

HUNTINGDON.

The prominent figure on the Common Seal of the ancient borough of Huntingdon, or Huntirisoune, is a huntsman with a bow in one hand and a horn in the other. This shows at a glance what the town and county have been noted for from time immemorial, and, although there is no longer a mighty forest filled with deer and birds, yet is the spirit of sport not departed, for the racecourse is still a famous one, and in recent years Golf found its way there and appears to have established itself. Football and cricket are not without good representatives, besides which they have the patronage and support of both of the present members for the county, but Golf can put against that the support of the fair sex, and who could desire more than that?

The final syllable of Huntingdon was formerly spelt "dun" or "dune," so that the word means Hunters' Hill or Down, and Archdeacon Henry of Huntingdon calls it "Mons Venatorum" in his "Historiæ Anglorum." He speaks of it as a place "excelling all others in its abundance of beasts of chase, on the bank of a river teeming with fishes." Of the former, the fox alone remains, but the river Ouse is still the frequent resort of fishermen, and large pike often reward the efforts of the wary

angler.

This town is of more than passing interest to Scotsmen, because David, son of Malcolm, the King of Scotland, was created Earl of Huntingdon by Henry I., and his son, Prince Henry (who was buried in the churchyard of Conington, Hunts), succeeded him in the title, but died childless, and the earldom was restored to the family of St. Lize. This David is better known to most readers in the person of "Sir Kenneth, the Knight of the Leopard," the hero of Sir Walter Scott's "Talisman." One of David's good works remains to this day, or at least some of the walls of St. John's Hospital, founded by him, and the most casual observer, in walking along the High Street, cannot fail to be struck with the two lovely specimens of Norman zig-zag arches which are still extant. The modern building is the Grammar School, "rebuilt so lately as 1878 at the expense of Dion Boucicault, Esq., in memory of his son who was killed in the great railway collision at Abbots Ripton,

in January, 1876."

But the name which is best known in connection with Huntingdon is that of Oliver Cromwell, who was born in a house in the High Street, and educated at the Grammar School. His ancestors were the owners of Hinchingbrooke, and Sir Oliver Cromwell, his uncle, had the honour of entertaining King James I. in the great dining hall, in the year 1603, when he was on his way to London to be crowned. His Majesty was so delighted with his host that he is reported to have said to him at parting:—"Merry mon, thou hast treated me better than ony ane syn I left Edinboro'." James paid several visits to Huntingdon on account of its being a good neighbourhood for sport, and, during one of these, Oliver quarrelled with young Charles and bled the prince's nose! A most exciting incident in a still earlier part of Oliver's strange career is thus graphically related by Archdeacon Vesey, in his "Lecture on Huntingdon." "A monkey took the infant Protector in his arms, while the nurse had gone to supper, and ran up with him to the top of the house, and, if he had not been cleverly persuaded to resign his charge, the baby might have been dropped from the height and the history of England would then have read very differently." Like many another great man, Oliver appears to have been well birched when a schoolboy; the portrait of his schoolmaster Dr. Beard, birch in hand, is in the Archdeacon's possession, bearing witness to his belief in the rod, while Oliver proved that it did not spoil the child, for the "farmer of Huntingdon" lived to be respected and feared by everybody.

Having endeavoured to show that even a storm-stayed golfer will have no reason to say that he wasted a day in Huntingdon, a place that abounds in historic memories extending back to the days of Boadicea, Queen of the Iceni, and giving food to the thoughtful and reflective mind (and what golfer is not reflective, especially after missing an easy putt?), it is now our bounden but no less pleasant duty to tell of the somewhat

romantic origin of the Golf-course.

Ladies' links are common enough nowadays-they may be seen at St. Andrews, North Berwick, Elie, Gullane, Great

