FERNIE ON THE "SCIENCE OF GOLF."

Willie Fernie, of Troon, one of the finest professional players, came to London last week on a short visit primarily with the object of teaching the theories connected with the attainment of a perfect swing. He paid us the compliment to call at GOLF and to explain in the course of a short interview what he had been doing in Scotland to initiate golfers in the home of the game itself into the true principles underlying a correct, full, easy swing of the club. It seems that nearly a thousand golfers of all stages of progress in the game, including even the Amateur Champion, have received instruction from him, or have consulted him with the object of redressing some slight, unexplained defects of their style of swinging the club. Like all players, good, bad, or indifferent, Fernie himself had periods of play when there was a distinct deterioration in the quality of his game. Occasionally he sliced his balls, and occasionally he pulled them, oftentimes he topped them, and frequently he was so uncertain that he could not be sure whether the ball was likely to go to cover point or square leg. This experience was a depressing one to a player of his calibre, who any day was likely to be challenged for a £100 match; and Fernie, with the true resourcefulness of a golfing genius, set himself with laborious minuteness to the task of analysing his own swing, and of trying to find out the cause of its radical defects. Being an expert in the use of Indian clubs, and what may be described as a really admirable ambidextrous golfer, he set himself to test first the swing with the left hand, and then with the right, until he succeeded in localising the flaws, and in curing them. By this means he was enabled to return more speedily than he otherwise would have done to his previous sound and high-class style of play. He has been working at his theories for years, but he has only been enabled to complete them in their present scope, and finish about three months ago. Since this time he has been giving instruction to golfers in Edinburgh and Glasgow during the past three months, and the applications for instruction in the North have been so numerous that Fernie was not able, owing to his other engagements, to fulfil all the demands made upon him.

The basis of Fernie's theory is that any golfer who wishes to play a sound game, and attain with speed scratch form, must set out by first of all mastering the rudimentary conditions attaching to the stance and the swing of the club. In this he is undoubtedly right, and it was a fact which was abundantly impressed upon the attention of our readers by "Coach" in the series of admirable articles published in these columns. Fernie places the pupil before him, and asks him to swing the club (a walking stick will do) in his ordinary playing style. His practised eye at once detects the fact that the club head is neither travelling in its correct position, nor in its true orbit. The head of the club is turned up or face down; the player does not turn on his toes, or he draws his body back from the ball. Fernie shows in one or two slow movements of the club how the head of the driver ought to describe the circle, and when the player sees how easy the defect is cured, he sallies forth to the tee and drives a ball with a swing quite a fourth fuller than his previous swing, more easily, and with less physical effort. The cure generally leads to a rearrangement of the hands and grip, as well as the stance, which it only needs a little patient practice to consolidate into the player's natural style. Fernie, in short, analyses every player's swing bit by bit, and imparts to each defect the required remedy.

We had the pleasure of witnessing three illustrations of cure thus effected. One was a player who had played for quite twenty-five years, and was near scratch form. Fernie commended the general excellence of his game in every department except the swing, which he asserted was defective. he proved to be the case by the above analysis later on. In bringing back the club to the top of the swing, the hands were held in a wrong position, as shown by the position of the club head at the top of the stroke. Fernie showed how the club head ought to travel, and when the point was seized, and the remedy applied later on through the green and off the tee, the results were startling in their efficacy. A second player had a fine,

full swing which Fernie admitted he could not improve, but he pointed out that this player did not turn on his toes, thereby curtailing the length of his shots, and leading to frequent topping. This was true, and to this player Fernie recommended the practice of what is known as the second exercise of physical drill. Yet a third player with a fine swing appeared, but Fernie at once detected a defect, and though he had never seen the gentleman play, he said, "You slice your balls." This also was true, and here again the remedy was taught with completely satisfactory results.

Those are three illustrations which came within our personal observation, and there are hundreds to the same effect. Fernie, during the past week, has been busy with classes at Wimbledon, and the golfers of the Royal Wimbledon and the London Scottish Clubs are intensely interested in Fernie's theories and the efficacy of his cures. Fernie has been a leading player in the best professional Golf for twenty-five years; he has been Open Champion, and he knows his subject thoroughly. He imparts his instruction forcibly, and with an amusing, pungent, running fire of commentary and illustration. He prefers to teach in classes of ten or twenty players, and we recommend ladies or gentlemen golfers who wish to receive any of his valuable hints to communicate with him at the Dog and Fox Hotel, Wimbledon. His stay in the South closes at the end of February.

