



GOSSIP FROM A HIGHLAND GOLF GREEN.

The need of rest, and a desire to try the bracing effects of mountain air, induced me to seek some quiet spot where these were likely to be had. I wished to be away from the "madding crowd" and fashionable gaiety, and this I found in an oldfashioned village near the great Highland Railway. Travellers on that celebrated line pass, in golfing language, within a "good drive" of our village, yet they cannot see it, and would not imagine it existed, not being visible from the railway, nor the railway from the village. It is, however, no "mean city," possessing, as it does, three hotels (though not one villa residence), a splendid herd of polled Angus cows, whose daily walks in Indian file to and from their pasture is a sight, poultry of every known and unknown breed, and withal neither church nor chapel within nearly four miles. Some, however, may not feel this to be a want. We have post and telegraph in a lowly cottage, where every civility and attention is found, and we have one baker, and sometimes a butcher.

Like many other places, our village consists of lowly cottages on the road edge; here and there may be seen one of two stories. The old turf-covered roofs have given place to slates, and a modernised appearance is thus given to an old-fashioned place. Then we have gravitation water, but no gas; an place. Then we have gravitation water, but no gas; an "institute" with a small library, to which our American neighbour-Mr. Carnegie-gave a donation! We have a good many crofts and crofters, who seem to be very comfortable in their holdings on the braes. Our surroundings are hills and mountains of purple heather, one at the end of our street being nearly 3,000 feet high. We have close around us charming pine woods, with their delicious aroma—so good for the invalid; valley and stream entice to a walk and the use of "the angle" (we have caught half and pound trout in the Valley Then last, but not least, we have two Golf greens! They are in one little village in the very centre of Scotland, and neither has met the notice of my friend Mr. Smart. Perhaps their height has caused the omission, and possibly in the next edition of the "Golf Greens of Scotland" we shall see

The public green is a gift to the village by the Laird, and though small it is charmingly situated. There are nine holes, short nice dry grass, hillocks and hollows, no great hazards, and putting-greens waiting to be improved. It affords a very pleasant round, demands no long drives, and can be comfortably played with a cleek and iron. We are not yet troubled with a club-house in which to waste our time; we have no caddies to worry us, and we have the company of a few lady golfers to cheer us; so on the whole we can spend our golfing time pleasantly.

The other green is private property, and has been laid out by the shooting tenant. It is about a thousand feet above sealevel, and is finely kept. The putting-greens are fenced with strong iron standards and iron wire, high enough to allow the sheep to get a nibble, and strong enough to keep out the polled

Angus cows.

As there is no church within about four miles, some of your friends who advocate Sunday Golf might be induced to try a round of what they call innocent enjoyment, but perhaps they might find it to end in a round with the "men of the North," who dislike all such things as being sinful; broken clubs and broken heads may be the result—rather a serious thought, as there is no doctor in the village. Doctor, preacher, priest, and

lawyer are equally distant.

Can any of your golfing tourists tell of a place with so many attractions, with "two greens," and so high in the world, with mountain air so pure and exhilarating that no alpine valley can excel, a soil so light and gravelly that rain has little effect on the walks, and scarce haders the pedestrian? Then we are in Ossian's country, and we have the Badenoch Highland games near us, at which you see all the rank and fashion of the district. Drives we have with every variety of scene. One returns home gratified by the simple manners of the people, and refreshed and invigorated for the winter's work.

Review.

HISTORICAL NOTES AND EXTRACTS CONCERNING THE LINKS OF St. Andrews, 1552-1893. By D. Hay Fleming. Citizen Office, St. Andrews.

At a time when schemes are before the local community of St. Andrews providing for the re-acquisition and future government of the historic links, and when a Golf Club elsewhere in Scotland, seems disposed to palter with public rights on a public Golf Green, this little book makes a very opportune appearance. It is intensely interesting reading to every golfer who takes an interest in the history of the game at St. Andrews, for it shows not only how really ancient is the game, but it throws a by no means obscure side-light on some of the social characteristics of Scottish burgher life in the troublous times of the sixteenth century. In compiling the book Mr. Fleming has evidently been engaged in a labour of love; he has ransacked all the available records extant which either remotely or directly could throw a gleam of light on the tenure, extent or upkeep of the links; he has even sunk his plummet into the turbid pool of refined legal subtleties; and the result is that we have gathered together within very moderate compass all that can practically be known of the links and how their possession came to be alienated from the community of St. Andrews.

