



# GOLF IN SOUTH AFRICA.

#### PORT ELIZABETH GOLF CLUB.

The Port Elizabeth Golf Club was founded on the 1st September, 1890. President, Sir C. F. Blaine; vice-president, Mr. J. T. Keith; captain, Mr. T. Dewar. Committee: Messrs. C. A. H. Gallie, R. H. H. Heenan, W. Hume, M. Kennedy, H. J. Sherman, and E. H. Walton. Hon. secretary and treasurer, Mr. Percy J. Pool.

Although a few new members have been added to the list since the annual report was printed, some have left the Bay, and the roll now numbers fifty-eight members. The club is in a flourishing condition.

The following are some of the best scores recorded: - December 20th, 1890, Mr. T. Dewar (scratch), 92; January 24th, 1891, Mr. T. Dewar (scratch), 88; March 21st, 1891, Mr. G. Bruce, 114, less 30=84; April 25th, 1891, Mr. E. H. Walton, 112, less 30=82; May 23rd, 1891, Mr. C. A. H. Gallie, 96, less 5-91; June 6th, 1891, Mr. T. Dewar (scratch), 80; June 20th, 1891, Mr. T. Dewar (scratch), 87; September 19th, 1891, Mr. T. Dewar (scratch), 92; December 19th, 1891. Mr. A. B. Smith. 119, less 30=89; Christmas, 1891, Mr. G. A. Merry (scratch), 83. First six-monthly handicap medal won by Mr. To Dewar; average, 97'1. First annual medal, 31st October, 1891, won by Mr. G. Bruce—115, less 16=99. First series Dunell cup won by Mr. W. Simpson; average, 98'2. Second six-monthly handicap medal won by Mr. L. F. Penny; average, 97'3.

Mr. Thos. Dewar, the captain, began to play Golf in 1872, at St. Andrews, getting a few lessons from Jamie Anderson. He joined the St. Andrews Golf Club in 1878, and from that year he was always coming forward in the prize list. In 1883 he was first with a score of 94, taking the medal and first prize, also ticing for the six-monthly medal. Joining the Thistle Golf Club, St. Andrews, in 1884, he won their first medal and gold charm, with a score of 89 strokes. He left for South Africa in 1885, and made an unsuccessful effort to start a club in Port Elizabeth in 1886.

A description of the Port Elizabeth links may be of interest to many of our readers :-

First hole (starting from the teeing ground at the back of the tramway stables).-The first hazard we come to is a disused road leading nearly to the green, which is rather sandy, but fairly level.

No. 2.—From teeing ground with fair tee shot, the player finds a stony hazard on the right, with a cart-road on the left, while in front lies the tramway line and water hazard. The approach stroke brings the player to the green, which has a whin hazard on the left side.

Green very good turf.

No. 3.—A good drive from the tee will bring the player to the foot of the whin hazard, over which a careful iron shot has to be played to land the gutty on the green-soil being of red clay and difficult to putt

No. 4.—In driving for this hole, which is a short one, the player has to overcome a nasty whin hazard, wire fence, and hard road, which brings him to the edge of the green, care having to be exercised in approaching, as on the further side of the green lies a deep bunker.

No. 5.—The line of play to this hole leads one up the face of a hill,

the ground being covered with whins, long grass, and a very uneven surface, the approach shot here being very difficult, the green having been excavated out of the side of the hill,

No. 6.—The line of play leads over fairly clear ground, but any deviation therefrom -on either side-lands the player in heavy whin The following shot requires force and judgment to bring the player on to the green, which is difficult of play, being slightly sloping. The green here is very good turf.

No. 7.—A long drive has to be played to take the ball over whins,

rough ground, and a road, to bring it on to a small grassy flat; from which a good loft from the iron lands the player on the green, which is of fairly good grass, but wiry.

No. 8.—A clean drive over rough grass brings the player within an easy iron shot of the green, which is rather small, lying alongside the road referred to in No. 7.

No. 9.—A clean drive must also be played here, whin hazards lying immediately in front of the teeing ground: the iron shot must be carefully played, the ground being rough and the grass wiry.