On the motion of the chairman, seconded by Mr. A. B. Wykes, the report and balance-sheet were received and adopted.

The report showed that the roll of membership for the year 1803 was

The report showed that the roll of membership for the year 1893 was 84; for the year 1894, 129; for the year 1895 it has been 166, 37 more than in 1894, and 82 more than in 1893. Of these 166 members. 105 have been resident playing-members as against 79 in the previous year, 38 were ladies, and the remaining 23 were non-resident and non-playing members.

The year commenced with a deficiency of £114 on the revenue account, and £191 on the club-house account, making a total debt of £305. It ended with a deficiency of about £9 on the revenue account, and £134 on the club-house account, making a total debt of £143 only, a reduction of £162. This satisfactory result is due mainly to a considerable increase in the revenue, which has risen from £180 in 1893, and £220 in 1894, to about £360. The expenditure, on the other hand, was £37 less than in 1894, being about £255 as against £292 in the previous year. The links have been open for play during the whole of the past year, a good course having been kept well mown and rolled throughout

On the motion of Mr. C. J. Billson, seconded by Mr. W. Whetstone, revised code of rules was passed in substitution for those hitherto in force; the number of resident playing members being limited to 125, the entrance-fee being fixed at £3 3s., the charges for visitors introduced by members being fixed at 5s. a week, or 2s. 6d. a day, and other

alterations being made.

After the usual vote of thanks to the retiring officers of the club, the meeting proceeded to elect officers and council for the coming year, with the following results :- Patron, the Marquis of Granby ; president, Mr. J. DEATH OF A WIMBLEDON GOLFER.

We record with regret the death of Mr. Arthur Adams, a player well known at Wimbledon and other Metropolitan greens. He was born in 1849, and died on the 4th inst. Educated at Forest School, Walthamstow, and at Berlin, he was in his youth a good football player, and a runner at a hund ed yards. With his eldest brother, Mr. J. Franklin-Adams, he was a member of the Cruising Club, the qualification for which body was a thousand miles cruising. Mr. Adams early developed a great fondness for sport, and his services were often called into requisition as starter or judge. He began to play Golf in 1885 while staying with his brother in Scotland, and in subsequent years he did a great d-al to popularise and spread the game. He was a member of the Wimbledon Ladies' Golf Club committee, his brother, Mr. Franklin-Adams, being secretary, when that influential ladies' club was founded. The Ladies' Golf Union, in its early stages, owed a great deal to the efforts and advocacy of Mr. Adams, and a great deal of the success attending the Union's last two meetings was due to his management and tact. One of the great proposals which he strenuously advocated in the meetings of the Union was one whereby all the best lady players should not be drawn in a bunch in the first half of the draw. The Rane agh Club also found the services of Mr. Adams very valuable in connection with organisation and other golfing matters. Mr. Adams leaves a widow and three children, the youngest of whom is a Queen's Scholar at Westminster.

A PLEA FOR A BRITISH GOLF UNION.

Under this heading the Spirit of the Times, the leading or an on Sport in America, says :- "The game of Golf at one time was a branch of sport confined almost entirely to Scotland, but that condition of affairs no longer exists. The game to-day is almost universal. As long as it was confined to the narrow limits of Scotland there was no necessity for a Union. The parent body, the St. Andrews Golf Club, was fully capable of dealing with all questions. However, with a broader field, new complications have arisen, and there is a growing demand for a Union which shall have supervision of the game, and take such action as is deemed necessary for the furtherance and perpetuation of the Royal and Ancient Game. Not that any very radical changes are needed in the rules. The regulations in force at St. Andrews are in the main adopted by every Golf club that is organised, but some minor changes are required in order to cover new points which have arisen, owing to the same having been taken up in other fields. The editor of GOLF has been besieged with questions relative to the interpretation of the rules. He has, however, explained the mooted questions in accordance with the letter of the law, but this interpretation has not always proved satisfactory to those by whom the questions were propounded. The rules as they now stand are not always sufficiently lucid and comprehensive to the lay reader, though the expert, by careful study, may arrive at a correct interpretation.

