## DIDSBURY GOLF CLUB.

On Saturday, the 15th inst., Mr. John Ball, jun., paid a visit to these links, which, during the day, were visited by a large number of members and friends anxious to witness the play of the present Amateur Champion. Unfortunately, Mr. Ball has not been playing much recently, and though playing a strong game, he was by no means seen at his best. The course also being new to him militated against low scoring. In the morning he played a single against D. Anderson, jun. (resident professional), who played a very fine game, and ultimately won by 4 up and 2 to play. The scores were—Anderson, 77; Mr. Ball, 85. Anderson's score was, however, beaten by Gourlay (professional of the Bowdon Club), who, playing a single with Mr. H. Ross Coubrough, completed the eighteen holes in the brilliant score of 75. In the afternoon Mr. John Ball, jun., partnered by Mr. H. Ross Coubrough, tackled the two professionals in a thirty-six-hole match, and certainly, looking to the result of the morning's play, the outlook for the amateurs was by no means rosy. They, however, put a stout heart to a stiff brae, and eventually won a most keenly contested match by 1 hole. The professionals at the end of the first round stood 2 holes up, and then came a very exciting period in the game, eight holes in succession being halved, and these were holed in the very fine score of 32. The amateurs then reduced the lead to one, but, losing the next hole, the game stood where it was. Continuing, the amateurs now again brought the lead down to one, but never further, and at last the professionals found themselves in the pleasant position of 2 up and 3 to play. In this state of matters the result of the match was considered foregone, but in Golf, perhaps more than in any other game, the unexpected happens. Mr. Ball, and his partner were determined that interest in the game should not cease at this point, and so, doing the needful at the next two holes, placed the match all square and 1 to play. Amid some little excitement, Mr. Coubrough made a fair drive to the last hole, but was wide of the hole to the left, being apparently determined not to go out of bounds to the right, which is very easily done at this hole. Gourlay, however, did not profit by his example, but, playing almost straight for the hole, carried out of bounds. Anderson determined to do or die, and played an almost similar shot, likewise out of bounds. Gourlay again drove out, and it was not till the fourth ball had been teed that the professionals were able to move on. This placed the match beyond a doubt, and the amateurs had the satisfaction of winning by one hole a very exciting game.

The prizes range in value from £5 to £25, and there will be a special prize, value £10, for the best scratch score. The meeting will also be noteworthy for the opening of the fine new clubhouse, as well as for a grand foursome, which has been arranged for prizes given by the club, between Messrs. John Ball, jun., and H. Hilton, and Douglas Rolland and A. Herd, two well-known professionals. This foursome will begin at 2.30, and the match will be one of eighteen holes. It is well worth a day's journey to see such fine exponents of the game.

Mr. A. M. Ross did not simply throw out a proposal to have Musselburgh course enlarged to eighteen holes. and leave the same to drift, but he is following up the idea, and having the ground surveyed which it is proposed to take in, and, ere long, the proposal, we believe, will be transformed into *un fait accompli*. Such a consummation will be one of the most important in the history of the "Honest Toun." It will be heard with regret that Mr. Ross is not to compete for the championship at Prestwick.

The spring meeting of the Tantallon Club was no doubt very successful, but a good many of the early players, appettised by their round, were heard grumbling at having to wait an hour before refreshments were on the table. It is surely time that this popular club had a club-house of its own at North Berwick. Its membership is considerably over 300, and except on club days, when (by some arrangement which the majority do not understand) they have the use of the hall attached to Mr. Hutchison's shop, for luncheon, they have no place to which to adjourn between rounds, and the various hotels are at considerable distance. With such a large membership there should be no difficulty in having a club-house built, and certainly the benefit to members would be very great. Can no one be got to move in the matter? The worthy Provost of the Burgh would no doubt support the movement, and with his assistance success would be certain.

The player who knows all about "Golf in the year 2000" seems to believe more in Golf in the year 1893, for the Tantallon Medal, if we mistake not, is the third scalp which Mr. J. M'Culloch has strung to his golfing girdle during the present year. It is no doubt wiser on the part of golfers to do their best at the game under present imperfect conditions than to wait for the development of a future century.

