S.S. 201, or S.S. 211, or S.S. 221, or S.S. 241
recommended; S.S. 201 preferred.
Problems of regulating and controlling human behavior. Emphasis placed on major economic and political institutions involved in social control. This includes problems of human wants and needs.

203. American and World Problems (S)
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0)
S.S. 202, S.S. 212, S.S. 222 or S.S. 242
recommended; S.S. 202 preferred.
The international scene with the focus on problems of economic development, conflict among the nation-states and attempts at conflict control.

211. The Emergence of Man (S)
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0)
The bio-social evolution of man. The theories and empirical findings of the behavioral sciences are brought to bear upon the nature of man.

212. Coping with Changing Institutions in Modern Society (S)
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0)
S.S. 201, S.S. 211, S.S. 221 or S.S. 241
recommended; S.S. 211 preferred.
Individuals and the changing institutional framework of modern society. Emphasis on socialization enabling personality systems in different cultural settings to cope with life in the future.

213. Casualties of Contemporary Society (S)
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0)
S.S. 202, S.S. 212, S.S. 222 or S.S. 242
recommended; S.S. 212 preferred.
The meaning of deviant behavior and personal disorganization and their impact on society. Selected problems examined in depth.

221. The Individual and Metropolitan Society (S)
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0)
Factors and directions in metropolitan change. Impacts on life styles and life strategies of individuals and groups. Challenges to traditional family, educational and community patterns.

222. Economics, Politics and the Individual in the Metropolis (S)
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0)
S.S. 201, S.S. 211, S.S. 221, S.S. 241,
recommended; S.S. 221 preferred.
Patterns of economic and political participation: The impact on the individual. Employment security and job satisfaction, economic rewards, political power and civil rights. Intermeshing of economic and political activities.

223. World Urbanization: Cultures and Common Issues (S)
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0)
S.S. 202, S.S. 212, S.S. 222 or S.S. 242
recommended; S.S. 222 preferred.
The unity of urban life patterns and the emergence of modern-day urban problems. Cultural variations in approach to issues—comparative political, social, economic, ideological systems.

241. Cultures in Crisis (S)
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0)
The nature and sources of social cohesion. Approaches to the modernization of traditional societies. Problems and alternative strategies of nation building.

242. Freedom and Justice (S)
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0)
S.S. 201, S.S. 211, S.S. 221 or S.S. 241
recommended; S.S. 241 preferred.
Ideologies of change in the modern world—sources, appeals, problems. Issues of social justice and individual freedom.

243. War and Morality (S)
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0)
S.S. 202, S.S. 212, S.S. 222 or S.S. 242
recommended; S.S. 242 preferred.
Social tensions and revolutionary change. The causes of war: international conflict and the great powers. Strategies for peace. Man's conscience versus state policies.

292. Selected Topics
(U C 292.) Fall, Winter, Spring. 3 to 5
credits. May reenroll for a maximum of 8 credits
if different topic is taken.
Interdisciplinary study of topics in the social sciences.

300. Supervised Individual Study
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 2 to 4
credits. 8 credits completed in general education
social science; approval of department.

228. Marriage
Fall, Winter, Spring. 4(4-0) Students
may not receive credit in both S W 228 and FCS
145.
Examination of marriage and the family, from a
social work point of view. Consideration of such
areas of adjustment as emotional, physical, social,
financial, religious and legal.

322. Child Welfare
Winter, Spring. 3(3-0) Juniors.
Child welfare movement and contemporary
children's agencies and their services. Programs
for improving home and for substitute care,
safeguarding health, employment protection,
delinquency prevention, and other needs of
children and youth.

