Clean Sweep - Pesticide Disposal

Ottawa County in cooperation with Vriesland Growers Cooperative has established a permanent agricultural chemical disposal facility. This site will handle the storage and disposal of waste agricultural pesticides (herbicides, insecticides, fungicides) because they are no longer labeled or useful. The new facility will accept pesticides from area agricultural operations and will arrange for the safe disposal at no cost to the farmer.

Beginning April 1st, the collection facility will accept agricultural chemicals by appointment only. Please call Ottawa County Environmental Health at 393-5638, or Dan Harrigan (phone 669-3120) at Vriesland Growers Cooperative to arrange for drop-off. Before you call, make a list of the pesticides you wish to dispose, identify them by trade name and common name, indicate whether the product is still usable and most importantly estimate weight and volume. Check to see if the item needs to be repackaged. Ottawa

County Environmental Health can provide repackaging materials if you need it. No pesticides will be accepted at Vriesland without an appointment.

The Ottawa County Pesticide Disposal Facility comes to you as a result of the efforts of Ottawa County Environmental Health, Michigan Department of Agriculture, Ottawa County MSU/Extension and Vriesland Growers Cooperative.

Nine Safe Transport Tips For Waste Agricultural Chemicals

1. Usable fungicides, herbicides and insecticides are acceptable at the collection facility.
2. Keep products in original, sealed and labeled containers.
3. Do not mix the contents of unknown or unlabeled containers.
4. If portions of an agricultural pesticide are placed in a new container, duplicate the existing label and place it on the new container.

5. Ensure that containers are not leaking prior to transporting to collection facility.

- inspect steel drums for excessive rust, pinholes or deficient seams.
- over pack all leaking containers in a clear plastic bag or a rigid, leak proof container
- if a container is at all questionable, over pack it for safety.

6. Do not transport containers with open tops.

7. Secure all containers in vehicle to ensure that they cannot slide, tip or spill contents during transport.

8. Place chemicals in transport vehicle away from passengers.

9. To over pack a large container, such as a 30 to 55 gallon drum, call the collection facility contact listed for further assistance.

GCSAA Nominating Committee Approves 1998 Slate of Candidates

The Nominating Committee of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America met at association headquarters in July to examine eligibility and qualifications of those nominated to serve on GCSAA's 1998 Board of Directors.

GCSAA members will have the opportunity to decide three officer posts and elect two directors from a field of four candidates for the 1998 Board of Directors during the annual meeting, Feb. 7, during GCSAA's 69th International Golf Course Conference and Show, Feb. 2-8, in Anaheim, Calif. The following slate of candidates was unanimously approved by the nominating committee.

For President: George Renault III, CGCS, Burning Tree Club in Bethesda, Md.

For Vice President: David W. Fearis, CGCS, Blue Hills Country Club

in Kansas City, Mo.

For Secretary/Treasurer: Tommy D. Witt, CGCS, Wynstone Golf Club in North Barrington, Ill.; and R. Scott Woodhead, CGCS, Valley View Golf Club in Bozeman, Mont.

For Directors: Joseph H. Emanuel Jr., CGCS, Hurstbourne Country Club in Louisville, Ky., Jon D. Maddern, CGCS, Elk Ridge Golf Club in Atlanta, Mich., Ken Magnum, CGCS, Atlanta Athletic Club in Duluth, Ga., and Wayne P. Remo, CGCS, Rock Spring Club in West Orange, N.J.

Samuel R. Snyder VII, CGCS, and Michael Wallace, CGCS, each have one year remaining on their two-year director terms. Paul S. McGinnis, CGCS, 1997 President, will serve as 1998 immediate past president, and Bruce R. Williams, CGCS, 1997 immediate past president, will retire from the board.

"With my understanding of the demands and hectic schedule placed on the superintendent, I am pleased to see there are some willing to give up personal time in order to give back to their profession," says Gary T. Grigg, CGCS, nominating committee chairman.

Also serving on the nominating committee are Jack D. Birdwell; Robert W. Graunke, CGCS; James B. Hodge and Ross James O'Fee, CGCS.

Candidates for the 1998 Board of Directors will be introduced at the Chapter Delegates Meeting, Sept. 5-7, at GCSAA headquarters. USGA, GCSAA, NTEP join forces to administer on-site golf course testing for grass varieties

The United States Golf Association (USGA), the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America (GCSAA) and the National Turfgrass Evaluation Program (NTEP) are combining resources to manage a new national research project that will evaluate grass varieties (also known as cultivars) on actual golf course settings.

"On-site testing of turfgrass cultivars is not a new concept," said Robert C. Shearman, Ph.D. NTEP executive director. "However, the joint sponsorship of on-site putting green trials is new. Golf course superintendents have been asking for some time to have information that bridged the game between small-plot university trials and their end-use needs."

Practice putting greens built to USGA specifications at 16 different golf courses across the nation, featuring bermudagrass and/or bentgrass varieties, will be monitored to provide data for golf course personnel in the building and maintenance of facilities. The northern locations will integrate bentgrass cultivars, and far-south venues will employ bermudagrass varieties. Both will be used in transition zone climates.

The USGA originally funded variety testing research on golf courses in the 1930s and 40s. Testing then moved to university research settings in the late 1940s. While this research has been the backbone of the turfgrass industry, there was a void of actual on-site testing for those in the golf industry. The USGA/GCSAA/NTEP project will use the combined efforts of superintendents, university researchers and USGA Green Section staff for monitoring and evaluation. Annual reports will be filed over a five-year period, with an evaluation of the program for possible continuation with the same or different grass varieties.

"The greatest gains in turfgrass research have and will continue to come from universities," said GCSAA Director of Research Jeff Nus, Ph.D. "But this project allows us to do 'real world' testing and replicate actual conditions in order to provide the best data to those

in the golf course maintenance profession. Golfer expectations and golf course conditions have changed so much in the last three decades that we need to study cultivar performance based on the conditions demanded by today's golfers."

Because traffic is an important factor in cultivar performance, all of the putting greens constructed for the project will be used as actual practice greens at the respective facilities. Preliminary work has begun on the construction of greens at some locations, while sponsors/companies have entered the various bentgrass and bermudagrass cultivars to be considered by researchers for use in the trials study. The list of cultivars to be included in the test will be determined later this fall.
