SCOTTISH CLERICAL GOLFERS.

I respect a man, not because he is a minister; but I respect a minister if he is a man.—OLD GOLFER.

N a somewhat famous picture illustrating one of the humours of the game the humours of the game—the stymie—a grotesque clerical figure is seen in the right-hand corner. His coat is long enough for the highest of High Churchmen; his clean-shaven face is distorted with pain, for a skimmer has caught him in a sufficiently sensitive, but not at all dangerous part. In his left hand he holds a scroll which declares his abhorrence of tobacco, and from his right falls the inseparable companion of his pilgrimage—a weather-worn, bunchy-looking gingham -and with this disengaged hand he seeks to soothe the smart. This poor object of the artist's ridicule is labelled, "Always in the Way"; good for nothing, we suppose, save rubs of the green, which, of course, reduces him to the level of a dog or a cow. He is not classified ecclesiastically, but, so far as Golf is concerned, he is unmistakably a nonconformist. Never has a falser symbol of the clerical attitude towards the game appeared in pictorial or other form. Should the misguided artist read this article, he will learn that some of the most brilliant golfers, taking St. Andrews scores as a standard, are Presbyterian ministers, and that no other profession can produce a more formidable array of players. "Always in the way!" Yes; they have been very often in the way of laymen winning the coveted prize.

The first name that occurs to us is the venerable Free Church minister of Markinch, Fife. Ordained in 1852, the Rev. A. B. Campbell is still a man of excellent physique, a veteran golfer of the finest type. He ascribes his abounding health to the recreation he so much enjoys. Excepting Old Tom himself, we do not know a player of his years who could tackle him successfully. He has always been a golfer of few clubs, and, unlike most men of advanced age, he has resisted the tyranny of use and wont, and believes that some recent weapons of war are improvements on the old ones. Twenty-five years ago play-club and cleek were his favourite tools; and last summer, on Carnoustie Links, we saw him doing splendid work with a bulger and patent cleek. The cleek had a bump behind the stroke-a bumptious cleek, he playfully called it— and in his hand it drove a long, low-flying, straight ball. Mr. Campbell has won many honours on different greens as a scratch golfer. His finest score was perhaps on Elie Links, where, in the teeth of a fierce gale, and with a large field of golfers against him, his game, judged even by a professional standard, was wellnigh perfect, and made him, facile princeps, the winner of the blue ribbon of the year. On one occasion, after being presented with a medal, he made a facetious little speech, in which he said he was glad to be able, not only to advocate sound doctrine on Sunday, but also to administer a wholesome thrashing on Saturday. A man after Charles Kingsley's heart, his genial and robust humanity bursts the bonds of severe tradition, and makes him a favourite with men of every Church. Able, enthusiastic, honoured as a golfer, he is not less esteemed as a minister; and it was only the other day we heard an old lady from Fife remark: "Mr. Campbell! We could never hae dune without im. He worked like a hero for the biggin o' oor Kirk."

And coming to men ordained about twelve years later— 1863 and 1864—it would be difficult to find two more graceful players than the Rev. D. Millar, St. John's Glasgow, and the Rev. John Sime, Dundonald. Both of

them were medal-holders in their student days, and some years ago, the links of Elie and Prestwick saw few better exponents of the game. A still older minister and as keen a golfer is the Rev. C. C. Macdonald, Aberdeen. Though aging a little, he is often found in capital form, and is never to be trifled with.

Ministers, of course, have not the advantages of practice that certain leisured and well-endowed laymen possess. But for this disability there is no doubt that the Rev. Dr. McPherson, of Ruthven, would have been in the running for either Championship. His brilliant record, when a student at St. Andrews, vindicates this strong statement, for, about a quarter of a century ago, he was able to hold the best professionals of the time in check. For many years, however, the doctor has been busier with his pen than his club, and golfing has been to him a thing very much apart, and we are afraid he is hardly en rapport with the latest developments of the game, which, in some instances, is to be regretted. His literary exposition of the sport as given in "Golf and Golfers," and in other articles as occasion offered, is admirable, even though marred by a strong flavour of conservatism, and a somewhat bigoted exaltation of contemporaries. "I played Gowf afore you were born, min," said an old golfer to a promising youth. "Supposin' you did; that disna hinder me playin' better." and that perhaps is the best way of answering all such specious pleas on behalf of the past as having a sort of prescriptive right to pre-eminence in Golf. Long, however, may the accomplished minister of Ruthven be able to swing his oldfashioned play-club, although we should prefer to see him with a bulger in his hand. His long driving would, of a certainty, grow longer, and some of his pet prejudices would be driven out of sight; and the golden age of Golf, although having much to do with iron, would not be regarded as part of ancient history, but by signs and wonders as declaring its advent here and now.