Yarmouth, and elsewhere; but in all the places with which we are acquainted men introduced Golf, and ladies were beguiled by the fascination of the game. In this case, however-and surely it constitutes a record—the ladies took the initiative. About five years ago Mrs. Gunning and Mrs. Desborough, whose names should be handed down with gratitude to posterity, set themselves the task of forming a club and laying out a course. It is not to be supposed that they had no masculine assistance, for indeed they were far from emulating the example of Tennyson's refractory "Princess," to the exclusion of gentlemen; but it came to pass, and is now a matter of Golf history, which it is highly interesting to chronicle, that for four years the course of Huntingdon was under the domination of the fair sex. But the hour came, and the man who should change all that. Captain Kinloch came upon the scene about a year ago, an enthusiastic golfer, a player who can give and take a beating with equanimity, and he has applied some of his surplus energy to the development of Golf so well that the Huntingdon course is now worthy of a place amongst inland greens, and this club furnished most of the players in a recent county match with Bedfordshire. The gallant Captain altered the old course of eighteen short holes to the present one of nine, and, to their credit be it said, the ladies seconded his endeavours to produce a course suited to the requirements of all players. It is about a mile and a-half in extent, and, if you will call a caddie and come along down Grammar School Walk and past the Barracks, we shall have a round. That gentleman in front of us is "Colonel Bogey." What a drive he has made for a start! The ball lies just on this side the row of trees, and with his second he will clear the brook called "Toby's Trunk," and perhaps hole the "Barrow" at 3. will observe that the flags bear a strong resemblance to those at Muirfield; in fact, they were taken from that model.

The "Colonel" is doing it; he just grazed one of the trees with his tee shot, and the globe rests on the plateau slightly to the right of the hole, where the ground is pretty hard. A good

wrist iron approach will ensure a 4 for the "Lane."

How will he negotiate the "Americans"? Will he clear the trees at once, or aim to the right and leave the hazard for his second? Over the trees and dyke, and ten yards to the left of the pond. Bravo, "Bogey"! The brassie will take him home

Did you see that? "The Colonel" has topped his drive for the "Farm," and the ball lies on the bank below the road. What a grand second, with a Park's driving iron! Actually hole-high in 2, which no one can excel.

He is using a driving-cleek for the "Pond," and is nearly in the hole in I; the slightest "toe" or "heel," and he would have landed in the pond on the left, or run into the dike on the

Now comes the tug of war in the long or "Spring" hole. "Bogey" is going the whole hog, of course; that ball has flown over the trees with a hiss like a rocket, and is landing 20 yards beyond the twin willows; he should reach the green in 2 with a very good brassie shot; it lies on the slope of that pretty grass field, about halfway between the Pesthouse and the Bath. Our secretary is the only man who has hitherto done it in 4.

And now, pray, permit a slight digression, after the manner of the father of history, for we are on classic ground, and standing by Cowper's Spring. William Cowper, the poet, used to come every morning, at an early hour, to drink the delicious, cool, clear water that gushes out of it. It is not so cold as the water of St. Ann's Well, Malvern, for instance, but it is an inestimable treasure in a county where springs are almost unknown, and where most of the water is collected in claybottomed ponds, or in large tanks. It is the more to be wondered at that, when a public-spirited citizen once offered to convey it at his own expense, to a suitable part of the town, and also to erect a fountain for the benefit of all, his offer was refused. The authorities of the day evidently thought that water was vilissima rerum, but a plébiscite might have led them to form a different opinion. It is said that Dr. Abernethy analysed the water of this spring, and bottled it for the use and behoof of his Majesty, George IV.

Cowper spent two years in Huntingdon, and wrote of it that "the town is one of the neatest in England; the country is fine for several miles about it; and the roads, which are all turnpike, and strike out four or five different ways, are perfectly good all the year round." Cowper's House School was his residence.

But we must hurry on over the fence, and catch up with "Colonel Bogey" at the sixth hole, the "Pavilion," one of the easiest of the round, with no hazard save the hedge, not many yards from the teeing-ground. This field is played over by golfers through the kind permission of Mr. Goodliff, the lessee, and it may be added that it is also the County Cricket Ground. The rest of the course is rented from the Freemen of Huntingdon.

Will "Colonel Bogey" carry the hedge, about one hundred and fifty yards from the tee, the excellent, tempting hazard that guards the "Union?" He does, so he ought to reach the hollow with an easy second, and be close to the hole.

The final drive has now come; far and sure the ball travels "as if an inner life sustained its motion." It is near the brook that we crossed before reaching the first hole, and sufficiently far to the left to escape marshy ground; if the "Colonel" reaches the green of the home hole in 2, it will be an unprecedented feat in the 'golfing annals of these parts. We might follow him into the neat little club-house, kindly presented to the Hunts County Golf Club by one of the members, Mr. J. A. Fielden, and, after the treat he has given us, treat him to what he will. Hilton believes in tea, so do many golfers, but a stronger drink than "the cup that cheers but not inebriates" will be preferred by the "Colonel," you bet!

