

### OPENING OF NEW GOLF CLUB-HOUSE AT CAMBRIDGE.

On Saturday last, the handsome new club-house, at Coldham Common, was formally opened. In a neat speech Mr. Charles Pigg, the president, declared the house open. and spoke of the wonderful popularity of the game in Cambridge. Speeches were also made by the captain, Mr. John L. Low, and the hon. sec., Mr. W. T. Linskill. The club-house is certainly one of the largest in the county, and will prove a boon to Cambridge golfers.

The architect is Mr. B. D. Cancellor, of Winchester, brother of the Cambridge ex-captain, and the builders Messrs. Thoday, and Son, of Cambridge The first teeing ground and the home hole are close to the club windows. The green on Saturday was crowded with golfers; but the daisies are very luxuriant, and the green much parched; gentle rain is wanted badly. The Barrow medal is to be played for to-day under the "Bogey" system.

### ROYAL CORNWALL GOLF CLUB.

Favoured by glorious weather, a numerous company of ladies and gentlemen attended the County links, on Tuesday last week, to witness the presentation of a handsome silver claret jug, by members of the Royal Cornwall Golf Club, to Mr. H. Young-Jamieson, their popular hon. sec. In the absence of the president, Lord Robartes, the ceremony was ably performed by Colonel Swiney, captain of the club, who heartily thanked Mr. Jamieson for introducing the game of Golf into this county, and more particularly for the indefatigable zeal and ability he has displayed in establishing and conducting the Royal Cornwall Golf Club. Mr. Jamieson, in accepting the gift, thanked Colonel Swiney for his complimentary remarks, and the members for their highly appreciated present, promising his support to the club in the future as in the past. The links are charmingly situated on the properties of Lord Vivian, F. J. Hext, Esq., J.P., and the Rev. G. Hext, to whose generosity the club is greatly indebted.

### SUDDEN DEATH ON THE LINKS.

A PAINFUL incident occurred on Monday afternoon at Balgownie Links, the Golf course of the Aberdeen Golf Club, resulting in the death of Major-General Rutherford. The General, who resided in Albyn Place, Aberdeen, and was an ardent golfer, left the city with the afternoon 'bus for Bridge of Don, arriving at the links about three o'clock. In company with Surgeon-Major James Macdonald he ascended the slope leading to the Golf-house, and complained of being breathless, but the incident passed unnoticed at the time, and afterwards he partnered in a round with Professor Harrower. He played the first four holes with his usual enthusiasm, but it was at the fifth hole that the sad occurrence happened. General Rutherford became separated from his partner, who played on to the green and awaited his arrival, but as his movements could not be seen a caddie was de-spatched to search for him, Professor Harrower recalling meanwhile, with some anxiety, that he had in passing noticed the General putting his hand to his breast. Unfortunately the worst fears were realised. The caddie found the General lying face downward on the ground, still breathing, but insensible. Dr. Macdonald was summoned, but before he reached the spot General Rutherford had expired. The remains were in Albyn Place. John Wellingwood Rutherford, who was in his sixty-sixth year, was a native of Roxburghshire, and his father went through all the Peninsular War with the 94th Scottish Brigade. At the early age of sixteen, John, in 1841, joined the 47th Madras Native Infantry, and took part in the stirring events of that period. He went through the whole of the Mutiny, and was rewarded with a medal. After thirty-five years service, he retired with the rank of Major-General. Settling in Aberdeenshire, of which county he was a Justice of the Peace, he took a keen interest in outdoor exercise, being, besides a member of the Aberdeen Golf Club, president of the Aberdeen Curling Club, and also an enthusiastic angler.



### QUESTIONS ON THE RULES.

### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—In your issue of this week you were good enough to insert my letter signed "Bunker." The new rule distinctly states that anything out of the ordinary line of the course is a hazard. Now, in answer to my note, you state that if lying on a clear patch of grass surrounded by whins, one is allowed to ground his club, although out of the ordinary line of the course, therefore implying it is not a hazard. Now, suppose one is lying on a clear patch surrounded by whins, with also loose sticks and stones near one's ball, by your verdict one is allowed to remove these. I cannot think that the new rules mean this. They define anything out of the ordinary line of the course a hazard, and, therefore, one cannot move anything, or ground one's club, which to me seems manifestly fair.