"If a Golf Union were formed, these questions could be discussed, and

many beneficial changes could be made.

"In a recent number of GOLF, Mr. Ernest Lehmann editorially presents his plea for a Union. He recognizes the fact that Englishmen as a class are opposed to radical changes, preferring to honour old tradi-tions and customs. He proposes that the delegates of the Royal and Ancient, the Honourable Company, the Prestwick, Royal Liverpool, and St. George's Clubs, under whose auspices the Amateur Champion-chies are held, chould at their records. ships are held, should at their annual meetings be empowered to take the rules into their consideration, to revise them when necessary, and to examine any questions submitted to them by committees of other clubs, and disputes arising out of discussions on any of the rules brought

up by cases arising from actual play.

"This plan seems feasible, and in this way a governing body could be secured with very little friction, and with a minimum of inconvenience. It would also represent the best elements in the Scottish and English golfing communities, and these delegates could in safety be entrusted with the task of preserving the best traditions of the game, and with adding whatever might be considered necessary to the rules. If this Union is formed, reciprocal relations should at once be arranged between it and the United States Golf Association."

WANTED, A GOLF UNION?

HE Field, of February 1st, had a very judicious and well-informed leading article on the need of a Golfing Association. It is well-informed, because it recognises the peculiar difficulty which besets the formation of such an association, much as it may be needed in the case of Golf; and it is judicious, because it refrains from the suggestion of any wild-cat scheme which might be alluring, but would be of more than doubtful value.

The difficulty under which Golf labours in this respect is due to the kind of tug of war which is kept up between England's desire for an Association, on the one hand, and Scotland's dislike to the proposal and jealousy of it, on the other. Both feelings are very natural. As the Field leader writer points out, there exists no body, having authority, to whom vexed questions of the rules may be submitted, and such vexed questions exist in numbers. It is quite true, no doubt, that for a game that presents the immense variety of incident and accident inseparable from Golf, a code that would cover all possible cases would be perhaps prohibitively voluminous; but if such a body, having authority, as the suggested Association were in existence, the answers given by that body, to the questions submitted, would go to form a code which in course of time might come to be practically all-inclusive. As it is, there is no such body, and no authoritative answer is ever given; the vexed question remains as vexatious as ever unto the end. At the same time, although an all-embracing code of rules might be impossibly bulky, there are certain points on which no legislation has been passed, and which a very few words would clear up. instance, no one knows what is to be done in the case of a ball within six inches of another on the course being lifted, and a large divot being cut out by the first player. Should the opponent's ball be replaced in the hole cut out, or should the divot be first replaced, if it happen to be re placeable? No one knows. You may argue it, as you please, on grounds of equity: the law is silent on the

The other main business of the Association, according to the proposal of the writer in the Field, which he quotes from the excellent article of constitution of the American Golf Association, would be "to decide on what links the Amateur, Open, and Women's Championships shall be played." We may, for the present, leave on one side the question of the last-named Championship, merely recording the observation that in all probability the women will always prefer to settle it for themselves, as they have shown themselves, in fact, quite capable of doing in the past. But, taking the other part of the suggestion into consideration, we see at once to what jealousies and heart-burnings the institution of an Association in Great Britain would be likely to lead as soon as ever it set its hand to any such work. The settlement of the arena for the Open Championship has always been in Scottish hands—in the hands of the clubs who subscribed for the Championship cup. In the jealousy and mistrust which the Scottish golfers not unnaturally feel towards Englishmen who would wish to tell them they are to do about their own national game, it is most unlikely that they would readily pass over these arrangements into English hands; and their reluctance would be amply justified by the very solid reason that the cup is, in fact, their property. Moreover, they have given every evidence of a wish to act liberally in the matter of the Open Championship, by allowing it to be played at Sandwich, and, prospectively, in 1897, at Hoylake. The

arrangements for the Amateur Championship are conducted by a more generally representative body; and the very best of reasons against interference with either managing body is, that their management seems, on the whole, remarkably satisfactory. It may not be theoretically the best possible, but it works well; and that, after all, is everything. The writer in the *Field* observes that it is unfair that so immense an amount of work should be put on the executive of any club as is entailed by the playing of either Championship on that club's green; but, though this is true enough, it is no less true that, in every case, this extra work is most cheerfully undertaken. All clubs are desirous of having the Championship played on their greens; and certainly they would much prefer that their own executive had the trouble than that the competition should be conducted and arranged

by any outside body.