We learn that the earliest document relating to the "Linkis of Sanctandrois" is to be found in the University Library, that it is dated January 25th, 1552, and that it bears the signature of Archbishop Hamilton. In this document the right reverend prelate acknowledges "licience and tollerance" of the council and community of St. Andrews to stock the links with rabbits, though the council are careful to reserve the rights of the community to pasture, cut divots, play Golf, football, and other games. So much was Golf in vogue at St. Andrews in those days that we find that the Kirk Session, in 1598, had to deal with citizens for golfing on the Sabbath, the very elders neglecting their duties in the Session to practise the game. In marshalling his facts the author has spared no pains in research, for it appears that he ransacked all the minute-books of the Town Council for a period of over 200 years. The main facts in connection with this research are that the Town Council was sorely pressed for money, but how or why is not stated. At all events, the authorities, in their straits, turned their eyes, in an evil moment, on the fine commonty of the links as a partial means of extrication from their difficulties. First, they began by rouping the pasturage, which in 1678 brought the magnificent annual rental of £11 13s. 4d.; in 1770 the price had risen to £33 6s. 8d, and in 1786 to £42. In 1797, however, the Town Council appeared to be sinking further in the bog of insolvency, and in this year the proposal was made to feu or sell the links as a method of clearing off the debt. On the 30th of October, 1797, the links were exposed for sale, and they were bought by Mr. Thomas Erskine, of Cambo, for £805. Subsequently they were re-sold to Messrs. Charles Dempster and Son, merchants, St. Andrews. The Town Council, however, had always been vigilant enough of public interests to stipulate that there should be no curtailment of the people's enjoyment on the links, as far as Golf was concerned; and, in the last-named sale they reserved the superiority over the links at the price of £42 per annum. But this superiority also went the way of the greater privilege, and in 1848 it was sold for £1,000. As Mr. Fleming rightly says, the sale of the links was "an unpardonable blunder"; and henceforward a great deal of friction arose in the law courts and locally, between the town and the proprietors of the links. It appeared that the stocking of the links with rabbits was the prime cause of the dispute, and the golfers even carried the case against the proprietor into the law courts. Incidentally, we learn that at the beginning of the century the greenkeeper—he was either a Robertson or a Morris—received one guinea a year for walking round the links on the day previous to the monthly medal, and putting the holes in order for play. One greenkeeper-his name was Robertson—got five shillings a year for the same work; but subsequently, and until forty years ago, the greenkeeper's salary was £5 a year. About 1750 the price of the leather ball was threepence or fourpence each; in 1805 the price was tenpence. In 1848 the North Haugh and the superiority of the links were sold to Mr. Cheape for £5,500, the Town Council being, of course, sadly in need of money. After this there was a good deal of litigation, principally with reference to the boundaries of the Golf course, the feuing and building of the houses along the line of the first hole, the making of the road to these houses on the links, and the case of Mr. Denham and the St. Andrews Ladies' Club. After well nigh a couple of hundred years, the Town Council are making a praiseworthy attempt to undo the criminal blunder of their predecessors by negotiating with Mr. Cheape for the repurchase of the links. The prosperity of the town undoubtedly depends on its Golf green, and every golfer will admit that more room is needed. This little book will assist all who are interested in forming a judgment upon a delicate question which can only be solved by the tact, discretion, and public spirit of St. Andrews' citizens.

MR. JOHN PARKER, Irvine, Ayrshire, has sent a specimen of a new putter which he has brought out. It is the ordinary wooden putter, made very upright, broad across the centre of the head, and tapering inwards at the nose and the heel of the club. Across this broad portion of the head, and right in the centre of the face, is a raised straight line, intended to give a better guide in direction to the hole, while the weight is imparted by means of lead sunk in the sole, and not behind. The maker claims that this method of inserting the lead imparts a better balance to the club. It is certainly well balanced, but not to a greater or more appreciable extent than the ordinary club. For some players the line across the head may be of assistance as a guide; but we believe that very few of these aids are, as a whole, of much practical utility. Experience shows that, as a rule, they come to be disregarded because, in actual play, it is found that the distraction to the mind of having to observe these little details detracts from rather than helps to accuracy of putting.

Heaton Moor Golf Club.—The seventh monthly competition for the president's gold medal was played on Saturday, which was a perfect golfer's day. The usual sweepstake was divided between the first and second players. The apparent high scoring was due to the alteration in the course, which has been materially improved and lengthened by altering the position of the teeing-grounds. Twenty-one members competed, and the scores under 100 are given below. A special general meeting was held in the Conservative Club on Friday last to consider the advisability of increasing the membership limit and the entrance-fee. The limit was ultimately placed at 85, and the entrance-fee raised to two guineas:—Mr. R. Scholes, 99, less 15=84; Mr. G. J. Webb, 105, less 20=85; Mr. A. H. M. Gow, 96, less 10=86; Mr. T. W. THE GULLANE LINKS.

We publish to day the draft minute of agreement, by which the Gullane Golf Club propose to regulate Golf at Gullane. The minute was generally approved at the meeting last Saturday, and was remitted back to the committee with powers. We are glad to notice that a faithful few objected and protested, for this is quite a dangerous move on the part of Gullane golfers, which may eventually be fatal to their interests altogether. In our next number we shall give our opinion of this minute of agreement in a special article; and meantime those who have any remarks to make thereon may let our readers have the benefit of them.

Minute of Agreement between Mrs. Mary Georgiana Constance Nisbet Hamilton-Ogilvy, of Belhaven and Dirleton, wife of Henry Thomas Nisbet Hamilton-Ogilvy, of Belhaven and Dirleton, Esq. (hereinafter referred to as "the first party"), with the special advice and consent of her said husband, and also with consent and concurrence of George Murray, residing at Whim House. tenant of the subjects hereinafter mentioned, and the said Henry Thomas Nisbet Hamilton-Ogilvy, and George Murray for themselves and all right and interest competent to them in the premises, of the first part, and . . . all members of the Golf Club known as Gullane Golf Club, being a committee appointed by the members of the said club, conform to minute of meeting held by them on the . . . day of . . . to enter into and execute these presents for and on behalf of the said club, and the whole members thereof (all hereinafter referred to as "the second parties"), of the second part.