- 400H. Honors Work**
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 1 to 16 credits. Juniors; approval of school. Study of a problem, phase or field of social work; seminar for particularly able students.
- 417. Minorities and Women in the World of Work**
Fall, Spring. 4(4-0) Senior majors or approval of department. Interdepartmental with the departments of Management, and Racial and Ethnic Studies. Administered by the Department of Management. Racial, ethnic, sexual and other minority experiences and problems in the world of work. Awareness training approach (what it's like to be . . .) featuring movies, guests, subgroup discussions and encounter-type exercises.
- 428. Dynamics of Marriage and Family Relations**
Winter, Spring. 3(3-0) Juniors. Analysis of post-marital interpersonal adjustment from standpoint of family social work. Includes current social changes affecting these relationships, and specialized services available to families.
- 430. Introduction to Transactional Analysis**
Winter. 3(3-0) Majors in Social Science, Education, Human Ecology, Communication; Juniors. Major concepts of transactional analysis for analyzing, predicting, and changing human behavior. Concepts are applied to social work practice and to other helping professions.
- 433. Social Work as a Profession I**
Fall. 3(3-0) Junior majors. Historical development and philosophical basis of social welfare policy in relation to methods for problem solving at individual, group and community levels.
- 434. Social Work as a Profession II**
Winter. 3(3-0) S W 433. Continuation of S W 433. Human reactions under stress; social work intervention through welfare organizations and social action.
- 435. Social Work as a Profession III**
Spring. 3(3-0) S W 434. Social welfare programs to meet human needs; social planning for services.
- 439. Interviewing in Social Welfare**
Fall, Winter, Spring. 3(1-4) Juniors. Principles of interviewing as applied to social welfare. Related laboratory experience.
- 440. Social Work Intervention I**
Fall. 3(3-0) Senior majors, S W 467 concurrently. Intervention related to individuals and families based on application of social work and social science knowledge and utilization of interviewing techniques.
- 441. Social Work Intervention II**
Winter. 3(3-0) S W 440; S W 467 concurrently. Continuation of S W 440. Development of techniques in social work practice focused on the situational-environmental assessment of client.
- 442. Social Work Intervention III**
Spring. 3(3-0) S W 441; S W 467 concurrently. Continuation of S W 441. Advanced study of choice and utilization of intervention modes emphasizing social work conceptual framework for enhancement of client social functioning.
- 444. Social Work in Corrections**
Spring. 3(3-0) S W 205 or S W 433 or approval of school. Introduction to juvenile and adult probation and parole, clinical services in juvenile institutions, and classification in prisons. Intended for students planning to enter corrections field.
- 450. International Studies in Social Welfare**
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 3 to 12 credits. May reenroll for a maximum of 24 credits. Approval of school. Independent study or participation in formal programs outside the United States.
- 455. Dynamics of Group Process**
Fall, Winter, Spring. 3(3-0) Senior majors. Application of social science findings and group dynamics theory to social work practice in small groups.
- 460. Community Organization Methods in Social Work**
Winter, Spring. 3(3-0) GEO 402 or SOC 329 or M C 251 or approval of school. Social work methods for working with community development groups and community change processes for social service networks; analysis of social action strategies for solving community problems.
- 466. Social and Spatial Approaches to Community Service**
Spring. 3(3-0) GEO 201 or S W 205 or approval of department. Interdepartmental with and administered by the Department of Geography. Analysis of major themes in social service planning: communities and neighborhoods, public policy administration, social service networks, location of public facilities, evaluation and accountability of service systems.
- 467A. Social Work Field Experience I**
(467.) Fall. 4(1-15) S W 440 concurrently. Supervised practicum in approved social agencies and institutions.
- 467B. Social Work Field Experience II**
(467.) Winter. 4(1-15) S W 467A, S W 441 concurrently. Supervised practicum in approved social agencies and institutions.
- 467C. Social Work Field Experience III**
(467.) Spring. 4(1-15) S W 467B, S W 442 concurrently. Supervised practicum in approved social agencies and institutions.
- 470. Women's Issues in Social Work**
Spring. 3(3-0) Senior Social Work majors with one previous course in women's issues or approval of instructor. Evaluates sex discrimination in social work education and practice; knowledge of and skill in non-sexist methods of therapy.
- 475. Philosophy and Techniques in Social Work Research**
Fall, Winter. 3(3-0) Junior majors or approval of school. Concepts and methodology used for empirical investigation of social work problems including the philosophic basis of scientific investigation, techniques of measurement, research design, data collection, and data analysis.
- 476. Research Methods in Social Work Intervention**
Winter, Spring. 3(3-0) S W 475 or approval of school. Focus on the data analysis of the research process employing quantitative methods in measurement of outcomes of social work interventions.
- 482. Selected Approaches in Social Work**
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 1(1-0) to 6(6-0) May reenroll for a maximum of 16 credits. Approval of school.
- 490. Independent Study in Social Work**
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. Variable credit. May reenroll for a maximum of 12 credits. Third-term Juniors; approval of school. Each student will work under direction of a faculty member on an experimental, theoretical, or applied problem.

