



# PROFESSIONAL MATCHES.

TAYLOR V. HERD, AT KETTERING. (From our Special Correspondent.)

A large and interested gathering assembled at Kettering on Saturday, to witness a thirty-six-hole match between the Open Champion and A. Herd. Both players are well known everywhere for the superlative excellence of their game, and all golfers know what a keen element of interest was infused into the recent Open Championship at St. Andrews by the consistently brilliant form shown by Herd throughout all the preliminary public tournaments in Scotland previous to the decision of that great event. Herd and Taylor have only met together three times in matches-once at Sandwich, where Taylor won, the last occasion being in the summer at Cromer, where Taylor, far from well at the time, was easily defeated. On Sa'urday both men played the first round at the very top of their game all through, but towards the middle of the second round Herd fell away somewhat, sometimes in the approach, but notably on the green, with the result, that Taylor won by 2 up and I to play, thus placing to his credit two wins to one loss in his matches with Herd.

The committee of the Kettering Club are to be heartily congratulated upon the happy inspiration which led them to arrange such a match. It was worth the trouble of a long day's journey to see, and many golfers travelled from Northampton, Cambridge, Nottingham, London, and surrounding towns to witness the play. Dr. Allison, the captain, Messrs. Stringer, Mobbs, Barlow, Simmons, Saunders, and other officials of the club worked with cordial heartiness to secure the comfort of all the visitors; and in this effort they have the assurance that their labours were rewarded with success, and that their hospitality was keenly appreciated. One would like to see the public-spirited action of the Kettering committee more liberally acknowledged than it is by their fellow-townsmen in the shape of a largely increased accession of membership to the support of the club. The local Golf club ought to be supported more liberally and heartly than it is in a growing industrial town, for not only does the Golf club provide moderate, healthy recreation for all classes of the community, but it is a powerful centre for good in cultivating the most pleasing friendships and in softening and refining social asperities. The course is a very fine one in point of length of holes, variety of hazards, and good putting-greens; and both Taylor and Herd acknowledged that (as their detailed scores amply show) the green is one thoroughly calculated to test the highest capacities of the best players.

The weather on Saturday morning was wet and unpleasant; but towards eleven o'clock when the match began, the rain ceased, and the bonnie sunshine blinked with cheering gaiety among the heavy leaden clouds. The condition of the green reflected the greatest credit on the hard-working greenkeeper. Mr. A. J. Robertson acted as umpire. Herd took the honour, and led off with a good ball slightly pulled, a cross wind helping to divert the ball from the straight line. Taylor's ball went in the same direction, but as the hole (340 yards), situated close to the railway fence, was thus materially opened up, both players halved in an uneventful 5. The next two holes were also uneventful halves, in 4; but in going to the fourth hole (315 yards), with a road to carry off the tee, and another road and a brook to cross with the approach shot, Taylor fell short of the last-named obstruction. Herd, on the other hand, got a lucky fall on the road with his second shot, and lay within two club-lengths of the hole. Taylor overran the hole, and had to play 2 more, and failed to get down. Herd, who had a narrow escape for 3, got easily down in 4, and stood I up. The next two holes were halved in well-played 4's, but Herd increased his lead to two holes at the seventh (300 yards), chiefly owing to Taylor failing to get up on a soft, spongy green. The eighth hole (290 yards) was halved, somewhat indifferently, owing to difficult putting; but at the ninth (300 yards) Taylor landed a beautiful second on the green, dead at the hole, and won in 3, to Herd's 5, the last-named being too much to the left in 2, short in his third, and missing his next. Herd I up. Coming home, Taylor misjudged the distance off the tee, and, by playing a full driver shot, he got too far. His ball lay close among whins at the foot of a hedge. Herd took his brassie, and lay twenty yards short of the hazard, and a well-played iron shot landed him on the green. Taylor got his ball

well lofted out of the bad and difficult lie, but he was short with his third, and thus allowed Herd to regain his lead of 2 up. The eleventh hole (130 yards) is one of the most ticklish holes we have seen. It is closely bounded on the tee side by a hedge, the hole being within twenty yards of the hedge. Herd, in both rounds, played this hole to perfection. With the iron he lofted the ball with plenty of cut, and just carried clear of the hedge on to the green, the ball lying each time within two clublengths of the hole. Taylor also played it well, but got a little further than Herd. He lay in the rough beyond the green, and had to play back; but he secured a good half in 3. At the twelfth hole (240 yards), Herd increased his lead to 3, owing to Taylor's approach shot being brought up sharp in the soft ground, and through being short in his putt. The next hole (400 yards) was taken by Taylor in a splendid 4, and then followed three uneventful halves, leaving Herd dormy on the first round. The remaining holes were, however, played by Taylor with great dash. Herd led off to the seventeenth (240 yards) with a fine raking drive which carried over the bunker 180 yards from the tee. Taylor was short to the left, but in the odd he got well on the green, while Herd approached too strongly and considerably overran the hole. The putt was an unpleasant downhill one, and he got too far in a bold bid for the hole. Taylor got down in 4. The home hole (160 yards) is a cleek short across a road, and both men reached the edge of the green. Herd, however, failed to lay himself dead, while Taylor did, and in a good 3 to Herd's 4 the Open Champion, who had been playing an uphill game all through squared the first half of the match. The scores were:—