The Abbey School, North Berwick, which under the head master, Mr. Waddy, is doing splendid work, has evidently some rare golfing talent among its members. In the recent school competition Master H. Howden was first with 86; Master L. Campbell second with 87. A comparison of these with the Tantallon scores shows what the boys can do, and it will not be surprising if some future champion is now found under Mr. Waddy's care.

The Aberlady, Gullane and North Berwick Railway may now be regarded as safe, all consents having been obtained to the alterations by which Mr. Hope was induced to withdraw his opposition, and the preamble being approved. It was perfectly right on the part of Mr. Hope's agent to notice the rumours that the promoters did not intend to carry out the whole scheme. It will be a distinct breach of the understanding arrived at if this is not done, and the whole of the railway, as shown in the plans, constructed. No time should now be lost.

A record medal score for the Glasgow Golf Club was made at the spring competition, in the Alexandra Park, by Mr. J. A. Shaw. It was compiled as follows:—3 4 3 6 4 4 3 5 4 5 3 4 5 4 3 3 3 4=70.

Many will hear with regret that Mr. J. Thomson, whose songs and contributions in the "Golfing Annual" display so much enthusiasm and ability—one of the keenest of Glasgow golfers and most pleasant of companions—is laid aside by ill-health.

The recent competition for the Championship medal of the Falkirk Tryst Club was notable for the record score made by Mr. J. H. Aitken, viz., 79, which is 6 strokes lower than any former winning score. Mr. Aitken is not only a good golfer, but he is a great authority on the history of the game, and has one of the very best libraries of golfing literature.

Dr. M'Gregor, of Lady Yester's Church, Edinburgh, in acknowledging a presentation from his flock in honour of his receiving a Doctor's degree, pleaded guilty to the soft impeachment contained in our last week's "Tee Shot." Many, he said, were the congratulations which had reached him, and not least from his fishing, curling, and golfing friends. These pastimes were his redeeming vices, and he was convinced that if ministers would indulge more in these they would have healthier frames and healthier minds, they would come more in contact with human nature in its various aspects, and be enabled better to fulfil their ministerial duties. The younger clergy who aspire to be Doctors of Divinity will be wise to listen to such sound advice.

In the Edinburgh Academy Golf competition the first place has been secured by Master A. W. Robertson, son of Councillor Robertson, a young player of great promise. He won the first handicap in the Gullane tournament last year with a score of 83 natural, a fine record for a lad of fifteen.

\* \* \*

A ladies' Golf competition has been arranged by the proprietors of *The Gentlewoman*, for twelve valuable prizes, comprising a lady's dressing-bag, gold bracelets, Golf costumes, by Messrs. Caiger and Co., Piccadilly; Golf balls and clubs. We believe that the competition is due primarily to the initiative of Miss Blanche Martin, an energetic member of the Brighton and Southdown Ladies' Golf Club. Quite two years ago Miss Martin made a similar effort to organise such a competition as the present one; but at that time the movement did not meet with the same responsive welcome as now awaits this proposal, the particulars of which have just been published. The competition is open to all members of ladies' Golf Clubs in England, Scotland, Wales, Ireland, and the South of France, and each competitor is allowed to return six gross scores made over her home green, or that of any other club of which she may be a member, during the month of July. Each competitor must have a scorer to certify to the authenticity of the card, and the scores returned must be for eighteen holes, no account of handicaps being taken between the competitors. All cards must be returned before August 7th. Three of the prizes have been set aside for ladies who play over the men's links.

\* \* \*

If it were needful to criticise the scheme, we should say that the weak point of it is that while in theory there is no handicap, in actual play there would be in some cases a material one. Ladies who play over links like those at St. Andrews, North

Berwick, Gullane, and Wimbledon, would practically concede a by no means inconsiderable handicap to ladies who play over some of the Southern greens, which are for the most part devoid of hazards, short, easy, and plain sailing for the "sclaffer." The organiser of the scheme has very properly recognised this defect, and has provided for it as well as circumstances would admit. But all the same it may have, though we trust it will not have, a deterrent influence in making the competition so widely general and popular as it should be. In any case, this competition, together with the steps which are being taken to give ladies a cohesive force by the formation of a Union, tends in the right direction. It must necessarily be experimental, but the experience gained will ultimately be of the highest importance in view of further developments, towards a Ladies' Championship. We wish the movement a hearty success.

