



#### THE FIRST MEDAL-DAY AT MUIRFIELD.

Tuesday, April 5th, 1892, was a noteworthy day in the history of the "Honourable Company." Although the Company very wisely keep their discussions to themselves, rumours have for some time been rife as to serious disagreement and possible disruption over the question of selling the club-house at Musselburgh, and making Muirfield the sole rendezvous of the Club. A vigorous minority, it seems, protested against the abandonment of the old home, and the majority did not care to carry their proposal to an extreme at the expense of the unity of the Company. On Monday, March 4th, the question came up for final settlement, and after a long debate in the Freemasons' Hall, Edinburgh, no less than 150 members of the Company being present at the meeting, "Farewell to Musselburgh" was carried, for that is unquestionably implied in the resolution, to sell the company's club-house there. As we hear of no further protestation, we may, while sympathising with their desire to cling to the old hearth, congratulate the minority on the graceful submission they have made to the wish for emigration shown by the majority of the family. Crowded out at Leith, then at Musselburgh, the experience of the Company has not been the most fortunate. Let us hope that in their new home they will have before them a future of unbroken occupation, prosperity and peace.

Immediately following this decisive meeting came the medalday, April 5th the first of the many that are likely to follow on the new course at Muirfield. Although the duty was not, perhaps, distinctly diocesan, it was partially so, and on such an important occasion we made a point of being present. More than usual interest attached to the competition for the blue ribbon of this spring meeting. Who was to be the first Muirfield victor? Naturally the champion, Mr. J. E. Laidlay, whom the "Honourables" are fortunate to reckon among their ranks, was "first fancy." But there was not unanimity on that point any more than on the emigration business. No such vulgar custom as "betting" prevails in the Company, but we know of several members who set it forth as their opinion, to which they were prepared to render pecuniary assistance, that Mr. Leslie Balfour would beat "Johnnie," as the champion is endearingly spoken of among his brethren. Mr. Laidlay was partnered, as he often is, with Mr. Wharton Tod, and immediately before them were Mr. Balfour and Mr. Stuart, who, more golfico, is generally prefixed by "Andy." It was, therefore, possible to watch more or less attentively, as the turns of the green permitted, the play of both couples. We did so with great interest and delight. Mr. Tod, although an excellent and distinguished player, is not perhaps entitled to be drawn with the champion, but as for the others, Laidlay, Balfour, and Stuart, Scotland has certainly no superior trio of players, and their past achievements make them worthy of attention and admiration at any time. But in view of Sandwich, and speculation as to his chances against the English "Johnnie," who has eclipsed the world, and many a time carried all the silver of St. George's to Hoylake, the present holder of the champion-ship is watched jealously by his countrymen. Then, at the opening of Dunblane course, only the previous Saturday, Mr. Balfour and Mr. Stuart unitedly won fresh fame by easily defeating the two well-known professionals, Tom Morris and Ben Sayers It is not every day one gets a chance of seeing such exponents of the golfing art, and we were naturally anxious to see what they will make of Muirfield on this first medal day. In the miscellaneous play that has taken place since the green was opened, the record (as stated in GOLF, April 1st) is 80, made by Mr. W. G. Bloxsam, and thus detailed :

A fine score, but we must, if possible, have it bettered, by one or other of this famous trio on the medal day. All three are apparently impressed with their responsibility, and are evidently anxious to win.

It is some years since we have seen Mr. Laidlay play. He scarcely seems so tall as when we last saw him, but he is not so thin, and this may account for our impression. In one respect we notice a distinct change in his manner. He does not play with the same quickness and nonchalance which were characteristic when we saw him some years ago. He studies his putts more carefully, his high honours, and the expectations of his countrymen have developed a sense of responsibility, and although there is no slowness about his stroke there is certainly a seriousness we did not notice before, and this is all to his credit. He puts as strangely as ever, off the left leg, and gripping the club halfway down. "It's a grand way o' puttin," said a young pro-fessional to us lately, "He sees the hall way to the hole," May-be so, but curiously enough, on the Muirfield medal-day, while his putts were all straight and good, not one from any distance went down. They were always "there or thereabout," and several should have come off, but they just didn't do it, and this "cussedness" on their part cost him three or four strokes. "It's the puir player that gets in the long putt on the medal-day," said a friend, and there is something in it. The player with no reputation to lose fearlessly follows the maxim "never up, never in," and if many go past, a few go down. The champion has to be more careful about being "dead." Mr. Laidlay made one fatal mistake at the fourth last hole. Had he used the brassy and been past the hole he had a certain three (so thought Sayers who was one of the onlookers); but he took the cleek, and pressing, got into a little bunker, and took 5. A large company watched his last putt with eager interest, but again it refused to come off, and Mr. Laidlay finished in 80 thus made up :-