### THE OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP.

### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—According to rotation, the open championship falls to be played for over Musselburgh links, but even now there are rumours—which it is hoped are unfounded—that the committee in charge of the matter have thoughts of transferring the competition to the Honourable Company's new green at Muirfield. We townspeople have very much regretted that the Honourable Company should have felt themselves constrained to sever their connection with our links, with which they have so long been identified, and which must have very many memories for the older members of their club; and we anxiously trust that the championship meeting will continue to take place over this links in the future as in the past.

I would venture to suggest that an early intimation of the intention of the committee should be made; and I would further suggest that the play should take place earlier in the year, say July or August, instead of October or November. It will be remembered that three years ago several of the last couples finished almost in darkness, and they might not have been able to complete their rounds at all if steps had not been taken to induce those players whose first rounds had put them out of court to withdraw.

HOLE IN ONE.—This rather unusual feat was accomplished last week on the Aberdeen links course by a member of the Victoria Club. Playing in a foursome with Professor Cameron as his partner, Mr. Semple drove from the first Alps tee, and succeeded in holing out the Valley hole with his tee shot. A like performance has not taken place here for a number of years, the last occasion on which it happened being when Mr. G. Leslie Jamieson, of the Aberdeen club, holed out the Rose hole off an iron shot.



Mr. R. P. Lyle, captain of the Greenock Club, has offered two prizes of Golf clubs for competition during next month, and Mr. Baxter has given a prize for competition in the autumn.

It may be taken that the Edinburgh ladies are to have a course provided for their own special use. A committee of the Edinburgh Town Council resolved last week to report that in their opinion there could be no objection to young women playing short-hole Golf on the north-east end of Bruntsfield links.

RECORD SCORE FOR KELSO.—Playing in a friendly match with Mr. T. D. C. Smith over the Kelso course on Tuesday, the 19th inst., Mr. William Bennet made the record score for the green. The rounds were as follows :—

The former record was made by Mr. Smith when playing in the Calcutta cup competition a few days before, when he compiled the score of 83.

The Greenock Golf Club decided, at a meeting held last week, to increase the membership to 150. The option was given to the committee of imposing an extra charge upon new members.

Lieut. J. H. Goldfinch, R.N., has resigned the hon. secretaryship of the New Forest Golf Club, on taking up an appointment, and Mr. R. Hargreaves has undertaken the duties *pro tem*.

The Brighton and Hove Golf Club has been obliged to postpone the tournament for Mr. Walter Carr's prize till the autumn, owing to so many of their players being unable to enter.

A RECORD SCORE AT BRIGHTON —Charles Ramage, the professional of the Brighton and Hove Golf Club, has lately done two very fine rounds, viz., 72 and 74, the latter being a record for the links. On a well-known Scottish green, where sometimes the members are pestered by the caddies coming within the enclosure of the club-house, the wrathful secretary, one morning before starting for a medal round, took up his pen hurriedly and scribbled a notice forbidding the practice. Soon after a quartette of unmarried ladies, passing by, were attracted by it, and one of them read aloud as follows :--

"NOTICE TO LADIES.—Ladies, whether engaged or not, are prohibited from coming within the enclosure, except when invited by their employers to do so. Hereafter this rule will be strictly enforced, and those who wilfully transgress the same shall have their names struck off the list of eligible *ladies*." The secretary is now said to write his notices more legibly.

### ABERDEEN.

The tie for the Leopold cup, between Captain H. V. Brooke and Mr. W. R. Reid, at the Aberdeen club spring meeting was played off at Balgownie on Tuesday, the 19th, and after a very exciting game Captain Brooke proved the winner by one stroke. There was a strong easterly gale blowing. The respective scores were :—Captain Brooke, 91; Mr. Reid, 92. Captain Brooke, therefore, becomes the possessor of both the club's cups for the present year.

Captain H. V. Brooke and Mr. W. G. Jamieson, played their tie game for the second and third prizes in the optional sweepstakes, over the Balgownie Links Course on Wednesday, the 20th, and halved the match scores :—Captain Brooke (scratch), 89; Mr. W. G. Jamieson, 95, less 6=89.

