In weather of a disagreeable kind, the semi-final and final rounds for the Dundee Evening Telegraph cup came off at Carnoustie on Saturday, July 27th. The semi-final round started as follows :--Mr. Thos. Brimer, Monifieth, v. Mr. A. D. Thomson, Toryglen, and Mr. W. Greig, St. Andrews, v. Mr. L. Auchterlonie, St. Andrews. The match between Messrs. Brimer and Thomson was finished at the fifteenth hole, when Mr. Brimer got into the final by 5 up and 3 to play. The match between the St. Andrews men was an interesting one. Mr. Auchterlonie, however, got on the lead early, and won by 5 up and 3 to play. The final round was witnessed by a large crowd. At the outset, Mr. Brimer got into difficulties, and he lost the first hole. The next two holes were halved. It was then apparent that Mr. Aucterlonie was off colour, his patting being particularly weak. Luck was at one stage against him, two strokes being lost at the sixth hole on account of a bad lie. When the match was half over, Mr. Brimer, and subsequently Mr. Auchterlonie negotiated 2 holes in succession. At the thirteenth Mr. Auchterlonie was stimied. Using his mashie, he deftyl folfed his ball over the obstacle. It missed the hole by a hairbreadth, however, the ball striking the edge of the disc and bounding on to the green again. Mr. Brimer thus won the hole. The next hole was halved, the fitteenth taken by Mr. Brimer, and the sixteenth being halved in 5. Mr. Brimer, won the match by 2 up and 2 to play.

halved in 5, Mr. Brimer won the match by 3 up and 2 to play. At the close of the match, the cup was presented in Bruce's Hotel. The club to which Mr. Brimer belongs gets possession of the trophy for a year, while the winner gets a gold medal, the runner-up a silver medal, and the unsuccessful semi-finalists a bronze medal each. These were handed over to the winners by Sir John Leng, M.P., in presence of a large number of golfers and other interested persons.

Sir John Leng said the donors of the trophy were very much gratified to find that the competition had excited so much interest, not only in that locality, but throughout Scotland. Sir John then presented the cup and gold medal to Mr. Brimer, the silver medal to Mr. Auchterlonie, and bronze medals to Messrs. Greig and Thomson, each, as he came forward, being heartily applauded.

came forward, being heartily applauded. Mr. J. Martin White, M. P., who witnessed the final tie, said he was d-lighted that the first public appearance he made after the electors of Forfarshire had done him such an honour should be in the interest of physical exercise—a subject in which he was so much interested and had tried to promote. Many of them had been trying to push this part of education forward in this country, and he was glad to see so much attention was being paid to it. Of all the games, Golf perhaps was the finest, for the reason that one could play it from a few weeks after he left the cradle until a few days of going to his grave. He proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the donors of the cup.

Sir John Leng acknowledged the vote of thanks, and on the call of the Rev. A. 1. Campbell Barry, a hearty vote of thanks was awarded to the Commissioners of Carnoustie, and the Dalhousie, the Carnoustie and Taymouth, and the Caledonia Clubs for their efforts in keeping the greens in order and as clear as possible for the players in the tournament.

Mr. W. F. Soutar, in reply, said the people of Carnoustie were indebted to the proprietors of the *Evening Telegraph*, first, for having presented the cup, and, in the second place, for selecting the Carnoustie Links for the first contest. He mentioned that a children's course was about to be laid out at Carnoust'e, and that by-and-by they would have accommodation for playing Golf second to no other place in the country.

Subsequently Sir John Leng entertained the Champion and those who had gaiaed medals, along with a number of gentlemen, at dinner in Bruce's Hotel. Sir John Leng presided, the croupier being Mr. W. F. Soutar, Carnoustie.