Whereas the first party is heiress of entail in possession of the lands and barony of Dirleton, in the parish of Dirleton and county of Haddington, and as such is heritable proprietrix of that part of the said lands and barony adjoining the seashore near the village of Gullane, which is commonly known as the Links or Common of Gullane, over which certain neighbouring proprietors or feuars claim certain rights of servitude: And the said George Murray is tenant under the first party of the said Links, including the privilege of killing rabbits thereon, and certain rights of pasturage on the same, all which belong to the first party as heiress of entail foresaid: And whereas the second parties were formed or constituted as the said Gullane Golf Club in the year 18, and have since been in the habit of playing Golf on a portion of the said Links, being the course or green delineated and coloured blue on the Ordnance Survey Plan, docqueted and signed by the parties as relative hereto, during which time the said course or green has been maintained and kept in order by the second parties, all which has been done without the consent of the first party and her predecessors, but without objection on their part beyond the assertion of their right of property in the said Links when occasion called therefor: And whereas the second parties have applied to the first party for the right and privilege of playing Golf on the said course or green by themselves, and of regulating the use of the said course or green by themselves and others, which the first party, with consent and con-currence foresaid, has agreed to grant to them for the period, and subject to the reservations and upon the terms and conditions afterwritten: Therefore the parties hereto have agreed, and do hereby agree as follows, viz. :-

First.—The first party, with the special advice and consent of her said husband, and also with consent and concurrence of the said George Murray, for all or any interest competent to them respectively in the premises (as is testified by their subscriptions hereto), does hereby for herself and her heirs and successors in the said lands and barony of Dirleton, grant to the second parties the privilege of playing Golf upon the said course or green, delineated and coloured blue on the said Ordnance Survey Plan, on the said Links, with full power to them and to all persons authorised by them to enter upon the said course or green at pleasure, and make and maintain putting-greens and putting holes thereon, and generally to do everything necessary for the proper playing of the game of Golf on the said course or green; as also with full power to permit, veto, and regulate the use of the said course or green by the proprietors and fewars in Gullane and their families, and by such clubs or individuals as the second parties shall think proper for playing Golf thereon, upon such terms, including payments in money, and subject to such conditions as the second parties may think proper: But declaring always, as it is hereby specially provided and declared, that the exercise or enjoyment of the privilege hereby granted to the second parties as aforesaid shall not prejudice

the claims which any member of the said Gullane Golf Club may have to a servitude or other right of playing Golf, or any other rights or servitudes which they may have as feuars or proprietors at Gullane, which claims of the feuars and proprietors at Gullane and the first party's objections thereto are hereby expressly reserved.

Swond.—The first party reserves the right to Golf upon the said course or green by herself, and the said Henry Thomas Nisbet Hamilton-Ogilvy, their family and friends residing with them, or any person in their employment, and to grant the right of golfing thereon to any person or persons having the express authority of the first party, or of the said Henry Thomas Nisbet Hamilton-Ogilvy, or of their factors or agents for the time.

Third.—It is hereby stipulated and agreed that the second parties shall be bound, before delivery of these presents, to submit to the first party a draft of proposed rules and regulations for the play of Golf on the said course or green by themselves, and by any club or person having their consent and authority; which rules and regulations, as well as any alterations on or additions to the same as aftermentioned, shall be subject always to the approval of the first party or her foresaids, and a copy of the first set of which shall be signed by the parties simul as semel, with the execution of these presents, and as relative hereto: And the second parties shall do everything in their power, but shall not be bound to take any legal proceedings, to keep the said rules and regulations strictly enforced.

Fourth.—The privilege hereby granted to the second parties shall be held to commence as at the term of Martinmas 1893, and shall endure for the period of five years fixed from said term, and thereafter from year to year during the pleasure of the first party and her foresaids: Declaring that the first party or her successors shall have power to withdraw and terminate the privilege hereby granted at the term of Martinmas 1898, or any term of Martinmas thereafter, upon giving twelve months' previous notice in writing to the second parties, or to their captain or secretary for the time, of her or their intention so to do.

Fifth.—In consideration of the privilege hereby granted to the second parties as aforesaid, and during the continuance thereof, they shall be bound, as they do hereby bind and oblige themselves, and the whole members of the said Gullane Golf Club, present and future, all conjointly and severally, and their representatives whomsoever, and also the whole funds and property of the said club, to make payment to the first party and her foresaids, or to her or their factor or agent for the time, of the sum of £5 per annum, and such further sum not exceeding £50 per annum as shall be collected by them for the use of the green, after deducting the expense of collecting the same, at the rate of £52 per annum, payable at the term of Martinmas in each year, beginning the first payment at the term of Martinmas, 1894 for the year to that term, and so forth yearly thereafter so long as the privilege hereby granted shall be continued to the second parties, with a fifth part more of each yearly payment in case of failure, and the interest thereof at the rate of five per cent. per annum from the respective terms of payment till paid.

Sixth. - It is hereby specially stipulated and agreed by and between the parties hereto that the privilege hereby granted to the second parties shall not in any way prejudice or affect the proprietary rights of the first party and her foresaids in and to the said links, or any part thereof, nor interfere with any rights already granted by her or her predecessors, or which she or her foresaids may hereafter grant to any of her tenants or feuars, or any rights of servitude or other rights which may be competent to neighbouring proprietors or feuars: Declaring that from and after the date of these presents, the first party shall not, during the existence of this agreement, grant any right of Golf over the said Golf course inconsistent with the second parties' rights under these presents; and also that she or her foresaids shall be at liberty at any time, and from time to time, to let any other part of the said links to any other Golf club, or any other person or persons, and also to let the part of the said links known as the old racecourse as a training-ground for horses, or to grant to any person or persons, whom she or her foresaids may think proper, the privilege of training horses on the said course, and that on such terms and subject to such conditions as she or they may deem advisable: And it is also hereby expressly stipulated and agreed that the second parties shall do nothing to interfere with the game and hares and rabbits upon the said links, or to injure or affect the sporting rights of the first party and her foresaids, or of her or their tenants on the links.