But yet there unquestionably does exist in England a very wide-spread wish that some association could be formed, not so much for the management of these great meetings, which are already managed so well, but as a source of definite decision as to the rules and their interpretation. If such an Association could be formed, with the consensus, fairly unanimous, of all the leading clubs in Great Britain, there is little doubt that it would be a great blessing. But, if this consensus were not obtained, it is more than likely that it would be a big curse. And it seems very probable indeed that the leading Scottish clubs-especially the Royal and Ancient, which is the leader of leaders-would stand outside it. No doubt there are difficulties of detail—as to the election and meetings of the members of the Association-but they might, conceivably, be overcome. But if the golfing world were to be split up, by any injudicious and immature efforts in this direction, into two camps, the one following the ruling of St. Andrews, and the other that of the Association, it would be a misfortune, and would make our Golf less pleasant. So that the main question seems to be whether the time is yet ripe for such an innovation: whether the views of English golfers and of certain large-minded Scotsmen have so far infiltrated into the Royal and Ancient Club-shocking notion to the mind of the old golfing Tory !- that it would be content to take its part, the leading part, in a General Golfing Association. Before wise action could be taken in the direction of forming any such Association, the feeling of St. Andrews in the matter ought be gauged, for most of the Scottish Clubs would probably feel bound by St. Andrews' action. It is almost certain that the feeling of the Royal and Ancient Club is changing-it is scarcely to be conceived that any member of the club to-day could get up in a general meeting, when the proposals of a sub-committee were being discussed on some points of rules which had been submitted for their revision, and gravely propose that "The subcommittee should be thanked for its trouble, and its report put into the fire." But there is a wide gulf between the frame of mind which that suggestion indicates, and the disposition which would look with favour on the formation of a Golfing Association; and there is a good deal of reason to doubt whether that gulf has yet been spanned.

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We have just had a private view at the studio of Messrs. Dickinson and Foster, New Bond Street, of the completed oil portrait of old Tom Morris. The figure of old Tom is life size, the whole canvas being seven feet high. In its handsome frame the picture is really a beautiful piece of portraiture, and the likeness of old Tom is a "speaking one." He stands in the familiar attitude that those who know him are accustomed to see him adopt in familiar conversation at the home hole at St. Andrews. The pipe is in his left hand, and he has just taken it out of his mouth preparatory to uttering some of his sententiou sayings. In his right hand he holds a Golf ball, while in the background is to be seen the Royal and Ancient Club-house with players preparing to tee off. On the right of the picture is a couple shown holing out. The bronzed face is depicted with marvellous accuracy, and the artist has succeeded beyond cavil in catching the genial expression of frank benevolence which is such a fine trait of the old golfer's character.

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We do not know the destination of the portrait as yet, but it is undoubtedly one to be secured by the Royal and Ancient as a pendant portrait to Mr. Whyte Melville for the club-house That is its true destination, not only as a piece of fine golfing portraiture, but as a lasting memorial of one who has done so much during his long and honourable career to make St. Andrews and the game we all love and cherish famous in all corners of the globe. Among those who saw the portrait on Saturday were the Prince of Wales and Lord Colville of Culross, who accompanied His Royal Highness. The Prince was charmed with the portrait, and Lord Colville, who knows Old Tom intimately, was enthusiastic in his praises of it. In the meantime Messrs. Dickinson & Foster intend to publish small reproductions of the portrait for the benefit of golfers generally; and it is to be hoped that many applications will be sent in. There will be twenty-five remarque copies at £5 5s., others at £3 3s., £2 2s., and £1 1s. It ought to form a decoration in every Golf club.