The second round began in bright, sunny weather, with the breeze just a trifle stronger. For the first two holes the play was even, and then Taylor, off the third tee, cut the boundary a little too fine, struck a tree, and got out of bounds. He had to pay the penalty of stroke and distance, but Herd playing safe and easy won the hole, and once again assumed the lead. The balance, however, was soon redressed, for at the next hole Taylor approached so well that he got on the green in 2, while Herd was short out of a thick, heavy lie, and the match stood all square. The next hole was noteworthy for brilliant putting on both sides, evoking a hearty cheer from the spectators. Taylor got a lead of 1 at the seventh hole, owing to Herd's slackness on the green, but the next hole saw Taylor close under the hedge off the tee, a lie from which he had to play back, and Herd was enabled to bring the match all square. Turning for home Taylor reasserted the lead by running off with the tenth hole, soon, however, to be lost at the difficult short eleventh by a perfect piece of play on the part of Herd, who just failed to hole in 2. Taylor retaliated at the twelfth by pocketing it in 3, and in a perfect 4 he increased his lead to two at the thirteenth, owing to Herd half-topping his approach and landing heavily in a whin on the edge of the green, from which he had to lift and drop behind. Herd might have reduced the Champion's lead at the remaining holes had it not been for his missing an easy putt at the fifteenth, though by holing a splendid long putt at the sixteenth he just saved the match from being finished, as Taylor was now 2 up. The Champion, dormy 2, led off with a safe shot to the left of the bunker. Herd, playing up with great spirit and boldness, hit a very sweet ball which failed, however, to carry the bunker; it lodged among divots at the top. Taylor got on the green in the odd, and Herd, notwithstanding the serious punishment of the lie, strove manfully to secure the hole by cautious play on the green. But a half in 5 left Taylor 2 up and 1 to play, the last hole being taken by the Champion in 3 to his opponent's 4.

The missed putt and the bad lie on the top of the seventeenth bunker were the turning-points of a brilliant ding-dong match. Both competitors were heartily cheered. During some informal speechmaking in front of the pavilion, Taylor expressed indebtedness for the handsome way in which Herd and he had been treated, and also for the lively interest shown by the spectators in the ups and downs of the match.

# THE CHAMPION AT KING'S NORTON.

J. H. Taylor, the Open Champion, took part on Monday, November 4th, in two competitions on the course of King's Norton Club. In the forenoon a foursome was played between Mr. S. Baldwin and the Champion on one side and Mr. J. J. Tomson and Cawsey on the other. An exceedingly interesting game was the result. A heavy fog hung over

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the ground, and the greens were stiff, and Taylor, who had not been over the course previously, did not get the distances for a time, being long in his approaches. Cawsey, on the other hand, while playing well in the open, was weak on the greens. The first nine holes finished, Mr. Tomson and Cawsey 2 up, and their score was 44 against 46 for their opponents. On the second round Mr. Baldwin and his partner made up the leeway, and the game finished all square. The figures for this round were:—Mr. Baldwin and Taylor 38; Mr. Tomson and Cawsey 40, a total for the two rounds of 84 each. The game was uncertain up to the finish. At the last hole but one Cawsey drove out of bounds, and the hole was given up, while, thanks to a beautiful approach to the last green. Mr. Baldwin and the Champion were enabled to make the game level. In the afternoon Taylor and Cawsey engaged in a match of eighteen holes. The fog, if anything, had increased, and would have given points to the much reviled Scotch mist. To make matters worse, before the first round had been completed, a drenching rain commenced to fall, and continued with irritating persistency throughout the remainder of the game. Notwithstanding this, a band of enthusiastic golfers, including several ladies, followed the match with great interest. And it says much for the sound and consistent character of the Champion's play, that, despite the adverse circumstances, he accomplished the round in 73, which, we understand, ties with the record. He was in his full play, and in the second half especially gave an exhibition in approaching which was marvellous. He was invariably on the green with his second, and in every instance sent the ball home in other 2, showing a record of nine successive 4's. Cawsey played a good game, and it is no discredit to him to be beaten by so sterling a golfer as Taylor. Taylor won by 4 holes. The scores were as follows:—

# BEN SAYERS AND A. THOMSON AT BALHAM.

(From our Special Correspondent.)

