#### GOLF AT WORLINGTON AND NEWMARKET.

#### AN EASTERN COUNTIES CUP.

Some months ago we gave in these columns a full and interesting account by one of our correspondents of the introduction of Golf at Worlington. The writer could then describe only the short course of nine holes, the "golden number" of eighteen being only in prospect. Those who have the interests of Golf on hand in the locality seem to act with great pluck, perseverance, and energy, for already the long course is un fait accompli, and the members are enjoying their daily round over their new green, which will compare favourably with many of ancient renown. The club had the good fortune at first to enrol among its members the celebrated Burgess player, Mr. A. M. Ross, who has some intimate friends in the place. Mr. Ross, who has recently been on a golfing tour in the neighbourhood, spent several days on the Worlington course. He was in his best form—so the secretary tells us—and on one occasion did the eighteen holes in 80. This is a sufficient proof that the Worlington Links are difficult, and afford a good test of golfing skill, for Mr. Ross can do most of the home greens in a considerably lower figure, his Gullane record of 70 being one of his last notable performances. Mr. Ross is not only one of the most finished exponents of the golfing art, but no one knows better what a golfing green should be, and it must be gratifying to Mr. Gardner of the Rosery, whose property it is, to Capt. Baird, the captain, Mr. Ruston, the club secretary, Tom Dunn, who laid out the course, Tom Hood, the resident professional, and all who have been promoters of the game at Worlington, to hear Mr. Ross pronounce, as he does in a private letter to the writer of this notice-"The links are the very best (inland) I have ever seen." In the Cambridge Daily News of March 5th, a letter appeared from Mr. W. T. Linskill, relative to a suitable ground for a Golf course, in the neighbourhood of Cambridge, and he highly recommends Worlington. The links, he remarks, are close to the railway station (Mildenhall), between which and Cambridge there is a good train service, and he goes on to say:—" From the nature of the soil and formation of the ground they might be by the seaside, and owing to the sandy soil and short grass they will be in excellent condition all the year round. There are a large number of natural hazards, sand bunkers, whins, &c. The links are decidedly sporting, and require very accurate play to steer clear of the many diffi-culties that exist. The way in which the eighteen holes are laid out reflects great credit upon Tom Dunn, who mapped out the course. Many of the greens are old turf, and, with those that have been re-laid, are in first-class order . . . . There is a club-house on the ground, and every other convenience for golfers, and nothing seems to be spared to make the green first-class in every respect." To Londoners, as well as to Cambridge golfers, the Worlington Links ought to prove an attraction, Mildenhall, the station to which we have referred, being on the Great Eastern Railway, and special facilities as to fares, we believe, are offered to golfers by the Company, while the hotel accommodation is excellent, and the tariff also specially favourable to golfers. If some wandering Scot, following Mr. Ross' example, should find his way to Worlington he would not be long in finding that there were "freens" and "kenn'd fowk" about. Mr. James Ryan, a well-known Newmarket trainer, is to be seen going round the green daily. "His game," says Mr. Ross, "is very good, considering it is thirty years or so since he played as a boy at Gullane. Another old Gullane boy (Mr. Mat. Dawson) is very much interested in the links." So there you have East Lothian Golf and that at Newmarket closely connected. These names are familiar ones at Gullane to this day, and it is pleasing to find that the horse training families who cannot look to Gullane Links to welcome their return, are doing honour to the old place by keeping up their love for the old game.

Considering its brief existence, the Worlington and Newmarket Golf Club seems to have been very fortunate in the number and value of the prizes which are competed for by the members. On the third Saturday of each month they compete for the silver monthly medal, and at the end of the year the winners play off for a valuable prize. The first gathering