The Chairman gave "The Health of the Champion." In doing so, he said he was not a golf-r, but he recognised Golf as being a healthy game. It was a game which suited all classes and sexes, and all agos, and could be played in all weather, and that was a great advantage, and no amount of rain would damp the ardour of those engaged in it. There was one thing which he thought was particularly admirable, about the British love of sports—the British love of fair play. He was looking over the code of Rules in connection with the Royal and Ancient Club of St. Andrews, and it seemed that these must have been the result of great experience, and that the great aim of them was to secure for every man who played the same fair chance of winning the game. Referring to Mr. Brimer's victory, Sir Joha sa dhe felt all must be pleased to see that one whose distinction hitherto had been quite local had now taken a position which placed him on a certain pedestal. The spread of Golf was wonderful. They had even Golf Clubs in connection with Parliament, and he hoped, as time went o₁, there would be a regular match between the two sides of the House. (Laughter.)

Mr. Brimer, in acknowledging the toast, said he was proud to become the winner for the first time of such a handsome trophy.

Sir John Leng next gave "Prosperity to Carnoustie." Carnoustie Links had been acquired by the Commissioners of Carnoustie with great skill and foresight, and in a manner leaving no ill-feeling between them and the proprietors with whom they had come to an amicable arrangement. Happily they had no rapacious landlords to deal with. Two great landed proprietors in the neighbourhood acted with a liberality and generosity which did them the greatest credit. They set an example to all proprietors in similar circumstances.

Provost M Corquidale said he could very well bring to his recollection when Carnoustie was very different from what it was at present. His colleagues and himself had done their best by close attention to the work of developing the attractions of Carnoustie, because he thought in Carnoustie they had everything by nature in their favour. He was quite convinced that it only required to be known for Carnoustie to become one of the most fashionable and attractive places in Scotland.

PROFESSIONAL MATCH.

DOUGLAS ROLLAND v. RAINFORD.

Not much has been heard of Rolland lately, but last week he played a match against Rainford, a local professional, in connection with the prize meeting of the Pyecombe Golf Club, near Brighton. The match was for a small purse. It must in fairness to Rolland be stated that it was his first visit to the Pyecombe Links, Rainford being on his own ground. The high wind was trying, and greatly against low scoring, the professional not equalling the fine performance of Dr. Bruce-Goff the previous day. Rolland's great strength is in his driving. He started off well, and won the first hole. The second hole was most carefully played by both, and was nearly halved. Rolland made a grand crive across the valley for the third hole, Rainford falling short. He made a splendid approach shot, but by hard luck the ball rolled back, down the short bank on which the green is placed. Rolland was punished by playing a little too hard down the green. Rainford, by punished by playing a little too hard down the green. careful putting, won the hole, and the game became all even. The play for the next hole evoked much enthusiasm, Rainford winning it by holing a putt of about two yards, Rolland missing an easy chance Rainford, however, lost his advantage by just missing the fifth hole, the game again being all square. At the sixth hole, Rolland's fine driving brought him almost on the green, and The seventh hole is in sporting country, and a grand view withal, the narrow green between bunkers requiring delicate handling. Rolland's strength was his downfall, and Rainford's accurate play again brought the game all even. The eighth hole is also in treacherous territory. Rolland fared badly, while Rainford won the hole with a splendid putt. The ninth hole is in the midst of furze bushes, punishing the slightest mistake. It was well managed by both, each having a touch of bad luck, and the hole halved. At the turn Rainford was I up. Both rather over-reached the tenth green, which is on the downward slope. Rolland badly missed a short putt for the half, leaving Rainford 2 up and 8 to play. The next hole was halved, Rolland losing on the green the advantage he had gained in the drive. The course now lay straight along the bottom of the valley, the green being in a "punch bowl," a very pretty hole. Rainford won it with a fine put and become 3 up. It was now an uphill game for home, and Rainford again beat his opponent at the thirteenth hole. In approaching the again bear his opponent at the threehol hole. In applicating the next green Rainford got badly in the furze, and gave up the hole, his score being 3 up and 4 to play. The bunker guarding the fifteenth hole is a cattle lodge and yard, requiring pretty tall driving. Both got over the trouble from the tee, Rolland's bad luck followed him on the green, and he lost the hole, Rainford winning the match at this hole, 4 up and 3 to play, amid the hearty applause of the crowd. In playing the bye Rolland secured the advantage, Rainford failing to take the hedge at the seventeenth hole; the others were halved. The strong wind was difficult to gauge, and made the scoring poor, but the match was an interesting feature in a very successful meeting, the whole of the arrangements reflecting most creditably on Mr. F. Campion and Mis. Keen (the hon. secretaries), and everyone concerned.

