch was dormy, and he won at the last hole. Mr. Garden Smith had a close battle with Mr. John M'Culloch. From start to finish the match remained in a position of the utmost doubt, and was only decided at the Home hole. Mr. M'Culloch, who is an elder brother of the ultimate champion of the tournament, succumbed here by a hole. Mr. Stuart defeated Mr. Hogg by 4 and 3 to play. At one stage the Bass Rock captain gave promise of placing a different complexion on the aspect of the game. He more than held his own in the outward portion. At the Hole of Cross, which was gained by him in 2, Mr. Hogg led by a couple of holes, and on turning he had still the advantage of one. The driving powers of Mr. Stuart especially told in the Home play, and as Mr. Hogg failed against the gale of wind and rain, he ulti-mately fell an easy victim to his formidable opponent. Mr. Lehmann gave Mr. Williamson a tough fight for entry into the third round, a very equal game resulting in favour of the latter by 2.

In the semi-final Mr. Sydney M'Culloch ran off with the match from Mr. Garden Smith, ousting the latter in a manner that had hardly been bargained for in view of the previous excellent form exhibited by Mr. Smith. The greatest surprise in the tournament was occasioned, however, in the defeat in the semi-final of Mr. A. Stuart, who was first favourite at the outset. Close play in the outward portion of the match finished by Mr. Stuart leading Mr. Williamson by one at the end. When the Pit had been reached he had yet one in hand ; but the three away a very easy chance of a half at the High Bent, and the match was again level. Perfection was halved. Mr. Stuart had here the worst lie from his drive, but played the shot admirably. As the result of the following two holes, Mr. William on stood dormy 2, Mr. Stuart being comparatively weak on the Redan green, and topping some of his drives for the Gate hole. Winning "Pointgarry," where a half would have sufficed to give him victory, Mr. Williamson thus qualified for the final encounter.

Some speculation naturally existed as to the probable result of the match in the final round between Mr. Sydney M'Culloch and Mr. J. Williamson. Opinion was pretty equally divided in the matter, each of the contestants having given so excellent an account of himself in the previous stages of the play. Mr. Williamson started most unpromisingly, indeed, halving one and losing as many as four of the first five holes. Ditch and sand difficulties were largely responsible for this state of matters. Mr. M'Culloch's advantage was reduced to 3 at the Hole o'Cross, and to 2 at the turning after a half at Quarry-out, the game of the Burgess player recovering in steadiness. This glimpse of good fortune and possible success was, however, short lived, for, after halving Quarry-in, he followed up an indifferent drive for the Pit by pulling his second on towards the beach. Mr. M'Culloch, who had a rare drive, followed with a good approach, and now led by 3. Further increasing his advantage at High Bent, which he gained in a good 3 to 4, the Tantallon representative was at Perfection hailed the winner of the match, and champion of the tournament of this year. Mr. M'Culloch, accordingly, gained the first cup, and the second fell to Mr.
