Fresh from his victory at Kilmalcolm, on the 26th August, that grand player, Alexander Herd, paid a visit to his native green on the 28th, as an interlude before going to Prestwick. Some little time has elapsed since "Sandy" was last at St Andrews; but it was abundantly plain that his right hand had in no wise forgotten its cunning; nay, he gave the im-pression that he has developed into a finer player than ever. Physically he seems to be more powerful; his shoulders broader, and there appears in him a sort of combination of strength and suppleness somewhat reminiscent of Mr. Edward Blackwell. Certainly his driving has become longer, and his graceful, easy style renders him a most attractive player to watch. Before he joined the professional ranks he had carried off the medal of the St. Andrews Club, with a score of 78, a record. About two years ago a 77 secured him first prize in a summer competition for money prizes subscribed by visitors; while last year his score of 308, at Muirfield, brought him in second, a tie with Mr. John Ball, jun., and Hugh Kirkaldy. On this occasion he played a couple of rounds, the first with David Leich, whom he defeated by 3 and 2 to play, with a score of 79, in which were three 6's. The second round was a threeball match with Jack Kirkaldy and R. B. Wilson, the players being accompanied by a considerable crowd. From the outset it was evident that "Sandy " was in magnificent play. Recently, in these columns, the question was raised whether there is any reasonable probability of the record of 73 being still further reduced ; when half the round was over it became apparent that that that record was in considerable jeopardy. True, the round, although most of the holes are in the medal greens, is easier, because somewhat shorter than when Hugh Kirkaldy first signalised himself; still, anything below 80 must be looked on as an except onally fine performance.

As events proved, the record still stands ; but, nevertheless, the spectators were treated to as brilliant a display of Golf as has ever been witnessed. With long raking drives, Herd reached every putting-green in 2, including the long fifth hole. Two more putts always sufficed for him to hole out ; this, of course, exclusive of the short hole (where a 3, perfectly played, might just as well have been a 2), and of the High Hole, where he holed out in 3. As a result the nine holes were done in seven 4's and two 3's, a total of 34. Turning homewards another 4 gave augury of unimpaired accuracy, and speculation became rife whether 72 would not be reached. But it was not to be. The short hole saw the first mistake ; Herd overran his first putt, and failed to hole out in his next. Two more good holes followed, and then another mistake ; two tremendously long drives placed him within easy approaching distance of the Ginger Beer hole ; but about this time he appeared to become somewhat careless ; his iron shot was weak, and lay at the foot of the green ; a 6 was necessary. At each of the next three holes a stroke was lost in the short game, and all hope of a record was over. At this time the light was failing, a circumstance which made it more difficult to judge distance correctly, and in the end he had to content himself with 77, which ties his own best performance. His outgoing score was so good that neither of his antagonists had a chance with him ; indeed, R. B. Wilson never succeeded even in halving a hole until the ninth hole was reached, and was defeated by 8 and 7 to play. He likewise lost the match with Jack Kirkaldy by 3. Herd's score was made by such good play that it is worth while giving the details of it, which were as follows :--

Had he played as faultlessly in the latter as in the first halfround he certainly would have arrived home in 72.

The Open Championship has come and gone, and, as we suspected would be the case, the result has come as a surprise to those who had not heard of, or who had been unfamiliar with, the sterling playing qualities of the winner. To beat such a field as appeared at Prestwick is undoubtedly a great honour; and golfers everywhere will wish that Auchterlonie maybe long able to follow the career he has begun so auspiciously. Additional interest is added to the competition when the name of a new man is added to the winning list. There can be no reason for any one to say that the victory was a fluke. Auchterlonie's play over the two days was steady in the extreme; sometimes it was even brilliant; and under the absolutely fair test of seventy-two holes, as compared with the thirty-six holes of earlier years, there was plenty of scope for a first-rate player of either class fulfilling the scornfal American prediction of "a high-toned start and a low-toned finish."

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The old St. Andrews flag is hoisted again at the close of the Open Championship, and, as in the amateur competition, a young stripling, who has barely attained his majority, has succeeded in slaying all the golfing Goliaths of the day. It is noticeable that in both competitions Mr. J. E. Laidlay has been the runner-up, and, while many will regret that such a grand player has not succeeded in placing himself on level terms with Mr. John Ball and Mr. H. H. Hilton, who have both been Open Champions, it will be gratifying to all that the young generation of players is able to come to the front and to defend the colours of the Old Town, which so long has been the centre of light and leading for the Royal and Ancient game. Auchterlonie's victory was deservedly won. Even though he led on the first day of play, there was no certainty that the second would save him from the fate of Mr. Horace Hutchinson in last year's competition. The likelihood was that success would unnerve such a young player, and it is to his credit that by such steady play he kept to the front, and won a place among the immortals.