Fall. 4(4-0) Majors or approval of school. Interrelationship of social, cultural, subcultural, small group and situational factors that influence human adaptation to change and stress. Examination of psychoanalytic, behavioral and role theory approaches to personality development.

- 812. Human Behavior and Social Environment III**
Fall, Spring. 4(4-0) S W 811; majors or approval of school. Psychosocial maladaptive behavior. Analysis of characteristics of the interaction of itiological, dynamic, environmental and situational variables. Implications for social work intervention.
- 813. Seminar in Psychosocial Pathology**
Spring. 3(3-0) S W 812, S W 837 or approval of school. Major concepts, principles, and problems of psycho-social pathology as applied in Social Work Practice. Behavioral, interpersonal, psycho-dynamic, and etiological correlates of selected problematic behavioral styles.

Social welfare and social work institutions, and their socio-economic and political contexts. Social problems and arrangements for meeting human needs. Policy issues related to poverty, income maintenance, women and minorities.
- 821. Social Welfare Policy and Services II**
Spring. 3(3-0) S W 820 or S W 433, S W 434 or approval of school.
Organization of social welfare services. Analysis of organizational patterns of social welfare. Study of current service delivery systems: income maintenance, family and child welfare, anti-poverty, mental health and others.
- 822. Social Welfare Policy and Services III**
Fall. 3(3-0) S W 821 or approval of school.
Social policy development. Analysis of social legislation. Policy and policy processes as central determinants of the nature of the social welfare system. The professional role in policy-making processes.
- 830. Contemporary Theories for Social Work**
Spring. 3(3-0) Majors or approval of school.
Analysis of contemporary theories from social and behavioral sciences relevant for social work.
- 835. Social Work Practicum I**
Fall. 4(0-16) Majors: S W 810 or concurrently; S W 840 concurrently.
Application and integration of concepts, principles and methods of social work practice. Through conscious use of knowledge, self, agency and community resources the student develops understanding, professional attitudes and skills.
- 836. Social Work Practicum II**
Winter. 4(0-16) S W 835; S W 811 or concurrently; S W 841 concurrently.
Continuation of S W 835. Emphasis on diagnosis and treatment; evaluating nature of the relationship; developing self-awareness and enhancement of other professional attitudes and skills.
- 837. Social Work Practicum III**
Spring. 4(0-16) S W 836; S W 812 or concurrently; S W 842 concurrently.
Continuation of S W 836. Integration and refinement of basic generic concepts, principles and skills in social work practice.

Formulation of a conceptual framework for social work practice. Identification of social work roles and methods in offering services to individuals, families and small groups.

Continuation of S W 840. Development of modes of intervention with the individual and his social groups. Evaluation of the family system in the social context, and the meeting of service needs.

Continuation of S W 841. Selection, implementation and evaluation of modes of intervention to stabilize, develop and enhance social functioning.

Theoretical aspects of group behavior. Analysis of structure, norms, leadership and communication patterns in groups. Application to social work systems.

Introduction to community social work. Community structure, function, decision making. Community organization methods, change processes, practice settings. Client systems, practitioner roles and functions.

Spring. 3(3-0) S W 860 or S W 460; majors or approval of school.
Problem-solving methods and techniques in social action, planning, and community development. Uses of consensus and conflict as change processes.
- 864A. Advanced Social Work Practicum I**
Fall. 4(0-16) S W 837; S W 865 concurrently.
Application and integration of concepts, principles and methods of social work practice.
- 864B. Advanced Social Work Practicum II**
Winter. 4(0-16) S W 864A; S W 865 concurrently.
Application and integration of concepts, principles and methods of social work practice.
- 864C. Advanced Social Work Practicum III**
Spring. 4(0-16) S W 864B; S W 865 concurrently.
Application and integration of concepts, principles and methods of social work practice.

