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#### LE "GOPHER."

'HE following is the account given by an English boy, in a French school, of that interesting little creature the "Gopher." It seems worth preserving, as illustrating a certain confusion of ideas produced by attempting description of a creature, known to the writer from books, in a language which is evidently not familiar to him. It should be of interest to all Psychologists :-

#### LE "GOPHER."

Cet animal (Spermaphilus Franklini Linn), dans les premiers jours de notre siècle presque inconnu, ou, tout au moins, habitant les régions les plus septentrionales des îles britanniques, est devenu, il y a quelques années, si nombreux qu'on le rencontre aujourd'hui d'ins presque toutes les parties de la Grande Bretagne et, également, dans plusieurs endroits du Continent Européen. On dit qu'il a réussi de s'introduire dans les Etats-Unis d'Amérique et même dans l'Australasie transporté, sans doute, en quelque vaisseau maudit, comme le moineau dans le pays le premier dit et le lapin dans le dernier, où par raison de l'étonnante rapidité avec laquelle il se multiplie, il promet bien de se faire une peste inouïe. Les manières de vivre de cette créature farouche, mais intéressante, sont bien dignes d'étude, quoiqu'elle soit du nombre de ces êtres curieux qui font qu'on redoute un moment l'omniscience et la bienveillance de la Providence Suprême qui les a créé.

Le "Gopher," espèce de bipède, quoique d'une ordre très inférieur, est omnivore par habitude, mangeant tout avec une voracité tout à fait prodigieuse. Disons néanmoins à l'avantage de cette pauvre bête, qu'il ne mange jamais les créatures de sa propre espèce; viande, en vérité, il n'y a pas de plus répugnante! Ces animaux-là sont un peu grégaires. On les observe toujours marchant en bien petites troupes, à deux ou à quatre. Pour la plus part les mâles ont l'habitude de se séparer des femmes. Il y a des petites troupes masculines, et, encore, des petites troupes feminines—chose bien curieuse, enfin, parce que parmi tous les autres animaux on ne trouve pas les femelles également aimables entre elles

Or, suivant chacun de ces "Gophers" adultes, soit qu'il soit masculin où feminin, marche encore un "Gopher" très petit, portant dans les bras les longues cannes desquelles cette créature vraiment remarquable se sert pour agir d'après sa

Voici la chose la plus étonnante! Ces êtres passent toutes les journées de la vie-et on prétend que leur existence a une durée énorme-à marcher, à courir, à frapper avec lesdites cannes une bien petite balle, quelque fois blanche, quelque fois ronde, mais quelque fois couleur de boue et presque tout à fait informe, jusqu'à ce qu'ils l'aient chassé dans un petit trou fossé -par leurs talons, sans doute-dans le terrain. En toutes ces façons d'agir n'est-ce pas que nous pouvons remarquer des phénomènes analogues à ceux-ci qu'on observe parmi d'autres créatures grégaires, notamment parmi les fourmis, qui cherchent leur nourriture, en la roulant sur la terre, l'été, afin qu'ils ne périssent de faim, l'hiver? Or, on trouve aussi quelque chose de parallèle dans la manière de faire du scarabée qui a donné

lieu au mythe de Sisyphe avec sa grosse balle en rocher.

Mais pourquoi d'agir ainsi? Remarquons qu'il n'est pas à redouter que les petites balles du "Gopher" soient bon à manger, bon à rien! Animal vraiment remarquable, que ce "Gopher." Néanmoins, il y a des gens qui prétendent que cette pauvre créature a les rudiments de l'esprit et de l'âme! Cet avis, il va bien sans dire, ce n'est pas le nôtre. En marchant, marchant toujours, comme les bombyx processionaires, et en frappant, frappant toujours avec les longues cannes et une fureur aveugle, comme les gros singes des fôrets d'Afrique, on ne voit pas, en vérité, la raison pas même de la plus rudimentaire-mais plutôt l'opération d'un instinct tout à fait stupide et bête.

Gardons nous bien de parler aussi présomptueusement! Sans doute, parmi tous les animaux que la nature a créé, en sa

merveilleuse bonté, il n'y a pas un seul qui manque de raison d'être! Suffisons nous, alors, d'admettre que la raison d'être du "Gopher" soit, d'après le bon mot de Hamlet, "hors des

limites de notre philosophie."

Par tempérament le "Gopher" est un peu craintif, et c'est bien à remarquer que les membres des petites troupes, quoique discutant entre eux avec une férocité presque acharnée, ne semblent pas s'inquiéter du tout, du tout, des disputations des troupes qui circulent à côté. Au contraire, à l'approche de quelqu'un du genre hum in le "Gopher" témoigne la plus vive inquiétude, quelques uns manifestant une farouche timidité, les autres une rage épouvantable. Néanmoins ils ne sont pas absolument indociles. En menageant avec soin et en s'adressant aux pauvres bêtes avec bonté, c'est possible de s'approcher bien près de quelques-uns des plus dociles; mais il faut surtout se garder bien immobile au moment que la créature frappe la balle-moment enfin, qui semble d'être la crise de la vie du "Gopher." Si on bouge, c'est fait au risque d'être attaqué par tous ceux, grands et petits, qui ont remarqué où qui prétendent d'avoir remarqué, ce mouvement -- attaqué avec hurlements de rage, avec pieds, avec talons, avec les longues cannes !