MR. LAIDLAW PURVES ON STYLE.

M R. LAIDLAW PURVES' analytical notes on the different manners of address and swing adopted by prominent players at the late Open Championship, are full of interest; and though the compiler himself is well aware that many more observations are necessary before any general principles can be deduced from them, there are nevertheless certain points in the results as already obtained that are well worthy of notice.

No doubt the first sentiment generally suggested by the perusal of these notes will be one of surprise, to find how very various are the attitudes in which players whose skill has been proved beyond question address themselves to the striking of the ball. But the wide divergence of style between Mr. Laidlay, with the ball advanced almost in front of his left foot, and Taylor (say), whom we have often seen piaving a full shot with the ball almost to the right of his right foot, has been the subject of frequent observation before. A fact that Mr. Purves educes, and which is likely to be a greater matter of surprise to those who have bestowed some thought and study on the attitudes in which golfers place themselves for various strokes, is that a majority of the professionals putt with the ball nearer the left foot than the right. The present writer must confess himself altogether astonished to learn this fact, for fact it is, beyond question - no man, probably, has given so much thought and attention to this matter as Mr. Purves, and no man could possibly approach the matter better equipped with the intelligence and experience for its understanding. Of the ten players that were the subject of Mr. Purves' observation, six stood with the ball, for putting, nearer the left foot than the fork ; one, W. Auchterlonie, had it opposite the fork; and three, W. Fernie, A. Kirkaldy, and A. Simpson, nearer the right foot. The majority, who putted in the manner in which the present writer would have expected to be told that only a small minority putted, was composed of D. Brown, A. Herd, H. Kirkaldy, Sayers, Taylor, and Toogood. It is probable that, for putting, the attitude is of less importance than for any other stroke in the game. The department of the game in which it is probably of most importance, is in iron approach play, and in this stroke we find, as the result of Mr. Purves' observation, that there is more uniformity of attitude than in any other. He has omitted Toogood in his analysis of this stroke; and, of the nine remaining, eight play the approach with the ball nearer the right foot than the fork, H. Kirkaldy being the exception, and he only a nominal one, the difference being that he emphasises the attitude by having the ball actually opposite the right foot. Yet, even in this department of the game, Mr. Purves, as he very well knows, would have found a notable exception, had his observations included Mr. Laidlay, who plays all the game "off his left leg," and excels especially in approaching with the iron. But in this Mr. Laidlay stands, so far as we are aware, alone. In other details of style, many have imitated him; none, that we recall, have adopted his methods for the approach stroke.

But, after all, it is Mr. Purves' notes on the various styles of driving that will perhaps have the greatest interest for the greatest number, and with regard to them it is to be regretted that he did not add to their interest and value by telling us exactly the conditions under which they were taken. For various conditions modify the stance and attitude of the first-rate player in driving, more than in any other stroke of the game (of course excepting strokes

played from exceptionally cramped positions). It would have added greatly to the value of these notes if Mr. Purves could have assured us that in each observation of the driving stroke the same conditions were present. Ideally, the driver should be observed driving off a perfectly horizontal teeing ground, in a calm, without any exceptional features of danger in front of him (such as a long " carry " to be effected, or rising ground near the tee to be cleared, or a peculiarly narrow course to drive down). All the conditions mentioned within brackets modify a man's way of standing to the ball, and it is scarcely worthy of remark (so obvious and familiar is it) that a man stands, and should stand, in a different relation to the ball accordingly as the wind is behind, ahead, or from one side or the other. To place oneself thus in the position of a critic of Mr. Purves' method of making these observations is both ungrateful and presumptuous-ungrateful, because his labour and care in this matter deserve the thanks of every golfer who takes an intelligent interest in that elusive problem of the manner in which the ball is, and should be, struck; and presumptuous, because no man in the world has fuller knowledge or better qualities than Mr. Purves as an inquirer into this question. It is certain that he is well aware of the necessity of seeing that the conditions, under which the observations are made, are identical in each case, even if not of the ideal nature that we have indicated. It is even very possible and probable that he may have been careful to ensure this identity of conditions in the cases that he has recorded, but in the absence of his assurance we do not feel justified in assuming that he was thus careful, and unless we make that assumption the record of the observations loses its value for the purposes of comparing one style of address with another. To take the most notable of the instances cited, Taylor, in driving against a head wind, puts his ball almost opposite his right foot (of course, in order to keep his ball low), but he is cited as putting it "to the left of the fork, but nearer the fork than the left foot." We assume, therefore, that he was observed driving down wind or in a calm; but is the assumption justified, and are we to extend it to all the other cases?