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The best score of the second day's play was that of Ben Sayers—160, only one point behind Auchterlonie's 159 of the opening day; but Sayers was too much handicapped by his first day's score of 175 to be any source of danger. Before him came A. Herd and Hugh and Andrew Kirkaldy, who all are entitled to distinction for their steady scoring. On the other hand it was disappointing to find the three Willies, W. Park, jun., W. Fernie, and W. Campbell, so far down in the list. They must look to their laurels. John White seems to be steadily making his way upward, and a little more brilliancy added now and then to his steadiness is all that he needs to bring him to the top in such competitions.

The following are entitled to distinction for having on such a difficult green as Prestwick made scores under 80, viz. :—J. H. Taylor, 75; Ben Sayers, 76; A. Kirkaldy, 77; W. Auchterlonie, 78; A. Herd, 78; Mr. John Ball, jun., 79; Hugh Kirkaldy, 79. In one round Mr. Laidlay accomplished the feat of holing the second and the fifth holes in 2 each, and Mr. Mure-Ferguson in one of his rounds did the same with the second and the seventh holes. The fifth hole was also done in

2 by Jack White, Mr. John Ball, jun., and Andrew Kirkaldy; while James Kay, who stands sixth in the list of honours, also secured the seventh hole in 2.

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Comparing the score made by Auchterlonie with that of former competitions at Prestwick for the open event, we find his average for the four rounds to be 80°5. In 1890 Mr. John Ball won with an average for the two rounds of 82; in 1887 Willie Park was Champion with an average of 80°25; in 1884 Jack Simpson with an average of 80; in 1881 Bob Ferguson with average 85; in 1878 Jamie Anderson with average 78°5. In 1870, when Young Tommy won the belt outright, his average for two rounds of the Prestwick green was 74°5, so that his record still holds the field. Mr. Laidlay's average when he played for the trophy in 1890 was 88°5; this year his average is 81, a considerable improvement.

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The step which the three large Scottish clubs took in reconstructing the basis of the competition has been more than justified by the result. Every one agrees that two days' play are infinitely preferable to one day as a test of Championship form. The abolition of the privilege of free entry to all comers has also been justified, inasmuch as the players are not only all really first-class men, but the entries have increased rather than diminished, though each competitor had to pay 10s. The prize fund has also been considerably augmented in value, with the result that the rivalry between the best professionals to maintain the high standard of their form is sure to be productive of the very best play available. A gratifying feature of the competition also is to note the increasing number of Englishbred professionals and amateurs who are gradually creeping into the list and disputing with a fair amount of success the hitherto unquestioned supremacy of their brother golfers in Scotland. In old lists of the competition one scarcely met with a name beyond St. Andrews, Musselburgh, and Prestwick. Mr. John Ball appeared and broke down the monopoly ; and since then the game has been pursued with such diligence and enthusiasm in England that high-class professionals like Taylor of Winchester, is one of the products of the widened system. The competition was a great success, and all players are indebted to Mr. Harry Hart, the hon. secretary of the Prestwick Club, for his kindly attention to their comforts and to the local green keeper for having the fine Ayrshire links in the best playing condition possible. The competition for 1894 takes place at Sandwich.

On Friday afternoon last, an unfortunate accident occurred on Prestwick links. While Bob Scott and Bob Simpson (the two Carnoustie men) were playing their last round in the Open Championship competition, a considerable crowd congregated on the hill—locally known as "The Alps"—which has to be crossed when the last hole but one is being approached. Bob Scott had had one of his usual long drives, and proposed to carry the hill and the bunker behind with his brassy. He hit the ball very clean, and it went skimming off the face of his club with great force, and struck a man who, when he heard the shout, turned round and received the blow a little above the eye. He was rather severely cut, but two doctors, who were watching the play, at once attended to his injuries. Three stitches had to be put into the wound. Scott was in no way to blame for the accident.

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A curious incident occurred during a match between the West Dorset and Weymouth and Dorchester Golf Clubs, on Wednesday, 30th ult. One of the West Dorset players hit a ball from a considerable distance into the pocket of a waterproof hanging over some rails, but he was fortunate enough to hit it out with his niblick at the first attempt, without injuring the coat.

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A correspondent writes :—" It has been remarked that, for obvious reasons, the science of golfing has almost entirely been written by amateurs. If it has not already been done, might I venture to suggest that a series of short articles on the leading principles of golfing, by our leading professionals, would doubtless be of great interest to the ever-increasing army of golfers? The articles, appearing weekly, might be the result of a personal interview, illustrating the positions with snap shots; or answers to a set form of written questions in the form of a circular sent round, or a combination of both methods."