From the above rough sketch it will be observed that there are great possibilities for bringing in a low card on this course, but, as a matter of fact, Captain Kinloch holds the record at 43. A good many balls are lost in hedges and ditches, and it is seldom that the course, which is a winter one only, is dry enough for a perfect score, while everyone knows that watery "lies," and particles of mud adhering to the ball, are serious drawbacks to a count. It might be improved by further drainage.

The putting greens are not very large, but they are good and true, one of the best features of a course on clay soil.

The Earl of Sandwich, a popular and accomplished gentleman, is president of the club. His stately mansion of Hinchingbrooke stands on a slight eminence on the south side of the river, and some of the best cricket and tootball matches are played in his grounds every year.

Captain Kinloch is the hon, secretary and treasurer, and about forty other gentlemen complete the present membership. The ladies' club numbers no less than thirty-five.

First and second class caddies are to be had, who wear red and black badges respectively, and clubs and balls are kept in stock by Peacock, in the High Street.

Space forbids to speak of Godmanchester (supposed to have been the walled city of Gormon the Dane) and the remarkable ancient bridge which unites it to Huntingdon.

The writer begs to express his obligations to the learned and courteous Dr. Vesey, Archdeacon of Huntingdon, to whom he is indebted, directly, or indirectly, for all the information given above, which may interest the general reader, or the literary golfer (whose name is legion) in this remarkable town, replete with memories of ancient days.

THE OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP.

Minute of meeting of representatives of the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers, the Royal and Ancient Golf Club, and the Prestwick Golf Club, appointed to consider and rearrange the regulations of the Open Golf Championship, held at 64, George Street, Edinburgh, on Friday, June 9th, 1893. Present:—For the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers, Messrs. Alexander Stuart and B. Hall Blyth; for the Royal and Ancient Golf Club, Mr. David I. Lamb; for the Prestwick Golf Club, Messrs. J. S. Higginbotham and Harry Hart. Mr. Alexander Stuart, captain of the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers, was appointed Chairman, and Mr. D. R. Kemp, joint hon, secretary of that club, was requested to act as secretary of the meeting.

The Chairman explained that the meeting had been called with the object of placing the competition for the Open Golf Championship on a basis more commensurate with its importance than had hitherto existed, and he stated generally the views of the clubs and of representatives of professional golfers on the subject, which, having been fully considered and discussed, the following resolutions were unanimously agreed to:—

First. Greens on which Competition to be played.—The competition to take place annually in succession on the greens of the three clubs represented at this meeting, as hitherto; and in order to meet a generally expressed wish that the competition should be extended to England, it was resolved to include the greens of the Royal Liverpool Golf Club and the St. George's Golf Club, in turn with those of the three Scottish Golf Clubs. The secretary was instructed to communicate with those clubs, and the following dates were fixed for the respective greens:—1893, at Prestwick; 1894, at Sandwich; 1895, at St. Andrews; 1896, at Muirfield; 1897, at Hoylake. The competition to extend over two days, and consist of four rounds of eighteen holes each—two rounds each day—in all seventy-two holes.

Second. Entrance money and prizes.—Each competitor to pay 10s. of entrance-money, which shall be used as part of the prize fund, to which each of the associated clubs shall contribute £15 annually, commencing with this year's (1893) competition. The prizes shall amount to £100 annually, and be divided as follows:—First, £40 to the winner of the Championship, of which £10 shall be expended on a gold medal, and £30 given in money to a professional, or in plate to an amateur golfer, the winner to have custody of the Championship cup, but he must, if required, give security for its safe keeping; second, £20; third, £10; fourth, £7; fifth, £5; sixth, £4; seventh, £3; eighth, £3; ninth, £3; tenth, £2; eleventh, £2; twelfth, £1. The prizes from second to twelfth are for professionals only, and to be given in money.

Third. General arrangements.—The general arrangements in each year, including the date of the competition, to be left to the club on whose green it is to be held, which club shall bear the necessary incidental expenses.

FERNIE v. CAMPBELL. MATCH FOR £50 A-SIDE.