The annual match between the Aberdeen Club and the Dalhousie Club (Carnoustie), duly came off on Saturday over the Balgownie links, and ended in a victory for the visiting team by sixteen holes. Twelve men started on each side. The strangers brought through a strong, well-balanced side, the leading men of which are well known as some of the best amateur players in Scotland. The Aberdeen Club also put a good team into the field, though, from the first, the opinion was generally expressed that they had little chance of winning. The weather, unfortunately, was all against good play, a strong south-westerly gale blowing, whlle clouds of dust were flying about in all directions. On reckoning up the scores at the close of the game, it was found that eight of the Dalhousie men had gained twenty-seven holes, while the three winners for Aberdeen scored eleven holes, Messrs. Clarke and Ballingall halving their match. Some splendid Golf was witnessed on the part of Messrs. R. B. Sharp, J. Sharp, jun, D. Anderson, C. E. Gilroy and W. Ballingall for Dalhousie; while on the Aberdeen side the best form was shown by Colonel Boyes, and Messrs. Clarke, McLellan, Jamieson and Orr.

### ARDEER GOLF CLUB.

The Ardeer Golf Club held their spring meeting on Saturday, when the conditions were on the whole favourable. Consequent upon the fine dry weather the green was very keen, and the putting-greens were especially so, but a rather strong wind, which was accompanied with intermittent showers, was very disconcerting to players, and the result was that scoring was above the average. The usual business of this club is transacted at the autumn meeting, so that the proceedings on Saturday consisted in the competitors for a series of prizes to the value in all of about  $\pounds 7$ . The first of the competitors started about half-past eleven, and the last couple went out at three, and in all twenty-one couples entered, which is about an average. The players were divided into two sections, those from scratch, or below it, to 9 of odds, and those from 9 of odds upwards. Of the total entry fourteen couples belonged to the first section, and seven couples to the second, and of the first section nine started from scratch, so that the club talent was very well represented. Of the first contingent that went out not one returned a score that was under 90. Mr. W. Fleming, with an unfortunate 8 to the second hole, finished at 96. Mr. J. R. Motion finished shortly after at 94, and the Rev. J. F. Graham at 95. The second contingent included the two likeliest men for a good scratch score-Messrs. R. Adam and W. Milne. ### PRESTWICK GOLF CLUB.

The spring meeting of this club took place on Thursday last week, when the proceedings were attended with unusual success. The weather, though threatening at the commencement, turned out fine, and the links, which have never been in finer playing condition than during the present spring, were in the finest order. The ordinary business meeting occupied an hour before the usual medal round was entered upon, and the principal part of the business was the election of Mr. A. R. Paterson as captain of the club for the ensuing year.

There afterthirty-six couples started in the competitions for the club gold medal, scratch, and the St. Andrew's cross, handicap. This is a record, so far as the number of entries is concerned, and probably also in point of the talent engaged, the players including Mr. J. E. Laidlay, Mr. Alex. Stuart, Mr. W. S. Wilson, Mr. J. A. Neilson, Mr. E. D. Prothero, Mr. R. N. Fairlie, Mr. A. R. Paterson, Mr. Kennedy Erskine, etc. In view of the champion being present, there were many interested spectators, most of whom followed the match in which he interested spectators, most of whom followed the match in which he and Mr. A. Stuart were engaged. Neither player turned out to be in very good form, though Mr. Stuart played well with 4 and 3 for the first hole. His experience in crossing the "Cardinal," however, proved very disastrous, and at once put him out of the running. He got so terribly punished in this formidable bunker, the indirect result of a bad shot from the tee, that his score for the three holes had mounted to 2a stroker. My Stuart no doubt for the three holes had mounted to 22 strokes. Mr. Stuart no doubt very materially handicapped himself by failing at one point to take full very materially handicapped himself by lating at one point to take fun-advantage of the rules. He found his ball in an unplayable position in the bunker, and lifting it, dropped it over his shoulder, losing 2 strokes; and as he had a bad lie he failed to get out. According to the St. Andrews Rules, which are in force at Prestwick, Mr. Stuart was en-titled to lift his ball and tee it, losing 2 strokes. The rule (VIII, for medal play, at p. 22) is :=-""A ball may, under a penalty of 2 strokes, ba lifted out of a difficulty of any description, and teed behind same." be lifted out of a difficulty of any description, and teed behind same. The interest in the match was, of course, over after this, though but for this misfortune Mr. Stuar was otherwise playing a game that might have brought him to the top. Mr. Laidlay, who threw away several chances on the putting-green, finished as follows :--