Nous avons écrit que la duration de la vie du "Gopher" paraît énorme. C'est assez à dire qu'on n'a jamais vu un seul qui ne paraîtrait pas bien vieux-et alors, on n'a jamais vu un mort. Phénomène extraordinaire, et qui se répète seulement, d'après notre connaissance au moins, parmi les ânes, avec

lesquels le "Gopher" a plusieurs traits en relation!
En apparence, le "Gopher" est aussi misérable et bête qu'en ses manières d'agir. En couleur les individus différent beaucoup l'un de l'autre ; et encore, ce qu'on a pu remarquer aussi du chaméleon, le même individu varie en couleur de jour à jour. Le terrain sur lequel le "Gopher" aime de marcher est aussi misérable que lui-même. En sa stupidité sauvage il ne semble point de comprendre quelle espèce de terrain serait le mieux pour le roulement de la p tite balle, choisissant plutôt, par préference étrange et contrarieté féroce, les endroits coupés des gorges et traversés par grosses crevasses sablonnées. "Gopher" manque de queue, mais en revanche il a des bien petites poches, comme les animaux dits "marsupiaux," qui lui servent à garder les petites balles qui sont en toute apparence sa seule raison d'être. Voilà ce que c'est parmi les merveilles de la nature, celle qui peut être la plus grande de toutes—le "Gopher"!

THE WHITE GUTTA BALL.-From the notice which appeared in these columns a fortnight ago of the new A I white gutta ball, the impression has been gathered by golfers that the material of which the new ball is made is white throughout its entire bulk. We are asked by the manufacturers to remove this misapprehension. The makers do not claim that the ball is white throughout, but only that it is finished with a special white material, the core being made of special hard black or red gutta. The fact, however, that the ball is not white throughout does not detract from its value as a factor in the game. On some dark grassy greens the ball can be used without any paint, while if one coating of paint is deemed to be necessary, the outer white surface of the ball causes the paint to adhere more tenaciously than is the case with the unprepared black or red gutta surfaces. More extended trial has proved the ball to be in every respect a good one.

THE PURCHASE OF ST. ANDREWS LINKS.—The St. Andrews Links Bill, which passed the second reading in the House of Commons on 21st ult., is to be opposed in the Committee stage, a petition by Dr. John Paterson and others, to be heard by counsel, witnesses, &c., having been lodged with the Private Bill Committee. The petition alleges that a crowded meeting was held in the Town Hall, St. Andrews, on March 19th, at which it was resolved to oppose the Bill. The reasons set forth are that at present the petitioners have the free use of the links for Golf and other purposes, and that these rights are secured to them by express provision in the titles under which the links are held, and that they cannot be interfered with in any way by any one, consistent with the common law of Scotland. It is further stated that the Commissioners have taken no steps to ascertain the views and wishes of the ratepayers; that ample tacinities of Golf already exist, and that additional facilities will be provided by persons and bodies interested in the game at their own expense; also, that under the Bill a heavy additional burden to the existing taxation that under the Bill a heavy additional burden to the existing taxation. The petition has been signed by about 400 ratepayers and others.

#### PROFESSIONAL MATCH AT LITTLEHAMPTON.

#### H. KIRKALDY v. J. WHITE.

On Wednesday, March 28th, in glorious spring weather, a match of eighteen holes was played on the Littlehampton Links, between Hugh Kirkaldy, of St. Andrews and Oxford University Golf Club, and J. White, of North Berwick, for a purse. The picturesque links were attended by a number of members of the club and their friends and visitors. Among those present were the captain of the club, Mr. A. J. Constable, Lord Ernest Hamilton, Mr. G. E. Wellesley, Mr. R. B. Pearson, Mr. E. C. R. Golf, Mr. C. Farmer, Mr. R. O. J. Dallmeyer, Mr. R. Henderson, Mr. R. Ogilvy-Grant, Mr. D. Munro, Mr. A. Holmes, Mr. J. C. Constable, Mr. H. Burnell, Mr. A. J. White, Mr. U. Lear, Mr. C. Bartlett, and Mr. H. E. Harris. The course was in splendid order and reflected the greatest credit on the professional, Rowland Jones. White started by winning the first two holes, but Kirkaldy was not long in getting 1 up, and this advantage he never lost, increasing it to 4 up and 3 to play, thus winning rather easily. He expressed himself as being well pleased with the course, which is now undoubtedly one of the best in the South of England.