James Braid, who played so well against Taylor at West Drayton a short time ago, has been appointed professional to the Romford Gelf Club. C. R. Smith, the foreman at the Army and Navy Stores, has got the situation as professional to the Hastings Club, and goes there in a fortnight. Braid will stay there till his time is up for Romford. Braid has been asked by the Crowborough Club to play a match with Rawlins, the American Champion, on March 7th.

Mr. C. G. Broadwood, whilst playing a match over the Scarborough Links with Mr. Johnston, of Whitby, broke his own and all previous records, both professional and amateur, by going round in the following score:—Out, 8 4 3 4 4 3 4 4 6=40; In, 4 3 5 3 4 3 4 2 4=32; total, 72. The first hole is an easy 5, and the high figure was caused by the ball lying in an impossible place.

Messrs. G. W. Bacon & Co., 127, Strand, have brought out an ingenious and somewhat difficult game of Table Golf. It is enclosed in a small box, about the length of a stimie, and consists of a green strip of raised cardboard, fixed in the lower half of the box. This green piece represents the Golf course, and it is cut out into a series of sinuous folds, with the tee at one end and the hole at the other. The object is to get a small wooden ball, about the size of a marble, from the tee, up and down the narrow, sinuous folds representing the Golf course, until it is lodged in the hole. Every time the ball goes off the green strip on to the brown the ball counts as bunkered, and each attempt to reach the hole a stroke. It is a very interesting puzzle with which to while away the tedium of a spare hour.

* * *

In Fernie's opinion Taylor's style of play, taken all through, varies less than any other professional's he has known. The secret of this unvarying uniformity and excellence he believes to result from the interlocked grip of both hands on the leather of the club. Taylor's grip is, so to say, the wield of the club by one massive hand instead of two separate hands. The disposition of the right hand to work against the left, or vice versa, causing slicing or pulling, is therefore eliminated in Taylor's play; and hence the Champion's consistent accuracy and high standard of form throughout his matches and competitions.

"Inspiration of genius" is the terse description which Fernie gives of Taylor's style. The Troon professional acknowledges that Taylor's methods have afforded him interesting material for study and reflection, and that in the lessons which he is now giving with so much acceptance to Southern golfers, some useful hints have been derived from the Champion's general method of address, stance and swing. Fernie has played off the left leg like Mr. Laidlay, off the right like Taylor, after Jamie Anderson's model, and with the ball midway between the fork of the legs; but to-day he says that he prefers to play with the ball three or four inches to the right of the left heel.

* * *

The annual general meeting of the Eltham Ladies' Golf Club was held at the club-house on February 5th, and was fairly well attended. The chair was taken by Mr. R. Hedderwick, captain of the Eltham Golf Club, who opened the meeting, by expressing his pleasure that Mrs. Lord had consented to be re-elected president. He also said that he felt sure the members would be sorry to hear that Mrs. Brown was unable to continue her work as secretary. Mrs. Lord was then unanimously re-elected president, and Miss Richardson was elected to take Mrs. Brown's place as secretary. Mrs. Mitchell and Mrs. Tasker were elected to fill the two vacancies made on the committee by the retirement of Mrs. Hedderwick and Mrs. Johnston. At the close of the meeting votes of thanks were passed to Mrs. Lord and Mrs. Brown for their work in the past, also to Mr. Hedderwick, chairman, and to Mr. Collingwood, secretary of the Eltham Golf Club.

It is sincerely to be hoped that that a rattling good contest between English and Scottish amateurs will be made a feature of the Championship meeting at Sandwich in May. It is the especial interest of Scotland to have such an international contest brought off. Two or three Englishmen have brought to England a large share of the glory of the Championship, and it is said in mitigation of the fact that they are exceptional players, but that if a dozen representatives from each side had to enter into an international contest, Scotland would come off with flying colours. The sooner this is tested the better. Anyway, the battle would be quite as interesting as the single-handed struggle for the blue riband.

Of one thing, we may be sure, that most of the entrants for the Championship will be found in good form. The winter has been so remarkably mild and open that it can scarcely be said we have had winter weather at all. Golf has therefore not been hindered, and with so much practice the old hands will be prepared for the fray, and many new Richmonds will be in the field.