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The suggestion of our correspondent has often been thought of ; but, unhappily, the bulk of our professionals are men who can show you how a shot ought to be played, but who cannot for the life of them explain with consistent and satisfactory clearness the why and wherefore of a shot being sclaffed, topped, heeled, sliced, or pulled. They know at a glance that something is wrong with the shot either as to stance or position of the hands, and they can tell you what fault you have committed ; but it is extremely rare to find a professional at Golf, or for the matter of that at most other games, whose vocabulary, observation, and reasoning extend to the length of being able to set out an argumentative analysis of style and how to remedy proved and glaring defects. On such a subject as this the professional would always be playing one off two to the educated amateur who not only plays Golf quite as well and scientifically, but who at the same time has had the advantage of a rigorous intellectual training. We have already published a series of articles by a first-class amateur on "Ad-vice to Young Golfers," and Mr Horace Hutchinson in the "Badminton," and Sir Walter Simpson in "The Art of Golf," have left very little for the professional instructor to glean in the same field. A series of snap shots at a good professional with a "Kodak" by a golfing amateur would undoubtedly be valuable, but to be of really prime value as an instructive model on which to mould a style the professional must be unconscious that he is being stalked, and there must be an entire absence of anything like pose for effect on the part of the subject.

Mr. Robert Wallace, M.P. for East Edinburgh, whose humorous speeches on the interminable Home Rule Bill have much relieved the monotony of the proceedings in the House of Commons, complained that by the conduct of his brethren, "like Joseph—he referred of course to the patriarch of that name (laughter)—he found himself, if he might use the colloquialism, *in a hole* (laughter)." Messrs. Cope Brothers, in their next Golf cartoon, may represent the G. O. M.. with "honest John" his partner's approbation, "putting out" Mr. Wallace, who for the nonce must be made of gutta-percha (or an "eclipse" might do), with a coat of paint, not of the ordinary white, but of many colours.

A very pretty marriage was witnessed in the parish church of North Berwick on Friday last, the bride being Miss Sprott (daughter of the parish minister), an esteemed member of the Ladies' Golf Club, and the bridegroom Mr. Henry Mortimer Rush, one of the masters in Merchiston Castle School, and who has distinguished himself in the competitions of the Tantallon Club. Among the guests were a great many of the members of the Ladies' Club, and some of the leading gentlemen golfers of the district. The church was beautifully decorated for the occasion.

Mr. S. Carmichael, of St Andrews University Golf Club, recently went round the ladies' links at Machrihanish with the phenomenally low score of 24, made up as follows: $-3 \ 2 \ 4 \ 2 \ 3 \ 2 \ 3 \ 3 = 24$. Mr. W. Welsh, who holds the record for the Cambridge green, has been doing some splendid work on the Machrihanish green which he has got round more than once in 75, his score seldom transgressing 80 for the round.

Under the auspices of the Dunaverty Golf Club, a successful concert has recently been given at Southend. Colonel Forbes Mackay presided, and spoke of the advantages to be derived from the encouragement of Golf in the district. At Machrihanish, a concert, in which several lady and gentlemen golfers now residing at the Pans Hotel took part, came off under the genial presidency of Mr. Paxton, Edinburgh, who has long been a welcome visitor at the Pans; and at Campbeltown, a successful concert was held in the Town Hall in aid of the building fund of the Ladies' Golf Club, the opening of which we noticed last week. In Argyleshire, Golf and music seem to have formed a happy and profitable alliance, which we hope may long continue.

We understand that the Rhyl Golf Club intend opening their new club-house at their autumn meeting, which will begin on Tuesday, September 19th. The house contains ladies' and gentlemen's club rooms, lavatories, dressing-rooms, etc., besides accommodation for servants. It was built by Messrs. Boulton and Paul, of Norwich, and, including the purchase of the site, cost between $\pounds 1,200$ and $\pounds 1,300$. On the Saturday following (September 23rd) there will be a handicap open to all amateurs, with a ten-guinea cup for first prize. All particulars will be found in our club notices.

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Everything in connection with the Irish Open Amateur Championship on the 12th inst. is progressing well. The green is in excellent order, and several of the greens and teeing grounds are being saved. In addition to the prizes stated in the advertisement of the meeting, the County Down Railway Company has offered a consolation prize, value five guineas, to be competed for by holes, under handicap, on Thursday, 14th September. This competition is open to the losers in the first and second rounds of the championship.