One final point we may observe as worthy of note — Toogood is cited as the solitary instance, among the ten who were under observation, of driving with the "left foot advanced." Now Mr. Everard, in his account of the Championship meeting at St. Andrews, observes that Toogood seemed to drive longer than any of the others engaged in it. Rolland was not under Mr. Purves' observation, but he is our proverbial long driver, and he, too, advances the left foot. In Rolland's case the length of his driving may fairly be attributed to his exceptional physique; but a like explanation does not account for Toogood's length. Has that left foot in advance anything to do with it ?

THE HEALTH OF FELIXSTOWE — The medical officer of health at Felixstowe, Mr. C. G. Havell, writes to *The Times* : ----- Extensive circulation has been given to a report that Felixstowe is undergoing sewering at the present time, with the effect of deterring visitors. Will you permit me to say that, though it is true that the district council have embarked on a complete system of drainage on the plan of Mr. Shone, the only parts of it now being proceeded with are outfall works and portions of the scheme which cannot interfere with the comfort or health of visitors? None of the roads in Felixstowe will be opened, nor any house connections made, until after the present summer season. It may also reassure intending visitors to learn that the death rate for 1894 was only nine per 1,000, and that the town is at present entirely free from zymotic diseases."



GOLF IN THE BUSH.

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR.—Perhaps to many of your readers the heading "Golf in the Bush" sounds like a new development of the game, but the word "Bush" in this case does not mean that a player immediately calls for his niblick and loses several strokes in the extrication of his ball. The word here applies to the whole of Australia with the exception of the large towns, and there are many places in the bush, especially on river frontages, where really first-class Golf links could be made.

In Queensland, and many parts of New South Wales, there are large flats called "Clay Pans," which are in almost every respect suited for Golf. These "Clay Pans" are in many cases five or six miles in circumference, and as smooth and level as a billiard-table.

A very wet winter, however, will inundate these flats with an inch or two of water, and play would be impracticable for perhaps a month or six weeks. But when dry a Golf ball could be driven for miles without even a stone to turn its course; and with a spade and very little trouble, bunkers could be made, and a really good course laid out.

Several stations in Riverena (New South Wales) have links, and the game is also played in the Western district of Victoria.

On "Brie Brie," a station of some 14,000 acres, about thirty miles from Hamilton (Victoria), is one of the most sporting private courses in the Colony, and a short description of these links may be interesting.

From the first tee a good drive carries a bunker and road, and lands the player on the green, and the hole is a good one in 3. The second is two full shots and approach; the green being rather small 5 is a fair hole. In this and the following hole direction is the essential point.

The third requires two full shots and an iron, a ball overrunning the green lies badly in a road, and the hole should be done in 5.

A difficult bunker has to be carried at the fourth, and a sliced ball is severely punished in dead timber. With a long brassey the player lies on a beautifully smooth plateau, in the centre of which is the green ; this is the largest and best on the course, and measures about fifty yards each way. The hole is a good one in 5.

The fifth is a short hole, and with a good drive and approach the ball lies on a pretty little green, shaded by a blackwood tree, and the hole should be done in 4.

The sixth, on a calm day, takes three full shots to reach the green, the hole being an easy one in 6.

The drive for the seventh has to carry a large water-course, and a cleek shot is required to reach the green, which lies in a bend of the water-course, and 4 is a very good hole.

A careful drive is required for the eighth, where a sliced ball gets into trouble in a small swamp, and a pulled one in rough country; a three-quarter shot with the iron reaches the pin, and the hole takes 4.