Not the least interested in that last putt of Mr. Laidlay's was Mr. Balfour. He had arrived home in 79, thus, as it turned out, establishing a record, winning the gold medal, and defeating the champion. His score was as follows:—

In the first half of the round there was nothing brilliant, but the second half was played to perfection, and its 37 constituted him first gold medal holder on Muirfield Links. Though we well knew his renown as an athlete in many departments, we had not till now seen Mr. Balfour golfing. He seems all muscle. His style is thoroughly orthodox, and the thoughtful, painstaking manner in which he performs his work gives one a high impression of his character. He is "the man to back" in an important match, and the particularity and studied correctness of his every movement betoken a regard for the Royal and Ancient game, which it is pleasant indeed to see. The "innovation" of the use of iron on the putting-green is not countenanced by him, and his wooden putter appeared to be soled with brass, and very heavily weighted. Anyway, under its treatment, the ball had nothing else for it at any ordinary distance but to go to the bottom, and that without any hesitation. Mr. Balfour seems deservedly popular among his fellowmembers, and we were especially delighted to notice the hearty way in which Mr. Laidlay himself congratulated the victor. "The round should be done in 75," we afterwards heard him say, and, if that is the champion's opinion, you may depend upon it the medal will some day be reached in that figure. Meantime, 79 will keep the majority of the Honourable Company in a pious attitude of aspiration, and if, in coming contests it is beaten, it cannot be disgraced.

Mr. Stuart finished in three strokes more than his partner, his score of 82 being thus made up:—

He has a very finished and beautiful style of play, and on this occasion his "swipes" and his approach shots were unblemished. Several short putts, however, came between him and the gold medal, by refusing to obey his will. Visions of Glasgow hecklers may have come in the way, for the Unionists of Blackfriars and Hutchesontown have called on him to fight their battle in the political Armageddon now imminent; or the great honour conferred on him yesterday, when the Company elected him their captain, may be accountable. Any way,

he missed the medal, and this to the regret of many; for he is not only one of the finest of golfers, but one of the most lovable of men. Under the century were found the following:—

When the company assembled for luncheon in the splendid hall of the new club-house the scene was very animated, and the members must have congratulated themselves that such a handsome building was ready to take the place of the old on at Musselburgh, and Fitzjohn, after a severe illness, was still to the fore to cater for their wants. But we must reserve a notice of this golfers' palace for some future number of GOLF.

Since last May, when the green was opened, it may be said that Muirfield links have steadily grown in popularity with the members of the Company. Robert Brown, the keeper, has been doing his work well, and with the labour of his assistants and the play of members the green has been enormously improved. There is some talk of crossing the wall at one point of the course, and having a hole in the Himalayan sands that lie between the "Howes" and the sea. This would certainly do away with the feeling of compression caused by the interminable wall, and might relieve the zig-zag nature of the route, which, on ordinary days, makes the links rather monotonous, and on the medal day interferes not a little with the smooth ness and comfort of the play.

The addition of Muirfield to the other courses of the neighbourhood has increased the difficulties of the local School Board in enforcing the compulsory clauses of the Education Act. As in every district invaded by Golf, the caddie question is a "vexed" one, and sundry communications have passed between the secretary of the Board and the secretary of the Company without any satisfactory settlement of the difficulty. The School Board are "between the devil and the deep sea." "My Lords," teachers, and inspectors call upon the Board to do their duty, and compel the attendance at school of all children who have not passed Standard V., or are under the prescribed age. On the other hand, the golfer is glad to get a caddie, and ask him no questions about age or education, and the parent with enough to do to make ends meet is glad to get what the boy can earn by club-carrying, or (what is too common) the boy wants the money for himself, and carries clubs when he ought to be at school. The guilty party, according to the law, is really the employer of the boy, and in discharge of their duty the Board, it seems, have told their officer to report golfers who employ boys as caddies, who ought to be at school. On the medal day it appears the officer was in evidence, and spoiled the putt of a worthy baronet by challenging him when he was about to play. But the baronet stuck to his caddie, and on paying him off we heard him counsel the boy to "take his licks next morning like a man." Now, it is a pity that a Board should have to take this disagreeable course, or that a putt should be so spoiled, or a boy so instructed; and it is sincerely to be hoped that the Company, one and all, will try to support the Board in carrying out the law. That it is no wish on the part of the Board to disoblige golfers may be inferred from the fact that the teacher of Gullane School, after consulting with some of the members, took the boys in for lessons at seven in the morning and again at five in the evening, so as to let them off to carry clubs during the medal day. On such big days an to carry clubs during the medal day. On such big days an arrangement of the kind might possibly be made. Or if on any particular day a certain number of caddies were required, it is possible that by some arrangement with the teachers these might be provided without the schools being injured. But at present boys regularly absent themselves from school, and take their chance of employment on the links; and the worst of it is, not that they lose an education which is of more value than the shillings they gain, but often they are not employed, they are afraid to go back to school, they wander away and get into