"The best of players has something to learn," is a maxim as true of Golf as of anything else—perhaps it is more applicable to Golf than anything else. The Amateur Champion seems to be a believer in the maxim, for report says that he has been taking instructions from Willie Fernie during the visit paid lately by the Troon professional to Edinburgh.

Sir Thomas D. Gibson-Carmichael contributes to the Edinburgh Evening Dispatch, of January 31st, a drawing from a missal of 1504, which represents a game with club and ball, which he says is the game of chole, or perhaps Golf. A group of monks is in the drawing, one of whom, with a shocked expression, is running to inform the others of the approach of the player, and the ecclesiastics are seen screening the eyes of one of their number lest he should see the profane sight. Sir Thomas suggests that Sunday Golf may be no new question, but may have caused perplexity to church authorities in the early part of the sixteenth century. Several of the paper's correspondents point out that the players, from their position, are evidently engaged at shinty, not at Golf. Their position is exactly the same as that of the players in the drawing on the initial page of Mr. Andrew Lang's "Chapter on the History of Golf" in the Badminton Volume.

The Duke of Beaufort, editor of the Badminton series, presided, on Thursday of last week, at a dinner of the Clifton Club, Bristol, and presented handsome gifts to Dr. W. G. Grace and Mrs. Grace from the Gloucester Cricket Club, who formed the local committee in connection with the national testimonial to the Champion cricketer, which, with the £1,400 obtained in the Western Counties, brought the aggregate close to £9,000. The Duke, in reply to the toast of his health, said that he had just had an application from the publisher for his consent to the translation of the whole series of the Badminton Library into Chinese. The Chinese, he said, were the last people on earth whom it would have been thought to interest. If in China, as in our country, the Golf volume proves the most popular of the volumes, we may expect great things from the Celestials.

Before leaving Archerfield for the season, Mr. John Penn, M.P., as usual, presented the local club with a solid silver cup of neat design, for competition under handicap. There was a good muster of members, and on comparing cards it was found that Mr. A. Bernard, butler to Mr. Penn, was the winner of the coveted trophy with a net score of 91. Mr. Bernard took to the game late, but plays very steadily and with all the enthusiasm of youth, though he has crossed the three-score-and-ten border some time ago. The victory was very popular. Mr. Penn afterwards entertained the players to luncheon at Archerfield House.

Archerfield has again been taken for the summer months by Mr. James Law, whose tenancy of the charming mansion and grounds is always an assurance that there will be many happy gatherings on the links there during the summer. Mr. G. H. Law has been having a golfing holiday at Biarritz, which is just now crowded with players.

Gentlemen golfers who would like to get hold of nice mansions, with shootings attached and facilities for Golf in the neighbourhood, may just now turn their attention to East Lothian, where at present several of the kind are available. To begin with, there is Luffness House, in the very centre of the famous Golf district, which the proprietor, Mr. Hope, is letting for some time, as he has gone to Algiers. Then there is Gilmerton, one of the residences of Sir Alex. Kinloch, who resides in summer at Kilduff. This has been tenanted by Mr. W. Mure, who has taken Broxmouth Park. It is within nice driving distance of North Berwick, Muirfield, &c. St. Germain, is formerly the residence of another golfer, Colonel Anderson, is also in the market. It is within easy driving distance of Luffness and Gullane.

Secretaries of Golf clubs who wish to have the world informed of their existence should remember to send their information to the two annuals now being published—the Golfing Annual, of which 1896 will be the ninth year of publication, edited by Mr. Scott Duncan, and published at the Field office, a volume that no club should be without; and there is the Golfer's Guide, edited by Mr. W. Dalrymple. one of our esteemed contributors, and published in Edinburgh by Messrs. White & Co., which is in its third year, and covers some interesting historical ground on each occasion of publication, besides giving lists of clubs, &c. Information for these annuals should be sent now.