The ninth and last is the most sporting on the course. A long, straight drive pitches on the green, and the ball runs

gaily over undulating turf to the flag. The green is surrounded on all sides by hazards; beyond it is a road, to the right a bunker, and to the left of it and in front lies a small creek; the putting is perfect, and the hole is a real good one in 3, which makes "Bogey's" score 39. So far the record for the links is 40. The length of the course from start to finish is about a mile and a half to two miles round, and the links lie a mile from the Brie Brie homestead.

Were it not for the long droughts in summer, which scorch up the grass, the heavy floods in winter, which wash everything away, together with the low price of wool, which leaves the unfortunate Squatter little or no time for amusement, "Golf in the Bush," would be a still more flourishing game.

ENGLISH GOLF.

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To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—"G. G. S's." letter in your paper of the 26th instant induces me to send these lines to you. In the course of nature, my days on Golf links cannot be very many more, and being, like "G. G. S.," bound to the neighbourhood of London, I have taken opportunities of observing Golf as it is now played in the South. The only conclusion possible seems to be that English Golf is in a bad way. But some may exclaim, Look at J. H. Taylor, look at Johnnie Ball, look at H. H. Hilton, what a fine game each of them plays, not to mention others. This is not what I mean. I maintain that the spirit of English Golf is among other reasons:—

Golf is attempted to be played in many places in England on ground about as fitted for the game as a summer fallow is for a game of cricket. Hosts of Englishmen are trying to play Golf who know next to nothing of the rules of the game. I have noticed gentlemen in the South (often accompanied by dogs) engaged in playing what they would tell you was a match at Golf, whose ignorance, or neglect, of the rules and etiquette of the game was perfectly appalling. One thing they one and all seemed bent upon, and that was "keeping their score," as if the poor thing was worth committing to memory or paper. Cannot something be done to infuse a better golfing spirit into England? We are all aware that one cannot make a silk purse out of a sow's ear, or a proper Golf links out of an old park, or fields of good inland pasture, still, surely those who attempt to play a game, ought carefully to learn and observe the rules and etiquette thereot.

Perhaps the worst feature of English Golf is the host of handicap prizes offered to be played for by all the new clubs. The remedy for this would be for every club to have two or three scratch medals to be played for annually at different times of the year, and to have no club handicap list, which would, of course, mean the abolition of all handicap prizes. This remedy is a drastic one, and would probably be objected to by many. After all, however, what does winning a handicap prize mean? Either that the winner, if properly handicapped, was playing a little above his game, or, should be win, playing his usual game, that he had been overlooked by the handicappers. Further, I would venture to assert that, during the last ten or fifteen years in English Golf Clubs formed during that period, handicap prizes without number have been awarded for scores which were never really made as set down on the winners' cards, and this merely through ignorance. Possibly some of your readers could suggest something better than the above for bringing the spirit of Southern Golf more in harmony with that of the old Scottish game.

ANSWERS TO CORRESPONDENTS.

C. H. M.-(1) The gate is part of the boundary-mark, and a ball lying outside the mark has to be treated as if it lay out of bounds. It cannot be opened in order to facilitate the stroke of the player, because it is really one of the permanent fixtures of the course, and has nothing to do with what is known as material used in the upkeep of the green. If, therefore, a player's ball lies close to the gate, he may play it out as best he can, or submit to the penalty provided by the local rules, whether the ball is in a hazard or not. (2) No; he may not stand out of bounds. (3) The backward swing would count as a penalty, if, while the ball lay in a hazard, the player, in bringing back his club, touched or moved a stone near the ball. It would be just the same as if the player touched sand in a bunker with a similar movement of the club.

ARTHUR W. HUTT.—All balls must be holed out by the players themselves in competition play. In the case you mention, A must replace his ball, and hole out himself. It is, of course, otherwise in match play between individual competitors.

W. J. MACGEAGH.—(1) Yes, it may be lifted; it is not a permanent fixture on the course. (2) Yes. (3) The action is not quite in accordance with the spirit of the rules, and the player who soles his putter so far in front of the ball ought to be challenged. The rule means *immediately* in front of the ball—that is to say, almost touching the ball in front.