No. 10.—A similar green without hazards.

No. 11.—The player starts with a long drive down hill, his second shot taking him over fairly open ground with slight whin hazards. Approaching this hole a stony road and uneven ground has to be crossed to lie on the green, which is bounded on the farther side by two wire fences and a macadamised road.

No. 12.—The direction of this hole is perfectly straight, but the second drive has to be carefully played to avoid a small pit (in the direct line of play) with fence and road on the left, and broken ground

and whins on the right. In approaching this green a straight iron shot must be played.

No. 13.-A similar green with like hazards the hole lying on the edge ot a large water bunker. The green, after leaving No. 11 to this point, being most excellent turf.

No. 14.—This hole is the most hazardous of the round; the tee drive leading over the above-mentioned bunker-aptly termed Hades-with a macadamised road on the further side, to get on to good ground. The green, lying on the far side of the road, is of very good turf, with a slight hazard in the line of play.

No. 15.—The tee drive should bring the player nearly on to the green,

which is one of the best on the links.

No. 16.—The line of play leads over a set of train rails and a cart road, being otherwise a clear drive. The ground around this green is very stony, with bunker on the farther side of it.

No. 17.—A perfectly clear drive, a slightly undulating ground on side of green, which is of fairly good turf.
No. 18.—Home. The player with his tee drive has to cross a broad

cart-road and rough ground, and with an easy iron shot finds himself on a very good green.

MEASUREMENT OF THE LINKS. -From first teeing ground to No. 1 hole is 190 yards 2 feet; from No. 1 to No. 2 hole is 371 yards; from No. 2 to No. 3 hole is 259 yards; from No. 3 to No. 4 hole is 203 yards; from No. 4 to No. 5 hole is 274 yards; from No. 5. to No. 6 hole is 327 yards 2 feet; from No. 6 to No. 7 hole is 228 yards 2 feet; from No. 7 to No. 8 hole is 275 yards; from No. 8 to No. 9 hole is 180 yards 2 feet; from No. 9 to No. 10 hole is 213 yards 2 feet; from No. 10 to No. 11 hole is 316 yards 2 feet; from No. 11 to No. 12 hole is 409 yards I foot ; from No. 12 to No. 13 hole is 418 yards 2 feet ; from No. 13 to No. 14 hole is 214 yards; from No. 14 to No. 15 hole is 164 yards I foot; from No. 15 to No. 16 hole is 189 yards I foot; from No. 16 to No. 17 hole is 197 yards I foot; from No. 17 to No. 18 hole is 192 yards 2 feet; total, 4,626 yards.

#### THE UITENHAGE GOLF CLUB.

The Uitenhage Golf Club was started in December last, and the following gentlemen were elected as a committee of management:—Mr. W. Hume, president; the Hon. John Dolley, M.L.C., vice-president; Messrs. Thornton, Flanders, Gibb, Heugh, Pearson; Mr. Gibb, hon. secretary and treasurer.

The committee at once proceeded to lay out the links, and succeeded in getting a very pretty course, about 21 miles in length, with eighteen holes. The putting-greens are still in rather a rough state, but there is no doubt that when everything is in order this will be one of the best and most interesting links in South Africa, there being great variety in the ground, and many good hazards to negotiate. There are some very good players among the railway workshop men, who have learned the game in the old country, and after a short time Uitenhage should hold its own against any Golf club in South Africa. Port Elizabeth is only 20 miles off, and some matches will be arranged this year against the club at that town. The best score that has yet been made is 95, which, considering the difficulty of the course and the roughness of the putting-greens, may be considered a very good score.

Starting from the south-east corner of the Jubilee Park, the first hole, which is 250 yards distant, is reached over level ground, but rather rough, the vegetation consisting of small stubby bushes, requiring clean lofting shots to get over.