Seventh.—The second parties do hereby further bind and oblige themselves that during the continuance of the said privilege hereby granted, they shall keep in their employment and pay for a competent ground officer whose duty, inter alia, it will be to warn trespassers off the said course or green, and to see to the strict observance of the rules and regulations before referred to: But declaring always that, not withstanding anything herein contained, it shall be in the power of the first party and her foresaids to prosecute or interdict trespassers on the said course or green if they think fit so to do.

Eighth.—It is hereby expressly provided and declared that the fore-said privilege is hereby granted to the second parties subject to all the conditions and provisions of entail of the said lands and barony of Dirleton, under which the first party holds the said links, and that these presents shall be binding on the first party and her foresaids only in so far as is consistent with the said entail, and with the rights of the heirs of entail entitled to succeed to the first party in the said lands and barony; and

Lastly.—Both parties bind and oblige themselves to implement their respective parts of the premises to each other, and consent to registration hereof for preservation and execution.—IN WITNESS WHEREOF

The general meeting of the club was held on Saturday afternoon to consider, among other business, the agreement set out above between the club and Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton-Ogilvy.

Mr. J. A. Robertson moved that the members approve the draft agreement, authorise the committee to enter into it on behalf of the club, and remit to the committee to prepare the rules and regulations. He gave an account of the negotiations which had taken place between the committee and Mrs. Hamilton-Ogilvy—negotiations arising, he said, out of the generally expressed desire for some regulation at the hands of the club of Golf on Gullane Hill. They had perhaps felt it to be a pity that questions had been raised in connection with the Gullane links, but now that they had been raised, it was necessary that the club should come to some arrangement with Mrs. Hamilton-Ogilvy; and he told the meeting plainly that he had the feeling that if that club did not come to some arrangement, an arrangement would be entered into with some other party. The club, under the agreement, was not bound to charge any one for play on the green, and the club had no desire to make money out of the unattached players who came to Gullane. Still, the committee had the feeling that the outside public could not reasonably expect to come there and enjoy the privilege of play on a first-class course without contributing something, however small, to the upkeep of the green. (Applause.) No questions of property rights were raised or were affected by the agreement, and it would be a pity if any were raised. Their interest as members was to secure that the Gullane Club should have control of the green in order to obtain for the members and for golfers generally the full enjoyment of play on one of the finest courses in the country. (Applause.)

Mr. Henry Parker seconded the motion.

The Rev. John Kerr, Dirleton, said the committee had no doubt been forced to take some action in consequence of the pressure on the green, and all of them wished to come to an amicable arrangement. Still, there were many points which required discussion, and as there was not time on that occasion for such discussion, he moved as an amendment that a special meeting of the club should be called to consider the draft agreement with a view to the settlement of the difficulties that surrounded the questions raised by it, and that a special committee should be appointed to take the opinion of eminent counsel.

Mr. T. D. Thomson seconded the amendment.

Some discussion followed, and eventually Mr. Robertson, to meet points raised by several members, altered his motion to read:—"That the meeting approves generally the draft agreement, authorises it to be adjusted by the committee and to be entered into, and remits to the committee to prepare the rules and regulations." Between this motion and Mr. Kerr's amendment a vote was taken, when seven supported the amendment, and the bulk of those present—about sixty members being at the meeting—voted for the motion, which was accordingly carried by a very large majority. Mr. Kerr and six other gentlemen dissented from the finding.

Mr. D. Turnbull was re-elected captain of the club, and the hon. secretary, Mr. Wilson, was reappointed. It was reported that there was a balance in favour of the club amounting to £93 4s. 8d. On the motion of Mr. Henry Parker, seconded by Mr. J. A. Robertson, it was agreed that the ordinary membership of the club should not exceed 300.

In the course of the day the presentation was made to Mr. T. Lugton, sen., of a handsome drawing-room clock and side

ornaments to match, and a silver tea service, subscribed for by members of the club in recognition, on his retirement some short time ago from the office of hon. secretary, of his great services to the club, which practically owes its present popularity to his exertions during the years he held the secretaryship.

QUESTIONS ON THE RULES

To the Editor of GOLF.

Sir,—Will you have the kindness to tell me what the rules are in the following circumstances in match and medal play?:
—(1) A ball driven out of bounds from the teeing-ground: Can it be re-teed, or must it be dropped over shoulder on to the teeing-ground, with the usual penalty, a stroke and distance? In the club to which I belong the former is the custom, but on links over which I have recently been playing the latter is the rule.

Given two balls on a putting green: My opponent in playing for the hole strikes my ball (not intentionally, of course), placing it farther from the hole. Should I be right in replacing the ball in its original position, or is it a rub on the green? Contrarywise: If my opponent should place my ball in a more favourable position, would he be right in replacing it in its original position? In my club it is treated as a rub on the green; in others I know of the alternative is the rule.

[(1) On southern greens the player may choose one of two courses; either he may tee another ball two club lengths inside the course at the point where the ball lies out of bounds, and count two for the penalty, or he may lose stroke and distance, teeing another ball at the tee. This applies both to match and medal play. (2) A player whose ball is displaced by his opponent in putting, and the position of the ball in his opinion worsened by the stroke, has the option of replacing. If the position is improved, similarly he may play the ball from the position where it lies. The opponent has no voice in the matter, and cannot touch his partner's ball without danger of losing the hole. The object of the rule is to hinder either player from trying to gain an advantage by playing on the ball instead of at the hole.