One of the most interesting new entries in the present year's lists will be the Glamorganshire Golf Club, formed in a way in 1890, but not in much favour till 1892, when it began to attract attention in the neighbourhood. The club has now 150 members, including 20 ladies. The course is one of nine holes, and is as yet rather heavy, the soil being clayey, but it is being gradually improved, chiefly through draining, which has been done at considerable expense. A very nice pavilion has recently been erected for the use of members. The entrance fee is £5 5s., and the annual subscription £2 2s. The members are mostly members from the Cardiff Docks, who live in Penarth and about Cardiff. The ground is about fifteen minutes' walk from Penarth station, but the Taff Vale Railway Company are putting up a siding for landing players, as trains to Cadoxton pass the course. Much of the success of the club has been due to the hon. secretary, Mr. C. B. Stoddart, 38, Mount Square, Cardiff. A new greenkeeper has recently been appointed, under whom the green is expected to go on improving.

Civilisation has seen the stone, the bronze, and the iron ages, and now we appear to be entering upon the paper age. In addition to the many purposes for which paper has hitherto been employed, as, for instance, railway carriage wheels, paper is now being used for building. non-porous. In Norway there are two mills turning out roofing tiles of paper. In Golf club making paper has also made its appearance. Bob Simpson, of Carnoustie, has been turning out very neat, serviceable clubs made of compressed paper. The head is good as to pattern, hard in substance, and stands all kinds of rough play in the hands of beginners exceedingly well. It is a good club for winter play, as it is less liable to be affected by the wet than the ordinary beech head.

The material is soft and woolly, in all kinds of handsome and variegated check patterns suitable for spring and summer wear. The textures and patterns are not only admirably adapted for ladies who either golf or cycle, but also for those who wish a good, comfortable outdoor dress for spring.

The annual general meeting of the Streatham Golf Club was held at the Streatham Chess Club on Tuesday, the 11th. The accounts to December 31st, 1895, were passed. Permission from the London County Council has been obtained to extend the time of play during March and October until noon. The greens are now in very good order. Mr. S. T. Fisher is the captain, and Mr. S. N. Challoner, 100, Thrale Road, Streatham Park, S.W., hon. secretary and treasurer. The subscription is 5s. per annum.

The Cleveland Golf Club, at its annual meeting held on January 9th, elected as the committee for the current year:—President, Mr. T. D. Ridley; vice-presidents, Hon. G. E. Lascelles, Messrs. James Rutherford, A. J. Dorman, C. D. Mackenzie, J. Lambert, Hugh Bell, J. Bowman, and D. Lennard; captain, Mr. A. O. Cochrane; hon. secretary, Mr. Jas. W. Kyle; hon treasurer, Mr. J. M. Meek; members of committee, Messrs. T. C. Davison, T. W. Ridley, R. F. Helm, H. Smurthwaite, A. Mackinlay, and D. Mackay. The total number of members on the roll is 172, viz.: 155 gentlemen (of whom two are honorary and six suspended), and seventeen ladies, being an increase of thirteen gentlemen and two ladies. The revenue from visitors has been £27 15s., being an increase of £7 over the previous year. The debt on the club-house has been extinguished, and there is a balance to the credit of the club of £28, notwithstanding the outlay on the links and the engagement of a groundman, in addition to Taylor.

The links at Frinton on-sea, favourably reported upon by Tom Dunn, have now been laid out, and in about a fortnight or three week's will be practically complete. They are being played on now, and will make really good-class links. It is proposed to have a club competition at Easter and to offer two cups, one handicap for the better players, and another for the duffers, say from 18 to 25 strokes.

Mr. Cheape's claim for compensation for loss of his preemption in connection with the transfer of the St. Andrews' Links to the City of St. Andrews is to be decided by arbitration in Edinburgh, about the middle of March. Mr. Cheape claims £11,500, and the town, although contending that his claim is only of nominal value, have offered, without prejudice, five hundred guineas. The very best counsel are being engaged in the case.

The Kilrymont Golf Company, St. Andrews, has issued a new Golf Score Book, containing the rules of the game, with hints as to play. It has also illustrations, showing the correct position for driving, the swing, and the position for iron play. The hints, which are excellent, are brief and pointed, and will not only be highly valuable to a beginner, but will be a useful reminder to more experienced players.

GOLF AT GUERNSEY.

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR, -It may, perhaps, interest some of your readers who are thinking of a winter resort to know where they can golf on a

good green.