Among the Doctors of Divinity, Dr. Gray, of Dalkeith, and Dr. Charles McGregor, Lady Yester's, Edinburgh, sometimes play a game to which it would be dangerous for a layman to give odds; and in a foursome Dr. John Glasse, of Old Grey-friars, generally proves a steady and reliable partner. We must not forget to mention that the Very Rev. Dr. Story, Moderator of the General Assembly, is a lover of the game. His drives are not quite so straight as his speeches, nor his approaches so deadly as his invective. Still he enjoys his round on Gullane Green, and long may he be able to do so!

As good golfers and excellent scribes, setting forth in genial literary form the details and humours of the game, we have the Revs. R. Forgan, West Free Church, Rothesay, A. Lawson, Deer, J. Kerr, Dirleton, and R. Barclay, West Kirk, Greenock. These gentlemen have the root of the matter within them, and although occasionally off, they are frequently on; and many a proud layman, foolishly reckoning a clerical collar the badge of physical fecklessness, has been compelled, through the salutary discipline of defeat, to amend his hasty logic, and to accept the hard fact, grinning and bearing it as best he can, that some ministers can putt as well as preach, and that their long carries are even more exasperating than their long sermons.

From John o' Groat's to Maidenkirk ministers of this stamp are to be found. We do not know whether the Rev. David Lundie, Parish of Tongue, Sutherland, ever visits the fine links of Dornoch, but if he did, judging from his student record on St. Andrews Links, we have no hesitation in saying that his performances would be respected even by the Cock of the Green, whose brilliant feats have been described to us with perhaps a little extravagant admiration

-such as a carry of 180 yards in the teeth of a considerable wind! Mr. Lundie's driving can't compete with that, but Dornoch wind may be peculiar. Long driving never disconcerted him, and he smiled complacently if there was an approach shot left. His style of play was not the poetry of motion. It was decidedly stiff, but to get the better of him was even stiffer, as the best players were obliged to own.

Of outstanding players who occasionally find time for a round we have the Rev. John F. Cameron, of Blairingonea player of full and powerful swing, who can make a run of 4's on any green. We have often seen long, marvellous approaches from his driving iron, securing a good 5 hole in a brilliant 4, but right on the back of such achievements we have also seen a villainous 8 and 9 taken to what should have been an easy 4. A steadier player, and therefore oftener in the running for first place in club competitions at Leven, is the Rev. John Henderson, Collessie.

Along with these may be mentioned as formidable opponents to any layman-excepting the best amateurs—the Revs. H. L. Dick, Wiston; T. D. Miller, Kirkurd; W. Vassie, Castleton; W. W. Scotland, Arbirlot; John Ritchie, Creich; John McLaren, Alvth; D. B. Croom, U. P. Church, Montrose; and among young licentiates we find first-rate golfers in the Revs. Thos. Carmichael, Edinburgh; J. T. Paterson, Perth; Andrew Gray, Dalkeith; Robt. Johnstone, St. Andrews; and Alan Cant, Aberdeen.

The names we have mentioned do not by any means exhaust the golfing strength of the clerical profession. Many who are worthy of honourable mention have necessarily been omitted, but we must not omit two members of a distinguished golfing family, the sons of the Rev. Dr. M. L. Anderson, St. Andrews. We have the Rev. Jas. Anderson, Kinneff, who carried off first honours in the St. Andrews University Golf Club, and his still more illustrious brother, Mr. Peter Anderson, Student in Divinity, who won the Amateur Championship in the summer of 1893, and who will in ordinary course take his place in the ranks of

clerical golfers.