The teeing-ground for the second hole is at the edge of the high

ground, overlooking the flat surface of the Zwartkops River Valley, some 150 feet below. The drive is over a marshy belt, covered with rushes, the grave of many a Golf ball, but a good drive will land the player on a nice piece of grass, which leads up to the putting-green. Immediately beyond this strip of grass, however, is a very rough piece

of ground, full of sand-holes and whin bushes, so that an over-shot is attended with great risk. The third hole is 350 yards distant over some rough ground, just a swampy piece with rushes, and then a stretch covered with whins and

other bushes. The fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth holes are over fairly level ground, with a winding old dry river-bed intersecting the course, and a couple of very sandy roads between the sixth and seventh holes. The fifth hole is on the banks of the Zwartkops River, necessitating a very careful approach shot to avoid getting into trouble.

The ninth hole is the longest one, 450 yards, over very fair ground. The hole, however, is situated in close proximity to a strong running brook, with very boggy ground on the further side covered with reeds, out of which it is hopeless to think of getting a ball if played so far.

The tenth, eleventh, twelfth and thirteenth holes range from 190 to 250 yards, with bush hazards and old roads, necessitating careful play. The fourteenth and fifteenth holes are about 350 yards each, over ground with patches of bush and some old roads, very sandy; and also a

number of springhare holes close to the track. The sixteenth hole is

very similar, but shorter, being not more than 250 yards.

The seventeenth hole is situated at the edge of the high ground overlooking the valley, and it is therefore necessary to play uphill and across the same rushy swamp which has to be crossed between the first and second holes. There are, besides, some large bushes on the face of the hill, and unless a clean drive is made over all, the score at this point is apt to be a long one. The distance, however, is not more than 200 yards as the crow flies.

The ground to the eighteenth hole is the same as to the first hole, and

the distance about the same, 250 yards.

### FORMATION OF A NEW GOLF CLUB FOR ROTHESAY.

An adjourned meeting of those interested in the formation of a new Golf club, with links convenient to Rothesay, was held in the Town Hall on Monday evening, 20th ult. The Rev. Robert Forgan, West Free Church, a son of the famous club-maker, presided. The committee appointed at the previous meeting reported that Willie Campbell, Bridge of Weir, had inspected the different grounds where it had been proposed to lay down a course, and that he recommended that of the Westlands as being the best and most practicable, while it could be made ready for play at a cost of about £30. It was also reported that easy terms were in course of being arranged with the tenant of Westland Farm. The course it was stated, will be a long nine-hole course, and will be about a mile and a-half in extent. The report was approved, and it was unanimously resolved that those present form themselves into a club, to be named the "Rothesay Golf Club," so as to distinguish it from the existing Bute Golf Club, which has its links at Quochag, resolved in wiles form Pothesay. The new research will be about 6 ffeet. nearly six miles from Rothesay. The new course will be about fifteen and not more than twenty minutes' walk from Rothesay. It was also resolved that the annual subscription for membership should be one guinea, and a committee, consisting of Sheriff Martin, Rev. Mr. Forgan, Messrs. J. W. Stuart, A. H. Miller, A. M'Gaw, and R. D. Macmillan, was appointed to make preliminary arrangements as to lease of the ground, and preparing a constitution, and to report to another meeting. It was stated that the membership of the new club already numbers over fifty.

#### PROFESSIONAL MATCH AT ABERDEEN.

The final half of the match for £5 a side between Mearns, Aberdeen, and Dalgleish, Nairn, was played on 23rd ult., over the Balgownie course, near Aberdeen. The conditions of the match were that four rounds had to be played—two on the Nairn course and two at Balgownie—before the match was decided. Mearns started the day's play with 9 holes to the good, the advantage he had gained at Nairn a fortnight ago, and at the end of the first round, had increased his lead to 12 holes. The play was not very brilliant on either side, Mearns giving up 2 holes without playing them out, so that the scores cannot be given. In the second round the game was soon brought to a close in favour of Mearns, who won 3 out of the first 4 holes, and stood 15 up with 14 to play. He also won the bye by 4 holes, gaining 7 out of the 14 to his opponent's 3, the remaining 4 being halved. The scores in this round were as follows:—

