The Turfgrass Information File of Michigan State University Libraries reached a major milestone as their number of original descriptive records surpassed 200,000!

TGIF's first original descriptive record was created in September of 1984. Since then they have kept the gears turning for a steady 28 years to reach this momentous occasion.

Thanks goes to the staff and student employees who, over the years, helped to achieve such an amazing goal! Without the dedication and commitment of these individuals TGIF would not have been able to grow in quantity and quality to become the quintessential turfgrass information resource it is today.

The Turfgrass Information Center (TIC), a specialized unit at the Michigan State University Libraries (MSU), contains the most comprehensive publicly available collection of turfgrass educational materials in the world.

The Turfgrass Information File (TGIF) uses over 300,000 keywords and covers the full scope of the turfgrass industry with over 35% linked to full-text articles. The database monitors over 320 journals and magazines (including *Turf News* from 1977 to the present and back issues of **TPI's** *Business Management Newsletter*).



In addition, the database includes records for extension bulletins, books and book chapters, technical reports, thesis and dissertations, web documents, published Q&As, video interviews and more!

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Scientists Confirm - - Proper Use of Lawn Care Products DOES NOT Pose a Health Threat

Environmental Health Research Foundation presented research data on lawn care products and benefits to Connecticut Environmental Council reporting that the findings by noted scientists confirm that proper use <u>DOES NOT</u> pose a health threat.

CHANTILLY, Va., December 6, 2012— John Heinze, PhD and executive director of the Environmental Health Research Foundation recently presented the Foundation's latest research findings on the use of lawn care products at the Connecticut Environmental Council's annual meeting. Heinze joined presenters from the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary Program, the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station, and the University of Connecticut. Heinze presented his research as well as that of a colleague, Katherine von Stackelberg, Sc.D who is principal of E Risk Sciences and research manager at the Harvard Center for Risk Analysis.

Recently, von Stackelberg released findings on four of the most commonly used lawn care products. She reviewed research findings and data and evaluated the strength of the association between exposure and potential health effects. She reviewed the toxicological, epidemiological, and exposure data for bifenthrin, azoxystrobin, 2, 4-D and MCPA (a member of the same chemical family as 2,4-D). Her findings were recently published in the peer-reviewed Journal of Toxicology ("A Systemic Review of Carcinogenic Outcomes and Associated Mechanisms from Exposure to Concentration of 2,4-D and MCPA in the Environment.")

After completing the research, von Stackelberg stated, "I wouldn't hesitate to let my children and dogs play on a lawn where lawn care products have been used as long as the products were applied according to their respective labels."

Heinze presented von Stackelberg's research as well as his research review of the scientific literature on the benefits of lawns, parks, and playing fields, collectively called "green spaces." His findings indicate the positive impact to the environment from green spaces, including prevention of erosion and run-off; water and air purification; energy and cost savings; and freshening of air (oxygen generation). Health benefits included recreational space, stress reduction and increased physical activity leading to reduced obesity, improved health and increased longevity.

Heinze's overall conclusions in the presentation were:

- •Evidence of risk from use of four of the most widely used lawn care actives (azoxystrobin, bifenthrin, MCPA and 2,4-D) was found to be marginal to non-existent.
- •There are substantial environmental and health benefits from healthy, well-maintained lawns, parks and playing fields.
- Optimal benefits require healthy, well maintained lawns, parks and playing fields, which can only be achieved with the responsible use of lawn care products, including pesticides.

"As Dr. Stackelberg has noted on her report, significant research has been done on these products," Heinze explained, "and the weight of evidence indicates very little potential for adverse health effects associated with environmental exposures." He continued, "The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency carefully monitors and approves lawn care products for use and has, over the years, eliminated questionable products from use on lawns." Heinze further explained that, as part of the pesticide registration process, U.S. EPA evaluates and in some cases conducts independent research to evaluate potential risks and define acceptable uses. It has also determined that there is little or no health risk associated with exposure to bifenthrin, azoxystrobin, and MCPA when the products are used as directed.

"Green space, particularly in urban areas, offers significant health benefits, which are described in the Environmental Health Research Foundation's review of the literature. Maximizing these benefits may require the use of products to ensure a healthy, thriving green space, and the goal is to use products with the greatest efficacy and the least potential for risk," stated von Stackelberg.

Remembering Doug Fender

Doug Fender, TPI's former executive director (1983 to 2004) passed away unexpectedly on December 20, 2012.



Doug Fender grew up in northeastern Colorado and after high school he went on to the University of Colorado at Boulder where he received both his Bachelor of Science and Master of Arts degrees in journalism.

After a handful of odd jobs, he became the director of communications for the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America in 1973.

Five years later he became the director of public relations for the Million Dollar Round Table (MDRT). At that time, the MDRT was an independent, international life insurance sales achievement association with over 21,000 members in 41 countries.

In 1983 an opportunity presented itself and Doug became the Executive Director of the American Sod Producers Association (ASPA), which would later become Turfgrass Producers International (TPI). He continued on as TPI's executive director for over 20 years until his retirement in December of 2004. Over that twenty year span he doubled TPI's membership bringing it to over 1,100. Member countries outside the U.S. which once numbered just 10 also increased to over 40 representative countries.

Doug's contribution, commitment and dedication to TPI was always evident. He had a personal connection with TPI members and their families. For Doug, TPI was much more than an association, it was an extended family and over the years he developed warm and loyal friendships not just within TPI but throughout the green industry.

He was instrumental in forming the International Turf Producers Foundation (ITPF) in 1994 (now known as The Lawn Institute). Under his direction the foundation raised more than one-half million dollars to fund turfgrass-related research and support education. He also served on the Executive Committee and Board of Directors of Project Evergreen, a coalition representing all segments of the green industry dedicated to promoting the positive values of landscapes.

For nearly 20 years he was a director of the National Council of Agricultural Employers. He also created a coalition of the Irrigation Association, the American Nursery & Landscape Association and the Associated Landscape Contractors of America to create a website that addressed landscape water conservation techniques.

In 2002 the Turf and Ornamental Communicators Association (TOCA) recognized his contributions by naming him the Environmental Communicator of the Year. Upon his retirement in 2004 he was also the proud recipient of TPI's Honorary Membership Award.

After his retirement, Doug continued to conduct TPI Study Tours (a program he began in 1986) serving as an ambassador and a representative of the turfgrass industry. He provided many TPI members with the opportunity to meet with and form close relationships with fellow turfgrass producers around the globe. Among the countries he visited were: Australia, New Zealand, England, Scotland, Austria, Netherlands, China, Hong Kong, Chile, Argentina, South Africa, Zimbabwe, Spain, Portugal, Italy, Iceland, Denmark, Norway and Sweden.

Doug could engage anyone in friendly conversation and often make you smirk, smile or laugh with his captivating stories and clever humor. Long after his retirement it was obvious that Doug continued to care a great deal about TPI and he treasured the many friendships he made over the years. He will be greatly missed.
