### George William Prieskorn

1935-1995

George Prieskorn was born July 4, 1935, in Brighton, Michigan, the son of George A. and Lucile (Ash) Prieskorn.

A graduate of Michigan State University, George served with the U.S. Army. Prior to becoming the co-owner and manager of Bald Mountain Golf Course in Lake Orion, he was the resident manager of Burroughs Farms, Brighton, was a former maintenance manager for the Huron-Clinton Metroparks and a former Brighton High School teacher, football and golf coach. He was an active member of St. George Lutheran Church, teaching catechism for many years, as well as serving in other capacities.

George made many contributions to the MBCGCSA and served as president of the MBCGCSA from 1976-1977. George played as part of a three-member team representing the GCSAA in the Second British International Greenkeepers and Superintendents Golf Tournament at the Walton Heath Golf Course in London, England, in October 1976. Much to the pride of the MBCGCSA, the GCSAA team finished first by scoring an 89 in the threeball, better-ball, 36-hole tournament. George received a hero's welcome when he returned to Michigan.

George died in the early hours of Wednesday, July 5, 1995. Surviving are his mother, Lucile, his brother, Gerald, and his wife Kay, two nieces, Stephanie and Stacey, a nephew, Gerald, and a great-nephew, Justin.

## Fall Weed Control

This summer has been devastating to the rough of many golf courses, leaving opened turf for the encroachment of weeds. With or without opened turf, fall weed control has many advantages over spring weed control.

In the fall, perennial weeds are storing carbohydrates for overwintering and initial spring growth. This process draws a herbicide application deeper into the plant, killing both the vegetation and the root of the plant. Some perennial weeds, such as the dandelion, do not produce a flowering structure until they overwinter.

The time of emergence or germination varies throughout the spring for different weeds. An early application of a herbicide may miss different weeds like the late emerging buckhorn. By applying a herbicide in the fall, all weeds will have emerged or germinated.

The best control of weeds is a full stand of turf. Spring weed control leaves open spaces in the turf that may not fill in due to an early hot summer. In the fall, the turf area has plenty of time to recover from summer stress and fill in after a herbicide application.

The best control method for weeds always is a full healthy stand of turf. When a herbicide is used, it must be applied to actively growing weeds. Dr. Bruce Branham has conducted many studies on weed control, two of which appear in the 56th and 60th Michigan Turfgrass Conference proceedings. In these studies, it is clear that one specific herbicide does not control all weeds. It seems to be a standard practice to tank-mix different herbicides depending on the weeds being controlled. Most commonly, products like Confront, Banvil or Buctril which kill hard to control weeds such as buckhorn, speedwill, Oxalis and canada thistle, are mixed with a two or three way product. Herbicide selection is dependent on weed identification. Proper weed identification allows for the best control at the best cost. The hard to kill weeds tend to be the more expensive to control. Control in an area where hard to kill weeds are identified can cost \$16 to \$22 an acre, compared to \$9 to \$12 an acre.

Non-target plants are not as vulnerable to herbicide damage in the fall. Non-target plants have either hardened off considerably or lost their foliage during a fall herbicide application. If severe hard-to-kill weed infestation is a problem, ester formulations of a herbicide can be used. Ester formulations are not recommended in the spring due to their increased volatility in the warmer spring weather.

Fall applications can benefit a superintendent by providing better weed control during a time when operations are winding down instead of winding up. Any weeds missed in the fall easily can be controlled in the busy spring time. Any opened turf after weed control can be closed with a good fertility program during the rest of the fall and spring.

### Ball Roll Comparison: Soft Spikes Versus Traditional Metal Spikes

According to a USGA study, the average golfer takes 28 paces per green and the average golf shoe has 12 spikes; 28 paces times 24 spikes yields 672 impressions per player per green; 672 impressions times 18 greens equals 12,096 impressions per round per player. Assuming a course receives its daily average of 200 rounds, the greens receive 2,419,200 impressions every day, which comes to more than 72.5 million spike marks each month.

In theory, a golf ball rolling across a green pocked with spike marks would not roll as far as a ball on an unmarked green. This is due to the fact that each time the ball strikes a spike mark, it briefly loses contact with the putting surface. Over a distance of several feet, these subtle bounces may cause a significant reduction in ball roll.

Soft spikes have recently been gaining acceptance with golf course superintendents and golfers as a viable alternative to traditional metal spikes. This experiment was conducted to determine if use of soft spikes in lieu of traditional metal spikes would have a significant effect on ball roll.

#### Methods

During the autumn of 1994, a study was initiated at the Ohio State University Turfgrass Research Center in Columbus to compare the effects of soft versus metal spikes on ball roll. The study was conducted on a creeping bentgrass (Agrostis palustris Huds. cv. Penncross) turf maintained at 3/16th of an inch. The treatments included soft spikes (Softspikes, Alexandria, VA), metal spikes (Footjoy) and an untreated control. Each treatment consisted of walking with the soft or metal spikes for 10 minutes within a plot measuring 2 x 12 feet. The control did not receive a walking treatment. A single person, 5 feet 11 inches in height and weighing 160 pounds, was used as the walker throughout the study. The shoes used in the study were size 10 Footjoys. Upon completion of the walking, a stimpmeter was used to measure the distance a golf ball rolled. The treatments were conducted four times between October 20 and November 7 between the hours of 1 and 3 p.m. Each treatment was replicated three times in a completely randomized design.