A remarkable score was made at St. Andrews on Wednesday, the 13th, by Mr. H. S. C. Everard, who came home in 35 strokes. His figures were:—In—4 3 4 4 4 4 4 4 4=35. During the first half of the round there was a downpour of rain. This score is only a record in so far as nobody yet has donanything lower. On three occasions it has been equalled, as Andrew and Hugh Kirkaldy have each had 35 home, and so has Mr. F. G. Tait, the particulars of whose score are—6 3 3 4 4 4 3 4 4=35; 4 3 4 4 4 4 4 4 4=35. If Mr. Tait's score is compared with Mr. Everard's, it will be seen that Mr. Tait would have been I hole up. Mr. Tait missed a putt for 4 at the hole where he took 6. He was playing with Mr. Gerald Maitland Heriot when he accomplished this fine score. Mr. Everard's score looks more symmetrical than Mr. Tait's, but the last named would have won the match. Hugh Kirkaldy's thirty-fourth shot struck the hole, but did not stay in. Mr. Oswald deserves the greatest credit for only losing by 2 and 1 against Mr. Everard's score. Mr. Everard was 3 down to him at one time in the round (giving him I hole up to start with). Mr. Everard had no flukes in his round, with the exception of holing in 2 off the iron at the Long hole—a ten-yard putt. He reached all the other greens in 2, and holed out in 2 putts.

An unusual incident took place on the new Mortonhall Golf course at Edinburgh last week. While two members of the club were playing a round, one of the players, after he had driven off, made his way in the direction the ball had taken, and was astonished to see a large crow alight, give the ball two or three dabs with its beak, and then fly away with it out of sight.

With reference to Mr. Urquhart's "Patent Adjustable Golf Club" referred to in last week's issue, Messrs. George G. Bussey and Co. write, calling attention to the fact that Mr. Urquhart's club appears to be very similar to the patent "Interchangeable" club which Messrs. Bussey brought out some time ago. This club is described as follows:—"The blade and socket are separate pieces, the former being united with the latter by an extended pin passing through a hole at the foot of socket or shaft, and secured by a nut. By this means not only can different heads be used on one shaft, but they can be set at any angle." We have seen neither of the clubs in dispute, and therefore cannot give an opinion as to whether the one club clashes with the other.

Southend-on-Sea adds another Golf course to the long list of new greens. A suitable piece of ground has been found near the station towards Shoeburyness. The grass is of that short, soft nature so fascinating to golfers, and only to be found at the sea-shore. Very little labour will be required to make it a first-class green. It has been laid out by some old golfers, on the principle of giving the full value to a good drive and second shot. The tees are placed so as to bring in the natural hazards. The course is nine holes at present, and is about a mile and a-half round. The ground is private. Its chief attraction will be that it is the nearest sea-side Golf course to London, and, with the quick service of trains, a day's Golf at the sea-side will now be within the reach of those who find it necessary to go and return in the day. Although the idea of starting this

club only originated with one or two gentlemen a few weeks ago, the membership has increased to upwards of seventy already. The provisional committee have decided not to close the original members' list until after their first general meeting, which is to be held at Southend on September 29th. This gives all those who wish an opportunity of joining at the minimum fee of one guinea. Mr. Herbert Warlow, Fair Cross, Southend, is acting as honorary secretary, to whom all communications should be addressed.

A lady was sketching the other day at Cromer, near to where the ladies have their links. She was quite off the course when she was suddenly hard hit by a Golf ball on the arm, one of the fair golfers having sliced her tee shot (as cricketers would phrase it) not to cover-point merely, but absolutely to third man behind the wicket. The lady golfer rushed up to where the unfortunate sketcher was seated, rubbing her poor arm rather disconsolately. The lady, however, had only eyes for her ball. When she saw this lying teed up, she joyfully exclaimed, "Oh, how fortunate you were sitting where you are, otherwise my ball would have fallen down the cliff!"

A Golf Club has just been started in Montgomeryshire entitled "The Montgomeryshire Golf Club." The links are near Newtown, about three miles from the station, on the River Severn. The links will be as good as any in Wales, owing to the fact that the grass is always short. The links will not be ready for about a month. The hon. secretary is Mr. E. Buckley, of Milford Hall, Newtown, Montgomeryshire.

On parle français ici.—"Korunephoros" writes:—"While staying in Islay last month I spent a considerable part of one forenoon in the club-house at Machrie, as the weather was highly unpropitious for Golf. While amusing myself, and trying to enlarge my vocabulary with the assistance of one or two of the more intelligent caddies, all of whom have what Professor Blackie would call the happy bi-lingual faculty, I chanced to say 'Soleil' above my breath. 'That's the sun,' promptly said one of the caddies. 'Parlez vous français?' said I. 'Oui, monsieur,' he replied. Just then the sun came out, the golfers following suit, and the conversation ended. Moral: Not so Highland!"

A match for £1 a-side was played over the North Berwick course on Wednesday of last week, between John White and Richard Kelly, young local professionals. Both were in splendid form, and the match finished only at the home hole, where Kelly won by 2, having been dormy at Pointgarry.

Ben Sayers, North Berwick, and Hugh Kirkaldy, St. Andrews, are to play an exhibition match over the Machrihanish Links to-day (Friday). An exhibition game is also being arranged to take place at Sheffield towards the end of the present month, when four prominent professionals will compete.

The Right Hon. G. J. Goschen, M.P., Mrs. Goschen, and the Misses Goschen, have been staying for some days past at North Berwick. At this resort of Golf the links have, as a matter of course, been visited by the right hon. gentleman, who has occasionally been a not uninterested spectator of the play.