The home-and-home match for £50 a-side between Willie Fernie, of Troon, and Willie Campbell, of Bridge of Weir, the second half of which was overtaken at Troon on Saturday, resulted in a substantial victory for Fernie. Fernie started on his own green on Saturday with 3 holes to the good as the result of the first thirty-six holes at Bridge of Weir the previous week. This lead, and the fact that the last half took place over his home green, gave Fernie a considerable advantage, and made his opponent's task far from easy. The green, thanks to rainfall overnight, was in fine trim, and the play was followed by a large crowd of spectators. Both played loosely, and there was little to excite the admiration and raise the enthusiasm of the spectators. Very different, however, was the character of the game in the afternoon. Pulling themselves together, both men then gave a brilliant exposition of Golf. Campbell, beginning the last eighteen holes 6 down, played well-nigh faultlessly in his effort to reduce the adverse lead. Fernie, however, was not to be denied, and by an equally perfect game he more than held his own, and won the match six holes from home. In the forenoon Mr. E. D. Prothero acted as referee; in the afternoon this office was filled by Dr. Highet.

The first hole was halved in 5, one above "par." Campbell allowed far too little for the wind in his drive from the second tee, and never was within sight of a half. The old Musselburgh player did not repeat the mistake in the next instance. There was nothing amiss with his line, but in approaching Fernie excelled him, and getting down in a pretty 4, stood 5 up on the match. "Dunure" was halved in 5, and at the next hole Campbell, showing improved form, knocked I off the lead, for Fernie pulled the iron stroke, which should have brought him to the green, very badly indeed. A foozle with the mashie—usually so deadly an instrument in his hands—lost Campbell a half of "Ailsa," which Fernie had nicely in 4; and entering now upon the most sporting part of the green, the players halved "Turnberry," where both had pretty approaches, in 4. A half in 5 was the order of the day at the eighth green, and the end hole—going to which Campbell, keeping too much to the right, got into bad country, and Fernie, though on the line, had the heaviest of lies off his drive—was also halved, Campbell securing his half by a good putt. With a round and a-half still to play, Fernie accordingly stood 5 up on the match. The scores for the nine holes were:—Fernie, 5 4 4 5 5 4 4 5 5=41; Campbell, 5 6 5 5 4 5 4 5 5=14.

At the outset of the homeward journey both men got into grief—Campell, pulling his drive, among bents, and Fernie, erring rather on the other score, lying in a rabbit-scrape. Still, when they did reach the green, neither held any advantage, and the hole should have been halved; but Campbell, at a time when he could ill afford to throw away anything, missed the putt, which would have given him a half. Fernie got the hole cheaply in 6, and the next ought also to have been his. The play through the green in this instance was indifferent—really bad on Campbell's part—and Fernie ultimately hal the hole practically at his mercy. He missed the putt, and it was halved, by no means brilliantly, in 6. Playing the third hole in, Campbell was guilty of an error of judgment, which he repeated more than once in the course of the round. His drive left him in one of the hollows which abound at Troon. Anxious to get well forward, he elected to risk everything. Where his cleek would have been the safer club he used the brassey, and that while he knew that he was not in his best long game. The ball caught the face in front, and travelled no distance. brought him well up, but Fernie was on the green in the like, and, though Campbell made a capital bid for a half with a long putt, Fernie, cleverly evading a stimie, won the hole in 5. The local player showed badly at the next, the fourth hole in, where he threw away a half on the green. A hole later, however, the local man again stood 7 up, for his opponent there repeated his previous mistake of using the brassey instead of the cleek, and suffered accordingly. He made some amends for this mistake by playing the short hole perfectly in 3, Fernie all but halving it with a long putt; and the "Well" was prettily halved in 4. A faultless 3 at the second last hole saw Fernie once more 7 up, and an equally faultless 3 on Campbell's part at the home green left Fernie in the position of 6 up with 18 to play. The scores for the last half were:—Fernie, 6 6 5 5 5 4 4 3 4=42—total, 83; Campbell, 7 6 6 4 6 3 4 4 3=43—total, 87.