mischief, or lie about the road-sides all the day, where some of them whose age is scarcely beyond a double figure may be seen smoking their pipes and chaffing the passers-by. The question is a trying and difficult one, and along with the rapid development of the noble game it is bound to come up for settlement. It is a question which, as much as any discussion on the rules, requires a union of all clubs and players. But on this subject we must not enter here.

# Review.

SOUVENIR of Shakespeare's "King Henry the Eighth," presented at the Lyceum Theatre, 5th January, 1892, by Henry Irving. Illustrated by J. Bernard Partridge, W. Telbin, J. Harker, and Hawes Craven. London: The Office of Black and White, Bouverie Street, E.C. One Shilling.

This is a very interesting souvenir, commemorative of the production by Mr. Irving, on the stage of the Lyceum, of Shakespeare's well-known historical play. All who have seen the play acted will recognise how it readily lends itself to artistic reproduction, with its quaint bits of Tudor architecture, the pomp and pageantry of its processions, the fine colouring of its rich ecclesiastical interiors, and the magnificence of its royal palaces, Mr. Irving has spared no expense in showing us the internal mechanism of one of the most stirring and eventful dramas chronicled in the pages of English history, together with much that is valuable in an archæological sense in the way of side-light on the life of common mortals who do not bulk so largely, but not less eventfully, in historic perspective as kings and cardinals. In this little book we have capital portraits of Mr. Irving as Cardinal Wolsey, and of Miss Terry as Queen We have also a view of the great trial scene of the Queen, of Old London, and of many other points of the play. Each picture is in a different colour, and the general effect produced is one of more than ordinary picturesqueness and beauty. The artists have done their work extremely well, and the publishers are to be congratulated on the issue of a little book which they manifestly have spared no pains to make worthily commemorative of the occasion.

#### DEATH OF A MINEHEAD GOLFER.

The Minehead Golf Club has suffered a severe loss by the sudden death of its founder and secretary, Dr. Clark, of Blair, on March 25th. Started by the Doctor in 1882, under many discouragements and disadvantages, the club has prospered under his fostering care, and his loss will be felt, not only by the members who miss his enthusiasm and safe counsel in all matters connected with the game, but also by the many visitors to the links, who were always met by him with a hearty welcome. The date of the spring meeting has been postponed until May 10th-12th.

#### SEAFORD GOLF COURSE.

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—Some of your readers may be interested to learn that the alteration of our course has been finally setled. Last autumn Tom Dunn came down and suggested several alterations, some of which the committee, after long and careful consideration, decided to accept. The result of their deliberations has been to give universal satisfaction, so far.

The first six holes are the same as before; the seventh green has been moved to a beautifull wavy spot under the "Hell" Bunker, and close to a very good hazard, which I believe we

owe to the Romans.

The eighth hole is Chyngton side of the "Hell" Bunker, which from the tee hides the green. The beauties of this hole are perhaps most apparent when one's own clean-driven ball flies over the guide-post on the top of the sand hill. The ninth hole is the same as before. The Terrace greens have been given up, both being about as bad as they could well be; so the tenth hole is the South green; the eleventh is the Sea hole. Straight driving is essential here, for a pulled ball goes not into the Sea hole, but into the sea itself, while a slice is punished by a bad lie. This green is a very pretty one on a sandy ledge overhanging the sea.