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A Golf Club, under the title of Worlington and Newmarket, has just been opened at Worlington, a picturesque spot about six miles from Newmarket on the Mildenhall branch of the Great Eastern Railway line. Mildenhall Station is only a *iew* hundred yards from the links, which are laid out on land the property of Mr. W. Gardner, of Exning. The course is one of the best in the United Kingdom, affording hazards most varied, including water ponds, ditches, rushes, furze, trees, bunkers, etc. The soil is also most suitable (sandy), with short grass, which will not harden, no matter how dry the season. The situation of the course is also most picturesque and healthy, there being plenty of pines growing in the district, and on the links. The club, although in its infancy, already boasts a large number of members. The vice-presidents are Mr. H. McCalmont and Capt. E. W. Baird, the latter gentleman being also captain, while the hon. secretary is Mr. Albert A. Rutson, Newmarket.

It is not often that one finds a club-maker deviating from the well worn path of club and ball supply, in order to attend to golfers in other respects. But Messrs. A. Jackson and Co., Golf club makers, Swanage, Dorset, have been looking ahead, and are bringing out a new travellers' companion lamp for golfers who travel by night in somewhat imperfectly lighted trains. The lamp, which we have seen and tried, is exceedingly compact and useful. It is all enclosed in a bright, round metal case, about the length of a stimie, and is so devised as, by means of an ingenious arrangement, to be fixed quite close and stationary to the shoulder of the reader, while the light from the candle is strong and bright enough to satisfy all requirements. At this holiday season, when golfers are in search of health on greens scattered far and wide, a lamp such as this ought to form an indispensable part of the golfing equipment.

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Playing with Mr. J. E. Tunicliffe, on Friday, 25th ult., at Earlswood, W. Tucker, professional to the Redhill and Reigate Golf Club, succeeded in lowering his own record of 76 to 73 as follows :-Out-444344436=36; in-345644524=37; total, 73. A strong breeze was blowing.

During the sports at Dover last week, the Golf Club-house caught fire, and was burned to the ground. The fire originated in the kitchen flue.

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—All good golfers are grateful to Professor Tait, and on questions of science none will venture with him into the arena. But on a question of fact I will hazard the following query :—Is there any slipping between an ordinary smooth-faced cleek and a Golf ball?

May I suggest the following experiment to Professor Tait? Soak a Golf ball in water for half a minute, and let a golfer smite it with a clean cleek; the surface of impact is surprisingly great. Screw the ball and the cleek together in a vice with an oiled piece of metal on the other side of the cleek, till the ball is as flat as it was during the stroke; and then let him see the force required to move the cleek.

Is not the better moral of the Professor's article:-Stand with your left foot as far past the ball as you dare? Like, say, Mr. John Ball, who certainly bears out Professor Tait's theory.

It occurs to me that "underspin" also explains the great carry (other things being considered) of "jerked" shots, which has hitherto puzzled one whose tripos days are rapidly becoming dim remembrances.



RABBITS ON LINKS.

S1R,—I have just read Mr. MacCormac's letter on this subject. Have the County Down Golf Club not the trapping and shooting of the rabbits in their own hands? If so, why not have a *battue*? There are plenty of sportsmen among the members of the club. Shooting or trapping is, no doubt, the best plan, but I have also heard that tar put into the holes drives rabbits away. Mr. MacCormac's aim ought to be simply to drive the rabbits off the regular course, and this he will accomplish in time. Scrapes must be turfed over. It is no use filling with sand, as that is the first place a rabbit will go to in the evening or early morning.



GOLF AT MACHRIHANISH.

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—There are some more of us who think like "An Obscure Golfer" on this subject. Also there is an old canon in the standards of Golf, that when you come to *play at a hole you ought to see it*. In driving as a rule, direction and distance are all the player has in view, but in an iron stroke, like a rifle shot,

he is aiming for a particular spot, and should see it. Machrihanish was originally laid out on this plan by a man who knows about Golf greens—one Tom Morris, of St. Andrews. But Tom Morris's course has long disappeared. They know better down there, and the idea now is to hide the hole from you, presumably in case you should find it out, and play your ball into it. Many of the holes come into sight only a few yards off. You are told it makes these holes more "sporting," which word, begotten of bastard journalese, is an abomination in the cars of all true golfers when applied to links. Have plenty of hazards, surround the putting greens with them if you will, but let us see the flag at least 100 yards off when we come to play at it. An iron pitch calls for as much delicacy and skill as a putt, and who would dream of erecting a screen between the putter and the hole?

At St. Andrews you can see every hole a full iron shot off. The committee should take a trip to see the links in that town. And Tom Morris is still there.

NO BLIND HOLES

To the Editor of GOLF.

Str,-With reference to the remarks of "An Obscure Golfer" in your last week's issue, on the deterioration and deficiencies of this green, I cannot speak as to the former, for I have only recently spent a week at Machrihanish as part of my holiday, the same being my first visit. I should not, however, be surprised to hear that, with the increased and increasing popularity of this famous Golf course, and the enormous amount of play that must necessarily go on, there are some who endorse your correspondent's view, and, comparing the present with the past, say " the former days were better than these.