SUBSCRIBER.—The rule is a little rigid as it stan's The ordinary method is to allow players to send in three scores for handicapping purposes, at the times most convenient to them, previous to the competition. Having regard to the business engagements of busy men, it is not usual to tie them down to a week or a day; and the committee would be well advised to relax the rule, and to follow the prevailing practice in other clubs.

FORFARSHIRE.

C. H. Millar, 92; and Mr. Key, 94.

The monthly competition of the Montrose Ladies' Club was held on the ladies' links, on July 25th, in good weather. Ten couples started for the gold and silver medals and challenge bracelet. Miss Anna Woodward won the gold medal with a score of 107, and Miss Lily Burness the silver medal with 109. The bracelet for the lowest score in a single round was tied for by Miss Anna Woodward and Mrs. Dickson with 53. On playing off the tie, Mrs. Dickson won. The next best scores were:—Miss Watson and Mrs. Dickson, 110; Miss Jeannie Woodward and Mrs. R. H. Millar, 111; Mrs. Philippe, 113; Miss Turnbull, 118; Miss Burness and Miss Emily Burness, 119.

The monthly competition of the *Dundee Advertiser* Club took place at Monifieth on Saturday. Owing to the unfavourable nature of the weather the attendance of competitors, as well as the play, was not so good as usual. The prize-winners were :—First Class—Ist, Mr. A. Forsyth; 2nd, Mr. R. 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It is quite evident that Americans have set out with the desire as well as with the settled intention to conquer the world at Golf. With the resolute energy which characterises every scheme to which they apply their resourceful minds, the American golfers are shouting a stentorian "Fore !" to all the golfing world ; and what is more to the point, the movement within their ranks merits attention as well as hearty encouragement. In two years the United States has already outstripped "puir auld Scotland" with its 800 years of golfing effort and progress behind it ; and in the number of clubs and players it is nearly abreast of the decade of popular effort achieved by England. Both men and women have taken to the game in a spirit which it is not too much of a hyperbole to describe as one of passionate enthusiasm. Clubs are multiplying fast every week, both public and private; and wealthy landowners are laying out links in their demesne lands, as one of the inseparable amenities of civilised life. It is said, that Mr. Rudyard Kipling is one of those who intends to have a course laid out on his estate in Vermont.

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With the spread of the game in America, comes the increase in the newspaper press devoted to Golf there. Already in this short time we have two admirable monthly publications devoted exclusively to Golf. One is entitled *Golfing*, published in New York, and the other, *The Golfer*, published in Boston ; and now it is announced that a weekly paper with our own title is about to be started, with offices in New York and Boston This is progress, indeed. Not only, however, is the game being adopted by the lei-ured classes, but followers of other sports are entering the golfing ranks. Thus, according to *The Golfer*, of America, Tom Pettit, the champion professional tennis player, who beat our own tennis professional. C. Saunders, in London, a year or two ago, and who everywhere made such a favourable impression, has taken to Golf, and has been attached, with W. F. Davis, to the Newport Golf Club, Rhode Island. He is described as a very improving player, and has already made several good scores over various courses.

* *

Though America imports large quantities of clubs and Golf balls from this country, it was not to be expected that she would long continue to rest satisfied without attempting to supply the home demand with a home-made product. America is, of course, rich in all kinds of woods, and her craftsmen are notoriously ingenious and skilful. Hence it is we are not surprised to see that, in Boston, American Golf ball and club makers are at work turning out clubs and balls, and that four American rubber companies have taken up the manufacture of Golf balls. It is highly improbable that American makers will improve upon the finely-modelled club heads made by hand from the shops of Forgan, Park, Clark, Morris, and other leading makers here : but we look to America to devise machinery on the lines laid down by the Scottish Club Manufacturing Company of Edinburgh, to simplify the process of manufacture. If this should meet the eye of an Americ n club-maker, we should like him to send a specimen of his work, for criticism and comparison with our own makers' work and material. A very fine score was made in a mixed foursome competition at Minchinhampton on Saturday. Playing over the long course against Miss Woolwright and Mr. Laurence Grist, Mrs. F. J. Leslie and Mr. Charles Chamberlain holed out as follows: -Out, 5 7 5 5 4 5 5 5 6=47; in, 3 5 6 7 4 4 5 6 4=44; total, 91.