#### PROFESSIONAL FOURSOME AT ELIE.

A professional foursome was played on Elie links, Fifeshire, on Saturday last, between Jack Simpson (ex-champion) and George Walker, against Jack Duncan and George Pearson. The weather was very bad, rain falling in torrents during the whole of the game. This did not prevent a fine display of Golf by the winners, who played a magnificent game in the second round, and came away victorious by 4 up and 2 to play, or 6 holes up on the twenty-two holes played. Simpson is showing at present very good form, which reminds one of his rosy days. It is understood that he intends to make a hard struggle for the championship this year. Duncan is a golfer of the first order, and he showed a fine game on the putting-green, which saved his side a very much greater defeat. Walker and Pearson are both very pro-mising golfers, the former being noted for his long drives, and the latter for his steady play. Pearson played in the championship last year, but was somewhat unlucky. The following are the scores:—

# RECORD SCORES.

(Continued.)

#### NAIRN.

Dalgleish, the professional, in December, 1890, beat his own record, accomplishing the round of eighteen holes in 1873. In the previous month Mr. S. Kennedy, a visitor, broke the amateur record with 77=39 out and 38 home.

#### NORTH BERWICK.

Bernard Sayers, in 1888, set the record of these links with 66=34 out, 32 in.

#### NORTH BERWICK LADIES' CLUB.

The score of 28, made by Miss Ada Gillies Smith in 1890, remains the record for the ladies' course (nine holes).

#### OXFORD UNIVERSITY GOLF CLUB.

Mr. Horace Hutchinson, with 75, made on the 1st November, 1890, held the amateur record of the old links. On the 4th February, 1891, Hugh Kirkaldy beat his own record of 74 by 1, going the round in 34 and 39=73. During the summer a new course was opened at South Hincksey, and on the 27th November last Mr. W. D. Davidson, the hon. secretary, carried off the cup with a score of 81, which is the record for the links. The former record was 86, and was beaten on the same occasion by Mr. H. T. Knight, with 85.

### PRESTWICK GOLF CLUB.

Willie Campbell has the record of these links with 71, and also the record out with 33.

#### PRESTWICK ST. NICHOLAS.

Mr. D. Bone, in the last annual match between the Home and the Glasgow Golf Clubs in June last, went the double round (eighteen holes) in 74=37 and 37, thus establishing an amateur record of the green. The previous record was 77, which stood for several years. Our issue of August 21st last contains the statement (a "Tee Shot") that on the previous Saturday "a Prestwick St. Nicholas player distinguished himself by making a record for the green (nine holes) with 35.

## PORTRUSH (COUNTY ANTRIM) GOLF CLUB.

The professional record of this course was 68 in January 1891.

#### PAU.

The lowest authenticated score made as yet (May, 1891) on this green is 78.

#### PETERSFIELD.

The record of 54 for this course was made in the first handicap competition of the club in June last by Mr. L. G. Bonham-Carter.

#### ROYAL CROMER.

Willie Aveston, the professional, playing with Dr. Heasman on the 28th April, 1891, lowered his own record from 76 to 73 =37 out and 36 home.

## ROYAL BLACKHEATH.

Mr. J. G. Gibson, in a friendly match with Mr. Gordon Ruck on the 6th May last, lowered the medal record (his own), and established a record for the course with a score of 108 for three rounds of seven holes. His previous medal record was 112, and was made exactly twelve months before.

# RANELAGH.

Mr. A. Molesworth, in September last, broke Dr. C. A. S. Leggatt's record of 86, going the round in 83.

#### ROYAL CORNWALL.

Mr. B. F. Edyvean established a record for the round (nine holes) with 42 in the last August handicap competition.

# ROYAL MONTREAL.

The record of the present course, 79, was made on the 7th May, 1891, by the Rev. James Barclay in the Sidey medal competition.

#### REDHILL AND REIGATE.

Mr. Alfred Schacht, the captain, playing with Mr. A. J. Earnes, lowered the record of the course to 74.

#### ROYAL NORTH DEVON.

Mr. Horace Hutchinson, with 80, holds the best record for the medal round of this course.