Play began at two o'clock at the first hole, a tricky one, with whin and shingle in front of the tee. Kirkaldy pulled his ball and lay on stones. White was down in 4 and won the hole. At the second hole the moat of the fort yawns in front, but Kirkaldy, with a long drive, was nearly on the green, but, putting badly, lost the hole, White getting down in 4 after an indifferent drive, and now being 2 up. At the third hole both got on to the green in 2, and halved. At the fourth Kirkaldy drove a long ball, and lay dead in 3, getting down in 4 to White's 5. The fifth hole is a good sporting one. In front of the tee is a large rifle-butt, and the near approach to the hole, which lies in a grassy basin, is rendered difficult by broken ground, with stiff bent grass. White failed to get hold of his ball from the tee, and lay heavy in sand, not getting up with his second. Kirkaldy, with a long drive and a good approach, holed in 4, to White's 5, thus making the match all square. At the sixth hole, which is an iron pitch, both overran the hole, but halved in 3. At the seventh hole Kirkaldy pulled his drive on to shingle, and was short with his second, but lay nearly dead in 3; White over-ran the green with his second, and was lying under the fence, almost unplayable, and, failing to get out, the St. Andrews man won the hole, and stood I up. At the eighth hole Kirkaldy made a fine drive, but his opponent pulled his ball into heavy ground, and his second nearly into the burn. Kirkaldy was down in 4, which made him 2 up. ninth hole is long and difficult, the approach to the hole being guarded by a ditch, mound, and pond, while the burn twists and turns the entire length of the course on the left boundary. White drove into the burn, and lost the hole, making his opponent 3 up. The tenth hole is one of the longest. Both men drove long balls over the ditch, and got up in 3; but the putting was a little loose, and they halved in 6. Eleventh another long hole. Kirkaldy, with a fine second, got on the green, but White landed his second in a sand bunker, and, playing too strong, went over the green. Kirkaldy was down in 5, and stood 4 up. Twelfth hole.—Both got fair balls away from the tee, Kirkaldy a little to the right, but neither got up in 2, and the hole was halved in 5. At the thirteenth hole a fine drive almost landed Kirkaldy on the green. White made a bad drive, but with a good approach lay almost dead. His opponent's second was a trifle strong and his putt weak, the hole being halved in 5. The fourteenth is a long hole, but both managed to get down in 5, the match now standing dormy in Kirkaldy's favour. Both players were on the fifteenth green in 2; White, having a chance for the hole, failed to get down. The hole was halved in 4, Kirkaldy thus winning the match by 4 up The hole was halved in 4, Kirkaldy thus winning the match by 4 up and 3 to play. At the sixteenth hole, the St. Andrews man holed in 3 to his opponent's 4. The tee of the seventeenth hole is on a little island in the river, with a long stretch of whins immediately in front and a long line of ruts in waiting for a pulled ball. Both men were up in 2, White holing in 3, and Kirkaldy, missing a short putt, in 4. A good drive over the Gravel Pit landed White twenty yards from the hole, but Kirkaldy, with a still finer ball, outdrove him and holed out in 2 by a putt of twelve yards. #### H. KIRKALDY v. TAYLOR, AT KETTERING.

Kettering is well enough known as a market town and a railway junction, but it must have come as a surprise to many of the Midland golfers to hear that it was to be the scene of a conflict between two such players as Hugh Kirkaldy, the ex-Champion, and John Taylor, of Winchester, who is, to say the least of it, a possible Champion. The executive of the Kettering Golf Club must be congratulated upon being able to furnish such a treat, for it is only two years since Tom Morris came down and laid out this course, or at least nine holes of it, the remaining nine being planned by Dr. Allison, the energetic captain of the club. The club subscribed handsomely for two purses to be played for by the professionals, and it is is to be hoped that their efforts and the excellent exhibition of play which resulted will contribute to the furthering and popularising of the Royal and Ancient game in Northamptonshire.

Fine weather prevailed on Monday when Kirkaldy and Taylor appeared on the Kettering Course, accompanied by Mr. W. T. Linskill and Dr. Allison; the former had kindly consented to be umpire, and it is needless to say that he officiated with his customary skill and decision. In the forenoon the following numbered about eighty persons, the Kettering Club being well represented both by office-bearers and others, and there being a fair sprinkling of strangers, including a few ladies. In the afternoon the numbers were at least 200, and amongst the company were observed:—Messrs. C. G. Bolam J. J. Rowton, J. A. Gotch, Revs. F. B. Newman, Addison, Machin, Wilkinson, Colonel Brimley, Drs. Milligan and Lee, and quite a

galaxy of ladies.