of the club has been fixed for Friday and Saturday, 27th and 28th April, and the "plunder" to be distributed among the successful players includes the following:—The McCalmont cup, presented by Mr. H. McCalmont, vice-president: the Baird challenge cup, presented by the captain (Mr. E. W. Baird); the Bunbury cup, presented by Mr. H. T. C. Bunbury; and silver medals, presented by the Rev. J. D. Toolis and the hon secretary, Mr. A. A. Ruston. With the exception of the Baird challenge cup, these prizes, truly a goodly array, are to be played for under handicap. Doubtless the green will be busy during the intervening month with preparations for battle, the breast of each player being filled with hopes of victory. The enterprise of the Worlington and Newmarket Club does not end here. The club offers a handsome silver cup, value ten guineas, to be played for over their green on Saturday, 28th April. From the advertisement which appears in our columns, it will be seen that this competition is open to members of recognised Golf Clubs in the five Eastern counties—Cambridgeshire, Lincolnshire, Norfolk, Suffolk, and Essex—whose handicaps in their respective clubs do not exceed 12. There is to be no entrance fee, and everything indicates that the "field" will be one of the largest ever witnessed in the district. The idea is a capital one, and the secretary, in intimating the proposal, expresses a hope that a really good challenge cup may be instituted to be played for annually by members of these Eastern Counties Golf Clubs. We cordially concur in his desire. Certainly the gathering would be one of great interest, and would do good in bringing together in friendly rivalry the good players of the various clubs whose name is now legion. Whether or not such a challenge cup should be secured, the directors of the Worlington and Newmarket Golf club deserve much credit for the step they have taken. We wish the tournament every success, and at the same time time offer the club our hearty congratulations on the completion of their new green, of which such very glowing accounts are to hand.

CLEEK DRIVING MATCH AT MUSSELBURGH.—A return cleek driving match between Willie Park, jun., and A. Gair, both local professionals, for £5 a-side, took place on Musselburgh Links on Wednesday evening, the 4th inst., before a crowd of spectators numbering several hundreds. A week ago, it may be remembered, Park and Gair drove against one another—the former with his own cleek, and the latter with the cleek patented by Messrs. Anderson, Edinburgh—for similar stakes, when victory lay with Gair, whose longest ball on that occasion was a distance of 184 yards. Park was not satisfied with the result of the trial on the ground, as he put forward, that one of his drives had been stopped on the "run" by the spectators, and he forthwith challe nged his opponent to again enter the lists on similar conditions. This Gair was quite prepared to do, and so last evening's match came about, it being stipulated that the clubs used should not exceed in length 3 feet 7 inches, measuring from the top of the shaft to the sole of the blade. Each man drove a dozen balls. They teed some distance behind the big bunker at the "Gas" hole, and played towards the club-houses. The result of the match was not long in doubt. Park proved himself to be in rare form, and he most completely turned the tables on his opponent. He got all his drives away in the sweetest style, with just the requisite degree of "loft" to secure a "run," because both "carry" and "travel" were taken into account. Gair's dri ving, on the other hand, in the matter of steadiness alone, did not bear comparison with Park's, and though he did get one really nice ball away, he was beaten all round. Park's best drive—a grand stroke—was the exceptional distance of 222 yards, and his next best was a distance of 218 yards; whereas Gair's longest ball was 198 yards, 14 yards farther than his longest in last week's match. Mr. J. M. Williamson again acted as referee; and the result was received with loud cheering on the part of the crowd.

#### PROPOSED UNION OF YORKSHIRE GOLF CLUBS.

On Wednesday, April 4th, in response to a circular sent out by the Huddersfield Golf Club, a large number of representatives from the various Golf clubs of Yorkshire met at the Queen's Hotel, Leeds, to discuss the desirableness or otherwise of forming a county union. In March, 1893, we published some correspondence and an article on this subject (see Golf, Vol. VI.), but though we gathered from the letters of Mr. C. D. Mackenzie, of the Cleveland Club, that the County Association was an accomplished fact, the scheme appears not to have been pushed to maturity, and hence this representative meeting. Representatives were sent by the following clubs:—Ilkley (two), Sheffield and District (two), Wakefield (two), Leeds, Headingley (two), Scarborough (one), Bradford St. Andrews (two), Birkenshaw and District (one), Dewsbury and District (two), Maltby (one), Cleveland (two), Huddersfield (two), and Harrogate (two). Dr. F. L. Mackenzie, captain of the Huddersfield Club, was voted to the chair, and Mr. A. L. Woodhead, hon secretary of the same club, was appointed secretary of the meeting. Dr. Mackenzie briefly introduced the subject, and spoke of the desirability of forming such a union, and Mr. Woodhead described what had been done to secure the necessary information. Commander Hamilton P. Smith (captain of the Sheffield Club) then formally proposed that it was desirable to form a Yorkshire Union of Golf clubs, and that a sub-committee be appointed to draw up a scheme to be submitted to the clubs in the county. Mr. T. L. Chadwick (captain of the Dewsbury Club) seconded the motion. Mr. Percy N. Lee and Mr. R. S. Backhouse (secretary and committee member respectively of the Ilkley Club) proposed and seconded an amendment that the sub-committee consider the desirableness of co-operating with the Seaton Carew Club in the formation of a North of England Union. A long and somewhat fruitless discussion ensued upon this, but the amendment was finally with-drawn, and the original resolution unanimously carried. Mr. Chadwick then moved, and Mr. C. D. Mackenzie (Cleveland) seconded, that the following sub-committee be appointed to draw up the scheme:—Dr. Mackenzie and Mr. Woodhead (Huddersfield), Mr. A. D. Stuart (Leeds), Dr. Macvie (Bradford), Mr. Backhouse (Ilkley), Mr. J. S. Ronkesley (Sheffield), and Mr. A. J. C. Stanfield (Wakefield). It was understood that the sub-committee would report as early as possible.