# ROYAL EPPING FOREST CLUB.

The professional record for this course is 71=36 and 35, made by R. Tait in October, 1890.

# ROYAL JERSEY.

Mr. Spencer Robin, playing at the autumn meeting on October 10th, 1891, broke his own and the club record with 83=42 out, 41 in.

#### SEAFORD.

Dr. C. A. S. Leggatt, oa March 31st, 1891, lowered the record with 90=43 out, 47 in. In May, 1890, Mr. Felix Skene played round in 83; but the course since that time has been much lengthened and made more difficult.

Mr. Wright, on the 1st August, 1891, went round in 81, which is the lowest score in any competition since the course was extended and changed.

### SEATON CAREW.

The professional, J. Kay, on Saturd 19, the 4th May, 1891, broke the record of the then course (fourteen holes) with a score of 57. Three months later the course was opened as an eighteen-hole one. Mr. C. Cooper established the first record in September with a score of 88, which, however, was lowered by Mr. G. Newby, the captain, in November, to 86.

#### ST. ANDREWS.

For many years young Tom Morris' 77, made in a tie for prizes, was unsurpassed; but in the autumn of 1888 this record was broken by Hugh Kirkaldy with 74, and again, nine months later (July, 1889), with 73, which remains the professional record. Mr. F. G Tait for some time held the amateur record of the green with 77; but in a match with Mr. Arthur N. Stewart on the 17 September last, Mr. Ernest Blackwell succeeded in lowering that figure, accomplishing the round in 76= 37 and 39. Mr. A. F. Macfie has the best amateur score in competition, viz., 78.

Mr. H. S. C Everard is the only player who has holed the short hole at St. Andrews five times in one-three times going out, twice coming in. Such an honour, however, brings its penalties, because Mr. Everard has had to present a bottle of whisky each time to the caddie who happened to be the lucky custodian of his clubs on those occasions !

#### TROON.

The professional record of this green for a long time was 73, achieved by Willie Fernie, but that figure was lowered by his brother George, who went round on Monday, December 7th, 1890, in 72=38 out and 34 in. Curiously enough, on the succeeding day Willie went round twice in 72, making in each round 36 out and 36 in. On the 28th of May last he reduced that record by 4 strokes, holing out the eighteen holes in 68= 34 each way. He had made the record of 34 for the nine holes out, and on the 29th May, coming in, on the first of two rounds he established another record for the nine holes of 32. Mr. A. Morison's 79, with which he won the Hillhouse Cup, in 1889, is the record of the green in an amateur competition.

#### TOOTING BEC.

Tom Dunn, the professional, in October, 1890, went round in 70=38 and 32; but on the 12th April, 1891, he succeeded in lowering his own record, taking the eighteen holes in 68=37 out and 31 in. The amateur record of 78=40 and 38, was made by Mr. Arthur Denman in a match with Mr. C. E. Nesham on the 5th February, 1890. On the 8th April, 1891, Mr. Nesham, in a match with Mr. W. Bazalgette, lowered this figure by 1, going out in 41 and coming home in 36. Mr. Denman, however, regained the honour in November last, accomplishing the round, in a match with Mr. Dunlop Hill, in 75=38 out and 37 in.

## WEST HERTS (BUSHEY).

The record of W. Walker, when local professional, was 72 Mr. A. Melville, in October last, held the amateur record with 79.

#### WILPSHIRE AND DISTRICT (LANCS.)

Mr. J. Hargreaves, with a score of 100, on the 3rd October last, established the competition record for the links since their extension, the distance for the eighteen holes, twice round a nine-hole course, being 3 miles 344 yards.

#### WINCHESTER

The record of these links was reduced in October last to 74, by Andrew Kirkaldy, who has been engaged by the club for the winter months.

### WEST LANCASHIRE (BLUNDELLSANDS).

A'exander Herd, the new professional of this club, secured the record of the green on November 14th last, with a score of 73=38 out, 35 in.

#### RANDOM SHOTS.

It never seems too hot at night for a fire; or, perhaps, it is never too hot for me to appreciate the warmth and companionship of a cheery blaze of crackling wood, which throws out a faint resinous odour, very pleasant and refreshing.