I believe Mr. Horace Hutchinson, on a visit here some years ago, described the links of Guernsey as perfect, but they were devoid of good players. After all, a Golfer wants pleasant players even more than first class ones, especially if he be not in robust health, and I am certain no other Golf club can receive their visitors in a kinder manner than they do here. The hotels here are good and cheap. The wagonette belonging to the club leaves the town church at to a.m., and takes you out to the links by 10.40 a m.; it also meets the electric trams at 12.30 and 1.30 p.m., about a mile and a-half's drive, so that those who only wish an afternoon round are also suited. The wagonette then leaves the club-house at 4.30 pm., and brings all right back to the town church, whence most of us wend our way to the Grange Club, where they also receive visitors on most economic and friendly terms, where billiards, pool, or whist is the order of the day till 7 p.m., when they separate for dinner, to return again or not, whichever suits them, till 12 midnight, when the club is closed. There are a good sprinkling of lady golfers, some of whom are quite above the average. They rather scorn the wagonette, and ride out on bicycles when the roads are in a dry state. As far as I can gather the temperature here is generally about 7 degrees higher than the South of England, and snow never lies any time on the links. Should I by this letter induce any golfers to come here for the winter, I feel quite certain they will try and return next year. I may mention Tom Morris was over here two years ago, and suggested several improvements on the course, which have been considered, and the greens are now in most excellent order, and the club in a flourishing condition. Rumours are about of building a large club-house, increasing entrance-fees, &c.

LENGTH OF DRIVES.

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—Can you inform me what is considered a long drive, and an average drive, on a green where the balls travel well? The professionals to whom I have put this question differ a good deal. Can you also tell me the average length of a

1, J. H. Taylor; 2, Mr. F. G. Tait; 3, James Braid?
The latter in his last match with Taylor, according to newspaper accounts, frequently outdrove Taylor by twenty or thirty yards. He drives, I believe, a longer ball than anyone else.

[An average drive is 170 to 180 yards. A long drive we should take to be 200 yards or over. Taylor's average shot we should say, without actual measurement, is about 180 yards. Mr. Tait is a very long driver, and his average shots are 190 to 200 yards. He has the reputation of having driven the longest tee shot on record, namely, 341 yards, o feet, 9 inches, on January 11th, 1893, at St. Andrews (see article in Golf, Vol. V., p. 313). Braid is also a very long driver, and probably ranks above Mr. Tait. He is as long a driver as Rolland, who, at times, can carry 200 yards, and we have seen him drive several times 225 and 240 yards. But for the average player 170 to 180 yards is a good drive.—ED.]

F. R. A.—(1.) The exact length is 6,323 yards, or a little over 3½ miles. (2.) We know of no longer course. P. A. B.-Yes, the final s is sounded. It is a Scottish word, always used in the plural, and is equivalent to the English "downs." It means patches or divisions of sandy flat ground on the sea-shore, covered with bent grass, and land lying about the windings of a river and the seashore, though not all the open and inland country. Though the expression, "a links" is, nowadays, frequently used, it is incorrect, as well as unscholarlike and ungrammatical.

THE "YELLOW ASTER" GOLF BALL.

Mr. Robert Ramsbottom, the Sportsman's Depôt, Market Street, Manchester, ever ingenious and enterprising, has just brought out a new ball under the above name. The name brought out a new ball under the above name. chosen is a happy one, for it indicates in a word the character of the ball. It is a finely-moulded, hard ball, painted a light yellow colour instead of white. In taking this departure we think that Mr. Ramsbottom is right, for there is no practical reason why a bright yellow ball like a daisy should not be as distinctly visible to the player and his caddle against the green of the links as a white bill. We have tested the point by playing with both balls, and find that the "Yellow Aster" is even better than the white, for the eye of the player is not so readily distracted to other white objects lying about the green when he knows that he is searching for a yellow object. Young Tom Morris used to play with balls that had been kept a long time seasoning, causing the white paint to become yellow. Davie Strath used to banter his opponent on the fact that he had to play a man who used "oranges." Well, here is the orange pure and simple, and we certainly think it a notable improvement, even if it be a small one.