\* \* \*

Between Manchester and Crewe, over good short turf, a course of nine holes has been laid out at Holmes Chapel. The hazards are four small ponds, locally called pits; a small ravine, a hedge that has to be crossed twice, and some cart ruts. With the exception of one, every hole has its distinctive feature. No hole is under 180 yards, and five are 320 yards. Some of the holes will be lengthened when the club boasts of more members. None of the greens require to be relaid, but at present only round the hole has been smoothed, the dry weather preventing the use of a roller with any effect. The membership is very small at present, but if more were to join a great improvement would be made on the putting-greens, which are the only outlay. The subscription is a guinea; no entrance fee. Any gentleman wishing to see the links, or seeking any further information will be answered if he writes the Hon. Secretary, Post Office, Holmes Chapel. An attempt has been made to get cheap tickets from Manchester, but the London and North-Western Railway did not see their way to grant them, which is to be regretted, as it is only a few minutes from the station.

\* \* \*

Golf has now found its way to Chicago. Several of the leading business men in the city, lovers of the game, have been exerting themselves recently with the view of having links in time for the World's Fair. The time they think would be opportune for giving an impetus to their cherished sport. The want felt hitherto has been the securing of grounds within a reasonably accessible distance from the city—a distance that would enable a man to leave his desk at noon to spend a pleasant round or two and return in the evening. That difficulty has at length been overcome, as grounds that can be reached in forty-five minutes, almost any hour of the day, have been found. The links may not be as good as the ideal St. Andrews and Prestwick, but seeing they belong to an "old" Musselburgh man they will suffice, as he guarantees hazards good and plenty. The place is near to a station where ample means are given for returning, which is no small recommendation. Among the gentlemen interviewed and interested in the game may be mentioned: Mr. J. C. Stirling, treasurer of Illinois Steel Works; Mr. J. B. Forgan, vice president of First National Bank; Mr. C. B. MacDonald, broker, Monroe street; Mr. H. C. Chatfield-Taylor; Mr. J. C. Watson, treasurer East Chicago Iron and Steel Company; Mr. U. H. Broughton, Chamber of Commerce Building; Mr. C. H. Dalglish, the Rookery; Mr. A. Hadden Smith, Temple Building; Mr. J. Marshall Weir, Pontiac Building. Launched under such favourable auspices the game in Chicago is bound to take a wide and deep hold on the affections of all gentlemen who wish to indulge in a game that is free from all unpleasantness as the air we breathe, and full and rich in enjoyment as the heart of man can desire.

On Wednesday, April the 5th, a match was played over the Newhaven links, between Peter Paxton, professional, Eastbourne, and John Ross, professional, of Seaford. Paxton was in very good form and won the match by 6 up and 5 to play. He made a record for the first half viz. 40, made up as follows:—Out, 4 6 5 4 4 4 4 3 6=40; In, 4 6 5 5 4 7 5 5 3=44; total 84. This is the professional record for this links. Ross's score was 90. Both players expressed great satisfaction with the links.

Another of Her Majesty's Judges has fallen a victim to Golf. This time it is Mr. Justice Barnes, who is as badly bitten as Mr. Justice Kekewich. The latter luminary has for some time adjourned his court on Saturdays at one o'clock, sitting half-an-hour earlier for that purpose. Then he hies off to Sandwich or Bushey, and plays in all sorts of matches, including half-crown sweepstakes.

Playing with Mr. J. G. Morris on April 16th, Mr. Arthur Denman narrowly missed tying the amateur record of the Littlestone green. There was a very strong westerly wind blowing, and therefore, although a stroke was lost at the seventh, eighth, and 13th respectively, the score, and especially the home-coming, will bear inspection:—Out: 4 5 3 4 5 4 6 6 5 =42; in: 4 3 4 5 3 5 4 5 4=37. Total, 79.

Playing at Derby, on Saturday, Mr. J. P. Young, the honorary solicitor, made a very good drive apparently close up to the green, but on reaching the place where the ball dropped no trace of it could be found. After searching for some time, attention was drawn to a cow which appeared to be in trouble. The players concluded that she had the ball in her throat, and after a good deal of trouble they succeeded in recovering the ball, which was scarcely in a condition conducive to accuracy in putting.