The chief feature, of course, was the presentation by the Corporation of Edinburgh of a new silver Golf club. Then came the presentation to the ex captain, Mr. C. J. Kerr. This was well deserved, for the club owes much to its ex-captain, who, with a band of able assistants, so successfully managed the bazaar by which the funds were recently enriched. A keen curler as well as golfer, Mr. Kerr is one of the most genial of men. The victory of an old and popular hand, Mr. T. Aitken, who won both scratch and handicap gold medals and joint club prize with a score of 81, and the heartiness with which the victor was greeted gave additional charm to the gathering.

Messrs. Thornton & Co., Princes Street, Edinburgh, are the makers of the Baird and Eckford Dumb-caddie to which we recently made reference in a commendatory way.

We have seen and tried several specimens of the "Captive Golf Ball," an ingenious device for practising shots off the tee in one's back garden. The captive ball sent out by Jaques & Son, Hatton Garden, is one of the best we have seen. The parachute attached to the ball is somewhat larger than in some earlier specimens, and this has the result of bringing a well hit tee shot to rest within a radius of thirty yards. For practice purposes, at home, therefore, and when time and opportunity are not available for a round, this ball is invaluable for keeping the eye and hand in training. The price of the ball is the modest one of 18. 6d. and 28. This firm are also the makers of wooden and iron clubs called the "Fife Golf Clubs," each club being fitted with the "corkie" grip. Recently we have published some correspondence relative to the untidy leather grips now in vogue, and the "corkie" grip, being unaffected by wet, or tear and wear, gives a smooth, uniform hold to the club.

A correspondent, at Musselburgh, writes:—"Playing in a three-ball match with Mr. Waggott, clubmaker, on April 2nd, he teed each time on the face of a watch and only topped two balls out of nine. He made some long drives, and holed out in 41."

On Saturday, March 31st, the Rev. A. H. Upcher, when taking part in the Easter competition of the Sheringham Golf Club, performed the remarkable feat of holing out in 5, after driving two balls out of bounds and losing stroke and distance each time, that is to say, at the third drive he holed out. The distance is a little over 100 yards.

In addition to the "Dumb-caddies" already noticed in these columns, we have received from Mr. F. H. Ayres, 111, Aldersgate Street, the "Acme Dumb-caddie." It is a very simple and effective method of carrying the clubs when boys are scarce. The caddie is simply a crooked walking stick with a ring and belt at the top of the shaft, and a shallow tin pan at the bottom to hold the clubs. The stick is shod with pointed iron, and there is a small iron projection serving as a step for the foot to press the carrier into the ground. The caddie is particularly suitable for ladies, while male Golfers who prefer to carry, or are forced to carry, their own clubs will find the aid of this contrivance very valuable. The price is 5s.

A new eighteen-hole course was laid out on Thursday, March 29th, at Monton, near Manchester, in Broadoak Park, for the Worsley Club, which already numbers about 100 members. This has every appearance of making a first-class inland course. Only three of the holes will require an extra hazard. George Lowe, professional from St. Anne's, laid out the course. Lowe was allowed 100 to play round, for a small stake, by a member, and by some well-judged approaching did 87. This will be another opening for a steady professional.

A correspondent asks us to state that the Royal West Norfolk Golf Club at Brancaster "have not started, and have no intention of starting a County Challenge Cup. This is evidently a mistake for an Open Challenge Cup."