Punctually at 11, Taylor drove off far and sure, parallel to the line of railway above the first field. Kirkaldy followed with a similar shot, lower down but farther; Taylor fell short with his iron, Kirkaldy being hole high, but the latter did not lay his approach putt dead, and a half in 5 resulted. Taylor played the second hole perfectly, being far over the artificial hazard from the tee, and timing his second so nicely that it lay well on the green. Not so with Kirkaldy, who played his second rather tamely into the second hazard, where he lost a stroke and finally ran up 7 against 4. Taylor 1 up. Taylor drove prettily for the third hole near the pavilion; Kirkaldy's ball was not so far, and was very near the hedge, but wielding his mashie with extraordinary definess the ball cleared the fence and carried nearly to the hole. Taylor's second was about as good; but the Scot stole a march with his wooden putter and squared the game, Taylor's fourth lipping the hole. Kirkaldy now led off with a rasper beyond the ash tree, which marks the way to the fourth flag. Taylor made a good second with his cleek, while Kirkaldy played somewhat loosely to the right. The Winchester man overshot the green with his third, but laying his fourth dead secured a half in 5. The fifth hole is 180 yards long. Kirkaldy was exactly hole high, but twenty yards to the left, while Taylor's ball rolled past within a yard of the hedge. Taylor approached well, while Kirkaldy was short and had to play the odd. Taylor did not hole, and it was halved in 4. The course turns due west for the sixth hole, and it was halved in 4. The course turns due west for the sixth hole, which is 210 yards in length, but it is considerably uphill at this point, and the drives, though well over the hedge, were not nearly up. Taylor's approach was too strong, Kirkaldy's too weak; they were like as they lay in 3 above the hole, and failing in their putts there was no change. The seventh hole is 300 yards from the tee with a hedge about 200; Kirkaldy's ball bounded into this hedge, but Taylor's carried it, evoking applause. It seemed to be all up with Kirkaldy playing two more from the far side of the hazard, but with a magic mashie shot he hore from the lar side of the hazard, but with a magic masnie shot he reached the green in 3; Taylor's second was too far, and he failed to lay his approach dead, another half resulting. Kirkaldy retaining the honour, drove magnificently to the eighth, which is 290 yards away, his ball being within forty yards of the hole. Taylor drove well, but his approach was not good enough, and Kirkaldy laying his second dead, holed in 3 to his opponent's 4. Kirkaldy I up. After two long drives Taylor played the odd, and was just on the green; the Scot lefted the white partly with his general but dead in 3 and Scot lofted the whins neatly with his second, lay dead in 3, and holing in 4 against the Englishman's 5, stood 2 up. Kirkaldy, out in 42; Taylor, 42. Taylor was beyond the tenth hole in 2, Kirkaldy being on the green, and Taylor putting badly finished in 5 against 4. Kirkaldy 3 up. The eleventh hole (130 yards) lies just beyond a hedge; Kirkaldy spared his iron and failed to clear it, Taylor being well over, but the former recovered well, and Taylor missing a long putt failed to secure any advantage. The wind was now right ahead, and the two drives for the twelfth were well short; Taylor had the first approach and did it well, but only to see it quite capped by Kir-kaldy, who all but secured it in 3. Taylor's third seemed irresolute, stopping in the hole for a brief moment. Halved in 4. The thirteenth is a little over 300 yards in length, and here Kirkaldy gave the spectators a treat; he had a full iron shot to play to reach home in 2, and he timed it so well, both for wind and ground, that it finally lay within holing distance. Taylor's like was a good shot for distance, but it was pulled, or the ground was unmerciful to it, for it rolled into the ditch a few yards below the hole, and he finished in 6 to the other's 4. Kirkaldy 4 up. The fourteenth is a long hole (400 yards); both drove

well over the hedge, and Taylor playing the odd nearly reached the green in 2. Things looked bad for Hugh, for he foozled his second, but his iron again stood him in good stead and he managed to secure a half in 5, being now dormy 4. Both cleared the hedge in 2 in driving for the fifteenth, but Taylor's approach was too strong, while Kirkaldy laid his third nearly dead, and holed in 5 to 6. Kirkaldy 5 up. The sixteenth is the longest hole, and abounds in hedges, ditches, and other hazards. Taylor's fine tee-shot was found in a whin, Kirkaldy's lying well. Taylor played a good third, while Kirkaldy, not playing his second in his best style, had a sporting third over two hedges and a road, which he did superbly, being well on the green with his fourth, and down in 6 against 8. Kirkaldy 6 up. A drive and a loft took both players on to the seventeenth green, Kirkaldy securing it in 3 to the other's 4. Kirkaldy 7 up. The eighteenth is 160 yards, over a high roadway. Both cleared the hazard excellently and finished in 4. Kirkaldy 7 up.