Instead of regarding ministers, according to the famous picture, as so many Parnellites obstructing the business of the green, it would be nearer the truth to designate them pioneers of the game. Under their fostering care some of the waste places of the earth have been converted into highly respectable links. There are still members of the flock who call this nothing but vanity, and who begrudge the minister his healthful recreation. They are a vanishing quantity, however, even in puritanical Scotland. know not the secret of good preaching, and they won't guess it, even though we hint it now. The rigour of the game may not permit the minister to find "sermons in stones and books in the running brooks." Nay, the stone may be the death of a favourite iron shaft, and the brook become the grave of a fine flying ball. And yet, strange to tell! there is store of secret strength for the Sunday's discourse even in such calamitous experience as that.

THE LATE MR. W. R. ANDERSON.

WE regret to record the death of Mr. W. R. Anderson, which took place on the 30th ult., at sea on board the R.M.S. Massilia two days out from Colombo, on the voyage to Australia, whither he was proceeding on business. Mr. Anderson was the son of the Rev. Alexander Anderson, L.L.D., Old Aberdeen. In early life he made London his home, but as a member of the firm of Messrs. Anderson, Anderson & Co., and one of the managers of the Orient Line from its beginning onwards, his duties made him a sojourner in many lands, and he had a large circle of friends in the Australian Colonies and Canada, as well as in this country. His was to the last a singularly full and busy life; even in his leisure he spared himself no pains in furthering any cause in which he was interested, and which required his help. This trait in his character has left its mark on Golf. He was an enthusiastic follower of the game, and, as if in recompense for the keen enjoyment and recreation which it afforded, he has left many a golfing society his debtor for valuable work, as well as material aid, freely given and without thought of recognition or reward. He was one of the original members of the club which started the game on Wimbledon Common in 1865, a movement from which the rapid spread of Golf in the South of England may be dated. He interested himself in the foundation of many clubs that owed their origin to Wimbledon, but it is with the St. George's Golf Club that his name is most prominently associated. One of the most active members of the syndicate who acquired the links at Sandwich for the club, he acted as its honorary treasurer from its foundation until his death. He was also for a time honorary secretary, and was captain of the club in 1890-91. The extent and importance of the services he rendered in developing the club and giving the imprint of success to its organisation can be intimately known to few, but all will feel that with him a mainstay has gone, and until gratitude is dead the St. George's Club should keep his memory green.

PHOTOGRAPHIC COMPETITION.

A prize of Two GUINEAS will be given for the best six instantaneous snap-shots of any of the competitors in play during the Amateur Championship at St. Andrews, on May 7th.

1. Only amateurs, ladies or gentlemen, are eligible; and competitors

must be members of a Golf Club.

2. The photographs must illustrate the various phases of the game in progress—such as the swing off the tee, the approach, the putt, playing out of a bunker, and the grouping of the onlookers; and, if ossible, they must represent the actual movements of the player. There must be no posing.

The photographs must be accompanied by the name and address, and the Golf Club of the competitor.

4. Competitors are particularly requested not to molest or incommode players, nor to do anything likely to distract them by manipulation of the camera while playing a shot.

An eminent London photographer, who is himself a golfer, has kindly undertaken to act as judge, and his award must be final. Regard will be paid in deciding the merits of the snapshots, to (1) grouping; (2) skill in technical manipulation. photographs must be the complete work of an amateur (lady or gentleman).

The successful photographs will be reproduced in GOLF, and they must reach the Editor, at 80, Chancery Lane, by May 17th.

The laying out of the extended Golf course of North Berwick is now approaching completion, and it is expected that a Tournament, open to all members of the clubs contributing to the up-keep of the green, will be held as an inauguration of the course. A great professional match is to come off on the 7th June, and for this Mr. M'Culloch, the secretary of the green committee, is busy raising funds. As the prizes are expected to be of high value, and the Championship comes off on June 12th, it is expected that the field on the occasion will include all the prominent professionals of the day.