Your correspondent, however, reflects on "the green-keeper, his satellites, and his superiors" by the three propositions he lays down in his letter in such a way, that even with a week's play over the links at Machrihanish I feel it my duty to say a word in their defence. His propositions one and two, while partly true in the abstract, are, I think, singularly inapplicable to Machrihanish. Of the eighteen holes, only five (from No. 3 to No. 7 inclusive) are placed in grassy hollows, and, although it is perhaps a pity that they should come so closely together, it would not be easy to suggest the abolition of any of these greens. I fail to see how the fact of a putting-green being in a grassy hollow renders it "immaterial whether a hole be approached with a driver or an iron." I should say the reverse is the case. The hollows of Machrihanish are all interesting, and even if they were not so your correspondent if he only recollects how many putting-greens of the round are not at all in grassy hollows (what a splendid table is that last !) must surely see that he has no warrant for saying that the ideal place for a putting-green, according to the green-keeper, etc , of Machrihanish, is a "grassy hollow."

As regards teeing-grounds, your correspondent is here not so wide of the mark. Perhaps there are too many on hill slopes, but it is exaggeration to say that this is "the rule," and that it is "by choice" this is done, as if again such were the ideal in the minds of "the green-keeper, his satellites, and his superiors." As regards the way in which the green is kept, while there is no excuse for the careless divot-cutter who neglects to replace the turf he removes, your correspondent is unfair if he does not recognise that the green-keeper is doing his work well, and that considering the amount of play-" the serious amount of play which goes on, the links at Machrihanish are in wonderfully good condition. On the one hand it may be "high falutin'" to speak of Machrihanish as "the finest links in the world," (1 will not put our Gullane second), but on the other hand it is grossly unjust to all concerned to condemn the course in the sweeping way your correspondent does, and I shall be surprised if there are not many who have enjoyed there the most delightful of holidays who will demur to his exaggerated remarks.

While writing on the subject I may say that I think the only weak point in the Machrihanish course is the dangerous crossing of the players at the second hole going out and the sixteenth coming in. Could this not be remedied by making the sixteenth Dirleton, September 5th, 1893.

A RECORD score was made on Monday, 28th ult., over the Tyneside course by Mr. J. B. Radcliffe, one of the founders of the club. In a nine hole match he went the round in 36 strokes, and indeed had an easy chance at the last hole of doing a 35. The score, which was made in a nine holes match with Mr. M. P. Ismay, was compiled as follows :-544443435=36. It may be mentioned that the game was played practically over the medal course, with the exception that the teeing ground to the eighth hole was brought a few yards forward. This advantage was counter-balanced by the luxuriant crop of grass on the course at the present time, and which necessarily makes progress through the green somewhat heavy. Mr. Radcliffe had an easy chance of a 4 for the last hole to which he had a fine long drive, but being short with his iron, and too strong with the approach putt, it cost him 5 to hole out. There was not a fluke in the round, and what makes the performance still more exceptional is that he had not handled a club more than once during the past two months.

NORTH BERWICK-HOLING IN ONE.-In a single with Mr. Budd at North Berwick, on Tuesday, 29th ult., Mr. J. C. Camp-bell, Edinburgh, holed the Redan in 1. From a fine straight tee shot the ball was found resting against the pin, on removing which it dropped in.

THE PURCHASE OF ST. ANDREWS LINKS .- A special meeting of St. Andrews Local Authority was held on Wednesday, the 30th ult., Ballie Harris presiding, for the purpose of considering a report by the Links Extension Committee. The committee reported in favour of the acquisition of the unenclosed portion of the lands of Pitmour, generally described as St. Andrews Links, and they recommended that the sum of £4,500 be offered to the proprietor for the same, conditional to this offer receiving the sanction of the ratepayers by plebiscite or otherwise. Bailie Harris, the convenor of the committee, moved the adoption of the report, and pointed out that it was extremely desirable that as nearly as possible the sum for which the ratepayers would be responsible should be ascertained before a plebiscite be taken. Mr. George Bruce said that he dissented from the recommendation of the committee as to the area that was proposed to be purchased, and he indicated that three additional fields of arable land on the west boundary of the links should be acquired, in addition to what was recommended by the committee. Mr. Balsillie seconded the adoption of the committee's report. The subject of acquiring the additional fields mentioned by Mr. Bruce had been under consideration, but it was the opinion of the committee that the area proposed to be acquired was quite sufficient, and he saw no reason for paying the fancy price for arable land which would not be required for the purposes of Golf for a generation, and which would meantime not draw 5s. per acre of rent. Bailie Murray, Mr. Grubb, and others supported the motion, which eventually became the finding of the meeting, and the committee was instructed accordingly.