As I draw my chair close into the glow, my eye is caught by a row of small, round objects upon the mantelpiece. One is perfect in form, of a dazzling whiteness, and lined with beautiful regularity. It is an unused Golf ball, fresh from a crisp paper wrapping.

But those wretched shapeless lumps, scarred, speckled and gashed? It seems impossible that this morning they were also round, dazzling, and perfect. Yet such is the truth. I only took them out this afternoon. This one was cruelly flogged into a ditch; by an awkward stroke with the iron, this other received an unsightly wound; and yet a third was hacked and splintered through the furze. They were all shamefully handled; I shudder to think of it.

Yet this glimmering firelight is conducive to more comfort-

able thoughts.

After all, contrast is the relief of life, its greatest charm. Here, in my cosy armchair, I recollect with joy my afternoon's tramp round the links. The damp mist has lost its unpleasant effects; that cutting wind seems but a fresh, crisp breeze; the caddie who laughed at me behind his hand appears in my memory as a cheerful-faced, agreeable lad-at the time I hated

So it is with all things in life; it is contrast that charms.

Rest after work; play after toil; peace after war.

"Sait-on où l'on va?" is Mr. Sala's inquiry in the preface to his delightful book, "A Journey due South." Does any one or anything, know the final goal? But there is no flight so uncertain to predict, no future so veiled in mystery, as that of a Golf ball. At times (these, alas ! too few) so swift, so straight, so far its flight; at others, a little giddy twist, and bitter disappointment for the reward.

Every one of the balls which I now regard ruefully was meant

to fly straight to the goal of my aim.
What happened? Well, who shall say? One small evil influence affected its career at the outset, and its ultimate end was undesirable.

So many wrong methods for a single right one, the odds are heavy against the good result.

Nevertheless, there is balm for our grief. As the poet sang, "A minute's success pays the failure of years."

It was worth tramping twice round the links, worth all the cold and fatigue, to achieve that one glorious drive, which sent the ball spinning over the last and most difficult bunker, within an inch or two of the desired hole.

Strange that others cannot appreciate one's triumph. At best, it appears to them but sheer good luck; a random shot. To myself, it seems the sum total of my perseverance, the outcome of cultivated skill, the proof positive that at last I am "getting on."

As I have said, however, of all uncertain and doubtful

futures, the golfer's future is pre-eminently doubtful and uncertain. There is a fascination in the uncertainty, but there is torture also. A few days' good play, then back, back into the depths of dull despair. We all know it, and strive, for the most part, to bear it philosophically. Some day we hope to turn out A1, like some balls. "Sait-on où l'on va?"

Those random shots, which occasionally lighten our dreary lot, lift us from yielding to despair. Many of us would have given up the game long ago but for these meteor-like flashes, seeming to show better things in store; and one cannot tell whether they come to cheer us as good angels, or as the reverse, to goad us on to ignominious disaster. No doubt this day next year I shall sit speculating how I came to heel such a ball, or failed to loft such another; I may, and probably, shall, be still treading the gloomy path of mediocrity, or be plunged lower still into the very depths of dufferdom. But, oh! glorious uncertainty, I may have risen to the heights of renown; my putting may have become classical; my driving a dream. That random shot will do its work, and even the caddies may revere me, thus I dream.

Thus a single perfect drive will dazzle my thoughts, till I fall asleep, and wander forth in that strange, weird, dreamland full of wild hopes realised, of painless joy, and accomplished ambition, and can anyone tell me whither I go?

A THREE-BALL PROFESSIONAL MATCH.— An important and novel professional march is being arranged. Hugh Kirkaldy, the present champion and professional at Forest Row, David Brown, of Malvern, champion of 1886, and Douglas Rolland are to play this month a three-ball match for a purse raised by the clubs they represent. It is arranged that 36 holes will be played at Malvern on July 15th, at Limpsfield on the 28th and at Forest Row on Saturday, July 30th.