The afternoon's play opened with the result very much of a foregone conclusion, and certainly no one expected to see such a grand game as the last round brought forth. Campbell, despite the long lead against him, entered upon the round with all the dash and "go" which he was wont to show in his matches. Not a single mistake

characterised the play for the first two holes. Both were beautifully halved in 4. Campbell, however, beat his opponent in holing out on the third green; "Dunure" was halved in 4, which is "par" play; and then Fernie regained the lead with which he had started, by a great piece of holing out on the fifth geeen, the winning a 4 hole in 3. Fernie, with the fortunes of war against him, was stimid at "Ailsa," and lost the hole in 5; "Turnberry" was magnificently halved in 4, and only in playing the next—the eighth—was Campbell's string of 4's broken. There he made his first mistake of the round. He topped his second, but made a grand recovery with the mashie, and Fernie only won the hole by canoning off his opponent's ball and getting down in 4. A faultless half in 4 at the turn completed the outward journey, and the game turned with Fernie 6 up and 9 to play. The match was now practically over. Campbell had made his effort only to find his opponent ready for him. The end drew nearer when Campbell, getting among the bents from his drive to the tenth hole, lost a stroke in consequence. Fernie, negotiating a stime laid him on the green, won the hole Fernie, negotiating a stimie laid him on the green, won the hole in 4, and was 7 up. As Fernie excelled himself in this instance, so did Campbell on the following green. There he was all but "dead" stimied, and playing round it, he holed in great style. After all, however, it only gave him a half, so that Fernie was dormy 7. The next hole settled matters. In point of fact, it ought to have been halved, for Campbell missed his putt. The mistake did not signify. Even had he holed it, the match would have been over; as it was he missed it, and Fernie stood winner by 8 up and 6 to play. The past golfing season at Biarritz has become memorable by the fact that a "match" has been arranged between the distinguished golfer and golfing writer Mr. Horace G. Hutchinson, and Miss Chapman, a young lady visitor. Golfers everywhere will wish both much joy, and be glad to hear that the match is in every way a happy one.

In addition to the plans for enlarging Musselburgh Links, to which we have already made reference, another of a novel and interesting nature is proposed. This aims at reclaiming from the sea what the sea has gradually taken away from the links, and it has the great advantage that no acquisition of property would be necessary. If the area in view were reclaimed, the links, it is said, would be doubled. By an extensive use of railway sleepers, round which rushes and bushes would be twisted, the sediment caught from the tidal water is to be kept in its place, and the sea by its own act made to restore what it has taken away. The expense of this curious proposal is set down at £800. Were it successful, it would no doubt be adopted elsewhere, and old ocean would then have a big reckoning to pay for ill-gotten gains.

The scheme for securing a proper park for Golf at Portobello is not to be lost sight of, and though the Provost, in presenting the prizes to the Ladies' Club the other day, objected to it, because of the expense, that worthy gentleman admitted at the same time the necessity for an extension of the public park. It will be "penny wise and pound foolish" if Portobello is not now put in possession of a proper course. The present is a mere apology for what is needed, and the place will lose greatly if something is not soon done.

THE FLIGHT OF THE GOLF BALL.—At a meeting of the Royal Society of Edinburgh, on July 3rd, Professor Tait submitted the results of further research made by him regarding "The Path of a Rotating Spherical Projectile." The examples, he said, which he gave at a recent meeting of the Society, of the flight of a golf ball were founded upon general notions as to the co-efficient of resistance of the air, and as to the actual speed at which the ball was driven. These illustrations were calculated from various hypotheses as to the amount of resistance—some much greater and others much less than those deduced from Bashforth's experiments with iron bullets-and so far as he could make out, the co efficient was not 28c, as given by Bashforth, any longer, but for a golf ball it was nearer 240. Having detailed the experiments carried out by which he came to the finding in question, he said he arrived at the conclusion that for a very good drive the speed of the ball at starting must be somewhere over 300 feet per second. If so-or say 350, as he took at random-then by the help of that, and the time of fight, observed to be six seconds, he calculated that the coefficient of resistance must be 1 by 240, and on this definite basis the new set of sketches of the path of a golf ball were now arranged.

Mr. Clark is preparing a new edition of his well-known volume on "Golf." The volume, we understand, is not to be a mere reprint of the former edition, but is to contain a considerable amount of new matter. Golfers will await its appearance with great interest.

Dunbar, whose Golf links are now greatly improved, has just opened as a memento of the Royal marriage a fine new promenade, which will greatly enhance the attractions of the town to visitors. The promenade is the gift of Mrs. Baird of Cambusdoon, and cost £2,000. Fortunate Dunbar! A fine proof of loyalty gratis.