#### **Results and Discussion**

Three of the four reading dates showed a significant increase in ball roll with the soft spikes compared to both the metal spikes and the control. The initial readings taken on October 20 showed no difference in ball roll between the soft and metal spikes; however, both were significantly greater than the control.

The control was consistently the shortest ball roll treatment. This may seem counterintuitive; however, the control plots were not walked upon, while the soft and metal spike treatments received intensive traffic from walking. In essence, the walking served as a light "rolling." As a result, the metal spiked treatment, even with the spike marks, rolled farther than the control which did not receive the "rolling."

Although the comparison between soft and metal spikes on a putting green setting was somewhat "amplified" by confining the research to a small plot area, the significance of the data cannot be dismissed. Soft spikes are more likely to result in increased ball roll in situations where greens become excessively

## Personal Protective Equipment Standards

Michigan has revised and amended the standard on Personal Protective Equipment. The standard was effective on June 19, 1995.

Under the amended standard, employers will be required to perform workplace hazard assessments. These assessments will be used to determine the presence of hazards that necessitate the use of Personal Protective Equipment. Employers will then have to select appropriate equipment to protect affected employees from these hazards. In addition, employers will be required to educate and train all affected employees in the proper use and maintenance of personal protective equipment.

#### Hazard Assessment and Equipment Selection -R408.13308:

The employer shall assess the workplace to determine if hazards are present or are likely to be present which necessitate the use of personal protective equipment. If such hazards are present or likely to be present, the employer shall:

- \* Select personal protective equipment that properly fits each affected employee.
- \* Communicate selection decisions to each affected employee.
- \* The employer shall verify that the required workplace hazard assessment has been performed through a written certification that identifies the workplace evaluated, the person certifying that the evaluation has been performed, the date(s) of the hazard assessment and which identifies the document as a certification of hazard assessment.
- \* Defective or damaged personal protective equipment shall not be used.

#### Training - R408.13309:

- The employer shall provide training to each employee who is required by this standard to use personal protective equipment. Each employee who is required by this standard shall be trained to know at least the following:
  - \* When personal protective equipment is necessary
  - \* What personal protective equipment is necessary
  - How to properly don, doff, adjust and wear personal protective equipment
- Each affected employee shall demonstrate an understanding of the training specified in subrule (1) of this section and the ability to use personal protective equipment properly before being allowed to perform work requiring the use of personal protective equipment.
- 3) When an employer has reason to believe that any affected employee who already has been trained does not have the understanding and skill required by subrule (2) of this section, the employer shall retrain the employee. The existence of any of the following circumstances requires retraining:
  - \* Changes in the workplace that render previous training obsolete
  - \* Changes in the types of personal protective equipment to be used that render previous training obsolete
  - \* Inadequacies in an affected employee's knowledge or use of assigned personal

4.) The employer shall verify that each affected employee has received and understood the required training through a written certification that contains the name of each employee trained, the date(s) of training and that identifies the subject of the certification.

#### Eye and Face Protection -Generally - R408.13312

- \* Each affected employee shall use appropriate eye or face protection when exposed to eye or face hazards from flying objects or particles, molten metal, liquid chemicals, acids or caustic liquids, chemical gases or vapors, glare injurious radiation, electric flash or a combination of the hazards specified.
- \* Each affected employee shall use eye protection that provides side protection when there is a hazard from flying objects. Detachable side protectors (e.g. clip-on or slide-on shields) meeting the pertinent requirements of this rule are acceptable.

#### Head Protection - Generally -R408.13370

 Each affected employee shall be provided and shall wear head protection when working in areas where a hazard exists from falling or flying objects, or from other harmful contents or exposures, or

there is a risk of electrical shock, hair entanglement, chemicals or temperature extremes.

Protective helmets designed to reduce electrical shock hazard shall be worn by each affected employee when near exposed electrical conductors which could contact the head. Some examples include: Working below other workers who are using tools and materials which could fall, working around or under conveyor belts which are carrying parts or materials, working below machinery or processes which might cause material or objects to fall and working on exposed energized conductors.

Some examples of occupations for which head protection should be routinely considered are: Carpenters, electricians, linemen, mechanics, plumbers and pipe fitters, sawyers, welders, timber cutting and logging workers, stock handlers and warehouse laborers.

#### Foot Protection -Generally - R408.13385

Each affected employee shall wear protective footwear when working in areas where there is a danger of foot injuries due to falling and rolling objects, or objects piercing the sole, and where such employee's feet are exposed to electrical hazards.

Some occupations for which foot protection should be routinely considered are: Shipping and receiving clerks, stock clerks, carpenters, electricians, machinists, mechanics, plumbers and pipe fitters, structural metal workers, drywall installers, punch and stamping press operators, sawyers, welders, gardeners and grounds-keepers, timber cutting and logging workers, stock handlers and warehouse laborers.