A dead set is being made by some persons against Golf on Leith Links. The usual excuse is that of danger to the inhabitants. The inhabitants ought, however, to take care what they are doing, and at least secure the right to Golf elsewhere if they give up their right—their very old right—to play on the links of Leith. As Bailie Archibald wisely remarked, "Golf was one of the ancient games which had been sanction by the Sheriff, and unless they went to Parliament he was afraid they could not prohibit it." It is a pity to hear of the struggles of the old game on this historic ground, but we hope soon to hear of a satisfactory settlement of the difficulty.

The Field, in a recent article on "Golf Grounds and Common Rights," makes some statements on this subject in connection with a case of which the particulars are not given, but which those who had to do with the promotion of the lease of Gullane Common might read with advantage: - "It would be wise for all promoters of Golf clubs to be careful to approach the local powers for official sanction before setting up their camp, and not to jump at the conclusion that, when they have obtained the consent of the Lord of the Manor, they have done all that is needed in the matter." This clenches briefly the argument offered in our columns against the procedure of the Gullane Club, which, in its dealings with the Superior, ignored the rights of the feuars and proprietors of the village, and which mistake, as we pointed out, is sure to bring trouble on the club, either in the near or the distant future.

The picturesque little Golf course at Alnmouth, looked very

convenient for the course, which has for some years been in the capable hands of Mr. and Mrs. Binks, was taxed to the utmost for accommodation, and the various lodgings seemed to be well patronised. Sir Matthew White Ridley was among the visitors, and enjoyed several rounds of the links. The local players, in view of this week's spring competition, were engaging in a good deal of preparatory practice. We hope soon to give an account of this quiet and comfortable Golf resort, with some illustrations from the camera of a local amateur.

After a good deal of discussion, the committee of the Town Council of Musselburgh have agreed to recommend that the following should be the rate for the future for playing Golf on the green: - The Royal Musselburgh Club, Musselburgh New Club, Bruntsfield Club, the Burgess Club, and the Honestas Club, 2s. 6d. per year per member; other clubs, 5s. per year per member; monthly visitors, 2s. 6d. each, and children under sixteen years, 1s. 3d.; fortnightly visitors, 1s. 6d. each; children, half-price; day-visitors, 6d. each. The new scale, if adopted by the Town Council, will come into operation in the middle of next month. The Council are not likely to gain much in future by the Burgess Club, as the members seem so delighted with their new course at Barnton, that they are gradually abandoning Musselburgh, and the club-house is likely soon to be in the market.

Writing from the Castle Hotel, Harlech, North Wales, in Easter week, a correspondent says: "There is a very good Golf course here; indeed I have not seen many better, though it has only been about twelve months in existence. The situation is lovely, and the climate good."

Great interest was taken in Bideford, on Wednesday, in the wedding of J. H. Taylor the Champion, of Winchester, late of Northam, to Miss Clara Fulford, of Bideford. The rector performed the ceremony at the parish church in the presence of a large congregation. Miss Fulford was a teacher at the Church Infant School, and scholars and teachers of the Church day and Sunday-schools, through the rector, presented her with a valuable clock and a pair of salts. A number of Westward Ho! golfers attended the ceremony.

The popularity and the uncertainty of the game were two points specially illustrated in the final lie of the Dispatch tournament on the Braids on Saturday last. The "gallery" was larger than ever before, many thousands being spectators, and many more who could not be present being quite as concerned about the results. Baillie Macpherson (whose own sons had given a good account of themselves in the match) might well say, in presenting the prizes, that the purchase of the Braid Hills had been the most popular ever made by the Corporation of Edinburgh. Then, as to the matter of uncertainty, the favourite team was, no doubt, the defeated Carlton. The same quartette had played so well before in the same contest, and the Viewforth, for Mr. Buchan had to substitute Mr. Walden, a less experienced hand: little wonder that so many predicted that the Carlton would become complete owners of the cup. "Funk," as usual, did its fell work, though it is too bad to make Mr. Paterson bear all the blame. The fact is, a big gallery makes a great difference in a match, and the hardiest teams get demoralised at times. If the two clubs meet in the final next year, there will be even more excitement. The Dispatch, we believe, hopes they will, for it is desirous to replace the present trophy by one which is even more valuable and worthy of attainment.