A special meeting of St. Andrews Local Authority was held on June 29th, Bailie Ritchie in the chair, to receive a report of the committee appointed with regard to the purchase of the links. The committee reported certain correspondence with the agents of the proprietor, from which it appeared that he would not name a price, but would consider any proposal which the Local authority might make to him. The committee recommended that a public meeting be held to ascertain the opinion of the ratepayers on the question, and that, in order to lay all information before them, the committee be empowered to obtain an opinion of counsel as to powers of the Board under the Public Parks Act, and the rights which the inhabitants at present possess. This was agreed to.

There is one point about a club to which makers, in our opinion, do not give sufficient attention - the grip. For ninetenths of ordinary players the grip is much too thin, the padding as a rule being meagre and insufficient. Attention is naturally more concentrated upon the lie, weight, and general contour of the head, together with the length, suppleness, or otherwise of the shaft; but the grip, as originally turned out by the club maker, rarely satisfies the player, and more rind and longer leathers are usually called for. In the South this is particularly noticeable, resulting probably from the fact that the golfers are being largely recruited from the ranks of cricketers. Being accustomed to the thicker grip of a cricket bat, these players generally like to have a Golf club grip which bat, these players generally like to have a content grip which corresponds in general feel and dimensions in the palm of the hand to the handle of the bat. There is a great deal of sound reason for the preference. A thin grip is very apt to slip in the hand, especially if a shot is slightly "baffed," with the result that the ball is either dreadfully topped or pulled to square leg and perdition. Not infrequently the device is resorted to of fastening above the leather a red india rubber grip, which at at least has the merit of both thickening the hold and being less severe on the hands. Sometimes a portion of india rubber is pulled above the leather at the top of the shaft, so as to give a thicker and better grip to the left hand alone, leaving the right hand on the leather. Both these expedients answer admirably, though they have the disadvantage of adding a goodly percentage to the original cost of the club.

It appears to us that club makers might very well leave the wood at the top of the shaft a little less fined down, while all round they might increase the girth of the grip by an increase of the packing under the hand. But better still, they might make the underlying wood angular in form, as in the "Combination" club lately noticed in these columns from Mr. Joseph Roberts. The "angular" grip not only gives the additional thickness required, but the softened edges of the squared wood give more catching power to the hand. Hence there is less liability to slip the shaft in the hand while playing. The head also appears to be better balanced than in the case where the shaft is practically all one thickness from the socket to the end of the shaft. At any rate, there is none of that feeling of

disagreeable "whippiness" apparent right under the hand, which is so often felt in clubs too much pared down in the wood all along the shaft, with scant packing superimposed. From experience we should be disposed to maintain (though an eminent club maker, who is also a first-rate player, holds the contrary view) that both slicing and pulling are practically neutralised by having the grip thick, rather than thin or medium.

Mr. Joseph Roberts has carried out the improvement in his "Combination" driver which we suggested some time ago in noticing the club—that is to say, curtailing the sickle-formed metal socket at the nose of the club, and bringing the heel a little further forward. With the angular grip referred to above, and a greenheart shaft, the club is a powerful one, and ought to meet with a great deal of favour among golfers. Players who may wish to try one of these club-heads can obtain what they want by writing to Wilson, 193, South Street, St. Andrews.

The Rev. John Kerr of Dirleton, an esteemed contributor to these columns, and a preacher of the Gospel who "gowffs" as well as curls, has contributed a rattling golfing song to this year's "Golfing Annual." G. K. Wilson, lately from St. Andrews, who recently broke the record of the Withington Golf Club, has beaten his record, which was 76, by 2 strokes. Playing a round on Saturday, 1st July, with H. Maxwell, the latter receiving 4 strokes, Wilson made an excellent score, beating his opponent by 5 holes, made up as follows:—First round—5 4 4 4 4 5 4 3 4=37; second round—5 4 5 3 4 5 4 4 3=37; total, 74.

There is also a Ladies' Links, affording good practice for ladies, and the bracing air, and lovely scenery leave nothing to be desired for a holiday resort.

To preserve good feeling between the members of the Royal West Norfolk Golf Club, Brancaster, and the commoners—a good feeling which happily has always existed—the committee decided to give the men of Brancaster a substantial supper on the occasion of the marriage of the Duke of York, who is vice-patron of the club.