Ben Sayers travelled all the way from North Berwick last week to play a match at Balham on Saturday with his former comrade, Alex. Thomson, who left the East Coast links, about two years ago, to take charge of the green at Staines, whence he removed to Balham, at the beginning of the year, to undertake the duties of professional there, The match which was one of thirty-six holes (four rounds of the green), came off on Saturday last, and attracted a good deal of interest in the neighbourhood, the players having a large following, especially in the afternoon. Thomson has made remarkable progress as a golfer since he left his native green, and it was expected he would give a good account of bimself in his encounter with Sayers. This anticipation was to a large extent realised, and it was no discredit to the Balham professional to be beaten by an old and experienced match-player like Sayers. Thomson has an admirable style, and promises to rank some day among the foremost exponents of the game. In the early stages of the match he exhibited considerable nervousness, which, however, gradually wore off, and he played the later rounds with more confidence and precision. He excelled in the short game and on the green, his putting being remarkably firm. His familiarity with the ground gave him a distinct advantage over his opponent, and he also benefited from the circumstance of the bunkers being at a convenient distance from the tee to suit moderately long drivers like himself. Sayers was consequently placed at a disadvantage, for he had to put considerable restraint upon himself in driving some of the holes, so as to avoid being bunkered. He was not always successful in escaping the trap, and more than once got into difficulties after a splendid shot from the tee. He played the short game with his usual accuracy and judgment, and was seldom at fault on the green, getting down several long putts. The almost continuous rain of the three previous days had but the ground in a wretched condition. In some places it was little better than a quagmire, and the greens were heavy and sodden. The day, fortunately, was dry and bright.

Punctually at eleven o'clock Sayers led off with a fine drive, and was

Punctually at eleven o'clock Sayers led off with a fine drive, and was on the green in 2. Thomson got well away from the tee, but almost missed his second. On the green with his third, he took 5 to get down; and the hole was won by Sayers in 4. In driving to the second Sayers lay in a nasty rut on the edge of the bunker, and it was all he could do to get out. Thomson was well up in his second, and took the hole in 4, against 5 for Sayers. The next hole fell to the North Berwick man with a 4, his opponent taking I more. In going to the fourth, Sayers half-missed his drive, and was bunkered in the hedge about a hundred yards from the tee. He just managed to get out with his second, his third was short, and playing two more, he landed badly directly in front of an iron fence, about twenty yards to the right of the green. He took 7 to the hole,

Thomson getting down in 5. Sayers drove on to the next green with his cleek, and in putting his second, laid a stimie to Thomson, who was lying within a couple of yards of the pin with his second, but who failed to get down in 3. Sayers holed out in 3, which made him I up. Thomson missed his drive at the sixth, and took 5 to the hole, Sayers doing it in 4, making him 2 up. In going for the seventh, Thomson again foozled his drive; his second was not much better; his fourth was caught in the tree in front of the green and dropped short. Sayers, in playing his third, was also caught in the tree and fell alongside his opponent. Then Thomson laid Sayers a stimie, and the hole was halved in 6. The next was taken by Sayers in 4, Thomson driving out of bounds and giving up the hole. The ninth was halved in 4, Sayers thus being 3 up on the first round. Thomson, in the second round, ran off with the first two holes in 4; but he came to grief at the next, giving up the hole, which Sayers took in 3. The next three holes were halved—superb play on both sides, Sayers getting down an eight-yard putt. At the seventh, Sayers, in his second landed right up against the front of a wooden hut—a kind of hazard to which he is not accustomed at North Berwick—and lost a stroke in consequence, taking 6 to the hole, which was won by Thomson in 5. Sayers was now only I up; but he carried off the next two holes in 3's, making him still 3 up on the two rounds. His score for the nine holes was 36, and Thomson 37. Sayers won the first hole in the third round, making him 4 up; but he lost the next by getting into the ditch in front of the bunker with a beautiful drive. The third was halved in 4; the next was taken in 3, by Thomson, who had a very pretty ten-yard putt. Sayers din ot hole out. The fifth was also won by Thomson with a 3, Sayers missing a comparatively easy putt. The next was also captured by Thomson, Sayers being bunkered with his second and having to lift. The players were now even; but Sayers securing the seventh and inth hole

was I up on the bye, making him 5 up on the day's play.

The following are the scores, a fair allowance being made for the

holes that were not played out :-

Mr. Starkweather and Mr. Pearce officiated as referees. The match was for a purse of sovereigns subscribed by the Balham-Club, which we are glad to know is now in a flourishing condition, with a membership of close on 200. The green, if not quite one of the best in the Metropolis, is conveniently situated for City men, and affords abundant facilities for sporting Golf, which is the desideratum now-a-days. The present captain is Mr. T. G. Taylor, and the secretary, Mr. A. Cole.