The record for the new course of the Prestwick St. Nicholas Club stood at 83, up till Monday the 20th ult., when Mr. E. D. Prothero, in a three-ball match with Mr. A. R. Paterson and Mr. Goff, holed out in 77, which is now the lowest score recorded. Details:—Out, 5 4 5 4 5 5 5 3 4=40; in, 5, 3, 4, 4, 4, 5, 4, 5, 3,=37; total 77.

Playing at Selkirk on 14th ult., Mr. John Connochie completed the 18 holes in the very fine score of 79. His second round was particularly good. Score, 1st round, 6 4 4 6 6 3 4 4 5=42; 2nd round, 4 5 4 3 4 3 5 4 5=37; total 79.

Arrangements have been made by Provost Mitchell for a lease of ground on Kirkmichael Farm, adjacent to the Old Luss Road for the formation of a Golf course at Helensburgh. The lease is subject to the approval of the trustees of the late Sir James Colquhoun; but as they are deeply interested in the project, no difficulty is anticipated.

Golf is not the only game at which birds are killed during flight. A singular incident occurred during a game of lawntennis, played on Tuesday evening last week, on the ground of the Rugby and District Club. A player was in the act of serving, when a thrush flew across the court, and, coming in contact with the ball, it fell dead.

Wallace and M'Laren, and the others between Messrs. Horne, Sisson, Williamson, J. Mackinlay, and B. Innes Ker. The day was very unfavourable, a stiff east wind, accompanie l by rain, prevailing during the whole competition. The course and putting-greens were in excellent order.



#### AUDI ALTERAM PARTEM.

### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—Rather more than three years ago the Siamese Prince Bowlong visited Europe, and spent much of the winter in England. After returning to his native country he wrote a large tome upon Great Britain, and sent a copy of the work to Professor Chipstocks, who had shown him much civility. I have been fortunate enough to secure a copy of the letter written by the aforementioned, who is deeply read in Eastern languages:—

"Norham Square, Oxford, April 1st, 1892.

"Your Sublimity,—I know not how to express to you my sense of the honour which you have conferred on me by sending me your book upon England. I have been very much struck by the insight which one so unaccustomed to Western civilisation has got into our mode of life. Your chapter on the professed belief of the English generally in party government is worthy of one of our greatest satirists, and the strong terms in which you criticise our method of dealing with murderers is worthy of the thanks of all right-thinking Englishmen. You will forgive me if I presume on the friendship you manifested towards me to point out to you that you have fallen into a strange, but quite natural, error. I see that in Chapter XLVI. you incidentally allude to the English as suffering at the time you visited them from influenza, or, as it is otherwise called, Golf. The two diseases are entirely separate, and the former of them much less serious than the latter.

"You will forgive me if I put down a few facts with regard to them. Influenza is not a chronic disease with us. It visits our shores but rarely, and, as far as our medical men have been able to trace its origin, results from infection coming from China. Its effects are comparatively harmless. Those who are attacked by it are rendered incapable for work for a short time, and the after-results are rarely more than a mild form of idiocy, very rarely resulting in suicide. Would that I could say the same of Golf. It originated in "Caledonia stern and wild, fit nurse for" most Golf-players, and it is the sincere hope of all intelligent Britons that we may be able to follow Professor Twain's method, and ultimately get rid of it by inoculating the Chinese. You will know the evils of opium smoking, and the degrading force of habit in any one who has taken an opium pipe into his mouth. It is nothing, I assure you, to the effects on any one who has once taken a Golf-stick into his hands. No matter what his character was before, no matter what his interests in life were, from that moment he is a ruined man; everything is abandoned, and his thoughts and speech are merely a

jargon.