The Right Hon A. J. Balfour has been later in arriving at North Berwick this season than usual; but he was booked to play at the beginning of the week. Mr. Balfour generally arrives here at the beginning of September, and he has his two rounds a day—not unfrequently three rounds—throughout the month.

The chief attraction in the way of Golf at North Berwick last week was the play of Hugh Kirkaldy and Ben Sayers in foursome matches. On the evenings of Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, Mr. De Zoete and Sayers played Mr. R. T. Boothby and Kirkaldy, the former couple winning two of the matches and losing the other. Willie Campbell also took part in foursome play. There were large "followings" of visitors and residents.



THE IRISH AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP.

VICTORY OF MR. JOHN BALL, JUN.

The second annual tournament for the Amateur Championship of Ireland, held under the auspices of the Golfing Union of Ireland, was brought to a most successful close on Friday last, when Mr. John Ball gained the honour by a rather easy victory over Mr. L. Stuart Anderson, a player well-known at North Berwick, and now located at Aberdeen. It is now about thirteen years since Golf was played for the first time in Ireland, and since then the progress it has made in public favour has been remarkable. Every successive year sees a new club started in some part of Ulster-for it is in the Northern province that Golf may be said to have its home so far as this country is concerned. Two of the principal clubs at the present time are the Royal County, whose well-known links are at Portrush, and the County Down, over whose greens the chief Irish fixture of the year opened at Newcastle on September 12th. The County Down Club must be congratulated on having their admirable greens chosen this year as the scene of the yearly gathering of the Irish Golfing Union. Last year it took place at Portrush, and was an unqualified success. On that occasion Mr. Alexander Stuart, of the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers, succeeded in winning the Irish Championship trophy, the runner up being Mr. J. H. Andrew, of Prestwick St. Nicholas Golf Club. The entry in 1892 was a good one, but this year it is better, numbering no fewer than thirty-five. A very distinguished company of cross-Channel golfers were at Newcastle. These included Mr. John cross-Channel golfers were at Newcastle. These included Mr. John Ball, jun.; Messrs. Dancan M'Laren, captain of Mortonhall; D. Anderson, captain of Monifieth; Alex. Stuart, of the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers; W. Stringer, St. Anne's; Charles J. Hurst, Broughton; T. Green, Perth; W. J. Jeeves, St. Helen's; Lieutenant-Colonel Agg-Gardner, G. Nicol, C. C. Scott, J. F. Peddie, of Sandwich; Charles Dunderdale nad Reginald Hutton, of Manchester; D. L. Low of Monifieth; H. B. Armstrong and C. E. Allen, London; Wm. Taylor, Edin. Carlton; J. H. Andrew, Prestwick St. Nicholas; A. G. Tait and Captain Playfair, of the Royal and Ancient. All the Irish clubs were also well represented. The weather on the opening day was all that the most enthusiastic golfer could desire. sun shone out brilliantly all the day, the warmth of its rays being nicely tempered by a refreshing breeze. The greens and course generally were in splendid order, and gave satisfaction to even the most exacting of the Scotch and English golfers present. In this connection a word of praise must be given to Mr. John MacCormic, the director of the greens, to whose supervision their satisfactory state is in a large measure due. At present there is a large number of visitors enjoying the health-giving qualities of Newcastle, and a considerable proportion of these turned out, some following the play round the entire course, which is nearly three miles in length. Mr. George Combe, the secretary, and Mr. Hugh C. Kelly, the treasurer of the club, were in attendance during the day. The County Down Railway Company have done much to encourage the the game at this beautiful resort in the way of affording facilities to players to reach the links, and they have likewise made it convenient for those of the general public who wished to be present at this Championship meeting.

The first day's play consisted of a competition by strokes under handicap, and was open to all bona-fide amateurs, for which a couple of medals were offered as prizes. For it fifty-four players entered. Play began at ten o'clock, and concluded about six. Mr. John Taylor succeeded in carrying off the first prize with a net score of 80. There was a very close contest for second place, Messrs. A. Stuart, C. Dunderdale, and J. F. Hodges being equal with a score of 81. Two of

this trio played off the ties, which resulted in Mr. A. Stuart, who played Mr. C. Dunderdale (89), securing the second medal with 84. Mr. Hodges retired.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP.

Play for the Irish Amateur Championship began at eleven o'clock on the 13th inst. There were thirty-five entries, as follows:—Mr. W. M. Blake, Mr. George Combe, Mr. H. Gregg, Mr. N. Playlair, Mr. F. The last three couples named had byes, and on Messrs, C. L. Beichie and J. Napier playing off, the former won his place. Of the others Mr. Bell scratched to Mr. Low, and Mr. H. Adair beat Mr. A. B. Hull. Sixteen couples went off in the first round, which started at eleven o'clock, The most remarkable feature of this round, and, indeed, the surprise of the day's play, was the defeat of the present holder of the Championship, Mr. Alexander Stuart, by Mr. J. Taylor, Edinburgh, the winner of the stroke competition which came off on Tuesday, by 6 up and 5 to play. Mr. J. Ball, jun., beat his opponent, Mr. J. S. Alexander, County Antrim. 3 up and 2 to play. It is worthy of mention that at one part of the game the County Antrim player led the ex-double Champion, who, however, resumed his position at the fifth hole. The second round produced some very superior play. The most exciting contest was that which took place between Messrs. Blaikie and Low, the former winning by 1 up. The next best was that in which Messrs. Combe and Gregg were matched, the first-named coming off victorious by a couple of holes; while Mr. J. Ball, jun., defeated Mr. Johnston, 6 up and 5 to play.