The twelfth, for want of a better name, is called the "D" hole. The green is near the rabbit warren on Hawke's Brow. The thirteenth hole is over the chalkpit. This is the longest carry on the course; should the ball pitch 145 yards from the tee, it will lie on the green, always supposing it has been driven straight; a shorter carry will leave the ball in the pit, from which it may be extricated with one shot or more. From this point the course remains the same as before. I hope those who have not yet seen the new course will be pleased with it when they do. I may mention that, by the courtesy of the gentleman from whom we rent the links, we are now enabled to take in a corner of land near the Hell Bunker, and another at the ninth hole, I believe this will render it almost impossible to drive a ball on to land under cultivation. Hoping that you will kindly insert this,

#### KILMALCOLM GOLF CLUB.

Since this club was started in the spring of last year it has met with great success. The ambition of local golfers was at first limited to a small nine-hole course, but, in the autumn, with a fast increasing membership, it was resolved to extend the course to the full eighteen holes. The ground for extension was of a very suitable character, and the committee were most cordially met in their efforts by the owner of the ground, Mr. Arch. A. Spiers, of Elderslie. Willie Campbell, of Bridge of Weir, laid off a very fine course—nine holes out and nine holes in—and of a total length of three miles. The club next secured the services of C. S. Day, of Musselburgh, as their professional, and, under his supervision, the course is now in very fine playing condition. For some time past men have been at work on the putting-greens lifting, and, in many places, returfing them. The membership has steadily increased, and now stands over 130. With the small entry money of £2 2s., and the excellence of the course, the committee feel that a large membership is but a matter of a few months. The course is plentifully covered with hazards, which consist of burns, ditches, whins, trees, dykes, marshes, &c. These try the mettle of the strongest player, without discouraging the younger exponents of the game. The record for the round is held by Willie Campbell, who holed out in 77. The usual scratch score is about 86. A comfortable club-house has been built, with full accomodation for members, clubs, &c. There is very good accomodation for visitors in the village, including the well-known hydropathic establishment. Visitors are admitted to play on the links at 15s. per month, and 5s. per week. Kilmalcolm being a favourite resort for tourists, it is expected that a number of golfers from the South will find this an additional attraction to the village.

On Saturday last a "Bogey" competition took place for an opal and diamond pin, presented by Mr. H. Michell, of Bonchurch. The weather was perfect, and, in spite of the dry spell we have had, the greens were in excellent order. Mr. F. Crooke succeeded in winning this valuable prize by beating "Bogey" 2 up. A large party of golfers are expected for the Easter meeting, and the committee have felt compelled to close the green to visitors from the 13th to the 21st inst., in order that members may not be inconvenienced.

#### ROYAL BLACKHEATH GOLF CLUB.

Tuesday, 5th April.—The day of the competition for the spring medal is always the great day of the year for this club. In the present instance, however, it seemed particularly worthy to be marked with a white stone, as the result of the competition would place on the records the name of the hundredth winner of the medal. The present spring medal was designed and made in 1792, on the 31st of March, in which year it was played for and won by Mr. Thomas Longlands. It was then the medal of the Knuckle Club, the members of which society played Golf at Blackheath throughout the winter months, the Blackheath Golf Club then confining their play to the summer months of the year. In November, 1825, the Knuckle Club changed its name to that of Blackheath Winter Golf Club, and in February, 1843, the Blackheath Winter Golf Club was dissolved, and the medal presented to the Royal Blackheath Golf Club, who shortly afterwards extended their season for play to the whole year. Commencing with 1792 the medal was played for every year, while it belonged to the Knuckle Club and Blackheath Winter Golf Club. In 1844, the first year it was in the possession of the Royal Blackheath Golf Club, it was not played for; it was played for by them in 1845, and has been competed for annually in March or April ever since. Including the victor of last year, ninety-nine wins are recorded on the medal.

Leaving this historical digression and returning to the 5th instant, the day proved remarkably fine all through. Golfers are notoriously difficult to please exactly, and not a few of the forty-three members who started complained that the light was too strong, and the putting-greens too hard and dry. On inspection of the cards returned it was found thnt Messrs. W. H. Richardson and F. S. Ireland had tied for the spring medal, the score returned for each being 119 gross. The Singapore challenge cup (under handicap, limited to 21 strokes) and the monthly medal (under club handicap) were also competed for at the same time as the spring medal. Mr. W. H. Richardson's score of 119, less his handicap allowance of 4, made him the winner of both these prizes.

The annual general meeting on the business of the club was held at the club-house in the afternoon, when Mr. J. G. Gibson was re-elected captrin for the year—commencing from 1st Ap il—Mr. W. E. Mr. Honeyman, in laying out the ground has availed himself cleverly of the natural conformation of the somewhat hummocky and heathery "braes aboon Bonawe" to form a unique course. There are peat bogs to get over, and some clumps of heather where straying balls will be difficult to recover. The scenery is of the grandest description. Bens Cruachan and Starabh, with "The Shepherds of Etive," are in immediate view, and form a magnificent range to the east and north-east. With their snow-clad summits on Saturday they looked at their best. To the west are the wooded heights of Aird's Bay, and southward there stretches a wide extent of moor and mountain, clad with heather and woods of hazel and birch.