Task-centered brief intervention theories and concepts. Crisis theory and intervention techniques applied in maturational and situational stress situations.

Winter, Spring. 3(3-0) S W 837, S W 842.
Principles and strategies of intervention with groups to assist individuals, primarily adults, experiencing interpersonal problems. Social worker's role in various phases of treatment.
- 865C. Advanced Social Work Practice: Intensive Individual Intervention**
Fall, Winter. 3(3-0) S W 837, S W 842.
Elements of therapeutic communication and their behavioral correlates within the framework of selected theories of interpersonal treatment relevant to social work practice.
- 865D. Advanced Social Work Practice: Family Intervention**
Fall, Winter. 3(3-0) S W 837, S W 842.
Criteria for the selection of family treatment as the method of choice; goals of treatment; procedures in the initial interview and treatment techniques.
- 865E. Advanced Social Work Practice: Casework with Children**
Fall, Winter. 3(3-0) S W 837, S W 842.
Preschool and latency age children. Assessment emphasizing maturational phases. Direct one-to-one intervention; worker-client relationships.
- 865F. Advanced Social Work Practice: Group Work with Children**
Spring. 3(3-0) S W 837, S W 842.
Developmental activity groups for preschool and elementary age children. Taskmastery within peer groups; worker-client interaction. Purpose and programming as intervention tools.
- 865G. Advanced Social Work Practice: Social Work with Adolescents**
Fall, Spring. 3(3-0) S W 837, S W 842.
Major problem areas of adolescence, development of the treatment relationship, assessment, treatment methods and interviewing techniques.
- 868. Advanced Social Work Practice Issues**
Fall, Winter, Spring. 3(3-0) S W 842; approval of school.
Development, integration and reinforcement of professional competence. Further testing of skills relevant to emerging conditions of social work practice.
- 870. Social Work Administration**
Winter. 3(3-0) Second-year social work graduate students; approval of school.
Agencies as social systems. Theories of organization. Agency policy formation in terms of program planning, implementation, management and evaluation. Use of information for management decisions.
- 874. Social Work Consultation**
Winter. 4 credits. Second-year social work graduate students; approval of school.
Consultation as a problem-solving process in social work. Emphasis on role relationships, types of consultation, and intervention models. Differentiation from client treatment, psychotherapy, supervision and collaboration. Integral practicum component.
- 875. Evaluation of Social Work Treatment**
Fall. 3(3-0) S W 475; STT 201 or STT 421. Majors or approval of school.
Utilization of experimental design strategies in evaluating the processes and consequences of social work treatment.
- 876. Survey Research on Social Problems**
Winter. 3(3-0) S W 475; STT 201 or STT 421. Majors or approval of school.
Use of survey research methods to develop knowledge and theory as related to selected social problems.

877. Qualitative Research Methods in Social Work
Spring. 3(3-0) S W 475; STT 201 or STT 421. Majors or approval of school.
 Use of participant observations and other qualitative research methods in social work settings for purposes of developing empirically grounded theory.

879A. Administration and Program Evaluation Practicum I
Fall. 4(0-16) S W 837, S W 875 concurrently; approval of school.
 Application and integration of concepts, principles and methods of administration and program evaluation.

879B. Administration and Program Evaluation Practicum II
Winter. 4(0-16) S W 879A, S W 875 concurrently; approval of school.
 Application and integration of concepts, principles and methods of administration and program evaluation.

879C. Administration and Program Evaluation Practicum III
Spring. 4(0-16) S W 879B, S W 877 concurrently; approval of school.
 Application and integration of concepts, principles and methods of administration and program evaluation.

881. Social Work in Special Settings
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 3(3-0)
May reenroll for a maximum of 6 credits with approval of school. Majors or approval of school.
 Social work concepts, methods and program development in selected settings such as school, medical, psychiatric, correctional, family, or child welfare. Significance of organizational arrangements for social work practice.