"Before entering upon the most serious aspects of this mania, let me tell you an experience of my own. Being rather overworked, I gladly accepted the invitation of two other professors to go with them and spend a fortnight at an hotel in a bracing seaside resort on the South Coast. We arrived late at night, and immediately after breakfast on the following morning they left me to myself. They returned for dinner at seven, after I had whiled away a dreary day, and right glad was I to see them. But this feeling soon vanished. One of them was so rulky and dejected, there seemed nothing before him but suicide. The only reason I could discover was that 'he had done it' in 130, whereas no one before had 'done it' in more than 101. The other, who had 'done it in 88' was wildly jubilant, ordered champagne, and babbled throughout the meal of putting greens, cleeks, and irons. He was a person I had always respected for his probity and straightforwardness, and I was not a little shocked towards the end of dinner when he confided to me that the one thing he like! was a good lie. The next day I was

deserted in the same way, and in the afternoon went up to the links (for so they call the place where they give way to this disease), and not daring to attach myself to my friends, meekly followed two clergymen of the Church of England, who had evidently fallen a prey to this form of madness. I then was more appalled than ever; for I understood fully what my friend had said the night before. One of them evidently liked a good lie, for I noticed he had always a tendency to say, 'Let me see; this is my fifth stroke,' when I knew it was his eighth. The other counted his strokes aright, but was, I imagine, short-sighted, for he was always mistaking some one else's ball for his own. I returned to the hotel to dinner, but the bearishness of my two friends was such, that on the following day when they started for the links, I returned to Oxford.

"Since then I have watched with sorrow the development of the disease in those around me. One young Fellow of my college, who was the life and soul of our common room, was attacked. I sat next him when he was a novice, and he expressed to me his preference for a high tea. Since that day he has never appeared at dinner, nor have any of his old friends ever seen him except hurrying to a cab from lecture. I have known hard-worked fathers, who spent Saturday in taking their wives for an outing, seized with the mania, and desert their wives and families; others will never accept an invitation unless they are assured of the proximity of links, or at any rate of a captive Golf-ball. One very promising young man was so delirious as to insist on playing on board ship in the Bay of Biscay, and I regret to have to record that as he was making a drive, the ship lurched and landed him in a coal bunker, where he broke his neck.

"I will not enlarge upon the subject, but I hope I have written enough to convince you that the disease is very serious, and that if you have any regard for the welfare of your subjects, you will immediately punish with death any one who attempts to play Golf.

# QUESTIONS ON THE RULES.

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—Will you have the goodness (1) to define in your next issue what is a professional golfer (one who is not allowed to compete in an amateur competition), and whether any one who has within the last five years carried clubs for hire is eligible to

take part in an amateur tournament?

(2). Whether in a competition by strokes a player landing in a hazard can, under the penalty of two strokes, lift his ball out, go to the side, walk ten paces back, and drop or tee his ball? Should he not be obliged to tee behind the hazard (whins), even though he has to go forty yards back, and play over the hazard? What should be the penalty, in case of a protest, against a prize-winner not playing behind and over the hazard?

(1.) A professional in any kind of sport is, as the name imports, a player who depends for his means of subsistence on his skill in the game, in teaching it to others, in making the implement s, or generally in rendering services to others in the prosecution of the game, and for all of which considerations he receives money payment. A professional golfer, therefore, is a player who carries clubs and gives advice, who plays for pecuniary reward in competitions, and who makes it as much his business to get a means of livelihood out of the game as the butcher makes it a point of his business to get a profit out of the sale of fore-quarters of lamb. We should say that any one who has carried clubs for hire within a period so recent would not be eligible as a competitor in an amateur tournament. (2.) A player must, when he lifts, keep the hazard between him and the hole, taking the point where the ball entered the hazard as the guide for direction in the subsequent shot. He cannot carry his ball ten yards to the side of the point of entry and then drop or tee; but he is compelled by the rule to face the hazard, and to drop or tee on the nearest available ground, which may be forty yards behind. (3.) The penalty would be disqualification in medal play, and loss of the hole in match play.—[Ed.]

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—Will you let me pelt you with yet another question concerning rules? The ball is teed. The player, by a "movement" of his club, which was clearly "not intended to strike the ball" (Rule IV.), displaces it from the tee. Is this a stroke? Rule IV. seems to imply that it is not a stroke. Rule XXV., again, seems to suggest that balls "at the tee" may be touched and moved with impunity. Still I am inclined to think that the displacement in question is a stroke.

### BOWDON GOLF CLUB.