The further returns of the General Election have sealed the doom of some old Parliamentary golfers and brought others on the scene. Mr. Græme Whitelaw, a fine, vigorous left-handed player, almost at scratch, has been overwhelmed in Lanarkshire, and so has Mr. Seymour Keay, at Elgin. But among the new recruits, in addition to those we previously mentioned, the House of Commons has received a welcome addition to its golfing ranks in Mr. F. W. Fison, well known at Sandwich, Tooting, and other greens, and Mr. F. W. Wilson, an excaptain of Felixstowe, and as expert with the bow and arrow as with the Golf-club. In our columns a year or two ago will be found the record of a match in which Mr. Wilson with the bow and arrow competed against Jack White, the professional, over Felixstowe with club and ball, and won easily.

It is with great regret we notice that Sir George Newnes has been beaten by Mr. Harry McCalmont, the millionaire, in the Newmarket division of Cambridgeshire. Sir George had to fight against a great deal of unfounded slander launched against him by his political opponents. It was said that he was the enemy of sport, and that the Westminster Gazette, of which he is the proprietor, had condemned horse racing. Though it was shown that the contrary was the case, and that the Westminster had really pleaded in favour of all healthy sports against the crusade of the Anti-Gambling League, it is evident that the unjust statements served their purpose in a sporting constituency by creating a prejudice against the hon. baronet. Few men of means have done so much for Golf as Sir George Newnes. It was owing to him that the fine matches between Rolland and Tom Dunn, between Willie Park and Rolland, between Andrew Kirkaldy and Taylor, and a number of pro-fessional matches at Wimbledon and elsewhere, of lesser note, have been brought off. Indeed, it is not too much to say that it is owing to his liberality and keenness for the game that latter-day professional Golf has been maintained, not only at a high standard of wholesome purity, but at the height of its supreme excellence and finish. Sir George plays a very fair game himself, and is the most enjoyable of partners.

The August number of the English Illustrated Magazinc contains some very excellent and interesting reading. Mr. C. W. Radcliffe Cooke, M.P., imparts a contemporary flavour to the number by relating, from personal experience as a Parliamentary candidate, some "Humours of Electioneering." Mr. Max Pemberton gives us a tale of the Thames, the two characters in which are strongly delineated, but the tale ends somewhat ineptly. Mr. Grant Allen contributes one of his finely worked-out nature prose poems, and Mr. Weyman continues his dramatic narratives from the "Memoirs of a Minister of France." Mr. F. Dolman in his account of Reading and its indebtedness to Mr. George Palmer, the biscuit manufacturer, shows what energy and philanthropy may achieve for the community; while Mr. Walter Herries Pollock, in "Aix-en-Provence," gives us a modern peep of a town and a Troubadour community more picturesquely presented to us in the stirring pages of "Anne of Geierstein." The number is one to be taken with the holiday-maker in his portmanteau.

The autumn competition of the Edinburgh Institution Former Pupils' Golf Club will be held at North Berwick on Saturday, September 21st.

Golf matches the magistrates invited to the celebration dinner presented to the club 'a riddle of claret,' sending it in a riddle or sieve." This was done at Musselburgh in old times, but was it done anywhere else, and can any club say it is done now?

Messrs. Cope and Co., Liverpool, the well-known tobacco manufacturers, have issued another of their political cartoons, on which the company and their artist, Mr. J. Wallace, are heartily to be congratulated. The new picture is worthy of a place alongside of the other three that have already appeared, and been so popular with golfers. "A Lost Ball" is the title of the new cartoon, in which the Rosebery Government are seen busy hunting the missing gutta in bad country, Sir W. V. Harcourt as leader rummaging diligently in a rabbit-scrape. Of course Lord Salisbury, Mr. Balfour and party are waiting patiently on their opponents; but evidently politics do not permit of the larger charity of Golf, for the Unionists do not appear to be making any attempt to help the search, as the severest opponents in a Golf match would be willing to do for the enemy.