Neilson, who immediately pre-ceded the previously-named couple, both finished above Mr. Laidlay. Mr. Laidlay's score did not long hold the position of lowest, for Mr. R. N. Fairlie, who was two couples behind, handed in an 86, made up as follows :-

It was hardly expected that this score, considering the troublesome wind that was blowing, would be beaten, more especially as, shortly after, Mr. W. S. Wilson, a likely winner, finished at 88. But in this case the unexpected happened, and the lowest scratch score was eventually handed in by Mr. Thomas Anderson, a player with 9 handicap. Mr. Anderson's score was :—

This proved to be the winning score in a double sense, for not only was it the lowest scratch score, but with 9 off the resulting 75 was also the lowest handicap score, and Mr. Anderson's performance thus secured for him the medal and the St. Andrews cross.

It is interesting to note that this was not only the first occasion on which Mr. Anderson, who is a comparatively young man, competed for the medal, but that 84 is the lowest score he ever went round the links Although he has never come to the front before as a golfer, he is well known as a cricketer, and thus bids fair to become one of several notable examples of good cricketers who have become good golfers. ### ROYAL CROMER GOLF CLUB.

The career of this club, inaugurated in the autumn of 1887 through the instrumentality of Mr. H. Broadhurst, M.P., supported by Mr. Bond-Cabbell and others, has been one of brilliant success. Starting with a few members, principally local, the club, by the end of the first year, numbered about 77; since then it has been steadily increasing, and can now boast a membership of about 300. The Easter competitions held last week brought a large number of visitors to Cromer, most of them being members of the club and their friends, and as their stay extends over several days considerable benefit thus accrues to the town.

The annual general meeting to receive the accounts for the past year, and to elect officers, &c., took place at the Hotel de Paris on Wednes-day evening, the Hon. Harbord Harbord presiding. The treasurer's and secretary's reports were read and adopted, showing the club to be in a very flourishing and prosperous condition. To meet the extraordinary increase in membership it has been decided to make a further of dial of the second golfer, from St. Andrews, as an event of particular interest to the mem-bers. The object of this visit was to advise the committee in regard to the existing course, and also with reference to the proposed extension till this last has been achieved. The committee will not rest satisfied As introductory thereto the alterations and improvements of the course, as suggested by Mr. Morris, were at once taken in hand, and under the superintendence of Mr. Lucas and Mr. H. G. Winter, who constitute the green committee, have been pushed forward with all possible speed. Notwithstanding the inclemency of the winter having interfered somewhat with the work, it was admitted that the course had been vastly improved in every respect. The report further mentioned the fact of W. Aveston, a native golfer, having been appointed professional to the club, he having re-ceived excellent testimonials from W. Fernie. The number of lady players having increased, a temporary course has been marked out for them, and the committee hope to see their way to make six holes, which may be used by them independently of the ordinary Golf course. It was resolved from the date of this meeting to raise the entrance fee from  $\pounds 3$  3s. to  $\pounds 5$  5s., and the annual subscription from  $\pounds 1$  Is. to  $\pounds 2$  2s., the yearly subscription for members previously elected to remain at  $\pounds 1$  Is. Alteration was also made in regard to the rule for visitors, the subscription in future to be  $\pounds I$  per month, except during July, August, and September, when it will be 30s. to those belonging to a recognised Golf club, but to others  $\pounds 2$ .

The prize competitions were held on Wednesday and Thursday, and brought a strong muster of members. Between thirty and forty couples started on the first day, the field on the second day being somewhat smaller. The meeting on the whole was very successful, and was considerably larger than any other previously held. The silver challenge cup, presented by the Prince of Wales, and played for under handicap, led to a grand fight between Mr. P. M. Lucas (scratch) and Mr. E. M. Hansell, whose handicap is 8. They tied on the first day, their scores being : Mr. Lucas, 87; Mr. Hansell, 95, less 8=87. They arranged to decide the contest on the second day, but again they tied, the scores this time being : Mr. Lucas, 84; Mr. Hansell, 92, less 8=84.