THE OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP. VICTORY OF W. AUCHTERLONIE.

The competition for the Open Championship at Prestwick has resulted in the victory of the young St. Andrews professional, W. Auchterlonie, and the professionals are to be congratulated upon having again wrested the Championship from the amateurs. For the last four years it has been give and take between the two classes. On this occasion, the winner was pretty closely pressed by an amateur, Mr. J. E. Laidlay, of the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers, coming within two strokes of Auchterlonie's score. The play witnessed during the two days was of the most brilliant description, and the young St. Andrews professional is to be heartily congratulated upon his victory. His play all through was remarkable for its steadiness. He is a strong young fellow of twenty-one years of age, and plays all parts of the game equally well. Member of a golfing family, having five brothers, all good exponents of the game, the Champion is in the employment of Messrs. Forgan and Sons, the St. Andrews club makers; he has a local reputation as a prize-winner in the St. Andrews Club, and took part in the Championship at St. Andrews two years ago, but this is his first venture from home.

FIRST DAY.

The competition began on Thursday, 31st ult., when the weather was of the most wretched description, rain falling heavily all day. The conditions of the tournament are that it should extend over two days, thirty-six holes being played each day-seventy-two holes in all. The competitors who entered exceeded in number the list of last year, although it did not reach the entry at St. Andrews in 1891, when eighty-three came forward. Upon this occasion, seventy-two made their appearance, against sixty-six at Muirfield in 1892. These included Mr. H. H. Hilton, the present champion, Mr. P. C. Anderson, the amateur champion, Mr. John Ball, jun., a past both open and amateur champion, Mr. J. E. Laidlay, an amateur ex-champion, and Hugh Kirkaldy and Willie Park, ex-champions among the professionals. The list would not have been complete without old Tom Morris, who entered the tournament for the thirty-third time. The entry was remarkable for the absence of a number of well-known amateurs, such as Mr. Horace Hutchinson, Mr. L. M. Balfour, Mr. F. G. Tait, and Mr. A. Stuart, who are usually to the fore at the championship gatherings. Of the seventy-two competitors, twenty-six are amateurs and forty-six professionals. The increase in the number of professionals entered is no doubt due to their more liberal treatment in the matter of prize money. The aggregate prize-fund is £100. The first prize is £40, though £10 of this sum is to be expended on a gold m dal, which the winner retains as a memento. If the winner is a professional he receives $\pounds 30$ in cash ; if an amateur, plate to that amount.

Although an early start was made in order to finish the proceedings within reasonable time, it was after one o'clock before the last of the couples were despatched from the first tee. A. Herd, the Huddersfield professional, of whom much was expected on account of the splendid form he has been displaying recently, came home in 82; he took 40 to the outward journey, and a 7 at the Cardinal spoiled what promised to be an excellent performance. For some time James Kay, the stalwart professional from Seaton Carew, stood at the head of the list, having accomplished the round in S1. After a considerable interval, Mr. John Ball, jun., completed the round in S3. At the start the Hoylake player gave promise of coming well under 80, but he fell off on the return journey. After a splendid drive, he pitched nicely on to the green with his second, and got down easily in 4. Playing a very powerful game, Mr. Ball was down in 3 at the short hole and 5 at the Cardinal, and, with 12 for the three holes, seemed in a fair way of doing good work. He subsequently failed to get down some of his putts, and had to be content with an 83. Naturally a good deal of interest attached to the game of Mr. Peter C. Anderson. He began badly with a 6, and afterwards played in a disappointing manner, returning a 93. Immediately behind him, splendid work was being accomplished by Willie Park, jun., and W. Auchterlonie, of st. Andrews. With the exception of at the third and fourth holes the Musselburgh ex-champion played a remarkably steady game, and with a little more luck in his putting he would have run into a better place. The St. Andrews player did even a lower round, finishing in 78, and this took first place on the list so far as the play had gone. Willie Fernie, who can always be depended upon to return a good score, hardly did himself justice. He began very inauspiciously with a 7, while a couple of 6's helped further to spoil a score which ran up to 86. His partner, J. H. Taylor, the Winchester professional, whose practice during the week had established the fact that he would prove a strong favourite for the Championship, fully justified the confidence reposed in him. His performance of 75, and under such untoward weather conditions, may be considered one of the best ever witnessed on the green. Mr. S. Mure Ferguson occupied a good position with

83. Mr. Laidlay, who was in excellent form, made a rather indifferent start. After a good drive, he sent his second into the bunker, and required 6 to finish. Following a 3 at the second hole, Mr. Laidlay settled down to a steady game, and accomplished the outward journey in 39; coming home he maintained his form, except at the thirteenth hole, where he sliced his second shot, and was short in his approach; but he finished off splendidly with a 3, bringing his total up to 80—the best amateur score of the day, and one which gave him third place on the list. Hugh Kirkaldy had three bad holes, tor each of which he required a 6; but otherwise he played a steady game, and finished with 83. Mr. H. Hilton, last year's champion, was purticularly unfortunate. After 41 out, he began his homeward journey with a couple of 5's; but he ran up to at the dyke hole. Following a good drive, he spoiled his second, and then sent his third underneath a wire fence. It took him 3 shots to extricate the ball, and this simply meant 2 strokes.