At three o'clock Kirkaldy drove off from the first tee, and was holehigh in 2, Taylor's second being rather short. Taylor played too strong with his odd, while Kirkaldy's approach enabled him to hole in 5 against 6. Kirkaldy 8 up. At this point a change came over the scene, and the hopes of the Englishmen in their representative rose high. Kirkaldy drove into the brook, and eventually ran up 6, while Taylor, with par play, holed in 4. Kirkaldy 7 up. At the third hole Taylor reduced this lead to 6, winning it in 4. Both drove well down the hill towards the fourth, but Taylor, with his second, carried into the grassy dyke beyond the hole, Kirkaldy being short. Taylor's third was dead, and he finished in 4 against 5. Kirkaldy 5 up. Taylor drove safely for the fifth, Kirkaldy's ball going into the brook beyond the hole; Taylor's approach left nothing to be desired, and he holed in 3 to Kirkaldy's 5. Kirkaldy 4 up. Both drove well up the hill towards the sixth; Taylor's approach out of a furrow was a beauty, the ball rolling to within two club lengths of the hole, Kirkaldy's being too far. Taylor failed, however, with his putt, and allowed Kirkaldy to halve in 4 Driving for the seventh both players landed in the to halve in 4. Driving for the seventh both players landed in the hedge, Kirkaldy having to play back, and Taylor to lift and lose one. Kirkaldy's third, was on the green, and Taylor's beyond. Taylor's approach lay three feet from the hole, but his good genius had now deserted him, and he missed, Kirkaldy being again 5 up. Kirkaldy drove nearly to the eighth green, Taylor having to play the odd, but he latter recovered well, Kirkaldy's approach being caught in some rubble; a half in 4 resulted. In playing the minth, both balls lay on the green in 2, Taylor having the worse approach, which indeed cost him the hole, as his approach-put off the iron failed to run after hoft, and Kirkaldy won the hole in 4, standing 6 up again. Both were loft, and Kirkaldy won the hole in 4, standing 6 up again, Both were up in 2 at the tenth hole; Hugh's odd went past the hole, Taylor's third being also too strong, but the latter rose to the occasion and holed a long putt amid applause, reducing the Scotchman's lead to 5. Kirkaldy played the eleventh in a masterly manner, being on the green from the tee, and easily down in 3, while Taylor was too far, and, approaching badly, took 5. Kirkaldy 6 up. Both were on the twelfth green in 2, when Taylor again raised the hopes of his supporters by holing a long putt. Kirkaldy 5 up. The drives for the thirteenth lay side by side, Taylor making the best second, and the Englishmen keeping up his advantage, secured the hole in 5. Kirkaldy 4 up. The fourteenth green was reached in 3 each, a half in 5 resulting. Kirkaldy dormy 4. Going to the fifteenth both were over the edge in 2, Kirkaldy's second striking the branch of a tree. Both approaches were weak, but Kirkaldy nearly holed off his mashie, securing a half in 5 and the match by 4 up and three to play, revenging his defeat at Minchin-hampton. At the sixteenth Kirkaldy drove into the first hedge with his second, Taylor being safe in the field. Kirkaldy, by a magnificent cleek shot, cleared all hazards, and was within easy distance of the hole. Taylor's third lay in a dry ditch, but he played prettily out of it on to the green, eventually holing in 6 against 7. The seventeenth and eighteenth were halved in 4 each.

At the close Mr. Linskill presented the prizes, and spoke in felicitous terms of the course, which he characterised as being full of hazards, at the same time containing excellent greens, and being one on which he could play from ten in the morning till ten at night! Mr. J. A. Goteh proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. Linskill, which was heartily supported

Kirkaldy's play was conspicuous for fine driving and remarkably fine approaching with the mashie, which he followed up with, for the most part, deadly putting, using a wooden putter of an ancient type. Taylor's driving was also most excellent, but in approaching he failed to imitate the deadly accuracy of the other, though in the afternoon he delighted everyone by his plucky fight and occasional holing of long putts when he sorely needed them.

#### FRITH PARK GOLF CLUB.

ROLLAND AND WILSON v. H. KIRKALDY AND WHITE.

A capital course of nine holes has been opened on and around the excellent cricket ground at Bellaggio, and under the above name a club has been started which already has a large number of members. The cricket pavilion makes a very cosy and central club house, and as the links are accessible from either East Grinstead or Dorman's stations there is no doubt they will, in course of time, become largely patronised. If the success of the undertaking warrants the step, the course will be enlarged to eighteen holes, there being ample available land around to admit of this. To celebrate the opening and to bring the links to the notice of the public, an important professional match was played on Easter Tuesday, and despite many counter-attractions there was a large assembly of golfers from all parts to witness the play, which was of an extremely interesting character, Hugh Kirkaldy (Oxford) and J. White (Chesterford Park) met D. Rolland (Limpsfield) and R. B. Wilson (Beckenham), and the play ended in Rolland and Wilson winning 2 up and 1 to play. The links, which are only a few minutes' walk from the hotel, measure 2,460 yards and the holes vary from 210 to 440 yards each; there are plenty of natural bunkers ready to catch the unwary, and the wary also, as some of the professionals found to their cost; the greens were in perfect order and gave great satisfaction to both players and spectators. The match was exciting and brought out some brilliant play on both sides. On the first round Kirkaldy and White were I up, on the second Rolland and Wilson wiped this off and ended with 3 up. An adjournment now took place for luncheon, which was much appreciated after the hot walk, the weather being more like July than March. On resuming play Kirkaldy and White for a time seemed to have much the best of the game by winning the first 5 holes, but the round ended all even. In the fourth round they were all even again at the fifth hole; the sixth and seventh were won by Rolland and Wilson making them dormy; the eighth was halved, so they won this exciting match by 2 holes and I to play.

