Women vie for the "worst" title

There is a large part of the golfing public that is being overlooked. We discovered it quite by acci-The discovery came to light after several casual conversations with women that I knew. I innocently invited a friend to play Her response was, "You don't want to play golf with me. I'm a terrible golfer." I retorted with, "We'll get along great because I am the world's worst woman golfer!" An argument immediately ensued as to who actually was the poorest player. There seemed only one solution, we'd have to play golf and find out.

That conversation took place during the winter months of 1998. Over the next few months I had mentioned the conversation to others I encountered. Their response was always the same. "You can't be the world's worst woman golfer, because I'm the world's worst woman golfer." The die was cast. It was inevitable. I had to bring these women together and prove that we couldn't all be the world's worst women's golfers. What I learned was this, there are a number of potential golfers out in the world who shy away from the game because they feel intimidated by what they think of as "real" golfers.

The first step

White Pine National took was to form the "World's Worst Women Golfer's League." Every week these ladies would come and receive a handout that talked to them in very basic terms about the game, the rules and terminology. It also answered questions that they brought up the previous week. The enthusiasm was infectious. Someone was on the practice tee each week 1/2 hour before the first tee time to give pointers. look swings, offer encouragement and answer questions. Everyone made up their own foursomes so that people could play with folks they were comfortable with. Tee markers were moved forward (sometimes well into the fairway) on long par 5's so that ladies could the

achieve a sense of accomplishment. Prizes were awarded for most improved, attendance and other non-threatening areas. No one had to commit to a season, just a week at a time.

There was one rule that was consistently enforced. "If you hit the ball 10 times and are not in the hole, pick it up. You've had enough exercise for that hole." Rules and etiquette questions were answered and everyone learned to play the game, one by one.

Where are we now? For the 1999 golf season, we've expanded our format to "Part 1" and "Part 2". Part 1 players get more time on the range as they tee off later than Part 2 players. Part 1 is open to new players who have never played the game before and players who lack confidence and want to learn the sport and improve their game. struction is available each week. Before each tee time, someone travels the course while the players are on the course and answers questions, looks at swings, makes suggestions, and most important, encourages new players.

This format was so well received that this year we've added a parent/child league. Parents or grandparents play nine holes with their children or grandchildren. They establish a level of competition they feel comfortable with. The league plays early evenings mid week, when we normally have our "extra special junior rates" and kids play free when with a parent or grandparent. All the youngsters need to contribute financially is a nominal weekly league fee that will be used for prizes and a banquet at the end of the season. Families get good interaction, parents get a break on their wallet, young people learn the game, and golf gets a new generation of players.

#### MTF Founders Society Golf Outing

The Founders Society is a subsidiary group of the Michigan Turfgrass Foundation. Formed sixteen years ago, one hundred members banded together with the goal of establishing a fund to aid research at MSU's Hancock Turfgrass Research Center. Each person contributed \$1,000, and it was decided that only the interest on the total sum could be used. This money would purchase equipment and supplies used by multiple research projects.

The Founders Society has been responsible for the acquisition of

numerous pieces of equipment for the Hancock Center over the years. The most recent allotment outfitted the Founder Society Room at the Center. The Society continuously recruits new members. Donors can choose their level of contribution and also have the option of extending their donation over a five year period. There are currently 250 members with a goal of adding 35 new members this year. One of the perks for members, aside from the gratification of helping MSU turf research, is a yearly golf outing free of charge for the members and their guests

at Links of Pinewood. Owner Ernie Fuller generously donates the entire day. The outing includes golf, cart, continental breakfast and an exquisite lunch. It is geared toward recruiting new members, uniting current members and a short business report.

#### Players rave about course, format

Gaylord — The format and course at the DLJ direct Par-3 Shootout at Treetops drew raves from the participating PGA pros.

The course, Gaylord and the format were respectively lauded as each pro echoed support for the fledgling tournament.

"I like the golf course," said PGA legend Jack Nicklaus. "It's pretty. It's fun. It's a unique format. But it sort of negates the advantage I have with my power," he continued, chuckling.

"The par 3 gives everybody a chance," two time U.S. Open champion Lee Janzen said. "I don't think it gives anybody an advantage."

"I really enjoyed it a lot. It was fairly nerve-racking, too. At the beginning, I thought it was going to be a fairly relaxing two days and everybody would get their fair share of birdies."

It didn't turn out that way, as no one carded a bird until Janzen sank a birdie putt on No. 8 in the opening round and three of the four were 1-under par on the following hole.

Janzen won the tournament, but just barely. His skin on No. 2 Tuesday gave him just enough money to withstand a final round onslaught by Phil Mickelson.

"I'd love to come back," Janzen. "That's the best part of winning the thing, is coming back and playing it again."

Mickelson, one of the few left-handers on the Tour, said the tournament is a nice change of pace and allows the golfers to work on areas they normally can't concentrate on in most PGA Tour events.

"It gives us a lot of chances to really work on our approach shots, which we don't have a chance to do on a regular golf course until after you drive." Michelson said.

Nicklaus thought the par-3 format would result in several aces in the course of the tourney, but no one came closer than Janzen's two feet, eight inches from the cup on the final hole Monday.

"I thought we might see one, maybe even two, hole-inones in this tournament," Nicklaus said.

"Myself and all the players really enjoy playing around here," Mickelson said. "the people have been very receptive and supportive when players come up here, and consequently we want to return, which hasn't been the case in every city."