The Right Hon. A. J. Balfour, while continuing to deliver eloquent speeches in the evening on the political situation, all through the General Election, now closed with such a thumping majority for his party, kept up his Golf by matches played during the day. On Wednesday of last week his opponent was Mr. John Penn, M.P., who is a voter in East Lothian, being owner of a villa at North Berwick, and who had come down from London at the invitation of Unionists in Dirleton to deliver an address. Before addressing a meeting at Duns a few electors presented the honourable gentleman with a handsome Golf club. Mr. Balfour will enjoy a fortnight at his favourite game at North Berwick before the assembling of the new Parliament on August 12th. Lord Elcho, at one of the recent meetings, noted that on July 24th, Mr Balfour's birthday, Scotland had made him a handsome present in the way of giving him four seats won from the enemy.

The meeting of the Gullane Club, fixed for September 14th, has been postponed to the Saturday following, e.g., the 21st of the month. The houses at this popular watering-place are all well filled for August and September, while the new hotel, under the charge of Mr. Bisset, the proprietor, is also occupied by quite a host of distinguished visitors.

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Mr. Kekewich, who was defeated at Kirkcaldy, was one of the candidates in the recent election whose Golf was a feature of his candidature. On the town holiday, he and his opponent agreed to have an off-day, which Mr. Kekewich made a Golf day, and his play secured admiration, even from those who did not approve of his politics.

Evidently championship trophies are getting too numerous. We recently noted the failure of the Haldane cup in East Lothian, and now the cup presented by the *Dundce Evening Telegraph* for competition at Carnoustie has proved another fiasco, few distinguished names beyond that of Mr.L. Auchterlonie being found among the sixteen entrants, of whom a good many scratched before the first round came off. All this confusion in championship trophies is a proof that Golf requires a Golf Union to regulate all such matters, and bring the various counties and countries into such unity that they may work in harmony on all important occasions.

The "Golf Notes" of the *Manchester Courier* always show that the writer is a diligent student of our columns, and since he had occasion to explain to us that he was *not* Mr. Hilton, he has generally been civil, and occasionally complimentary. Last week he tried to show his "wut" at our expense by quoting a Scotch remark of a Scotch player, which appeared in our pages recently, and accusing us of putting this into the mouth of one who "is described as beingEnglish, or of the new school.' Perhaps this notes-concocting chiel might be a little more correct in his future remarks, even when he tries to be witty. The quick-smiting style has come to be called English because so many English players have adopted it, but such players have always existed in Scotland, and there are many there now. To be a golfer of the "English school," as it has been called, does not require one to be an Englishman. The man of Manchester himself is perhaps a Scot, though one of the Manchester school. Can be understand the distinction? Again, as regards our publication of snap-shot photos of the Championship meeting, let us give the Manchester man an old but useful motto—" Mind your own business."

The passion for Golf may carry its victim too far-even into jail. In Edinburgh, lately, a youth named Samuel Boe, was sent by the Sheriff three months to prison for stealing no fewer than one hundred and twenty-one Golf clubs and two Golf club-heads, from the premises of the Scottish Golf Club Manufacturing Company. Samuel was evidently a keen golfer (though his agent could not find out a reason for his conduct), and an ardent admirer of the machine-made club, but he will have three months to think over a better way of expressing his ruling passion.

The Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers are making important alterations at their club-house at Muirfield with the view of increasing the accommodation. One drawback to the perfection of the club-house has hitherto been that members could not entertain their lady friends in the club-house, but this is to be remedied, a room being provided under the alterations to which ladies in the company of members are to be admitted. The green at Muirfield is now in the very best condition, a large flock of sheep doing good service in keeping down the grass.

The Fortrose and Rosemarkie Golf Club have had a neat little club-house, with verandah, erected for the use of members. At the opening ceremony, which was performed by Miss Mackenzie, of Flowerburn, there was a very large gathering, and a series of competitions was held. Miss Fowler, of Radderty, won the ladies' medal, and Dr. M'Lean the Rosehaugh medal.
