Among those presenting were **Drew Wagner** of Sod Solutions with a presentation about Turf Logistics, Cloud Based Order Management & Logistics software; **Peter Rauwerda** of Green Horizon provided an introduction to Order Entry Logistic software to improve operating efficiencies; **Matt Duncan** of Nature's Wonder discussed Primera One Apex-10 and what he referred to as the ultimate soil and plant health technology; **John Kelly** of Redox Turf discussed the company's strides in plant growth technology and **Mike Kelly** of TerraMax discussed Innovation in Microbial Soil Management Tools.

So, how were the presentations on innovative products received? The interest was so great that TPI is planning a similar session for TPI's 2015 International Education Conference & Field Day in San Diego, California come next February.






WEDNESDAY – July 30th EXCLUSIVE TPI VIDEO INTERVIEW Natural Grass vs Artificial Turf: A Professional Athlete Weighs In

One of the highlights of the convention was an exclusive video presentation featuring former NFL Wide Receiver Ricky Proehl who expressed his personal thoughts on natural grass vs artificial turf. The twenty-five minute video was shown in its entirety.

In the coming weeks TPI will be releasing segments of the interview for posting on the TPI website, Facebook, and YouTube. TPI also plans to make the video available to members for posting on their websites and Facebook pages.



For a remarkable 17 seasons—almost unheard of in today's NFL, Ricky Proehl was one of the most sure-handed and clutch wide receivers in the game of American football. During his incredible career he appeared in 244 games with the Phoenix/Arizona Cardinals, Seattle Seahawks, Chicago Bears, St. Louis Rams, Carolina Panthers and Indianapolis Colts.

He was a member of four Super Bowl teams, including championship teams with the Rams and Colts and he is currently in his fourth season as a member of the Carolina Panther's coaching staff and second as Wide Receivers Coach.

As a professional athlete who played on both artificial and natural grass fields throughout his 17 year professional career he has strong personal feelings on the subject of practicing and playing on natural grass as opposed to artificial turf.

In June of 2014 he extended his time to Turfgrass Producers International and the North Carolina Sod Producers Association as a show of support for the contribution and efforts of turfgrass producers worldwide.





USDA Secretary Announces — Creation of Foundation for Food and Agricultural Research

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced the creation of the Foundation for Food and

Agricultural Research (FFAR) and the appointment of a 15-member board of directors. The new foundation will leverage public and private resources to increase the scientific and technological research, innovation, and partnerships critical to boosting America's agricultural economy.

Authorized by Congress as part of the 2014 Farm Bill, the foundation will operate as a non-profit corporation seeking and accepting private donations in order to fund research activities that focus on problems of national and international significance. Congress also provided \$200 million for the foundation which must be matched by non-federal funds as the Foundation identifies and approves projects.

"Studies have shown that every dollar invested in agricultural research creates \$20 in economic activity," said Vilsack.
"Investments in innovation made over the past several decades have developed new products and new procedures that have been critical to the continued growth of American agriculture. We must continue to make strategic investments in research and technology if we are to remain leaders in the global economy."

The research funded by the Foundation for Food and Agricultural Research will address issues including plant and animal health; food safety, nutrition and health; renewable energy, natural resources, and environment; agricultural and food security; and agriculture systems and technology.

The foundation's board of directors was chosen to represent the diverse sectors of agriculture. Seven of these board members were selected by the unanimous vote of the board's five ex-officio members from lists of candidates provided by industry, while eight representatives were unanimously elected from a list of candidates provided by the National Academy of Sciences. Congress mandated that the ex-officio members choose the initial 15 board members from among the lists provided by these two groups. However, new board members now have the option of adding additional members if they so choose. Secretary Vilsack said today he hoped the board would exercise its prerogative to add more members to expand the board's diversity.

In announcing the I5-member FFAR board today, Vilsack remarked, "Public-private partnerships are vital to the agricultural research community, and this is reflected in the membership of the foundation's board of directors."