882. Seminars in Social Work
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. Variable credit. May reenroll for a maximum of 12 credits. Approval of school.
 Seminars on selected issues, trends, programs or methods in social work.

890. Special Problems in Theory and Practice
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. Variable credit. May reenroll for a maximum of 18 credits. Majors or approval of school.
 Individual or group study of special settings or of specific social work problems.

893. Social Gerontology
Fall. 3(3-0) Approval of school.
 Aging and years of later maturity, with respect to social and personal difficulties and opportunities. Aging process, retirement, living arrangements, social relationships, community resources, and implications for social welfare.

990. Independent Study in Social Work
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. Variable credit. May reenroll for a maximum of 12 credits. Approval of school.
 Individual study of a theoretical or applied problem in social work.

 Recognition and description of social conditions which lead to individual human development. Exploration of ways in which society facilitates and fails to facilitate individual human development.

160. Contemporary Social Problems
Fall. 4(4-0)
 Identification of the factors and issues involved in mankind's fight for survival in our technological society. Relationship of humanism and technology. Examination of and suggestions for dealing with problems of warfare, cybernation, human rights.

241. Introduction to Sociology
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0)
Sophomores.
 Introduction to nature of sociological inquiry and to concepts and principles of sociology. Analysis focuses on institutional features of modern society and of structure and dynamics of social organization.

251. Social Psychology
Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 5(5-0)
SOC 241. Students may not receive credit in both SOC 251 and PSY 335.
 Social psychology from a sociological perspective. Relation of the individual to his social environment with special reference to group process and interaction, social structure and personality, mass phenomena, and social attitudes.

310. Social Stratification
Fall, Winter. 4(4-0) SOC 241.
 Survey of literature on the formation and changes in social class systems in modern and traditional societies. Social mobility in class, status and political orders.

311. Development of Sociological Theory
Winter, Spring. 4(4-0) SOC 310.
 Significant theoretical contributions to the development of sociological theory, both European and American.

312. Research Methods in Sociology
Fall, Spring. 5(3-2) STT 201 or PSY 215.
 Elements of scientific logic; procedures and problem formation; development of concepts, hypotheses, theory; research design; sampling, measurement, data gathering; analysis, interpretation, and reporting research findings.

320. Criminology
(235.) Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer. 4(4-0) SOC 241 or CJ 110 or approval of department. Interdepartmental with and jointly administered with the School of Criminal Justice.
 Crime analyzed from sociological perspective: meaning of "crime", crime statistics, and measurement, theories of crime causation, crime typologies, e.g., professional organized, violent, sex, white-collar crimes, juvenile delinquency.

321. Industrial Sociology
Fall. 4(4-0) SOC 241.
 Industrialization in Western and non-Western societies; social organization of work; internal dynamics of work plant as a social system; and labor-management relations in various cultural settings.

322. Political Sociology
Fall, Winter. 4(4-0) SOC 241.
 Political action in the United States in relation to theory and practice of democracy. Nature of social pressures, political group, politician and effect of local community situation on political activity will be considered.

323. Sociology of the Family
Winter. 4(4-0) SOC 241.
 Sociological analysis of the family, its development as a social institution, its relationship to society, and its contribution to personality.

329. Urban Sociology
Fall, Winter, Spring. 4(4-0) SOC 241.
 Urban theory and research techniques emphasizing the demography, ecology and social organization of American cities and sociological aspects of urban planning and redevelopment.

332. Behavior of Youth
Winter, Spring. 4(4-0) SOC 241.
 Sociological analysis of normal and deviant behavior of youth. Issues related to the existence of youth subcultures. Relation of social change to behavior of youth.

333. Racial and Ethnic Inequality
Winter, Spring. 4(4-0) SOC 241.
 Sociology of racial and ethnic problems in contemporary society with an emphasis on American society. Attention to specific ethnic and racial groups in terms of prejudice and discrimination with particular concern for the resolution of inequality.

353. Sex Roles
Winter. 4(4-0) SOC 241.