#### PROFESSIONAL MATCH AT FORMBY.

#### M'EWAN v. BUTEL.

The final stages of the professional match between David M'Ewan of Formby, and F. Butel of St. Anne's, which opened at St. Anne's on Wednesday week were reached on Wednesday, 28th, the play being on the links of the Formby Club, in splendid weather, and before a fairly numerous gathering of golfers, both ladies and gentlemen. In the early stages, play was very even; Butel had several chances of reducing M'Ewan's lead of I, but threw them away through weak putting. At the eighth hole, Brutel drew level, and was I up at the next hole; M'Ewan took the twelfth and thirteenth, but Butel drew level again in the fifteenth; M'Ewan took the sixteenth, and Butel the seventeenth, and at the last hole M'Ewan had again the advantage, finishing I up, as at the start. At the commencement of the second round, both played exceedingly bad, Butel being the more unfortunate of the two, enabling his opponent to add two more holes to his lead by the time the fourth hole was reached; M'Ewan took the sixth, eighth, and tenth, and in the next got into difficulties, allowing Butel to win easily by 3 to 4, leaving the local man 5 up and 7 to play; M'Ewan secured the twelfth in 4 to 5, and stood dormy 6, and the next hole saw the conclusion of the match, M'Ewan taking it in 4 to 5, and winning by 7 up and 5 to play. A CLEEK DRIVING COMPETITION AT MUSSELBURGH. -On Wednesday evening, the 28th ult., a somewhat novel driving competition took place on Musselburgh Links. The competitors were Willie Park, jun., and Alexander Geir, both of them Musselburgh professionals; and the conditions of the match, which was for a stake of £5 a side, were that Park should use his own patent cleek, and that Geir should handle the cleek patented by Messrs. Anderson, Princes Street, Edinburgh, some time ago. The weather was far from favourable for the trial. It is true that there was an entire absence of wind, but, on the other hand, a dense fog hung over the course, and the players were both at considerable disadvantage on that account. The match was one of driving alone, and actual distance with the "carry" With the object of enabling the referee, Mr. I. M. Williamson, to the more readily ascertain the result of the competition, a distance of 212 yards was measured off at the west end of the links, the players driving from the east side of the big bunker at the Gasworks hole, in the direction of the Burgess Club House. A large crowd of several hundred spectators turned out to witness the display of cleek driving, and, in their anxiety to see what was going on, some of the onlookers inadvertently interfered with the "run" of a capital Each player drove twelve balls, and the best two on each side decided the match. In the first place, it seemed as if the advantage were to lie with Park, for, to begin with, he certainly drove more steadily and farther than his opponent. After five or six balls had been played on both sides, however, Geir got away two particularly long and low balls, with plenty of "run" on them, and, though Park still continued to drive in fine form, although rather high, he was unable to get quite the distance reached by the other man. When a dozen balls had been played on each side, the referee had the distances of the best balls measured, when it was found that Geir's longest stroke was a distance of 184 yards, and that Park's best drive was shorter by eight feet. Geir, who was the challenger, accordingly won the stakes. The course, on account of the recent spell of fine weather, was hard and drive. weather, was hard and dry.

There must have been an enormous exodus of golfers during Easter week for the various seaside greens. The weather, on the whole, was really summer-like, and this fact, combined with the desire to enjoy a change, made the links at Felixstowe, Great Yarmouth, Hayling, Sandwich, Deal, Brancaster, and other places scenes of bustle and animation. Most of the seaside greens have generally a very attractive programme for their Metropolitan contingent, the evidence of which will be found in our Competition columns. At Brancaster, for example, the Easter Monday competition was a new item, for a very handsome cup presented by the Prince of Wales, whose Norfolk residence is situated not many miles from these fine links. The win for the cup was a very popular one, and Mr. H. T. Wright, who is a powerful player, from Wimbledon, deserves great credit for his steady scoring, considering the glassy hard condition of the putting-greens, which rendered putting near the hole by no means an easy task.

If it is the intention of the committee of the Royal West Norfolk Golf Club to make the Challenge Cup an annual Easter competition they would do well to consider whether more genuine interest would not be lent to the competition in following the practice of some of the other large clubs by making the decision of the event under match play rules instead of medal scoring. Under match play the competition could be made to cover two days' play, and if there was a ballot for partners two rounds each day would bring the final well within the afternoon of the second day. The example of the Calcutta Cup tournament at St. Andrews might be followed, and the handicap allowance by conceding a number of holes up on the part of the stronger player would be a welcome variation of the ordinary scoring handicap. Certainly the infusion of a wider and keener interest would be the result of match play, and the prolongation of the tournament under such conditions would not only be a closer adherence to the traditional method of deciding big matches but would also be consonant with the importance of this valuable prize.

Probably on few of the East Coast greens have the effects of the high winter gales been so marked as at Brancaster. The links are exposed pretty severely to the fury of the east and north-east gales, a goodly proportion of which have raged there during the past winter. Sand from the beach, and out of the large bunkers, has in consequence been scattered over many portions of the course and on the putting-greens with that lavish prodigality which nature alone loves to exhibit, but which must have been viewed with despair by Mr. Hol-combe Ingleby, Mr. W. H. Simms Reeve, the hardworking hon secretary, and by the green committee generally, and the green-keeper. The long and severe drought of the summer has also told on the putting greens, particularly on the re-laid ones; and the green committee have prudently altered the course somewhat in order to admit of recovery on some of the new greens. This is notably the case with the famous ninth hole, the "Mount Ingleby" of the course, which is as essential a feature at Brancaster as the "Maiden" at Sandwich, or the "Widow" at Hayling. It is to be hoped that the committee will not adhere permanently to the present tenth, eleventh, twelfth, and thirteenth holes. The consensus of playing opinion during the recent meeting was strongly against them, and much in favour of the old course as originally laid out. The general feeling was that too much was made of the marsh as a hazard, for it is crossed no fewer than six times—at the eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh, twelfth, and thirteenth holes. Not only do the new holes make the course shorter, but they lessen the interest of the play. Considering all the difficulties, however, with which the committee have had to contend, the course is in very good order; and when a few of the more exposed bunkers are protected by railway sleepers, to prevent the sand from being blown out, the Golf to be obtained at Brancester will be as fine as can be had anywhere.