# WILLIE PARK v. WILLIE FERNIE.

On November 6th Willie Park, Musselburgh, and Willie Fernie, Troon, met in a match over the Musselburgh course in the presence of a considerable crowd. Fernie had the misfortune to bunker his first drive, but he recovered well, and, playing out the hole in 4, he got a half. There was nothing exceptional about the approach to "Linkfield," and Fernie, after a long putt, won it by 4 to 5. Fernie's second shot in playing to "Forman's" was lying badly, but he recovered well, and his third only fell short of the green. Park's third landed on the green. Fernie won the hole by 5 to 6, being thus two holes up. Both men drove well to the "Sea" Hole. Park's ball just

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hopping over the dangerous bunker, and he nearly had the luck to hole out in 2, as his ball just lipped. Fernie missing a short putt, the hole was halved in 3. "Pandy" was carried in fine style by both men, and with their second shots with the cleek, they landed on the putting green. Fernie's putt rolled past the hole up a slight hill, and, rolling back, almost entered the hole. This hole was halved in 4. From Fernie's second stroke on the approach to the "Bathing-Coach" Hole, he got badly bunkered, but, lifting well, he got up to the hole. However, both of them missed short putts, and by 5 to 6 the hole went to Fernie, who was now 3 up. Both men reached the "Across" Hole in one stroke, but bad putting was again the rule, the hole ultimately falling to Fernie, making him 4 holes up. Fernie won the "Gas" Hole by 4 strokes to 5. The "Home" Hole was secured by Park. The figures for the first round were:—

There was nothing outstanding in the play to the "Graves," which Park secured in 4 against Fernie's 5, making the former now 3 behind. Park on approaching "Linkfield" was badly bunkered, but he extricated himself well, and his next shot found him in front of a dangerous bunker, which he carried well. He lost the hole, however, by bad putting. On approaching "Forman's," Fernie's ball got fixed in a rut on the edge of a bunker. Although the ball could scarcely be seen, he with his iron lifted it high, and it was a trifle annoying to see it fall into another bunker at the edge of the green after so fine a shot. Bad putting again by Park let Fernie in, and although he had the greatest difficulties to contend with, he halved the hole in 6. At the "Sea" hole it was again Fernie's luck to be bunkered, and two shots were required to get him out of the sand. He, however, halved the hole in 4. The "Table" hole was won by Fernie by 4 to 5, and the game resulted in a win for Fernie by 5 holes up and 4 to play.

Many people will regret to hear of the death of Norman, Chief of the M'Leods, which took place in Paris. He was the twenty-second scion of his surname in regular male descent from Olave Olors, who was King of Man and the Isles in 1237. He was educated at Harrow, and afterwards studied in France and Germany. By the death of his father in 1835, he succeeded to the ancient heritage in Skye (Dunvegan Castle), and during the famine of 1847-48 nearly ruined himself in succouring the poor. With characteristic determination he faced the position, entered the public service, resolved to live by his earnings and to save his patrimony from the fate which had overtaken the estates of some other gentlemen whose kindness in the bad times had gone beyond discretion. In 1852 he was appointed registrar or assistant secretary in the South Kensington Science and Art Department, and on the retirement of Sir Henry Cole, in 1873, became the head of that department. M'Leod retired from office after his first wife's death, and subsequently married Hannah, eldest daughter of Baron Ettingshausen, of Austria and Hungary, who survives him. He is succeeded by Major Macleod, C.M.G., late Captain 74th Regiment, who organised the Swazi contingent in the Zulu campaign, and he has also left two other sons surviving, viz., Reginald, who holds the office of Queen's and Lord Treasurer's Remembrancer in Edinburgh, and is married to Agnes, eldest daughter of the late Earl of Iddesleigh, and Roderick, a clergyman of the Church of

The "Royal and Ancient Game" has invaded Travancore, and has secured a patron and devotee in the Maharajah. There appears, under the head of expenditure by the Public Works Department, a sum for the improvement of His Highness's Golf course.

John Dunn, the eldest son of Tom Dunn, at Bournemouth, has just returned from a successful tour of the Dutch Golf links. He visited the Hague, Doorn, and Rozendael, and laid out a new course for the Amsterdam people at Hilversum. Some of the players in Holland are beginning to play very well. A very sporting match was played at the Hague. The Baron de Smeth and John Dunn played against the Baron de Tuyll and another John Dunn from Glasgow, professional to the Hague Golf Club. The former couple won, as the "Glasgow" Dunn was rather off his game, not having played for some time. The Hague club does not exclude strangers now, provided they have a letter of introduction from the secretary of their club. At Arnhem, John Dunn was induced to play the bagpipes, and to sing a Scotch song at a concert attended by a thousand persons. He was recalled three times with the pipes, while the piano, band, and people, joined in the chorus of the song. As he went off the stage the orchestra played the British national anthem. Both John and his brother Gourlay are pipers in the London Scottish.