#### Hand Protection -Generally - R408.13392

A.

Employers shall select and require their employees to use appropriate hand protection when employees' hands are exposed to hazards that may cause any of the following: skin absorption of harmful substances, severe cuts or lacerations, severe abrasions, punctures, chemical burns, thermal burns and harmful temperature extremes.

Employers shall base the selection of the appropriate hand protection on an evaluation of the performance characteristics of the hand protection relative to all of the following: task(s) to be performed, conditions present, duration of use and the hazards and potential hazards identified.

Before purchasing gloves, the employer should request documentation from the manu facturer that the gloves meet the appropriate test standard(s) for the hazard(s) anticipated. A copy of Part 33. Personal Protective Equipment can be obtained by contacting The Department of Labor Standards Division at (517) 322-1845.







## A Risk Management Approach to Lightning Safety

Every year many golfers and course employees are caught on America's golf links as thunder rumbles in the distance then grows louder and sharper as storm clouds darken the sky and lightning flashes within the clouds and to Earth. A recent study found that golf is one of the leading activities during which lightning deaths and injuries occur.

With the proliferation of liability lawsuits, there is added pressure for golf course owners and managers to warn and protect customers and employees from lightning's hazards. Most lawsuits from lightning events are based on allegations of negligence to warn and protect.

For example, the widow of a golfer who was killed by a lightning strike at Quail Chase Golf Course in Jefferson County, Kentucky, filed a suit against the course owners, charging negligence due to "failure to install and operate adequate warning systems." In another case, a golf course was found negligent by a jury and held liable for the lightning deaths in an unprotected shelter building. The couple's minor children were awarded damages sufficient to pay for their care and education.

To address these liability issues and to satisfy the "Duty to Warn" considerations, course managers must plan and implement appropriate safety measures. A comprehensive risk management plan against lightning hazards should include the following:

**Detection:** With the development of reliable lightning detection devices, it is frequently possible to warn of lightning hazards before they occur. These systems should be installed on the course.

Notification: Course-installed alert devices can be used to send an audible notice to customers and

workers of the hazard. Signs and other visual messages should be displayed.

**Protection:** All golf courses should have a lightningsafe clubhouse and shelters. Shelter buildings on a golf course can become lightning traps unless they have proper design and equipment.

**Education:** Golfers should be given printed instructions that advise how and where to take shelter during a thunderstorm. Signs that describe lightning safety measures should be prominently displayed in the clubhouse or on the golf cart. CPR training for course employees should be conducted on a regular basis.

**Documentation:** The golf course's lightning safety plan should be recorded with such information as dates of equipment inspection, employee training and other pertinent details. By acquiring the capability to detect, notify and protect golfers and employees, course management can demonstrate a 'best effort' defense against the lightning hazard. In contrast, failure to implement the capability to detect, notify and protect can provide significant difficulty for the golf course that is being sued from a lightning-related incident. Lightning will continue to be a random event and your facility may or may not be its next target. A comprehensive risk management program is the only way to maximize the safety of your facility against lightning.

## Around the Course

"When we started this program, we did not have one bluebird here we could identify. Now, we have more than you can count. That's Superintendent Robert Mateja as he was quoted in *The Detroit News* in an article about the Fox Hills Country Club's certification by the Audubon Society of New York State.

Fox Hills is one of three courses in the state and 36 in the country to be certified for its environmental efforts. The two other Michigan courses are the Tournament Players Club of Michigan in Dearborn and the Treetops Sylvan Resort in Gaylord.

The Audubon certification endorses Earth-friendly changes. One big change cited is in water use. According to the society, the water used on one 18hole course has been cut from 2.5 million gallons a day during peak season to 750,000 gallons a day.

The article cited Jean Mackay, education director for the Audubon Society of New York State. "Getting Michigan's 1.3 million golfers to accept a little scrubby prairie grass on the side of the fairway may be the hardest part," she said. "A lot of times, it's the golfers who are demanding these perfect conditions. The nature of the course is just as important as how fast or how far your ball goes."

"spiked-up" by use of traditional metal spikes. Greens that receive excessive play or are smaller in size are more likely to see the effects of slower ball roll caused by spike marks and are therefore the most likely candidates to experience an increase in green speed with the use of soft spikes.

Two potential benefits of using soft spikes were observed while conducting the experiment. First was the striking visual difference between the soft and metal spike treatments. The metal spiked plots looked literally "chewed up" after ten minutes of walking; in contrast, the soft spiked plots looked healthy and could barely be distinguished from the control plots. Second, we observed a noticeable difference in the "trueness" of ball roll between the soft and metal spiked treatments, especially as ball speed declined. In the soft spike plots, the ball rolled true, even as the ball slowed; while in the metal spiked plots the ball was more apt to vary in its course, especially as all speed decreased.

This study was conducted during the latter part of October and the beginning of November. If the study had been conducted in the spring or in the middle of the summer when growth patterns are different, the data might vary. Although further studies need to be conducted, we would expect similar data trends to occur.