In the afternoon, when the second round was entered upon, the weather improved slightly, but the rain soon began to fall as heavily as ever, and the day's proceedings were concluded under the most depressing conditions. In the circumstances, the play did not show any signs of improvement. Every one was pleased to see the return to form of Mr. John Ball, jun., who, with Hugh Kirkaldy, recorded the lowest score of the afternoon—viz., 79. With a z for the Alps, he took 38 for the outward journey. His play on the way home could hardly be surpassed, and, except for missing a short put occasionally, he might have had a record score. His total of 162, however, secures for him a high place in the list. W. Auchterlonie maintained the reputation of St. Andrews Golf by adding 81, and secured first place on the list with 159. Although he took eight to the first hole, through finding his way on to the railway, he played the remainder of the round in splendid form. Bob Simpson played another very steady game for St in the afternoon, giving him the low total of 162 for two rounds. J. H. Taylor, the hero of the forenoon, fell behind, being 14 strokes above his morning's record. Mr. S. Mure Ferguson continued to play a fairly good game, and two other amateurs, Mr. A. M. Ross, and Mr. Anderson, considerably improved upon their earlier scores. Mr. Laidlay and Hugh Kirkaldy, who were drawn together, gave the spec-Laidiay and Hugh Kirkaldy, who were drawn together, gave the spec-tators a splendid exhibition of the game. The amateur had to give way to the professional, but an \$3 added to his forenoon's score gave him a good prospect with 163. The professional played a perfect game all through the round, showing grand form and promising to make a bold bid to regain the championship; his total of 162 was only lowered by one competitor. Of the others, only Mr. Hilton made a score of any note, his 81 somewhat retrieving his misfortunes of the forenoon.

SECOND DAY.


Although dull and unpromising, the weather on Friday, the 1st. was fair, giving a light which just suited the golfers. Play was started at a quarter past 10 o'clock. The field was reduced in number by ten players, who found that their score in the first day had destroyed any chance they ever had of appearing near the top of the list. As it was thirty-two couples were despatched, and the proceedings did not ter-minate till 6 o clock at night. The attention of the spectators, of whom there was a large gathering, was pretty freely distributed over the long row of famous players. Auchterlonie, who held the lead on the first day, was, of course, the object of considerable attention, and the play of J. H. Taylor, Mr. Laidlay, Mr. Hilton, Hugh Kirkaldy, A. Herd, and Mr. John Ball, jun., was also closely watched. The first to return was Willie Park, of Musselburgh, in company with Mr. Charles Hutchings, of Liverpool. Indifferent form again gave the ex-champion a high figure for the third round, while the Liverp 101 amateur accomplished one of the best performances of the day in completing the round in So. At the outset the crowd following Auchterlonie experienced the feeling that the St. Andrews professional was about to break down. Taking his brassy for the approach sho', he sent the ball flying on to the railway, a mistake which caused a 6 to be registered for the first hole. At the second, the short hole, he seemed a little off his putting, taking 4 where he might have finished in 3. A splendid 4, however, was registered at the Cardinal. While attempting to retrieve a full ball in the low ground at the felysian Fields he completely forzled a shot. A splendid putt, however, sive I him for a 5. The railway and Monkton holes were disposed of in 4 each, and through a pulled approach the end hole was taken in 6. With a 41 out he started the return journey with a faulty shot, but then settled down into a game which could scarcely be improved upon. After a succession of three 5's he played in magnificent form, accomplishing the last five holes in 19, or an average of one under four. With 81 for the round Auchterlonie's total so far amounted to 240 Meantime James Kay, the Seaton Carew professional, was also playing a capital game with the exception of a 6 for the Cardinal. As he finished with 80 he improved his position in the list, totalling 242 so far, or only a couple of strokes worse than Auchterlonie. Hope was held out that J. H. Taylor, the Winchester professional, who was a strong favourite 11. Taylor, the Winchester profession 11, who was a strong favourite for the championship on the opening, might yet run into first place, notwithstanding his high second roun 1. He, however, soon dispelled such anticipations. Driving on to the railway he required 6 for the first hole, and principally owing to careless putting he had run up 43 before he completed the first half of the round. Coming homewards his play did not improve, an 86 raising his total to 250. The luck of the ballot drew together Mr. Laidbay and Mr. Hilton much to the satisfaction of the spectrum reference. Laidlay and Mr. Hilton, much to the satisfaction of the spectators, who followed the two great amateurs round the course. Mr. Hilton stood too high at the end of the second round to have much chance of again gaining championship, and an 82 at the third round put him completely out of the running. Mr. Laidlay's chances, however, were bright. He commenced with a fine 4, and followed that up with a superb 2. A 6 at the Cardinal was succeeded by a 5, and a couple of strokes were o at the Cardinal was succeeded by a 5, and a couple of strokes were gained at the Himalayas, by taking it in a perfect 2. From this point Mr. Laidlay still played a splendid game, and after going out in 38 he completed the round in 80. Another player whose g une was attracting considerable attention was Hugh Kirkaldy. He was doing good work, going out in the capital figure of 39. His play homewards proved equally good, but a splendid round was to a considerable extent spoiled by an 8 at the figure his worker Kirkaldy more however, here his by an 8 at the fifteenth hole, where Kirkaldy was bunkered from his tee shot. An 82, however, which brought his total to 244, still left him with a fine chance of securing premier honours. Attention was now directed to the play of A. Herd, the old St. Andrews professional, now of Huddersfield, who was reported to be making an excellent how of Hundersheld, who was reported to be maring an excertence score. So it turned out, as, playing a perfect game, he finished the half-round in 38 and coacluded in fine style with 78, a figure that increased his total to 241, only a stroke worse than Auchterlonie. The form displayed by R. Simpson on the opening day was well maintained or the field end. on the third round, when by capital play he hole I out in So. Mr. John Ball, jun, another of the fancied players, showel fine form for eight holes; at the end hole the Hoylake amateur heele t his third shot, overran the hole with his fourth, an I took another 3 to hole out. Afterwards he maintained good form until the fifteenth hole, when he missed a patt of a foot and a-half, a mistake which he repeated at the subsequent green, finishing in 84. His total for the three rounds reached 246.