It has been decided to form a Golf Club for the Maryhill district of Glasgow. Ground extending to forty acres, situated on Gilsochil Estate, has been obtained, and a nine-hole course is to be laid out. About 120 gentlemen have intimated their intention of joining. The ground for the first year is to cost £80, for the second year £90, and for the following three years £100 each.

With reference to the problem in last week's issue Mr. C. E. Nesham writes :- "My algebra is rather rusty now, but I make out that the Major was 8 up on the first round, and the Colonel 2 up on the second round.

Put x = the number of holes, Colonel H. won the first round.

Put y = the number of holes, Major P. won the first round.

Then  $\frac{x}{2}$  = the number of halved holes.

Then  $x + \frac{x}{2} + y = 18$ , the result of first round;  $2x + x + \frac{y}{2}$ = 18, the result of second round; i.e., 2x + x + 2y = 36; 4x +2 y = 6 x + y; y = 3 x; put this value of y in the first equation, and you get  $x + \frac{x}{2} + 3 x = 18$ ; *i.e.*, 2x + x + 6x = 36; 9x = 36;

Therefore the first round the Colonel won 4 holes, 2 were halved, at the Major won 12, the latter 8 up. In the second round the and the Major won 12, the latter 8 up In the second round the Colonel won 8 holes, 4 were halved, the Major won 6 = Colonel 2 up.

Mr. J. Hall, Nottingham, writes: - "Suppose the Colonel wins 'x' holes in first round: then ½ x are halved, and the Major wins 18-1½ x. In second round, the Major wins 36-3 x holes. Any value of 'x,' therefore, which is an even number, and makes 36-3 x less than 18, satisfies the conditions of the problem. There are only two such numbers, 8 and 10, and consequently two solutions :-

First round ... Colonel wins 8, halves 4; Major wins 6 Major Second round... Colonel wins 4, halves 2; Major wins 12 6 up. or,

First round ... Colonel wins 10, halves 5; Major wins 3 Col. Second round ... Colonel wins 8, halves 4; Major wins 6 9 up."

Professor Leebody, hon secretary, North-West Golf Club, Londonderry, writes:—"The reply to the question propounded in your last issue is that the Major won the match by 6 holes. The details of the two rounds were as follows :- In the first round the Colonel won 8 holes, halved 4, and lost 6. In the second round he won 4 holes, halved 2, and lost 12. This result does not depend on guess-work, but can be reached by an easy algebraic solution, which I enclose ":--

Algebra solution.—Let x = holes won by Colonel in first round; y = those won in second round.

In first round x won  $\frac{x}{2}$  halved,  $18 - \frac{3x}{2}$  lost.

In second round y won  $\frac{y}{2}$  halved  $18 - \frac{3y}{2}$  lost.

Now since  $\frac{x}{2}$  and  $\frac{y}{2}$  are integers, x and y are even integers; also

 $18 - \frac{3y}{2} = 2 (18 - \frac{3x}{2})$ ; whence  $x = 6 + \frac{y}{2}$ . Now y = 2 would not make x even, therefore y = 4 solution, when y = 4 x = 8, and thence result as stated.

Any wealthy golfer who desires a splendid historic mansionhouse, which more than once has given welcome to Royalty, and a capital Golf course in the vicinity, could not do better than take a lease of Broxmouth Park, near Dunbar, now to be let. The place was the residence of the late Dowager Duchess of Roxburghe. From the policies a private entrance opens on the Golf course, now in good condition. A plentiful crop of Golf-balls is said to be available within the grounds, as balls driven over the wall at any point are forfeited.

Golf-ball makers seem to have found out the great importance of a good mould. We have lately seen a very finished specimen of a ball made by the North British Rubber Com-pany with a new mould. Messrs. Goudie & Co., have also got what they believe to be perfection in the mould line. Messrs. John White & Co., Edinburgh, have lately put on the market a screw-press—not too expensive, by which golfers can turn out for themselves an excellent ball, the mould being such as to give the gutta the best appearance and playing power.

Mr. Hutchison, North Berwick, at the Haddington Industrial Exhibition, held last week, was awarded a certificate for the excellence of his Golf clubs. At the same exhibition Mr. J. Hutchinson obtained a diploma for photography, some of his exhibits being golfing subjects. Miss Balfour, of Whittinghame, sent for show a large collection of African curios, gathered in her travels, and Mr. Hope, of Luffness, contributed an assortment of Algerian work.

Mr. Charles Anderson, of Fettykil, the well-known golfer, headed the poll in the municipal election for the burgh of Leslie.

At the sale of the library of the late Professor Blackie, in Dowell's Rooms, last week, the "Inventories of Mary Queen of Scots," a curious volume, from several entries in which it is proved that the unfortunate Queen was addicted to Golf ("out of season" betimes, as immediately after the death of Darnley), sold for £2 14s.