The social club at Dormy House an adjunct of the Golf Club, is also a feature of the Golf at Brancaster. The house was full, and the resources of Miss Peters, the energetic and courteous manageress, were taxed to the utmost to provide for the comfort of the large gathering. This she did with conspicuous success, and many golfers, now scattered to their homes, will agree in bearing testimony to the fact that the pleasure of their visit was greatly enhanced by the comfort and attention they enjoyed while sojourning at Dormy.

Some confusion is likely to arise in Norfolk from the number of County Challenge Cups that are being promoted. Mr. Colman, M.P., has given a valuable county cup to the recently created Royal Norwich Club. We understand, however, that the overtures made by the Norwich Club to the older established Golf clubs in the county for suggestions as to the basis on which the contest should be conducted, have been more than coldly received. Yarmouth, Cromer, and Brancaster, feel that each of them has a prior claim to their young rival at Norwich to take the lead in such an important venture; and hence nothing has been done to promote the contest suggested by Norwich.

Great Yarmouth is going to institute an Eastern Counties Cup, and Brancaster is engaged in pushing forward a County Challenge Cup. A competition is also announced for next month for an Eastern Counties Cup by the Worlington and Newmarket Club, one of the counties eligible being, of course, Norfolk. It is a pity that rival jealousies should thus clash, for the object aimed at is one to be fostered with cordiality and promptitude, no matter whence the source of its original The common-sense view of the matter would seem to be that some general understanding ought to be arrived at among all the clubs of the county, all doing their best to make the trophy worthy of the contest, and to arrange that no one particular links should be the stereotyped battle-ground. If, as seems likely, each club is going to institute its own County Cup, then the competition will be shorn of the importance and value it would otherwise have if all the clubs combined to erect one cup to played for as the County Challenge Cup over each green of the subscribing clubs in turn. The question, therefore, is surely one for amicable settlement on the lines suggested by Norwich, who, after all, were first in the field with the proposal.

There was a strong muster of London Scottish Golfers at Hayling during Easter, a party of no fewer than a baker's dozen being down there, with Mr. James Gow at their head. The contingent included some first-rate golfers, such as Mr. John Duncan, a name well known in the East of Fife, who is now resident on a small property of his own in Hampshire. Mr.

James Duncan, a brother, and a scratch player of the London Scottish, was also of the band; the Messrs. Greig, from Chingford; Mr. J. P. Croal and Mr. C. Robertson, from Tooting. Play was by no means easy, owing to the keenness of the greens—a difficulty which was enhanced by the singular taste shown by the local green-keeper in placing the holes on slopes. The course is practically the same as that of last year. The alterations which it was understood the committee had in contemplation to make have not yet been carried out, and it is still felt that there is a great lack of hazards, especially for the approach shots. It is understood, however, that the committee are determined to get rid of this objection, as far as they can by eliminating the first two holes of the round, which are very uninteresting, and by taking in more ground at the end of the links, where the course would be made much more sporting in character.

On Good Friday Mr. John Duncan played a magnificent game. Owing to the hard, dry greens, his score reached 84, but this was the best scratch score made during the meeting. His brother, Mr. James Duncan, ran him close, with 86.

There are two singular playing penalties in force at Hayling to which the advocates of innovations in scoring ought to have their attention directed, as showing a disposition on the part of some authorities to play fast and loose with well-established rules of the game. The short hole at Hayling, before "The Widow" is reached, has a carry with the iron of about eighty yards on to an artificially made green. If you go too far, your ball runs on to the beach, much in the same way as a strong shot gets into the Eden at the High Hole at St. Andrews. To prevent this, there is a bank of sand surmounted by hurdles, raised up beyond the green, while the putting-green to the left and right is also bounded with hurdles, shutting off some rough ground for a sliced or pulled ball. If you slice your ball, and get on to the rough-lying ground to the right of the hurdles, you are not called upon to play the ball, as it lies, over the hurdles on to the green; but the local rule permits you to carry your ball to the putting-green inside the hurdles, and to drop it there without the penalty of a stroke. This gives a premium with a vengeance to loose play.

"The Widow" is a fine hazard on the course, almost corresponding in its natural characteristics to the "Maiden" at Sandwich. A good shot in both instances lands you on the green. But if you happen to top your ball, and get into the sand in front, you are not asked to play the ball out as it lies, but, according to the local rule, you may tee another ball, and lose stroke and distance. Just imagine a similar laxity in force in playing over the "Cardinal" or the "Himalayas" at Prestwick, or "The Scholar's Bunker" at St. Andrews. These two penalties are too absurd for serious treatment; but they show innovators who are ever clamouring for change that the reforming efforts of golfers of repute ought to be directed rather to just and equitable stringency than to haphazard, chaotic relaxation of penalties.