The weather was a decided contrast to that which ushered in the tournament on Tuesday. Dull and stormy in the morning, it continued so for the greater part of the day, and light rain fell for several hours. As a consequence the number of visitors at present staying at Newcastle who ventured out to traverse the greens was smaller than on the preceding day. The third day's play was favoured with delightful weather. All the players were allowed to go out without any following, except the ex-Champion, Mr. John Ball, jun., and Mr. Taylor of the Carlton Club, Edinburgh. By very superior play Mr. Ball won the first hole, and the second and third were halved in 4 each. At the fifth, Mr. Ball took 3 on the green, and Mr. Taylor 2, thus equalising the match at this point. Mr. Taylor showed excellent form, and won the next two holes in 4 each against his opponent's 5. At the seventh, after somewhat indifferent form, Mr. Taylor holed a very long and difficult putt in 5, giving his opponent a somewhat similar piece of work to accomplish. Mr. Ball was equal to the demands made upon him, and holed also in 5. The spectators hailed the result with a hearty cheer intended for both players. At the eighth hole, which is the shortest on the course, both were on the green from the tee. Mr. Taylor gave his opponent a lead by holing at his second, and again the ex-Champion was equal to the occasion, and performed a similar task. At the ninth Mr. Taylor was on the green in 2, Mr. Ball being to the right, The latter played his third short, and failed to reach the green, and, playing 2 more, lay on the lip of the hole—a dead stimie against his opponent. The only alternative left to Mr. Taylor was to run the risk of holing the ex-Champion's ball. Not choosing to risk this, however, he played to the left of the hole, but failed to get in, and the hole

was halved in 5. Coming home, Mr. Taylor got out of form, and Mr. Ball won by 2 up and 1 to play. Mr. Stuart Anderson found in Mr. Combe, of the County Down Club, a very strong opponent, the former only winning by a putt. Mr. M'Laren, of Mortonhall Club, and Mr. D. Anderson, of Monifieth, finished the round even, and after a second tie, Mr. Anderson won by a stroke. In the fourth round, Mr. Ball allowing 4 for the fifth hole, which he had not to play owing to Mr. Blaikie lifting, went round in 74, being the record over these The remainder of the day's play consisted of the first couple of rounds of the competition for the consolation prize, offered by the County Down Railway Company for those who were out in the first and second rounds of the Championship.

Those who attended with the expectation of witnessing a really fine exposition of the Royal and Ancient Game given by two players of distinction were not disappointed, and the interest in the result was shown by the large and fashionable company of ladies and gentlemen, who followed the game from start to finish. The rain kept off till about half of the course had been traversed, when a drizzling shower came on and lasted till the conclusion of the first half. There was a strong wind, however, all the morning, a circumstance which of course militated somewhat against the play. From the start Mr. Ball was the favourite, although the North Berwick man had not a few supporters. The latter all through outdrove his opponent, but it was a treat to witness some of Mr. Ball's cool, calculating shots. Play began at eleven o'clock. Up to the first hole Mr. Anderson's drives were perfect, and he lay dead in 3, but Mr. Ball saved the hole with a long putt of about three yards, halving it in 4. Mr. Anderson had a bad lie for the second, but making a good recovery, succeeded in halving in 3. Going to the third Mr. Anderson was short from the tee, Mr. Ball being on the near edge of the green. The former in playing his second shot overran the hole to the opposite edge of it, and Mr. Ball did the same, playing the like. Mr. Anderson failing to get within putting distance in 3, took 5 and lost the hole, Mr. Ball getting down in 4, thus constituting himself leader by I up. As to the fourth, the ex-champion's ball was short from the tee, Mr. Anderson having a bad lie and bunkering to the right of the green. He took 2 to get on, and, after playing a couple more, he picked up his ball, the Liverpool man going down in 4 and being now 2 up. Going to the fifth, Mr. Ball lofted his second into the

bunker short of the green, and not succeeding in getting out in 2, picked up his ball, thus giving up the hole, and reducing his lead by I. Mr. Anderson considerably outdrove his opponent from the tee coming to the sixth hole, which was halved in 5. Going to the seventh, Mr. Anderson had a very bad lie, and played two more, and his opponent found his tee shot a hanging ball, and got only a short distance with his second shot. Mr. Anderson bunkered in his third, and Mr. Ball Mr. Anderson went from one difficulty to another, played the like. and finally got into the hole in 8, Mr. Ball having got down in 6. This made Mr. Ball again the leader by 2 up. In regard to the eight hole both players drove short of the green from the tee, Mr. Anderson leaving himself too much to do to get down in 3. Mr. Ball played practically dead, and holed in 3, being now 3 up. For the ninth hole Mr. Ball failed to get his second forward, and was four yards beyond the hole while his second forward, and was four yards beyond the hole, while his opponent was about three times that distance away, but, notwithstanding this disadvantage, surmounted the difficulty, and got down in 3, thus reducing Mr. Ball's lead by 2 up at the turn. Both players had a short approach to the tenth. Mr. Ball just missed holing in 3 with a very long shot, and Mr. Anderson also failed to get up. The former had a narrow margin to get past Mr. Anderson's ball to get down in 4, but accomplished the task amid the cheers of the spectators. In going to the eleventh the North Berwick man pulled his tee shot very badly, and was fortunate in evading difficulties. Both were short of the green in 2, and Mr. Ball ultimately won the hole in 5, making Mr. Anderson bunkered short of the green, going to the twelfth, and failing to extricate his ball surrendered the hole, the score now standing, Mr. Ball 5 up. The ex-champion failed to get into the Punchbowl going for the thirteenth. Mr. Anderson was at the bottom, but, letting the advantage slip, the hole was halved in 4. Mr. Ball encountered difficulties at the fourteenth, Mr. Anderson winning the hole in 4. This brought Mr. Ball's score down to 4 up. Mr. Anderson pulled his tee shot going to the fifteenth, and was in the bent, but had a good lie. He played the odd on to the green, but lost the hole, taking 6. Mr. Ball won the sixteenth in 3, having had the best approach to the hole, and was now leading by 6 up. Mr. Anderson, from a very long shot from the tee, made a favourable approach in 2. Mr. Ball, over-running the hole, failed to lay his ball dead in 3 and took 5, and Mr. Anderson, getting down in 4, again reduced the Royal Liverpool man's score by 1. The eighteenth hole, which brought the first half of the match to a finish, was halved in 5, leaving Mr. Ball to start the second round with 5 up.