The Manchester Courier's Golf mentor, discussing the best six Scottish and English greens for a thorough test of play, at the present time, puts the following down for Scotland in their order, namely—St. Andrew's, Prestwick, North Berwick, Machrihanish, The Braids and Troon. For England he says he would choose Hoylake and Westward Ho! while Sandwich, Blackheath, and St. Anne's might be three of the others, but it would be difficult to mention another without invidious distinction. In the Scotch list we should say the three last-named will find a good many opposed to them if a vote were taken as between them, and say Dornoch, Nairn, Carnoustie, Islay, New Luffness and Dunbar.

Mr. A. Bernard, who is butler to Mr. John Penn, M.P., at present tenant of the mansion and shootings of Archerfield, was the winner of the Bass Rock Club handicap trophy in the last monthly competition. His gross score was 98, a very creditable performance for one who has reached three score and ten, and was late in beginning the game; and it may be noted that this is only six strokes behind the score with which Mr.

In reply to Mr. Anderson's recent inquiry anent "Land Reclamation," a correspondent says:—"Unquestionably a large amount of ground might be recovered from the sea for the enlargement of Musselburgh Links by the judicious use of groins, in the same way as is done on the South Coast of England and the North Coast of France. Groins are made of wood (stakes and planks). A large amount of débris appears to be brought by the tide from the mouth of the river Esk, and seems to be carried from west to east. If this were stopped at several places by the groins, the ground would gradually rise."

Mr. T. Lorimer Campbell, a youth still in his teens, made an 80 over North Berwick course last week, playing a three-ball match with Mr. J. H. Hutchison and Mr. A. Hogg.

With reference to the notice of "The Roughener" in last week's issue, Mr. George Hunter, its inventor, should have been described as captain (not ex-captain) of the Richmond County Country Club, U.S.A. Though at present resident in America, Mr. Hunter is a golfer from Scotland.

A, however, maintained that he was in order, since, under Rule XXXIX, "penalty" strokes do not alter the rotation of play, and that the loss of the stroke for moving, or "penalty" of a stroke, as Rule XXV. Puts it did not alter his turn to play.

Query-Who was right?

# RECLAIMING LAND FROM THE SEA.

# To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—In reply to Mr. Anderson's letter in last week's GOLF, it is not easy within the compass of a letter fully to answer the questions he propounds.

In the reclamation of land from the sea two essentials must always be present (1), a good rise and fall of the tidal water; (2), thick, muddy water containing a large proportion of silt or mud. In other words, in order to obtain the necessary deposit there must be present a "warpy" situation. The operations to be gone through are too intricate to be described at length

here, but the desired end is attained by means of faggots or fascines implanted in the sand firmly enough to hold, and these are extended seaward as the deposit increases. In a short time vegetation commences, and, subsequently, when sufficient land has been reclaimed, a bank is erected to keep out the tidal waters. This bank has to be of sufficient strength, varying from 90 to 100 feet at its base, and in height 12 to 16 feet.

So much depends upon the locality, strength of tide, and nature of work required that no estimate of the expense can be formed without a personal inspection of the locus in quo. But in the neighbourhood from which I write several thousands of acres have been, and are being, successfully reclaimed from the sea. The neighbourhood of the Wash, notably its foreshores between the rivers Ouse and Witham, east of King's Lynn and Sutton Bridge, is the centre in which works of reclamation have been in progress for years. Within three miles of Sutton Bridge a very fine piece of land has been enclosed within the last few years.

If Mr. Anderson will communicate with me I can give him the name of a gentleman possessing great experience in reclamation works who would be pleased to advise him upon the steps to be taken.



# SEATON CAREW GOLF LINKS.

SEATON CAREW is an unassuming watering-place in Durham, with a wide stretch of sand affording admirable bathing and boating facilities. It is about two miles south of West Hartlepool and is on the Stockton and Hartlepool branch of the North-Eastern Railway. At a little greater distance south is the borough of Middlesborough, a big industrial centre, of mushroom growth. In this thriving borough lived in the early seventies a genial doctor, with the fine Scotch name of McCuaig, who appears to have been looking out for a suitable place to play his beloved game of Golf. By the shore of the German ocean, at Seaton Carew, he found a most desirable spot. Here was a fine stretch of lovely turf by the sea-coast, with an abundance of sand bunkers and other natural hazards, such as delighted the heart of this enthusiastic follower of the