In the afternoon all the interest in the concluding round centred in the play of Auchterlonie, Kay, Mr. Laidlay, Hugh Kirkaldy, Herd, Bob Simpson, and Mr. John Ball, jun., beyond whom it was not considered necessary to look for the champion. Auchterlonie again made an inauspicious start, taking 6 to the first hole. Settling down with a 3 for the second, his subsequent play was of the steadiest character possible, a grand 3 at the Elysian Fields, and an equally admirable 3 at the end hole, enabled him to finish the outward journey (Continued on page 442.)

THE IRISH CHAMPIONSHIP MEETING. NEWCASTLE, COUNTY DOWN.

S will be seen by reference to our advertisement columns, the above meeting is fixed to take place next week on the fine links of the County Down Golf Club. Already the entry is large, and a good contest is sure to take place for the trophy and title, held since last year by that sterling golfer, Mr. A. Stuart, of the Royal and Ancient. Several letters have recently appeared in our columns from holiday-making golfers, eulogistic of the fine green at Newcastle, which is the most sporting, and undoubtedly, in many respects, the grandest, Golf green to be found in Ireland. An immense sum of money has recently been spent by the council upon the greens, several of them being almost of sufficient area to play cricket upon, and they offer opportunities of holing out almost

the longest putts on record. We are able to reproduce two or three photographs of the principal greens, and a view of the stupendous Matterhorna bunker which rises forty feet high on the line of the approach to the sixteenth hole. This green can be approached to the left by cautious players, but a stroke is lost by such a proceeding; the fearless and straight driver gets upon the green with his tee-shot. The green of the fourth hole, known as the "Priest's," is a splendid sample of a laid green. It lies at the foot of an enormous sand bunker, which has been the grave of many a wild approach. The "Field" hole is the fourteenth, where a magnificent expanse of turf favours the wooden putter, and from which a rare view is obtained of the grand chain of mountains under which Newcastle nestles - a

quaint little Irish fishing village, where the manners and customs of the natives resemble those of the seventeenth century —none the less courteous and engaging on that account !

in 39. His play homeward was of the same careful character, a 43 giving him 82 for the round. To touch his grand total of 322 was a formidable task for the other competitors. James Kay soon experienced a misfortune which greatly imperilled his chances. At the Cardinal he found his way into the bunker, where he lost three strokes before he managed to get clear of the difficulties in 7. The end hole also tended to put him out of the leading places. Bob Simpson put himself out of the championship with 85, his grand total being increased to 327, and Mr. Ball played below his form, contributing 86, which brought his total to 332.