Mr. Walter Bancroft, the hon. secretary of the Derbyshire Golf Club, writes with reference to the paragraph in our last issue, regarding the Derby County Football Bazaar as follows:—
"I very much regret that the names of the Home Golf Ball Press Company, Messrs. H. J. Gray and Sons, and Dr. Jaeger's Woollen Company were omitted from the list of those who had assisted me in furnishing the Golfers' Stall. Golf figured prominently in the deliberations of the North Berwick Police Commissioners at their April meeting. The question of supplying water to feus on the Dirleton estate has been on various occasions before the board. Some time since, an application for water was made on behalf of a private feuar; but the Commissioners refused the application, and decided to adhere to their original resolution to supply water to Dirleton estate feus in perpetuity only on the condition of the guaranteed use of the North Berwick links for all time. Negotiations have recently been on foot in regard to the water supply, between the agents of Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton-Ogilvy and the North Berwick Commissioners.

As the result of the negotiations, a twenty-one year's water supply for the Dirleton estate feus was proposed, the Commissioners to have the use of the links assured for a similar period. At the recent meeting of the Commissioners, replies to the proposals of the board were submitted from the agents of the Dirleton estate proprietors, and these were regarded as satisfactory, with one exception, the point of difference being in regard to the fixing of the charges for play over the North Berwick Links. The Commissioners had proposed, in the interest of the inhabitants of North Berwick, that in a new lease of the links the present charges for play be fixed as the maximum leviable. To this the Dirleton estate agents reply that

"Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton-Ogilvy are of opinion that your second condition (having reference to the fixing of the charges) is not one that should be dealt with in any lease by them to new lessees—such lessees will be empowered, under general terms, to frame such rules and regulations, and make such charges, as they from time to time think proper. It would not, they think, be advisable to limit the power of the lessees or interfere with their management of the links." This was the position of matters at the last ordinary meeting of the North Berwick Commissioners, and, after discussion, the clerk was instructed to endeavour to arrange with the agents of the Dirleton estate proprietors in regard to the question of the fixing a maximum charge.

The Rhodes green (North Berwick) is to be formally opened on the 16th inst, by Lady Hamilton Dalrymple, when a match is to be played between Ben Sayers and young Willie Park, which will, no doubt, be a great treat. Luncheon is to be provided for invited guests. Among those who have played round the course is Mr. Mure-Fergusson, who gives a very favourable account of it. The membership of the club now reaches thirty. A neat little club-house is in course of construction. It is intended, we believe, to let others than members play over the course on the same terms as hold for the North Berwick green. We hope to give an account of the green and the opening match.

"The cleek-driving competition at Musselburgh," says "Argus," can scarcely be taken as decisive. Gair's challenge at first was to use ordinary cleeks, and after the first trial, in which Park used an abnormally long shaft and was beaten, he set to improve on his patent cleek by making one with a putter face and head with which he made grand driving. Doubtless Anderson will retaliate by having a special face made for his patent. But, Query—Is this not going out of the cleek competition business altogether. A cleek is not a driver!"

Mr. David Turnbull, captain of the Gullane Golf Club, has taken the mansion and shootings of Luchie, North Berwick. He is succeeded at Gilmerton by another well-known golfer, Mr. W. Mure.

Mr. St. Clair Cunningham, the secretary, won the club prize and Cunningham trophy at the quarterly meeting of the East Lothian Club on Saturday last.

The Mayor of Northampton (Alderman H. E. Randall) had a curious experience while playing Golf on the Northampton course last Saturday. He had just driven from the second tee, when a cow seized his ball, and refused to drop it till the Mayor had chased it fifty yards or more. When the gutty was at last recovered, its masticated condition was not conducive to straight putting.

PRESTWICK.—With the best of golfing weather on Saturday, March 31st, the members of the Prestwick Golf Club competed for the mouthly handicap gold medal. #### THE COURSE AT HAYLING.

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—Under "Tee Shots," in your issue of yesterday, you publish some strictures on our Local Rules of Play. Your correspondent, evidently a visitor, would have done better had he taken the trouble to read these rules before rushing off and holding them up to ridicule. I don't say they are perfect; in fact, those he might well have criticised he has left alone.