Starting at the medal tee, to the right of the club-house, a good drive towards a shepherd's cottage in front, brings the player within ten or fifteen yards of a pond a little to the right of the line. The second shot, a cleek or brassey, carries to the edge of a somewhat difficult bunker, which is a great trouble when the player is not in good form. Many a good round is spoiled by the player getting into this bunker. A well-directed iron shot should carry on to the green, leaving a margin of 2 strokes to hole out in a good score of 5; 6 is not bad play. The second green is plainly seen from the tee, and requires a drive and a cleek or brassey according to the wind. If the player gets too far to the right he finds himself in difficult ground, and the same remark applies if he overruns the green into the rushes beyond. With good play the hole should be taken in 4 or 5. Going for the third green the player keeps to the right, driving towards a bunker protecting the green. A topped ball is punished by rough ground before the tee, but a


Royal and Ancient Game. Dr. McCuaig, who was in his day a St. Andrews medallist, called to his aid Mr. E. D. Prothero the well-known scratch player, of Troon, who was then residing in this neighbourhood-Mr. R. T. Thompson, and a few other enthusiasts, and a club was formed in those far off days, as Golfing history in England goes, of 1874. A fourteen-hole course was promptly laid out, and this sufficed, so well was the work done under the advice of Dr. McCuaig, for about seven-teen years. On the first of August, 1891, however, a full course of eighteen holes, laid out by the Green Committee and the professional, J. Kay, was opened with a due flourish of trumpets. It will, be seen that the Seaton Carew Golf Club has attained its majority, and it is certainly correct to say that it is now in the full vigour of manhood and promises to attain a very respectable and honourable old age. At first the head-quarters of the club were at a hotel not far from the links, but since then an elegant club-house has been erected, which last year was considerably enlarged, until now excellent and abundant accommodation is provided for golfers of both sexes. There is ample and good accommodation for visitors in the town, and the links, of which it may be said that the better they are known the more they will be appreciated, are within a quarter of an hour's walk from the railway station.

clean stroke meets with a good lie. The next difficulty is a low bunker stretching between the player and the green. Safely over this, he should be down in 4. The fourth or "Battery hole is of a very sporting character; the green lies on a kind of plateau about 190 yards from the tee. From a good drive the ball should land on the side of the bank, and a possible 3 may reward the dashing golfer; 4, however, is much more often the score, the pitch to the hole with the iron being the deciding factor. Should the drive be short, serious difficulties will be met with in a ditch or long grass, and the approach must be negotiated with very great care or the ball will run gaily over the opposite bank. Although not a long hole it requires a good deal of judgment to play it accurately. from the "Battery" the fifth hole lies in a south-easterly direction. If the player were to go as the crow flies the chances are that the best of drives would be severely punished in the long rushes. The play is to drive in an easterly direction, in which case a good lie is obtained near the green for a brassey or cleek in the second. If the ball is topped the player will find himself, to his intense disgust, among a lot of large thick rushes; it requires a good drive to get over this stuff. par play for this fifth hole, which is a sort of pons asinorum. At the sixth or "Railings" hole the hazards for the drive

consist of a pond nearly in front of the tee, and some very long and irritating rushes. Again the player has to drive in a south-easterly direction, somewhat off the line, but such a shot is rewarded with a good lie, and a successful stroke with the brassey brings the ball within a short iron shot of the green. This green demands delicate play, as it slopes somewhat towards the southern end, and the golfer may congratulate himself if he holes out in 5; the figure is more often 6.

At the "Railings" a shelter is erected which is very useful in stormy weather, the situation of course being a very open one. The tee for the seventh is put far back to the right. Again the player has to diverge from a straight line, which is over the shelter just mentioned. After a well-directed iron shot the hole should be secured in 4. Starting for the eighth hole, the player has on his right hand rushes, and on his left a sand bunker, while between him and the hole is a cart road. A long and straight drive, however, should leave but an iron shot for the green, and with good luck he should again be down in 4. This green is a particularly fine one, and perfect of its kind. The far hole, one of the most interesting on the outward journey, is of such a sporting nature that the "Colonel" is allowed 6 for it. A straight drive in a direct line is not certain of a good lie,

iron, and holing out in 4 should be quite possible. The tee for the twelfth, one of the longest holes of the course, is placed well to the right, and the player again has intervening bunkers and railings to carry, which cause trepidation in the mind of the indifferent player. A good straight shot, however, reaches safe ground, and a succeeding long and true brassey should once more leave but an iron shot to find the green. The course at this part is somewhat narrow, and if the driving is not true it is severely punished by bunkers to the right, or rushes to the left. Yawning bunkers and rushes again face the player as he starts for the thirteenth hole, but a long and powerful driver will be gratified by finding the ball on a lovely disused green. The obstacles in the way, however, are of such a formidable character, that the majority of gollers think it no indignity to take a line well to the left. The green is protected by a very insidious little bunker, which, unless the ball is well lofted, is a certain trap. To reach the fourteenth or "Pond" hole, the player descends into a little valley, and must nerve himself for a long shot if he wishes to play this hole in the par score. If he is far and sure, he will find the ball within a good brassey shot of the green, but woe betide him if he misses. A series of awkward bunkers lie in his course, and on his left hand is a pond, the sea being on the right. What it may take him if he

but the player may get round a formidable bunker, lying in front of the green, if he once more takes a south-easterly direction. If he can, as some clever brassey players can, be sure of a long and high carry with little run, he may find himself on the green, but with an ordinary run the ball would be over the green into bad ground. The golfer who is playing for safety, rather than brilliance, goes round the bunker at the loss of a stroke. Here two greens have been amalgamated, making an unusually large and fine one.