The Burntisland Golf Company has been formed for the purpose of acquiring the lands of Dodhead for an eighteenhole Golf course, to be laid out by Tom Morris, the price being £4,000. An income of £70 a year is expected from the local Golf Club, and it is proposed to form another Golf Club of which the shareholders of the Company would be members without any entrance charges, but paying an annual subscription of £1 is. The venture appears to be a very safe one, and the plan adopted at Burntisland might, with great advantage be followed at many other places where there is even greater necessity for developing and taking advantage of the golfing facilities of the locality.

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Intending competitors may again be reminded that all entries for the Amateur Championship, which begins at St. Andrews on May 7th, must be lodged with Mr. Stuart Grace, the secretary, by May 1st.

The latter pair were in grand form, both in the approach shots and putting. The driving also was good. Unfortunately a 7 for the last hole out and a 6 for the last hole in, spoilt the chance of breaking the record, which stands at 73. Five and 4 for these holes respectively is quite ordinary play. The Captain and his partner went round in 80.

The London Athletic Club has conferred upon one of its committee, Mr. J. E. Dixon, the honour of presenting him with the club medal, in recognition of his performance last Saturday in the ten miles amateur running championship. Mr. Dixon is known to most Golf club honorary secretaries as the proprietor of the "Athletic News Agency," and is also on the committee of the Balham Golf Club. It is nearly a quarter of a century since his athletic career commenced, and many "bests on record" are still standing to his name. The most noteworthy of all, probably, is his fifty miles running record of 6 hours 18 minutes 26½ seconds, accomplished on April 11th, 1884, and which still remains unbeaten Mr. Dixon's time for the ten miles last Saturday was 64 minutes 49½ seconds. The principal merit of this performance lies in the fact that the runner (and golfer) referred to is nearly forty-five years of age.

On Monday, Mr. F. W. Beckford, of Trinity College, Cambridge, drove over the Burn at the 17th hole, at Coldham Common. The carry was 210 yards, and the distance the ball actually went from the tee, which is far back, was 240 yards. Mr. Beckford was one of the players against Oxford at Sandwich.

Mr. F. J. Hope, the son of the popular Secretary of Great Yarmouth Club, is a very promising player. In addition to the admirable form which he showed at the Easter meeting of the club, he did the nine holes out on Saturday in 35. Unfortunately he took 47 to come home, otherwise he would have had a record round.

Taylor, and a handsome purse was quickly subscribed at the spring meeting of the club, which took place on Friday and Saturday last. The match (thirty-six holes) has been fixed for Saturday, May 4th, on the Worlington Links, and if as keen a tussle again takes place between these fine exponents of the game as last year, when Taylor won by 2 up and 1 to play, the onlookers will be, indeed, fortunate. Taylor said last year that the links were the finest inland he had ever played on, and were more seaside in their character than many seaside links. Since then the greens and course have been considerably improved. Golfers wishing to witness this match will find Mildenhall Station (Great Eastern Railway) adjacent to the links.

Bob Simpson, of Carnoustie, visited Rossie Priory last week, on the invitation of Lord Kinnaird, and inspected a piece of ground on the estate, with the view of laying out a nine-hole course. Simpson found the ground very suitable for Golf, and will now prepare a plan of the course for his Lordship's approval. While at Rossie Simpson laid out a ladies' course of nine holes on a beautiful bit of turf in front of the lawn.

"A Lady Golfer," writes:—"I enclose you the following cutting from a Kentish journal—

The Westgate-on-Sea Golf grounds have recently been much improved and extended, an adjoining field having now been added, on which some nine or ten new "lockers" are being thrown up. The ardent, if not numerous, lovers of the game have now a fine scope of hilly ground in splendid condition.

Can you inform me what sort of hazards 'lockers' are? I have been playing Golf for some time, I have read many books on the game, but have never heard of 'lockers' being thrown up in a field. Are the Westgate Links unique?"