The Rule re the 10th or Desert Hole (the one before "The Widow"), short only during competitions, at other times a good drive and half iron shot, is as follows:—"A ball lying behind the hurdles at the tenth green (Desert Hole) may be lifted and dropped farther behind without a penalty, while a ball lying near the inside of the hurdles may be lifted and dropped a club's length from same, a'so without a penalty." The reason why lifting involves no penalty is that the hurdles were put up for the sole purpose of protecting the green from sand being blown on to it, and not to form a hazard. Being allowed to lift and drop farther behind is a very questionable privilege, and but seldom taken advantage of, as the farther behind you go the rougher it becomes.

From the enclosed scoring-card, with the Local Rules printed on the back, you will see that your correspondent is again wrong, as there is no rule under which if you drive your tee shot into "The Widow," you may tee another ball and lose stroke and distance. Consequently in match play you must either play it where it lies, or lose the hole, while in medal play you may lift and drop with the usual penalty of two strokes.

The rule criticised once existed, but was abolished some time ago; however, that does not excuse a man of your correspondent's experience. The absurdity he talks about does

not apply to the rules he has questioned, but to his misquo-

tations, and criticisms founded on same.

The fault found with the positions of the holes is a little hard on the green-keeper, as the only one that was really on a slope was the first hole, and that was owing to the other parts of the green being worn out. The sudden change in the weather turned sodden greens into ones as hard as bricks, and naturally the putting was rendered most difficult. The general remark was that the links were never in better order, and I may mention, to show you that the green-keeper's work was appreciated, that a member started a collection for him, and got a nice little sum.

Your correspondent states that the committee of the club propose to alter the course by cutting out the first two holes. In that he is wrong, as their idea is to cut out the first three out and the last two in. When these alterations are carried out, and some approach hazards made, the course will be vastly

improved.

#### ANSWERS TO CORRESPONDENTS.

FAIR PLAY.—It is quite the usual practice in foursome play for one partner to advise the other how best to play a shot, or what club should be used; and in the case you cite there is not the least irregularity.

STILLINGFLETE.-We have always held the view that the lost ball, lost hole rule is not a fair one, and that the penalty is much too severe. Besides, though it is now the St. Andrews rule, it was not always so; and a dozen years ago it used to be stroke and distance. In all probability the congestion of the green has led to the adoption of the rule; but on a private green, where players are not too crowded, the modification of the rule applicable to a ball driven out of bounds, according to which the player has the option either of teeing another ball and losing stroke and distance, or of recovering the ball out of bounds, bringing it inside the course, teeing and losing two, works pretty well all round. In the case you so clearly put, A is strictly logical in his contention, and B cannot claim the hole until he has himself played a shot. He, too, may lose his ball off the tee, or the case might arise where B, having driven out of bounds, would in ordinary circumstances have to play the odds owing to the shorter distance he has driven, and not being able to claim his ball would himself lose the hole, though practically convinced that the longer shot of his opponent lay beyond the boundary fence. The gist of the case, therefore, is that the hole ought not to be given up until both players have played their shots.

C.S.—In match play you lost the hole by playing the wrong ball, and in medal play the equivalent penalty would be two strokes or disqualification, at the discretion of the committee. By playing the wrong ball you imposed the penalty of stroke and distance on the owner, and you cannot claim to be relieved of liability at the expense of another player. Had the player, whose ball you played, exchanged balls with you, then the penalty would have been cancelled.



#### ABERDOVEY GOLF CLUB.

The spring meeting of this club took place on the 29th and 30th, March, in perfect weather. The course has been much improved since the autumn, and with a further moderate expenditure should rank high among Golf links. The turf throughout the green was in splendid condition, and the driver was:largely in requisition. The putting-greens, some of which are exceptionally pretty, were in very good order, and the hazards were as usual all that could be desired by the greatest glutton for big scores. In order to make these links first class, the chief requirements are now, plenty of play, enlargement of the putting-greens with frequent mowing and rolling, and a number of small improvements through the course to assist the moderate player who cannot make his ball combine the accuracy of the flight of the crow with the precision of the drop of the hawk. As will be seen by the following scores, the handicappers brought the different grades of players very fairly well together, and both winners and losers agreed that they had had a most enjoyable meeting. Mr. B. Darwin's fine score of 82, less 4=78, made in the competition for the Brodie and Griffiths challenge cup will take a lot of beating, but all the competitors at present feel more or less sure of accomplishing this feat before the next meeting in August.


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
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