The West Herts Golf Club will hold its second open amateur competition at the end of June, for a cup valued at fifty guineas. An engraving of this beautiful cup was given in these columns last year, together with a portrait of the winner, Mr. H. H. Hilton. As the event follows close upon the Open Championship meeting at Sandwich, it is more than probable that the field will be enriched by the entry of a number of the leading Scottish and Irish golfers, who will make the task of Mr. Hilton to carry off the cup a second time, a very difficult one.

Messrs. H. J. Gray and Sons, Golf club and ball makers, Cambridge, have, owing to increasing trade, opened a London warehouse at 8, Goswell Road, E.C., for the convenience of shippers and wholesale buyers. Their staff of ten Scottish club-makers is fully employed turning out stock, and trade is so brisk with Messrs. Gray and Sons, that it will be necessary soon to double this number of workmen. We are informed that they have about 60,000 thoroughly seasoned blocks of beech and apple for club heads. We have received their

season's catalogue for all branches of outdoor sports, and in cricket, football, hockey, lawn-tennis, fencing, racquets and fives, Messrs. Gray appear to be as enterprising as they are in Golf. We note that Mr H. J. Gray, the senior partner of the firm, is an ex champion racquet player of England.

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At the annual meeting of the Tantallon Club, on Tuesday, Mr. Dalziel was elected captain in place of Mr. Bloxsom. Contingently on the proposed enlargement of the green the entrymoney and annual subscriptions were raised, as suggested, by the committee to 20s. and 20s. respectively, present members to be 15s. per annum. The question of a club house was brought up as we suggested, but it was felt that until definite arrange ments were made about the green it would be useless to do anything in the matter. We are told that arrangements with the Archerfield Estate have been concluded, and that a twenty-one years' lease of the ground has been obtained. If so, why are the clubs still kept in the dark?

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The opponents of the St. Andrews Links Bill are reserving their attack till the Committee stage, when they are to open fire on what they regard as the enemy.

The Braids still keep the record among greens for popularity, the total for the week before Easter Sunday being 2,455 players (of whom 162 were ladies). On Friday and Saturday of the week some waited two hours at the tee before getting off, so great was the congestion! This amount of play is telling on the state of the green, and it is a pity that it could not have a good rest after the rain. This, however, is impracticable. The competition for the Evening Dispatch trophy begins on Saturday and always draws out a large attendance. No fewer than twenty-five clubs have entered this year, and there will be some fine play witnessed, for in most of the clubs entered the standard of play is increasing yearly.

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The Scottish Metropolitan Life Assurance Company, of which the well-known golfer and secretary of the Tantallon Club is the manager, has also got its Golf Club, and the president has presented a handsome gold medal for competition among the members.

The council of the famous old Burgess Club have had their photograph taken, and when such noble heads are laid together as are seen in the photo it is not surprising that the club's affairs are so well managed. It is to be expected that future councils will have themselves 'taken' in the same way, and that the society will in time acquire an interesting gallery of portraits of the fathers and brethren of the Burgess.

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Lord Shand is a large shareholder in the North British Railway, and when he lived close to Eskbank the stationmaster often kept the train waiting for his lordship. One day a bagman was making his way to the station, when he saw the train come in. Knowing the influence of the Judge, says the Edinburgh Evening Dispatch, he ran towards the station, waving his hat and pointing to Lord Shand's house. The stationmaster stopped the train, into which the panting bagman rushed. "Where's his Lordship?" queried the stationmaster excitedly. "I ken naething aboot his Lordship," the man replied, "but I'm a' richt; ye can go on for Edinburgh as fast as ye like."

Mr. J. Talbot Fair, of Lytham, says the Blackpool Herald, suggested to the members of the Lytham and St. Anne's Golf Club, on Saturday, that the club should give a handsome cup, to be called "The Lancashire Challenge Cup," and to be competed for each year in a tournament by match play, open to the amateurs of the United Kingdom. He said they had a good deal of professional play, and he felt sure that the members would like to see more of the play of the best amateurs. The St. Anne's links were second to none, and if they established a Lancashire competition they might induce some of their friends from across the border to visit St. Anne's.

Blackpool seems to be a most enterprising place. We have seen nothing to match the provision made for the pleasure-seekers of the Easter holidays in the way of entertainments. The district is a grand golfing centre, but the Blackpool people seem to think that golfers require more than Golf to make life enjoyable. They are right, especially when golfers and the entire complement of their large families cannot all be on the links at one time. Blackpool deserves patronage worthy of the enterprise of its rulers and people.

Messrs. Grant & Co., Stafford, have patented a plan for what they call "Garden Golf." This is a practical and interesting method of learning, practising, and playing Golf in confined spaces. It is played in the same manner as ordinary Golf, with the exception that for the first or driving shot "a parachute ball," which cannot be driven more than thirty yards, is used: this is then replaced by an ordinary ball. A set of the various accessories for this garden game costs £1 is. When we have given the game a trial we shall be better able to pronounce upon its advantages in the way of educating players for the larger game, but whether it have this effect or not it must certainly be an amusing garden game with a great variety of interest in it.

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