After an interval of a couple of hours, during which rain fell, the second round was begun at half-past three. When about fifteen minutes had elapsed the weather cleared up, and the remainder of the match was played under conditions rendered all the more agreeable by reason of the light rain, which cooled the air. The first hole was halved in 4. On going to the second, neither reached the green, Mr. Ball foozling his second shot. Mr. Anderson ultimately won the hole in 4, making Mr. Ball's score stand again at 4 up. Neither reached the green at the third hole, and Mr. Ball won, which made him 5 up. Mr. Anderson won the fourth in 4, and Mr. Ball the fifth and sixth in 4 each. A change in Mr. Anderson's favour took place on going to the seventh, which he credited himself with in 5. The eighth hole The eighth hole was halved in 3. The prettiest shot of the day was made by Mr. Ball at the ninth, which he took in 3, amid the applause of the spectators. The succeeding holes-ten and eleven-were won by the ex-champion, the former in 4, and the latter in a like number of strokes. This closed the match, Mr. Ball winning the championship by 8 up and 7 to play. Hearty cheers greeted the victory, and the Royal Liver-pool man was heartily congratulated. Notwithstanding the termination of the match at this point, the players completed the round.

The second prize goes to Mr. Stuart Anderson, the runner-up; while the silver medals of third and fourth places will be awarded to Mr. D. Anderson (Monifieth), and Mr. C. B. L. Blaikie (Monifieth).

The close of the summer season's Golf at St. Andre vs is marked by a competition for money prizes subscribed for the benefit of professionals and caddies, by the visitors and others there resident. Friday the 15th inst, was the day fixed upon; a sum of £18 6s, was collected, and divided into sums ranging from £4 to 23. Twenty-six names were handed in; of these, one would-be starter failed to appear, and two more tore up their cards in disgust; the actual field therefore comprised twenty-three players. This was the sort of competition that would precisely suit the majority of us, inasmuch as even the that would precisely all the last on the list, was left not unprovided for, and like all the others, received a nuid pro nuo: or to be technical, "lifted" all the others, received a quid pro quo; or to be technical, "lifted" the twenty-third prize—with an actual score of 113, reduced by handicap to 104. As in the Caucus race, to the question, "But who has won?" The Dodo after a great deal of thought, replied, "Everybody has won, and all must have prizes." So all had prizes here; even as the Lory, the mouse, the owl, and the rest of them received a comfit apiece. The handicap was arranged by the players themselves, and seems to have worked out satisfactorily; though the odds some of the young players received cannot be said to have erred on the side of liberality. Possibly this may be due to the fact that their own estimate of their capabilities was taken as a basis. It is observable that such players as David Ayton and Jack Kirkaldy, who used to reign unquestioned at scratch, have now retreated to 4 strokes, in the presence of such performers as Andrew and Hugh Kirkaldy. These two tied in the Championship; then, a few days later, by the narrow margin of 2

strokes, the younger man beat his brother at Musselburgh: now again the pendulum swings the other way, and Andrew avenges his defeat. Hugh, it may be admitted, played on this occasion with bad luck; for instance, he carried into the small bunker going to the end hole, which in consequence cost him 6 strokes, and as he had had some bad holes before reaching that point, he went out in the high total of 47; he returned in a well-played 39, but had to content himself with sixth position. His brother Andrew, on the other hand, carried all before him-in fact this seems to be his favourite competition, as he has now won it three times. In 1888 he returned a card of 78, tying with Jamie Anderson at 82, less 4; in 1889 (a competition by holes), he tied with Tom Morris, and won the deciding round on each occasion. Friday saw him at his best; the day was windy, though latterly not so much so as materially to affect the play, but from the start Andrew Kirkaldy appeared likely to be dangerous. Little fault could be found with his play; his worst hole was the third, where a six was called for, owing to a badly drawn approach shot, which lay in the rough ground up against the railway fence; while subsequently a short putt missed helped to increase the total. This happened also at the fifth hole; and at the tenth a visit to "Strath," entailed 4, where otherwise a 3 would have sufficed. His driving was long and powerful, especially coming home; for instance, he was about ten yards past "Walkingshaw" from the tee, and was within an ace of securing that hole—the hole O'Cross -in 3, from a pretty approach. He continued to play a fine game to the end, and well deserved his victory. A performance of exceptional merit was that of D. Cuthbert, who had the lowest score of the day for the last half-round, viz., 37. His card shows very steady play; the only blemishes being a 6 to the first hole, and an 8 to the sixth, which ran up the total of 48 for the first 9 holes. David Herd also played a good round of 85, in which were only three 6's. It will be noticed that the Champion's name does not appear in the list as, being a club-maker, neither he, nor Bob Martin, W.