A nine-hole course has been laid out by R. Collins, professional at the Tyneside Golf Club, in the park at Bradley Hall, Wylam-on-Tyne, the property of Mr. J. B. Simpson. The turf is specially adapted to links, and some fine timber, tree-enclosures, ditches, hedges, and palings form a variety of interesting hazards. The Home hole, one of the shortest on the course, is a certain 4, though it can be done in 3, as it lends itself successfully to a neat approach. A drive and short lofting shot over rails on to a large, level green, protected by wide flower-beds, and a terrace-walk, brings the finish well within view of the Hall windows.

The course of Prince's Ladies has recently been considerably lengthened, and the circuit is now about 1,450 yards. Though the club was only opened last June, its accessibility from London and the Station, Mitcham Junction, its beautiful little club-house, and the good lies through the green, are spreading its merits among those who know the advantages of play on private ground. The fourth hole, the longest on the course, 270 yards, is particularly sporting, especially for the

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nervous driver. A topped ball is promptly punished in gorse, a badly sliced one disappears into ditches or from the course; while a pulled drive meets with rough ground and whins. This hole is protected by bushes of white hawthorn, a unique and beautiful hazard next month.

COUNTY GOLF.

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—As this question has now been raised, and as there appears to be a practical unanimity of opinion in favour of starting some scheme which will bring this about, I write this letter with a view to provoke discussion on the details

connected therewith.

In the first place, as regards the general principles to govern such a scheme, there would appear to be no better model to appropriate, than the rules at present in force regarding County Cricket, and if these were adopted, there would be at once rules which have stood the test of time, and which would fix the qualification of a County player, with the additional proviso, so far as Golf is concerned, that the County matches, at any rate for the present, be confined to amateurs. A County player would then be an amateur who had been born, or bonh fide resided for two years prior to the 1st of January of the year in which he played, in such County. Membership of a Golf Club situate in such County ought not to be required. As at cricket, a small committee would be required in each County on whom the sole responsibility of selection of players would rest; a meeting of County secretaries would settle dates and fixtures, as is now done at cricket.

One point which will require discussion in your columns is, what number should be fixed as a regulation County team corresponding with the orthodox eleven at cricket, and another will be the method of scoring in such matches. It would perhaps, although these are merely individual suggestions, be a convenient figure if nine were the number selected as a full County team; and as regards scoring, each individual match should count one point to the winner, and only in the event of a tie by individual matches should recourse be had to the number of holes, when the winner of the larger number of holes should be awarded the complete match. It is also suggested as a minor detail that players representing their County in three inter-county matches be entitled to wear the County cap and

be recognised County players.

Taking it for granted that such a scheme is approved so far, it would be well to borrow from Rugby football the grouping of Counties scheme, and for the present it would appear convenient that a group should be made of the Northern Counties (of course, this letter refers to England and Wales only), another of the Midlands, a third of the Eastern, a fourth of the Home Counties, and so on, special attention being paid to convenience of railway accommodation between such Counties. Then the champions of the nearest groups could play off between themselves and leave only the final for the year to be played on a selected neutral green. This would give Golf an interest over cricket, in that the honours of the year would have been actually won by the Champion County of the year, and not be left to the decision of any committee, and it would be free from the objectional professionalism and fictitious qualification of football.

The advantages of some such scheme as here shadowed out would be that it would not in any way encroach on the vested supremacy of St. Andrews, which would still remain the

M.C.C. of Golf; it would not encourage professionalism, it would improve the standard of amateur Golf, and it would be the means of making possible international matches, which there is no doubt would be the outcome of the scheme.

At the same time it could meet with no objection from the more exclusive clubs, as it would in no way encroach on either

their club-houses or greens, unless they so desired.

The expenses are not here touched on, as they would be in-

considerable, and are not pertinent to this letter.

Before closing I should like to confirm what has been written by the Warwickshire secretary, that is the mistake of uniting several Counties together. Most Counties are now sufficiently strong to stand by themselves, and it will only complicate matters if unions are formed embracing several Counties, thus placing an obstacle in the way of starting County Golf.

The all-important thing now is, that the movement should be started by the "Leviathans of Golf," Messrs. Hutchinson, Everard, Tait, and the Editor, et hoc genus omne, when it would at once command the respect to which it is entitled, whereas a scheme now started from the ranks would probably be futile, and put back the movement several years.

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
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
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