Turning homewards, we find the tees are placed well to the right, closely adjoining the sandbanks near to the sea shore. The difficulties of the player in going in, consist chiefly, therefore, in keeping out of the very numerous bunkers which face him all the way. The first tee shot should leave a brassey or cleek stroke over a wide intervening bunker, and this successfully negotiated, the player should be on the green or thereabouts. A very long brassey would place the player in inextricable difficulties, as the green borders upon a deep bunker. From a good approach, the hole may be taken in 5, if not in 4. Playing for the eleventh, the long driver may succeed in carrying two bunkers that lie tantalisingly in the way, but the pawky player will go towards the left. In either case the green may be reached in the second, with cleek or

does not surmount all these difficulties, it would be rash to guess, but if he does succeed he should be on the green, which is somewhat raised, and then he should be down in 4 or 5, The fifteenth hole is the most noted and sporting hole of the course. It is named "The Doctor," in commemoration of good Dr. McCuaig, who some time ago-rest his soul !- putted out on the last earthly green. The tee and the green of the fifteenth hole are on about the same level, but between the two is a gaping bunker, some 160 yards in length. The green lies just on the further side of this gap. Once safely over, the hole should be secured in 3, or at most in 4, but the penalties to the short driver who attempts the heroic accomplishment and fails, are terrible to contemplate. He has the option, however, of going to the left and creeping round, in which case he may still be fortunate enough to take the hole in 4. In playing for the sixteenth, if one or two narrow bunkers on the seashore are avoided, the decent player should find himself on the green in a second from cleek or brassey, and should take the hole in 4 or 5. The seventeenth is a ticklish one. In front of the tee is the shepherd's cottage, which only a Ball or a Rolland can safely attempt to carry from the long tee. The feat is seldom attempted by the professional or any of the local players. The guarding of the

windows of this cottage with wire netting is a tell-tale indication of the danger attaching to the attempt to carry it. On one occasion, it is related, two balls passed successively through one hole made in one of the cottage windows.

Fortunately the inmates were not injured, but it was thought the time had come when some protection should be offered to them stronger than a sheet of thin glass. Playing to the left of the building, a good tee shot should leave an easy iron

The player who is at all nervous may again resort to pawky play, but if he does he will find the approaches rather difficult. Four is the par play for this hole, and 86 is the "Bogey" round of a none too easy course of some 5,000 yards length.

The club can boast a number of good players. First and

H. G. B. Ellis, scratch at Oxford, and Mr. F. T. Ridley, of Newcastle, are also strong players who are members of the club. A local player, Mr. J. Robson, has come rapidly to the front, and his handicap is now only one above scratch. One of the most brilliantly successful members has been Mr. G. Pyman, who last year carried off the club cup with a net score of 82 in the final round, his handicap being then 6. This cup is played for on the third Saturday of each month from January

to September, the monthly winners playing off. Mr. Pyman has since added to his laurels this year by playing the best round by 3 strokes that has ever been played in any of the competitions of the club. The occasion was the first competition for the Mayor's Medal, played for on the 7th September, when he went round in the fine score of 78, the details of which are as follows:—Out, 6 4 4 4 4 5 3 4 4=38; in, 4 5 5 6 4 3 5 4 4=40; total, 78. Mr. "Raps" having won the Gray trophy-the gift of the president, Major M. Graybecame the absolute possessor of the prize, and the president has generously provided a duplicate to be played for under the same conditions.

The club has in J. Kay a clever professional and a good clubmaker, who made his first efforts at Golf under the famous Willie Dunn. Kay has distinguished himself in many rôles. He has been a noted swimmer and a foot-racer, and has displayed his ability in various other departments of athletics, and maddition, has served his Queen and country for twelve years. But for this break in his golfing career he thinks he would have attained an even greater position in the ranks of professional golfers than he has done; but he has achieved some excellent things, nevertheless. In the Open Chumpionship of 1892, when Mr. Harold Hilton won with a score of 305, Kay was only seven strokes behind, and he has, on several occasions, occupied an enviable position among the prize-winners at the Championship meetings. Kay takes great care of the Seaton Carew links, of which he holds the record with a phenomenal round of 68.

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
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
